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Polls open Tuesday for 1996 Primary elections

Tuesday, March 12 is the day that Texas voters will have to decide whether they will go to the Republican or Democratic polls to cast ballots for nominees for members of Congress, members of the Legislature, state, district, county, and precinct officials. County and precinct chairmen will also be selected by ballot.

This is one of the first primary elections at which local voters have a wide choice of candidates in both parties. Those who have previously voted in the Democratic Primary can now vote Republican if they so choose. Voting Democratic in previous elections in no way bars a citizen from voting in the 1996

Republican Primary. If there is a run off election then the voter can vote only in the run off of the party that they voted in on March 12. Voters can vote only as a Democrat or a Republican, not both. Voter registration card should be presented at the poll and will be stamped with the party name.

Stormer challenges Haverkamp in Primary

It wasn't long ago that the Republican party barely existed in Cooke County. Many voting precincts did not offer a polling place for the Republican Primary. The GOP in Cooke County has now grown to have candidates for most races and this year's contest for District Attorney has become a CONTEST!

Former assistant district attorney in Tarrant County, Cindy Stormer, is challenging Janelle Haverkamp who has been district attorney since 1992. Both candidates have placed unprecedented amounts of advertising around the county to inform voters of their qualifications. Haverkamp has promoted her record and experience in Cooke County courts which include 50 jury trials. Stormer has published numerous testimonials praising her courtroom work and police experience before she came to Cooke County to enter private practice. Both filed for the Republican Primary and have tried to discredit their opponent's claims to be a true Republican. The District Attorney campaign has centered mainly around two issues, both well detailed by advertising in current issues of the Muenster Enterprise and Gainesville Daily Register and

at public candidate forums. The issues are: who will be tougher on crime? and who will cost the taxpayers less money?

Haverkamp claims convictions in hundreds of felony cases as district attorney with defendants receiving a total of 5,366 years in the penitentiary, plus one life sentence. All of her cases appealed to higher courts have been upheld on appeal. Stormer says Haverkamp is not tough enough on criminals. Stormer promises to work harder and be prepared for more cases and to try more than one jury trial per month which the incumbent says is the maximum possible.

In the much publicized indecency with a child cases against Duncan Hudson, Haverkamp negotiated a plea bargain agreement at the request of the child's parents so the child would not have to endure further trauma. Haverkamp says although she wanted to prosecute, her sensitivity for the concerns of the victims were more important. Stormer says this is just one example of a very difficult decision where she would have gone on with the trial, trying to obtain a maximum sentence rather than allowing a child molester to go free on probation.

Stormer has claimed many times during the campaign that the district attorney makes too much money. She has promised that the \$8,616.00 paid by the county will be returned to the county with the request that it be applied to the sheriff's department or to fire protection. She promises to get more work done for less money in the district attorney's office projecting a savings to taxpayers of \$242,464.00 over a four year term plus additional savings to be obtained by moving cases faster. These promises form part of the foundation of Stormer's campaign.

Haverkamp has defended her salary and the costs of her office especially in advertising placed in this issue titled "Are you Being Misled? You Decide." Her salary, paid by the state is the same salary paid to any other district attorney who does not maintain a private practice, \$85,216.79. Haverkamp stated at a candidate forum that if the commissioners took back the \$8,616.00 paid by the county she would still want to be district attorney.

This first time Republican Primary contest for district attorney will be up for vote in Tuesday's election.

Rural addressing kinks hammered out in Commissioner's Court

Cooke County EMS Director Bob Harbin will serve as the coordinator of the county's budding 911 Rural Addressing project. Harbin was appointed to the supervisory position by 4-1 vote in the March 1 special meeting of Commissioners Court.

Richard Brown, Precinct #2 commissioner, cast the vote against Harbin's appointment noting that, "I feel we're asking Bob Harbin to wear too many hats. He's involved in a number of different areas and I'm not sure that it is fair to unload this on him. Since I've been on the Court we've kind of bounced around like a ping pong ball on this Addressing thing. It appears to me that we're just looking at the short term solution here and not the long term product."

Brown said that he understood

that the project would require some ongoing maintenance but that it didn't necessarily mean that Bob Harbin had to be in charge of the supervision. "I personally would rather see him devote his time to trying to reduce this \$300,000 loss that we're experiencing with the ambulance service. I think we've got him wearing too many hats and spread himself too thin."

Cooke County Judge Paul Hesse said that he felt the EMS Department was the most logical place for the Rural Addressing to be. Commissioner Jerry Lewis added that he felt Harbin could handle the project.

Asked if he could handle the additional work load Harbin replied, "I am getting spread pretty thin, I'll answer you that. If what you're expecting me to do is the actual mapping and the actual addressing

— I can't do it. I don't have the time. The supervision of the project, the coordination of the project, I believe I can handle that."

Also given the go ahead was to go out for bids on an expansion project for the EMS building that allows for the accommodation of equipment and files required for the 911 Rural Addressing project. Additional space has been needed for some time for the EMS storage, said Harbin.

A plan for a 20' x 31' building drawn up in 1992 to create more space for EMS was revised to 28' x 31' to include the Rural Mapping and Addressing. Harbin estimated the cost of the building to be between 15 to 20 thousand dollars. That was without plumbing.

Commissioner Brown questioned whether restrooms would be needed. Please See RURAL, Page 3

Price reveals horrors of abortion clinics to crowd of 450

LINDSAY — Approximately 450 people attended a fund raiser Saturday for the ABBA Women's Center.

The ABBA Women's Center, a crisis pregnancy center, opened Feb. 26 and tentatively serves the public from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. It is located at 414 E. Elm in Gainesville.

Bill Price, president of the organization Texans United For Life, was the guest speaker for Saturday's event.

In introducing him, Kenneth Bierschenk said that Price has worked for the pro-life cause full-time for the past 18 years. Texans United For Life is one of the largest pro-life organizations in the state.

The belief of the pro-life movement is that every baby deserves to have a birthday, Price said. If the country is going to be salvaged, he added, both the mothers and the babies need people's help.

Price said he is always delighted

to be among people who still hold to a standard of truth "and who know the difference between right and wrong."

He said, "May I remind you that in the halls of Congress and all over Washington, there are no monuments or memorials to budget balancers or economic conservatives. Men and women are remembered and revered in history primarily because they took a firm, unwavering stand on moral principle and did not

flinch. And I believe that when the history of this part of the twentieth century is written, with all of its horror and all of the killing of the unborn, that people like you — who do not make the evening news, who are not interviewed by the news media — will be known to future generations as the heroes of this century. I believe that with all my heart."

Price said "we all share" the responsibility for the more than 100,000 abortions that occur in Texas every year. "We are our brother's keeper," he said.

"A few years ago, a woman was stalked, raped and murdered on a street in New York City," Price said.

"... Twenty-two people confessed to hearing her cry out ... then turning away ... without even calling police. Her blood is on their hands. In the same way, if we stand by uninvolved while unborn babies in this community are being exterminated, our hands are stained with blood. We who know the truth — that every abortion stops a beating heart — have a special responsibility to get involved in stopping this carnage. If we won't be the good Samaritan, who's willing to go to the aid of our little brothers and sisters in the womb, who will? Who will stand up for them? Who will speak out for them if we don't?"

Saying he wanted to put a "face on the pro-life movement" and on the may abortion statistics, Price told stories of two 15-year-old Texas teenagers who had been victimized by abortion.

"People often ask me how I can continue to go on working," Price said. "And ... it's really hard. This is my 18th year. And this issue is so intense, and I feel so strongly about it ... it is hard sometimes to continue on. But when I get discouraged, I just think about these two little 15-year-old girls, and it recharges my batteries."

Price encouraged people to pray about how they could respond to the

issue of abortion. He urged people not to take their eyes off of their own community. "Your efforts here may never be noted by the media," he said. "But like all other acts of righteousness before a holy God, they will be noticed by our Father in heaven."

"Who would you rather have make the final judgment on your life?" Price asked, "a member of the press, or the God of the universe? The Marines are not the only ones looking for a few good men and women. God's looking for some as well."

Price encouraged everyone to become involved in the new ABBA Women's Center. Everyone can pray, he noted. The center is also in need of people to train to become volunteer counselors, people to open shepherding homes, and people to

donate baby or maternity clothing. Of course, Price said, the center is also in need of financial support.

Extended local calling approved for Rosston

The Public Utilities Commission in Austin has reported back to Rosston on the results of balloting for extended local calling. Residents of Rosston voted to approve all five of the proposed exchanges. Rosston will receive two-way, toll-free calling to Valley View, Gainesville, Saint Jo, Decatur and Sanger exchanges.

The balloting came about as the result of a petition by subscribers, within the local Rosston telephone exchange, to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC). The language contained in the petition was prescribed by the PUC and indicated that service would be provided for up to five additional exchanges at a flat service cost of \$3.50 for residences and \$7.00 for businesses. It required each

subscriber to vote yes or no for each individual city petitioned.

The additional service cost is the maximum increase that can result from approval of up to five requested cities. A cost study must be completed by Muenster Telephone Corporation for the local service to each city approved by the ballot. This study is sent to the PUC for its review and approval of the proposed charge or a smaller charge, depending on the cost of providing expanded local calling. The cost study and an implementation plan must be approved by the PUC, but you should expect expanded local calling to begin by August of 1996.

Campaign tactics questioned by Newton

"Voters in the 4th Congressional District need to be warned that my opponent is running on supposed name recognition and has sent out a mailer of his picture with several senators that could be misleading," Jon Newton, Republican candidate for the 4th Congressional District, said at a candidate's forum in Farmersville.
"My campaign contacted representatives of the senators pictured with him and we were told very clearly that my opponent was not endorsed by the senators and had not received permission to use the picture for his campaign," Newton added.
"Jon Newton's campaign is a grassroots effort in all 13 counties. I have met with voters, Republican leaders, activists and elected officials. I have attended political forums, debates and public events in all parts of the district," Newton said.
"My primary opponent has not been to one public forum, debate or published notice of a personal appearance. Republican primary voters should be insulted that they have had no opportunity to find out where he stands on the issues," Newton noted. "For some reason, he

does not want to face the voters of the 4th to have his political and business record examined."
"I will continue to attend public forums and am always available for interviews and questions at any time," Newton.

Newton supports a constitutional amendment to enact term limits and favors a flat tax over a national sales tax. to meet ADA requirement. Harbin noted that the public would be using the facility on a regular basis after the addressing and mapping system is put in place. Any new home, etc. would have to go there to get a physical address before utilities could be hooked up.

In a unanimous decision the Court agreed to the expansion with restroom facilities. Eventually the Rural Addressing equipment will be linked to the sheriff's department. "This should speed up response times for all of the emergency services," Harbin commented. When a 911 call comes in the address and mapping system will show a map with the exact location from which the call was placed.

Another request from Harbin was to move Lisa Conway, the employee working on the Rural Addressing and Mapping system, from the Commissioner's office to the EMS building. His purpose was to begin cross-training Conway and other EMS personnel.

"I would like to move her as soon as possible because there are a couple of things we have to get done before we can actually start doing the addressing," Harbin said. "We need to get her some training on the mapping itself. Although she's learned a lot on her own, Wise county has agreed that we send her and myself over there to actually learn this program. Also I intend to utilize her cross-trained with some of the EMS duties also so that I can take my dispatchers and cross-train them on the mapping. We need more than one person who knows this stuff."

Brown disagreed with the move saying that he would not agree to a building until he knew the cost and that there was always the possibility that the expansion wouldn't be made or that it might be delayed. "I see no reason that she can't continue to do what she is doing right where she is," he stated.

Commissioner Virgil Hess said that he liked the idea of cross-

training several people. He referred to a former employee who had been working on the project and left for a better job. That left the project at a stand still.

Harbin said that before any more work can be done in the computer the remaining road signs must be put up so that it can be verified, a new plotter must be purchased, an official county map must be approved by Commissioners Court and the Postal Service must approve it.

With Brown opposing, Commissioners Court voted 4-1 to move Ms. Conway to the EMS department as soon as someone was trained to do her other duties in the Commissioners office.

A decision of Mutual Aid Agreement to handle emergencies with neighboring counties and cities was tabled for a second time. The county attorney's office was still researching the legalities.

Grant approved for Muenster's composting program by TCOG, TNRC

Mayor Weinzapfel submitted a grant application for a 1996 Solid Waste Management in December 1995. The Texoma Council of Governments (TCOG) and the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission approved a \$2,055 grant for the City of Muenster. The funds will be used to implement a community backyard composting program. No city matching funds are required for this grant.

The program is separated into two parts. One part includes conducting a one-hour training session for 50 citizens who will then each receive a compost bin and instructional materials. The second part is distributing instructional materials and compost bins to the first 50 people who sign up.

An interlocal agreement between TCOG and the City is being drafted. It will be presented to the City council for consideration prior to the start of the project. More details will be provided after final approval. Anticipated completion of this project is during the Spring of this year.

ARE YOU BEING MISLED? YOU DECIDE

My opponent tells you that I "got legislation passed" that increased my salary approximately \$20,000.

THE TRUTH: Four years ago, I promised the voters of Cooke County I would not maintain a private practice of law while serving as their District Attorney. After taking office, I sought legislation which returned the Cooke County District Attorney's office to placement under the Professional Prosecutors Act. (The Cooke County District Attorney's office had previously been removed from placement under this Act so that the prior District Attorney could maintain a private practice of law.) By returning the District Attorney's office to placement under the Act, I insured the voters that their District Attorney could not maintain a private practice while serving as District Attorney.

The salary paid to District Attorneys in Texas is set by law. The salary I am paid by the State is \$85,216.79 and is the same salary paid to every other District Attorney in the State of Texas that does not have a private practice of law. The salary paid to District Attorneys who do not maintain a private practice is approximately \$17,000 a year more than what is paid to District Attorneys who choose to also have a private practice. As I told the voters four years ago, I believe that the salary paid to Professional District Attorneys more than justifies a full-time effort.

Cooke County pays a supplement of \$8,616 to the District Attorney. This supplement of 8,616 is set by the Commissioners Court and was being paid to the District Attorney prior to my taking office. Such a supplement in some form has been paid to the District Attorney and the District Judge for over 19 years.

My opponent has made conflicting promises to various groups and individuals to transfer a portion of these State and County funds to the Police Department, the Fire Department, Child Protective Services, and other social programs, depending on whom she is addressing at the time.

THE TRUTH: My opponent knows or should know that she cannot do so. These State funds are regulated by statute. The County funds are controlled by the Commissioners Court. These promises cannot be legally accomplished and do not save the taxpayers money, as the taxpayer would still foot the bill for the funds. The only way to reduce the state paid salary is for the District Attorney to "opt out" of the Professional Prosecutors Act - opening the door, once again, for the District Attorney in this county to have a private practice of law.

My opponent tells you that I increased the District Attorney's Cooke County budget \$23,000 in one year, from 1995 to 1996, added an employee and increased salaries of the staff.

THE TRUTH: The actual increases over which I had control were as follows:

- \$250.00 for law books (due to re-writing of the Penal Code)
 - \$1,200.00 for purchase of 2 dictaphones (replacement of 13-year-old defective equipment)
 - \$12,781.00 for receptionist/secretary (starting salary at that time for all county secretaries)
- The other increases were increased expenses to the county which not only affected my budget - but the budget of every department in the county, which included increases in FICA, increased cost of health insurance and retirement benefits for county employees, and increased cost of professional liability insurance.

As my opponent knows, the increases in staff salaries were as a result of the Commissioners Court granting an increase to all county employees. The addition of a receptionist/secretary was necessary for the continued efficient running of the District Attorney's office, partly due to an increase in paperwork demands on the District Attorney's office by the State. I believe it is irresponsible to promise to cut staff, without knowing the duties and responsibilities performed by each staff member.

THE TRUTH: By working full-time I have saved the taxpayers money. The year prior to my taking office, the District Attorney's budget included \$12,500.00 for Prosecutorial Assistance. I eliminated this line item completely from my budget during my tenure as District Attorney, resulting in a \$50,000 savings to local taxpayers over a 4-year period. To further ease the burden on the local taxpayers, I have more than doubled the collections of fines from felony criminal defendants in my first 3 years in office.

My opponent states that she can save Cooke County taxpayers "hundreds of thousands" of dollars each year. Her figures keep changing and simply do not add up. Anyone can promise anything to get elected. I believe the responsible voters of Cooke County will check the facts before accepting these assertions as the truth.

I believe I have the HONESTY and INTEGRITY to best serve you as your District Attorney.

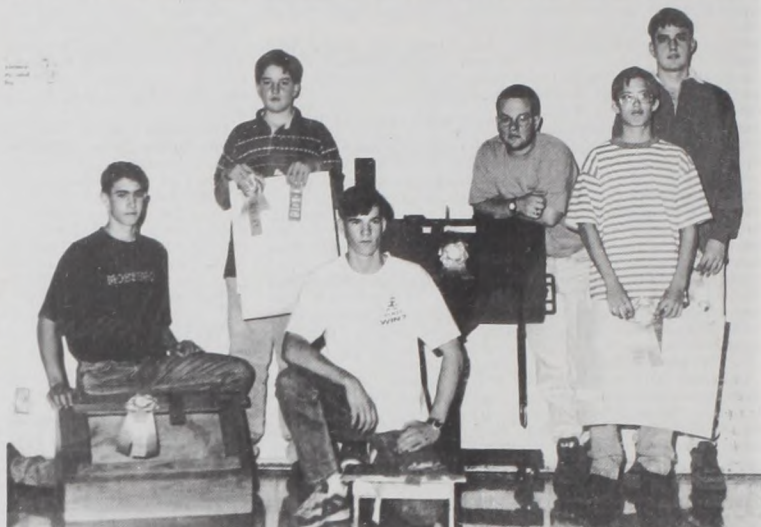

The Farm Bureau (of which I am a member and recommend everyone to be a member) officials, the National Cattlemen's Beef Association and many other organizations are studying and looking into all this, trying to improve the situation. I am sure the livestock markets and commissions would like to see the markets better.
So, maybe the rains will come and help. We have to remember our God sends the rain. At our house, we learned to take the rises and the falls and stay in the business.

Bush, Perry request federal aid for Texas livestock owners

Concerned about the impact of prolonged drought, unseasonable heat, and brush fires on Texas livestock owners, Governor George W. Bush has requested assistance for farmers and ranchers who are unable to provide enough feed to maintain and preserve their livestock.

"Drought conditions and severe weather have not only created fire hazards throughout Texas, they have also threatened our farmers and ranchers," said Governor Bush. "I have asked the federal government to make Texas livestock owners eligible for federal assistance to help them get through these unusually tough times."

Governor Bush has written to U.S. Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman to request assistance for Texas livestock owners throughout the state through the federal Emergency Feed program, the Emergency Feed Assistance Program, and other appropriate agricultural assistance programs.

"I want to thank Governor Bush for acting quickly so that our

ranchers have access to these funds," said Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry. "I hope that Mother Nature will bless us with rains as we enter spring and the critical growing periods throughout Texas, so that Texas ranchers will no longer need to rely on this emergency feed program."

These federal livestock feed programs were formed to assist livestock owners when they have suffered a loss of more than 40 percent of feed production on the farm or ranch because of natural disaster. Livestock eligible for feed assistance under these programs include cattle, sheep, goats, swine, horses, and mules which have been owned at least six months.

The Emergency Feed Program pays 50 percent of the cost of feed purchased to replace feed normally produced on the farm. The Emergency Feed Assistance Program allows producers to purchase grain from the Commodity Credit Corporation at 50 percent of the average market price in the county where the feed is stored.

Thornberry votes for passage of 7-year Farm Bill

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (TX-13) voted for the Agriculture Market Transition Act, legislation that will give farmers more planting flexibility in the long term and, in the short term, bring the nation closer to something that is long overdue - enactment of a seven-year farm bill.

"This debate has reminded me of the old saying, 'Better late than never,'" Thornberry said. "This is not a perfect bill by any means, but it is something we can live with and something that will benefit the agricultural community in the future. In the long term, probably the most significant thing about this legislation is that it gives farmers more control in running their own farms. In the short term, however, the most important thing is that it takes us one step closer to signing a bill into law so farmers can once again know the rules of the game."

The legislation passed the House Feb. 29 by a vote of 270-155 after over 17 hours of consideration. The bill reauthorizes and restructures existing farm programs over the next seven years, including price and income supports for crop, commodity and dairy farm products; food import/export programs; and farmland conservation programs. During the debate, 12 measures were introduced as amendments to the bill.

Thornberry said the bill will now go to a Conference Committee between members of the House and the Senate.
