
Starting the third period Muenster went 64 yards to the 7 and a Bee had the ball wrestled out of his hands.






**Bill Blanchards** Here During Visit Newlyweds Mr. and Mrs.



In other business conducted by Mrs. Joe Paul Fuhrmann president, members planned to again send Christmas packages to servicemen overseas.


