Tornadic winds might ponder is what the enemy in Vietnam is doing to exploit the antics of the radical protestors. The answer can be found in news releases from Hanoi that invariably follow the statements of a few of the less rational doves in our government and in the well-financed peace demonstrations. The North Vietnam communist leaders boast of this as being the will of the majority of Americans. They know that this is false, but the Vietnam people have no access to the truth and must accept the word of their rulers as gospel.

Another aspect of the radical dissenters' actions is not quite so conspicuous, but equally destructive. This is the closing down of Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) programs on campuses and the harassment of service recuriters on university campuses. School administrators find it easier to surrender to the demands of the violent than to continue to give academic credit, or in some cases even to continue the ROTC programs. Even as they close the military training programs they encourage new courses in many fields that have no reason for being except as sops to the demands of radicals and special interest groups.

The banning of armed forces recruiters on campuses has caused the Marine Corps to fall short of its needs for new



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

#### New SMV Emblem To Feature Texas Farm Safety Week

Texas Governor Preston Smith has proclaimed July 20-26 Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week and called on rural residents to make use of the new SMV emblem on slow moving agricultural vehicles as added protection when traveling on Lone Star State high-

He also urged rural residents to take advantage of modern technology designed to remove many of the hazards in agricultural enterprises and cited that in spite of a declining rural population and advances in agricultural technology, farm and ranch accidents in Texas continue to steadily in-

crease. Last year 297 Texans died as the result of farm accidents, an increase of six percent in the number of fatalities over the previous year. Injuries for the past year are estimated at 33,200 as compared to 31,400 in


"If we are to reverse this trend, we must renew our efforts to prevent accidents among our rural residents as they go about the hazardous task of producing the commodities needed by the entire pop-ulation," the Governor said

in his proclamation. The Texas observance coincides with observance of National Farm Safety Week, proclaimed by the President, to focus attention on farm accident prevention throughout the nation.

A new life-saving device which has proved promising in emergency situations in hospitals across the nation is now being tested by Army and Navy doctors in Viet Nam. Developed by Cleveland's famed neurosurgeon, Dr. W. James



Gardner, and scientists of the Kendall Company, manufacturers of hospital supplies, the device is known as the "Curity G-Suit." It is a modern version of the antigravity pressure suit created in World War II to prevent "blackouts" that were occurring in fighter pilots because of severe centrifugal

Mother's Life Saved The life-saving potential of the Curity G-Suit was first demonstrated in a dramatic case reported in medical journals by Dr. Gardner and his

Here is what happened: A young mother was near death from intra-abdominal hemorrhage. Two prolonged surgical operations had failed to con-

trol the bleeding. Within a period of 181/2 hours she had required 55 pints of blood, more than 5 times the amount normally present in the body, and, in addition, 10 liters of other

After her abdomen was closed, she was placed in the suit in the hope that its pressure would keep her alive until her husband might have a last word with her. With inflation of the suit the blood pressure rose and, to everyone's amazement, the bleeding ceased. The suit was removed after 24 hours with no recurrence of bleeding. She eventually left the hospital and has remained in good health.

Although in this case the use of the G-Suit proved curative, its chief function is to "buy time" in an emergency until bleeding can be brought under control by the surgeon.

Pressure Closes Wounds "The pressure which the suit brings to bear on bleeding arteries and veins in the abdomen works to close these wounds even as it raises blood pressure," said William O. Elson, director of research of the Kendall laboratories. "Even more important, by diverting blood to the heart and brain it acts to preserve the function of these vitally important or-

The same pneumatic princi-ple was applied by Dr. Gardner and Kendall researchers in developing a plastic inflatable splint. It also serves as a compression dressing to reduce edema and to control bleeding in an arm or leg. Known as the Curity G-Splint, it is now widely used in emergency first aid and on the battle field.

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

Bottled water sales are expected to reach \$60 million this year. It is sold in supermarkets in plastic half-gallon bottles, sold to residential customers in five-gallon bottles and vended in machines to customers who bring their own containers.

As our population continues its steady climb upward and the demand for pure water increases it seems logical that the sale of bottled water will increase, says Eual Davis of the Soil Conservation Service. One of the reasons for this increased sale is the increased pollution of our present supply of pure water, Davis continues.

The sad part of this fact is that water pollution can be reduced or eliminated if known ways and means were put to use. No doubt future generaions will judge most harshly a race of people who had the bility to prevent water polution, but simply would not

Agriculture has always been a major contributor to water pollution and soil erosion is the number one offender. After every rain SCS personcres of productive cropland eceive serious soil erosion This need not happen today ecause there are more and etter ways of control.

The Soil Conservation Serrice has advocated for years a complete terrace system, good waterways, a proven ropping system and the conversion of less suitable crop-

land back to grass as the way to end soil erosion. We still believe this to be true, however, we have made several improvements which we feel will benefit district cooperators.

One of these improvements is parallel terraces which can be farmed with multi-row equipment, farmed faster and more economically. You not only save money but you also save the soil. If your dislike for the old type terrace system has kept you from terracing your land come by and see us about the new type-parallel terraces

If every landowner will control soil erosion on his farm, ranch, and city property it will allow future historians to write that agriculture is no longer a major contributor to water pollution. Cost-share assistance is available through the local ASCS offices. Local directors of the Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District urge each landowner to do his part in Soil and Water Conservation.






