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In Dallas they are saying that no issue has ever caused as much public dissatisfaction as the recent federal court order for wholesale busing of children to achieve a racial balance in the schools. Congressman Collins has been on radio and TV denouncing the idea as a colossal blunder which actually results in poorer education for the children besides causing extensive hardship and expense. At the same time racial equality enthusiasts insist that minority children are entitled not only equal opportunity but to the identical same opportunity that white children have.

Senator John Tower also takes up the subject in his weekly release to constituents. He reports that he has proposed a Constitutional Amendment which states specifically that children should not be assigned to public schools on the basis of race and which goes a long way toward establishing the policy that public schools are primarily the concern of local school boards and parents. Tower has also introduced a resolution telling the Supreme Court to consider the disruptive effects that its rulings have on the educational process and that busing should not be required as a method of balancing ethnic groups.

Tower admits, however, that he is disappointed with Senate response to both the amendment and the resolution. Neither has received attention thus far and prospects for the near future are not encouraging.

This situation is one of the greatest puzzles of these confused times. It is an outrage to the people who have to observe it, a violation of common sense and of the American constitution. On the pretense of offering equal opportunity to all, it denies children of their right to go where they please and furthermore imposes a system which has already been proved by experience to be inferior to the old method.

Unfortunately this thing has been developing rather slowly. A comparatively small percentage of the nation has been affected and too many other people have remained unconcerned. But the movement keeps growing, hopefully approaching the time when enough people will be concerned to do something about it. That's when we can expect public pressure to reach Washington and force the Senate and House to pass corrective laws.

We wonder whether that time might possibly be near. Southern states this year are hit harder than ever before by the busing order. Strong resentment gets stronger by the year until there is enough of it to get results.

A great mystery about busing is that it ever got started in the first place. Civil Rights champions made a big issue about the quality of education the minority children were receiving before that historic Supreme Court decision of 1954, but now they impose hardships on the students resulting in a poorer quality of education. They sought and received the Supreme Court decision allowing children to attend where they wish, but their busing demands now deny that wish.

As this column sees it, the 1954 ruling says all children must be allowed to attend schools of their choice. Troops and federal marshals were sent into the South to protect blacks enrolling in white schools. But now children are not allowed to go where they wish. They have to bus back and forth to achieve racial balance — an obvious violation of the 1954 decision.

Besides, the regulation imposes on children and parents and the school faculty. First to consider is the huge cost of providing buses and drivers and the operating budget to haul the children, money that could be spent better on additional teachers, teaching aids, etc. And there's the child's wasted time being hauled daily to a far away school and the unfavorable attitude resulting from the unpleasant drives.

One should also consider the exclusion from PTA or extra curricular activity. When a class day is over, that's it. Neither child or parents is willing to make more trips across town to join in the other school's activity. In case of emergency this could be a serious problem. Suppose a child is injured or ill. The parent when notified would have to

The weatherman's jinx continues to hang on at Muenster. While areas all over the state, including some just a few miles from here, have been receiving dandy showers, this community receives token rainfall or nothing.

For instance, Wednesday's heavy clouds spilled only .43 inch here and considerably more elsewhere. And Muenster remained bone dry while a few nice soakers fell on neighboring communities.

However July to date is better than eight of the nine preceding months. Last Friday gave up a pleasing 1.32 and the total now is 1.83. Total for the year to date is 9.26 inches, which is less than half of normal for this time of the year.

This extends the current drought period to almost 10 months with a total rainfall of only 11.91 inches.

Some of what the visitors saw Sunday will be shown on film August 8-11 at a national convention of locker and freezer provisioners in Minneapolis. The movie, taken last week Wednesday by representatives of the E. F. Zuber engineering firm of Minneapolis, features newly patented items — a device for more efficient and humane killing of cattle, a water-pressure lift for the offal cart, and a carcass transfer from high to low rail. J. W. Fisher has been invited to appear at the meeting and comment on the operations.

Fisher's new plant includes a holding pen with capacity for 25 animals, the slaughter room with adjoining room for hides, intestines, etc., a pre-chill room, a cooler, a locker room for employees, and an office, shower and rest room for the inspector.

Tip Helps Deputy Solve Thefts of 4 Cycle Helmets

Good police work aided by citizen cooperation solved a theft case here last week while it was still warm. Or it might more properly be referred to as four separate thefts by the same two persons.

Two motorcycle helmets were stolen Tuesday night and two Wednesday night. One was recovered immediately after being taken the others were returned Friday and Saturday. Deputy Vernon Friedrich conducted the investigation.

The series of events started Tuesday night as Melvin Luke and Dickie Moster left their helmets with their machines outside The Center. When they came back the helmets were gone.

Next night Joan Pels and Ronnie Huneycutt, just back from tennis games, saw a suspicious character near Huneycutt's car. As Ronnie approached to investigate he saw the person throw something behind a shrub and leave. The couple found a helmet there which Joan thought was David Fette's. They took it to David's home and he recognized it as his.

Later a car drove up near the Pels home and someone went to the shrubbery, apparently looking for the helmet thrown there earlier. Mrs. Ed Pels was able to get the license number and reported it. Shortly later Deputy Friedrich saw the car and questioned the two occupants. Nothing was found.

The next morning Frank Moster discovered that his helmet was gone and Friedrich suspected that the two boys questioned the night before might be involved. One of them, a juvenile from a neighboring town, was brought to the city hall for questions. The other, his cousin from Houston, had returned home.

The youth admitted stealing Frank Moster's helmet. They had it hidden in shrubbery at the cemetery when they were stopped the night before. After more questioning he admitted having Luke's helmet but said Dickie Moster's was in Houston. He was told to have it sent back at once and the helmet arrived by mail the next day. All the helmets have been returned.

drive across town instead of a few blocks.

Discipline too can be expected to be more difficult under busing. The admitted motive is to mix the races and one can imagine that two groups of youngsters both resentful of busing and both preferring to associate with their own race will not be in a very harmonious mood.

One of the saddest facts about the system is that even the minorities, who supposedly are favored, don't want any part of it. Thousands would rather go to their own neighborhood schools regardless of racial imbalance. And, like many whites, they are not at all convinced that racial mixing improves the quality of any child's education.

In fact the obvious decline of educational quality leads only to one conclusion. The only thing achieved by busing is forceful mixing of the races in addition to their normal contacts in every day life. Is that what the races want? Or is it the wish of civil rights extremists? Or perhaps the wish of crackpots and subversives who favor forced mixing as a means of racial strife.

Well, some day the legislators will come to their senses and make it a law that every child can attend where he wishes. But when?
