To this column's knowledge there have been three sectional meetings of newspaper editors in the past several weeks at which those attending were polled on their opinions in the governor's race. To the question of who will carry their respective counties the voting generally favored Ben Barnes. But to the question on how they intend to vote personally most favored Dolph Briscoe.

It was equivalent to saying that they expect to see well organized machine politics determine the outcome of the election but, in their own judgment Briscoe is best for the job.

Fortunately for the state, the editors seem to have taken inspiration from their own opinions revealed by the polls. They discovered that they have lots of company sharing their belief in Briscoe as best suited for the job, and a constantly increasing number of them have given him their endorsement. They are discovering also that folks of other trades and professions and interests feel the same about the governor race. They assume that politics will prevail whereas they lean personally toward Briscoe.

All of which indicates that Texas is favored with a great opportunity to make a badly needed change at Austin. Not only in getting rid of Smith but also in repudiating the political machine which is assumed to be sweeping Ben Barnes into office.

Our guess is that the next two weeks will witness a definite swing toward the Uvalde rancher. The word is out that he has a good chance to win as increasing numbers come out openly in his support.

Behind it all are two very big reasons. First of all Texans are embarrassed and disgusted by the shenanigans of the past year at Austin. They don't agree that men in high places can be involved in stock fraud deals and just happen to get rich without getting their hands dirty. For that matter they don't approve of other wheeling dealing characters who exploit their stamp accounts or who circumvent the nepotism law by deals with other legislators in placing each others' kin folks on the payroll.

The other reason is the make-up Briscoe. Man to man he just stands taller than the other candidates. He is highly respected as a leading citizen in his home town, dedicated to the welfare of his neighbors and willing to do more than his part in promoting his community's progress. The folks who know him best are for him.

Besides, Briscoe is a rancher and business man rather than a politician. We think of him as a person who will apply solid business judgment in the state's fiscal affairs just as he has in his own personal affairs, a trait which we confidently expect to be reflected in a more realistic budget. Somehow we expect Briscoe to come up with a program that will give more of a break to taxpayers and less of a break to the something-for-nothing people.

Something more of the Briscoe character is indicated by his record as a rancher. He was an outstanding president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattlemen's Association. He's doing a fine job now as state director of the screw-worm eradication program. More than any candidate in many years he's qualified to do things for farmers and ranchers. And, as a legislator in the fifties, he had a big part in originating the state Farm to Market Road program.

By comparison the other candidates all seem to come up short. Preston Smith leaves the impression that he just isn't big enough for the job. Ben Barnes, referred to as the boy wonder of Texas politics a few years ago, appears to be more dedicated to himself than his state. We don't relish the thought of him using the governorship as a stepping stone to national politics.

Regarding the lady in the race, well, our number one concern is her over concern for the state's welfare element. We who pay the bills believe that the program should be tapered down rather than expanded. We don't agree that it's good for the state, or even for the welfare beneficiaries, to encourage careers in sponging off the public.

Good Rain Arrives with Twister, Power Failure

The moisture situation here was vastly improved Wednesday night, but at considerable cost as a twister passed through town causing more than an hour of blackout and thousands of dollars worth of damage.

The rain measured .56 in. during the rough weather and .57 later. With the .93 in. late last week that brings the month's moisture measure to 2.06 inches and the year's total to 3.24. Though late for the grain crops it's fine for all other vegetation.

The twister came about 8:45 knocking out the power with its first blow. Ernest Jaska of TP&L said that a broken tree limb shorted the line to an oil well just south of town, and the situation was further complicated moments later when wreckage at Stockmen's feed store snarled more wires.

Power was restored in sections, some after 15 minutes, some after 45 minutes, and some more than an hour later.

Probably the worst damage was to Stockmen's Feed Store's storage bins and Muenster Mill's elevator. Four bins were moved across a driveway and smashed against the elevator and scale house, causing severe damage to all the units. Related damage was to the chute system above the bins and to the delivery chute at the elevator.

Next in line, apparently, was the Dairy Inn where roof flashing was curled up but not torn off and the elaborate sign was badly damaged. Less

Band to Present Concert April 26

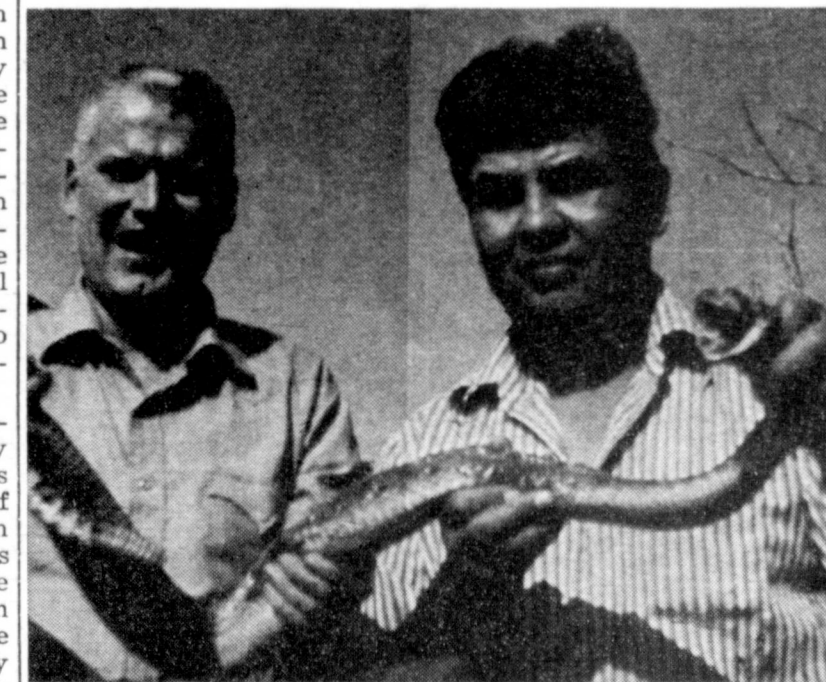
Muenster Public School band members will give a spring concert next Wednesday, April 26 in MHS auditorium at 8:15 p.m.

Muenster Jaycees are ready for their second annual rattlesnake hunt to be held here Saturday and Sunday of this week with headquarters in the city park — or in the Boys Club if weather is bad.

Business of the meeting will be a report by Manager Michael Sloan on the past year's growth, activity and finances, along with any new business that is brought before the group.

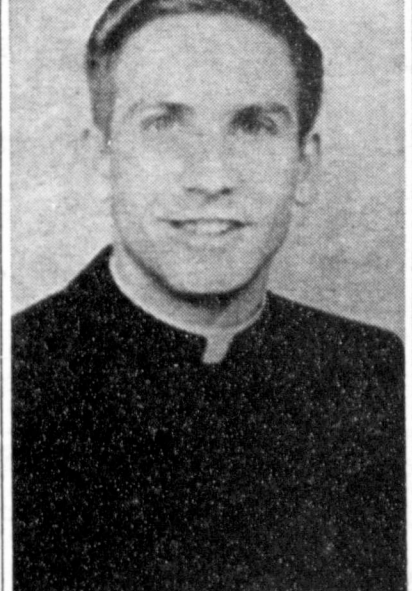

He is a native of Muenster and attended Sacred Heart School.


Hellman received an award for "long and faithful service to the university, significant professional attainment and valuable community service" at a dinner dance in the Wisconsin Club.
