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## Kids Have Pedestrian Crossing at Highway

Fifteen years after the Supreme Court handed down its decree on desegregation of schools, the hassle on desegregation seems to be as much a problem as it ever was. But not because people are still defying the original court order. The reason now is that civil rights extremists are reading a different meaning into the old order.

Folks old enough to remember can recall very clearly what happened in early test cases in Arkansas and Mississippi. The first Negro pupils seeking admittance to all white schools had their entrance barred by throngs of angry whites. And federal troops were called in to see that colored children were allowed to attend where they wished. The Supreme Court had ruled that a child could not be barred from any school because of race. Gradually the public got adjusted to the rule and children all over the country were admitted wherever they wished to attend.

However, that condition is not good enough for the race mixing enthusiasts in the department of Health, Education and Welfare. They put a new interpretation on the Supreme Court order, disregarding the child's original right to go where he pleases and insisting instead that the child be forced to transfer so as to achieve a better balance of integration.

One can rightfully wonder why the Supreme Court has tolerated this obvious change of its order. Why does it now fail to protect the right of thousands of children to attend schools of their choice? That is, the schools of their own home neighborhoods.

There is a difference, of course. Originally attendance was barred by people of the community. Now it is barred by a federal agency. But it does seem that in the second case, as well as in the first, the high court ought to back up its own decree in behalf of the pupil's right.

The irony in all this mess is that the federal integrationists, claiming to seek justice for the minority colored people, are pushing both races around. A few bits of current news tell the story.

"Negroes protested having to leave their all-black schools in a few communities of South Carolina, North Carolina, Louisiana and Georgia."

"White students boycotted mixed schools in parts of Alabama, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi and North Carolina."

"Negro pickets ringed predominantly Negro schools in Grand Rapids, Mich. They were protesting busing of black pupils into schools where blacks would be a minority."

"There were white protests and court battles against programs for busing pupils to get more integration in schools of Denver and Oklahoma City."

Those are only some of the many cases throughout the country. Those are cases making the headlines because communities are resisting the HEW orders. Besides those, there are hundreds more in which communities are unhelpfully complying with the order because they are not able to refuse.

When our magnanimous big government first introduced its federal aid to education, much of the country was suspicious. People feared that the government will regulate what it subsidizes. But they were assured that no such intention existed. Big government only wanted to help. No strings would be attached to the handouts.

Well, no one doubts now that the promise has been broken. After programs were established and the schools became dependent on big checks from Washington, HEW took control. It simply threatened to cut off the funds and put schools out of business if they did not do as told. This and this only is the reason why many communities are now complying under protest, why others are in serious trouble for resisting.

As regards the order of forced integration by busing, one has to wonder about the motives of HEW. By what twisted reasoning does it justify a system which wastes millions of dollars and millions of hours on needless transportation? How can it justify the brazen disregard of so many people's wishes? How can it justify the decline of scholastic achievement resulting from the difficulties and the unhappy situation?

Most of the factors which normally seem important in

A pedestrian crossing at the intersection of Highway 82 and Hickory street is the newest improvement in traffic safety at Muenster. It was established by the Highway Department in cooperation with the City Council.

Hopefully this will remove a hazard which existed since the old alternate red and green traffic light was replaced by a blinker light several weeks ago. Amber (caution) blinkers face the highway and red (stop) blinkers face Hickory Street.

City Superintendent Steve Moster said the change is fine for vehicle traffic. Formerly there were frequent front and rear collisions when the light changed to red and the second car failed to stop in time. Now traffic keeps moving and cars are not being bumped from the rear.

However another problem was created. With the green light, pedestrians, consisting mostly of school children, had their interval for safe crossing. Since then they have had to wait until traffic was clear in both directions before going across. The result has been, Moster said, several known cases of bad judgment by the kiddies. "We're lucky that no one was hurt."

The pedestrian crossing is an effort to correct the pedestrian problem while retaining a satisfactory system for the vehicles. For most of the day vehicles can go on as usual, however drivers are reminded "that children and other pedestrians crossing the highway now have the right of way, and the sign means just what it says: Vehicles must 'Stop for Pedestrians'."

Mayor Earl Fisher said that the next safety endeavor is to reduce vehicle speed at the crossing. Many are exceeding a "caution" speed particular-

## Hornets Trample Alvord Bulldogs In Practice Test

With regard to the score, Muenster High's Hornets passed their second test with flying colors, but Coaches Glenn Richardson and Dan Hamric saw a lot of faults which are receiving attention this week.

A good attendance of fans was more interested in the 36-6 win over the Alvord Bulldogs, and in the over-all performance matching the score.

MHS led 23 to 3 in the first-down tally and 463 to 22 in total yardage. It completed 17 of 41 passes for 259 yards, Alvord completed 2 of 6 for 7 yards. Despite yardage gained the Hornets coaches were concerned about the record of completions.

The Hornets started with a 70 yard march in eleven plays ending with Monday's sneak over the goal.

They missed two more scoring threats and were working on a third when an Alvord lineman intercepted and galloped 95 yards to tie the count. Moments later Monday and Bruns connected on a 70 yard TD play.

A fumble recovery, pass to Koelzer for 22 yards and a sneak produced the third score. Next an interception by Enders and four plays for 33 yards produced the fourth TD. A screen pass to Koelzer for 13 scored again just before the quarter ended.

During the final period MHS bogged down on two drives before going 70 to a TD just before the game ended. Koelzer made the last 3 yards.

The evening ended with 15 minutes of play by B teams. Ricky Huchton started the action with a 70 yard scoring run and the rest was a deadlock.

The 1968 attendance was only 8,725, reflecting the fact that the 68 summer was much milder than this year's. Biggest day this year was July 6, with 349.

Dan Hamric was the pool manager. He was assisted by David Fette and Janelle Stoffels.

## \$795,000 Budget Okayed by County

Two items for the city of Muenster are included in a \$795,000 budget for 1970, adopted Monday by the Cooke County Commissioners Court. The city continues to receive \$1,000 per year from the county for its service at rural fires. About half of the firemen's calls are outside the city limit.

Also the city continues to receive funds for its library, the amount for next year having been upped from \$1,200 to \$1,400. The library had asked for \$2,500.

Expected expenditures of the budget are listed under three funds: Road and bridge, \$358,309; Road and bridge lateral, \$35,924; Administration \$401,567. The lateral fund includes estimated cost of right of way for widening Highway 82 to four lanes from Muenster to the Montague County line.

Included in administration are pay raises for all elected officials and employees. Two officials were raised from \$484 to \$550 a month and others got a 10 per cent raise.

Muenster Hospital is a partner in the deal. It is authorized to dispense blood which is credited to the Muenster account to all patients in the lo-

cal hospital and also to patients of other hospitals who are eligible to draw on the community's blood account.

A third partner is the Red River Blood Center of Wichita Falls, a part of the nationwide Red Cross organization. It collects the blood, processes, stores and transports it and also does the bank's bookkeeping.

David Bright, administrator of Muenster hospital, pointed out the economic advantage of being in the Red Cross system. Under the previous arrangement blood was purchased, whereas in this system blood will be given by donors. Expense of processing and handling and the hospital's cost of administering remain about the same. Because the original cost of blood is eliminated, the cost of blood to a patient will be about half as much as it has been.

The bargain price applies even when the blood is administered elsewhere, for instance during an operation in Dallas or Wichita Falls or emergency treatment following an accident anywhere. Anyone living within the Muenster Hospital District is entitled to blood from the system

## Tigers Confident For Panther Game

Confidence is running high at Sacred Heart this week as the small but eager squad of Tigers prepare for their opening encounter at Saint Jo Saturday night at 8 o'clock.

The boys along with their coach, Tom Joy, have had their enthusiasm sharpened in a pair of scrimmages that revealed both offensive and defensive ability even though they were outmanned and outscored in both events. They have the feeling that they will face their equals this week and swing the outcome their way by extra determination and hustle.

Practicing with the Pilot Point B string the Tigers were downed by three long scoring runs. Take away those plays and the Sacred Heart defense looked sharp, limiting the young Bearcats to short yardage and some losses. Offense too was generally good. The boys moved the ball nicely on three drives and scored once.

A comparison of teams should rate the game as a toss-up, according to Coach Joy. Both teams are light and short in experience. Both have to rely heavily on freshmen and sophomores. Sacred Heart probably is ahead in starting strength but Saint Jo definitely has better reserve strength. The Panthers have fourteen on the bench, the Tigers only four.

As Joy sees it, much depends on how well his starters can hold out, and even more depends on which side makes fewer mistakes. With two teams of youngsters in the fray he expects miscues — while hoping that his team will come out with the better record.

and the only charges to such patients is the service and administrative costs.

At this time patients of the hospital and residents of the district are eligible to draw on the blood bank. Possibility of enlarging the list of eligibles is being studied.

The hospital as well as the patients will get a financial lift from the new system. Under the present method the hospital pays a stocking fee of one dollar per day per pint for blood in storage. Since six pints are normally kept on hand the cost is \$42 a week less an adjustment for blood that is taken out of stock for use. The net cost of this fee now is about \$2,000 a year, just for having the blood available. This cost is absorbed entirely by the hospital. Under the Red Cross system this fee will be eliminated.

The advantages available in the Red Cross blood bank system appealed to the local KC membership and received its enthusiastic endorsement.

Next step will be recruitment of donors and notification for them to be present when a bloodmobile comes here. Date of the unit's visit will be announced as soon as it is set. Everybody in the district, not just the KCs, is invited and urged to participate in the project, and the Knights are confident of a good response.

A minimum of 50 pints is normally expected in a bloodmobile visit. The KCs expect about twice that much.

Whatever the number of pints it will be credited to Muenster's account and the community will be permitted to draw on it until the supply is exhausted.

This does not mean that the same blood taken here will remain in storage until used. The time for using blood is limited. After that it is processed into plasma and other products. Meanwhile the bloodmobile visits are scheduled to keep an adequate supply of fresh blood on hand at all times.

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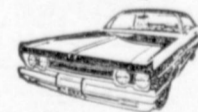
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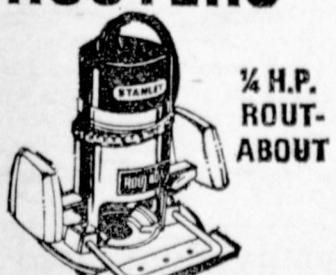
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**Surprises Greet Miss Lena Kleiss**
