

The best news in a long long time relative to the Vietnam war is Monday's report that the big offensive from the north is fizzling out. Which is equivalent to saying that President Nixon's Vietnamization program is paying off, allowing Americans to return home as South Vietnamese successfully assume responsibility for their country's defense. This is the best assurance to date that we have succeeded in our mission of preventing a take over by communists and allowing South Vietnam to determine its future.

Other good news concerning the offensive is the report that people of South Vietnam remained loyal to the Saigon government. Documents found on captured invaders indicated that Hanoi was counting on a popular uprising in support of its "liberation" effort.

Well, now everybody knows where the loyalties lie. That's an assurance to Saigon and a rebuke to Hanoi, also a definite reminder to lots of critics over here that our efforts over there have not been wasted. Despite the stories we hear on corruption, this indicates that the general public cherishes the ideals we fought for. After all, those are the people we were most concerned with.

Something else about the campaign seems to indicate a possible switch in the conduct of the war. The report says that North Vietnam is now considered as part of the battlefield area. Does this mean that finally South Vietnam, after all the years of defense, will go on the offense? We like to think that its troops have made that much progress, and that Hanoi is weakening.

It would be most interesting to see what develops if and when the action spreads north of the DMZ . . . especially in relation to popular uprising. 


On Electric Motors Next Week at MHS Farmers of this area have an opportunity next week to attend a short course on farm electrification sponsored by the vocational agriculture di-

Muenster High School. It will be held Monday through Thursday in the agriculture department of MHS. Entry fee will be \$3.00 and certificates will be presented

to persons who complete the course. The instructor will be Bob Jaska, farm electrification specialist of TEA and Texas A&M University. He has a master's degree in agricultural engineering, has been prominent in research work on the subject at A&M, and has been with the TEA ag education program since 1958. He has been coordinator of the pro-

gram since 1962. He says the short course overs such subjects as safety: proper choice of wire sizes, installing motor circuits; selection, protection, maintenance and grounding of electric motors; reversing electric motors and changing them from 120 to 240 volts; and how to cal-

culate the cost of operating electrical equipment. In addition the course will present opportunities for the farmers to bring up questions on their own special problems and interests in electricity.

This brings on a question that has been asked in this column before. Why is this strictly a defensive war with Americans and South Vietnamese being forced to fight when and where the enemy wishes? It's been that way from the start and all the while all of us knew that we can't win that way.

Accordingly, this column could not understand why we refrained from an all out attack on major cities and supply centers to knock the North out of the war. It wondered why our country let itself be influenced by the doves and traitors who were horrified by

every success on our side. Why should Washington and

Saigon ignore a basic fact of history? Namely that any country which extends its hand in greed thereby also sticks parents, the John Herrs and out its neck. When Hanoi sent other relatives. They were its troops south it declared itself as fair game for an attack by the South. That's how history has been made for centuries. Why in our time has it become wrong to retaliate against an aggressor from Korea and another from Vietnam? And, just because we goofed twice on that point, why should we be obliged now to continue the blunder?

This column has a weakness for wishful thinking, so it is inclined to presume now that Hanoi troops are pooped and Saigon troops are starting to feel their oats. It would be delighted with a big turnabout in which the South, instead of the North, waged the war of liberation. It would like for the world to know the difference of reaction by the people who are liberated from communism and those who are "liberated" from freedom. More than anything else it

would like to think that the global red conquest has been checked rather than advanced, and that the arrogant communists who insisted on dictating the Paris peace talks will have to settle on Saigon's terms

Considering recent developments, such an outcome suddenly becomes possible. With a vast buildup of our supporting forces and the apparent improvement of South Vietnam's military capability, it seems very possible finally to turn the war around.



Remember Simas Kudirka, who attempted to defect to the United States in November, 1970. but who was forcibly handed over to the Soviet authorities by U. S. Goast Guard officers? The facts about his trial are now known. It took place last May 17-20 before the Supreme Court of the Lithuanian Republic in the city of Vilnius.

Attorney Gavronskis was assigned to defend Mr. Kudirka, but Mr. Kudirka deto have him. When clined asked why, he said: "If Gavronskis is an honest man and defends me according to his conscience, then it can only do Gavronskis harm. But if he is dishonest and plays the role of second prosecutor, as often happens in political trials in Lithuania, then I think that my case is already complex enough and one prosecutor is enough."
