"With my experience with higher risk infants and neonatal transport, I've made sure the nursery was well equipped to care for and stabilize infants," Jenny explained. "Care has been taken to ensure the OB nursing staff has adequate experience and training with infants."

There will be RN staffing in the OB department 24 hours a day. All of the nurses hired for the OB unit have been specially trained. Those now on staff are Jenny Bezner, RNC; Darlene Stewart, RN; Joyce Abney, RN; Lisa Schilling, RN; Hayle Dangelmayr, RN; and Toni Diaz, RN.

The Family Center approach to childbirth has been chosen for Muenster's new unit. Labor, delivery, recovery, and postpartum care (LDRP) all take place in the same room. Family members are allowed to be present in the room with the mother during labor and

delivery. Mothers are encouraged to keep their baby in the room as much as possible. This promotes bonding and more opportunities for teaching.

Rooms are beautifully decorated to provide a comfortable, home type atmosphere. At the same time they are equipped to make the delivery as safe and comfortable as possible.

Equipment is the latest of everything. Delivery takes place in

the same bed as labor and postpartum care. The beds are described as the "Cadillac of beds". Childbirth classes taught by Jenny Bezner and Darlene Stewart are one of the services offered. These classes are presented in four segments taught on four consecutive Wednesdays, Included are breathing techniques, relaxation, baby care, and pain management.

While in the hospital the mother will be offered tapes and handouts on child care. Before going home the new parents will be treated to a special meal to celebrate the birth of their child.

The Felderhoff farm is located one mile north of Muenster and was founded by Henry John Felderhoff. He moved to Texas after he heard of a new German Catholic colony. The land was purchased December 13,

1890. There were 100 acres in the original farm. Wheat, oats, cotton, corn, cattle and horses were raised by Felderhoff and his wife,

torn, cattle and forses were raised by Felderhoff and his wife, Christina.

The couple raised 11 children: Mary, John, Frederick, Bernard, Hubert, Christina, Caroline, Joseph, Henry, Anton J. (Tony), and Rose.

Their son, Tony became the second owner of the farm which was now 180 acres. Tony raised wheat, oats, corn, hay, and stocker cattle. He was one of the first farmers to have the soil conservationists to help him terrace and build ponds on this farm. Tony was married to Theresia. They had five children, Anthony, Joan, Joseph, Theresa Mae, and Charles.

Their daughter Theresa became the third generation owner. She acquired 100 acres in 1972. Her improvements include a pond, fences, preserving the old home, building a new home, and practicing soil conservation to develop the land. Hay, cattle and grass are currently produced on the farm.

Theresa Mae and her husband Sylvan make their home on the family farm and their son Danny also has a home on it.

Some of the requirements are that the land be agriculturally productive

and owned by members of the family for 100 years or more. If all the land has ever been rented out to someone outside the family, it will not qualify. You must live and work the land. If you live off the historic land you must actively manage and land, you must actively manage and direct the everyday operation of the farm or ranch.

County moves forward with 911 rural addressing project

"The following developmental work for the Rural Addressing Project remains to be completed," noted Cooke County Judge Paul Hesse at the March 25 regular Commissioners Court meeting. "We need to complete and verify the address locations and coordinates; need to complete fruition of the MSAG, that's the master addressing data base and 911 data base; also we need to organize maintenance of the maps and the map book."

The estimated cost of the map project is \$40,000 plus, said Hesse. That cost is eligible for reimbursement with state funds.

Vendors will be brought in to complete some the above work. Commissioners are seeking proposals by vendors for the completion of the 911 Rural addressing development project.

Commissioners also approved the final plat for Cler Acres Section 3

north of Muenster and three new county roads, 493, 494, and 495, in that area. The approval was not unanimous as Precinct 2 Commissioner Richard Brown cast a dissenting vote on both items. He said that it looked to him like the creek gravel had just been piled loosely on the roads.

Commissioner Precinct 4 Virgil Hess said that the city of Muenster had already approved the roads and that the property owners had signed off on them. Hess and Commissioner Jerry Lewis said that they has inspected the roads and they had met with their approval. Brown countered, "It might meet yours, but I'm still questioning whether it meets the county specs.

"I voted against both of them for the same reason," said Brown. "The roads didn't meet county specifications. Specifications call for the material used on roads to be six inch compacted base material, usually crushed limestone suitable

for paving at a later time. The maximum size of the gravel is 1-1/2 inches in diameter. They used creek gravel on those roads and some of the stones are six to eight inches in diameter. At some point in time the county will have to spend money to improve the road."

Hess said in a later interview that the county specs call for six inches of base rock and that the roads do meet with the county's specs. "Everyone else approved them including Judge Hesse," he said.

Roads built on property to be sold in lots for building homes must meet certain requirements by the county including being a certain width and being constructed properly. The land owner pays for the construction of the roads. The county accepts them only after they have been built and inspected to ensure that they meet the necessary specs.

A Good Place to Start on Immigration Reform

To many, American immigration policy sounds like the distracted mother's answer to her child's request: "I said perhaps, and that's final."

Me send mixed messages to would-be immigrants. Enforcement of our immigration laws has been up and down like a roller coaster ride. As a result, 4.5 million illegals now swell the ranks of the underclass. They impose a daunting burden on public schools, health care providers and prisons. They compete with Americans and those who are here legally for scarce jobs on the lowest rungs of our economic ladder. It is in our national interest to curb illegal immigration swiftly and effectively.

While the debate over immigration raises many issues, I believe that one principle all can agree on is that obeying our laws is the least we should require of those who wish to come here and live in our country.

In the past we have attempted to enforce our laws by putting the burden on employers. I believe that is the wrong approach. I have a new approach: put the burden on the illegal immigrants.

Thave added such an amendment to the immigration bill currently before the Senate Judiciary Committee to address this issue directly. It would disqualify those found to be in our country illegally from applying for legal permanent resident status for at least 10 years, permanently in some cases. If you come here illegally and are caught, you can't even TRY to come back on a legal basis for 10 years.

My bill would encourage respect for American law — something which can reasonably be required of anyone who wants to immigrate here. Currently, those who enter our country in violation of our law can later apply for legal status with no risk of punishment or even censure. A recent internal State Department study estimates that 90 percent of some nationality groups waiting for legal immigration visas are already living in the United States.

There are penalties for people who smuggle or harbor illegal aliens, and penalties for employers who hire them. But the only penalty imposed on illegals now is a five-year ban on re-entry, and they can avoid this if they leave voluntarily (rather than be deported). Because the majority of apprehended aliens departs voluntarily, they are not subject to the sanction.

What we have now is an all-carrot, no-stick policy. The message we send is that aliens might as well attempt to enter and remain in the country illegally, because they have everything to gain and nothing to lose. America has been entirely too willing to forgive transgressions of our immigration laws.

Disqualifying apprehended illegal aliens from legal residence for 10 years would attach a consequence to the decision to violate U.S. law. It seems only fair that if we are going to penalize employers of illegal aliens for violating the law, we also should penalize the illegal aliens who do so.

The U.S. government has a responsibility to maintain the integrity of our borders, as well as an obligation to defend the best interests of its own legal residents and citizens. People who break our law should not be rewarded at the expense of American workers and taxpayers.





Texas monthly oil and gas statistics reported

The Railroad Commission issued a total of 952 original drilling permits in February. The total included 714 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 28 to re-enter existing well bores, and 210 for re-completions.

So far in 1996, there have been 1,797 drilling permits issued.

Permits issued in February included 366 oil, 219 gas, 308 oil and gas, 57 injection, and 2 other permits.

In February operators reported 365 oil, 311 gas, 36 injection and five other completions and reported 968 holes plugged and 134 dry holes.

Agriculture Commissioner Rick 2177 commented that several ovisions in the new Farm Bill, the deral Agricultural Improvement de Reform Act of 1996 or FAIR, ill benefit Texas farmers and nehers, but one measure was not cluded that could have helped a nall business sector in Texas. verall, the act will transfer crop oduction decisions from the overnment to farmers. "This legislation is a historic iift," Perry said, "Instead of the overnment deciding what is lanted, who plants it and what rice is paid for it, our farmers will ow make their own decisions. It was our producers the control and exibility they need to respond to hanging market and consumer 2 mands."



However, Perry expressed isappointment because one rovision was not authorized by ongress due to strong opposition om the U.S. Department of griculture.
The provision would have llowed meat processed at state-spected facilities to be shipped

and sold interstate. Meat processed at state-inspected businesses can only be sold in state even though the U.S. Department of Agriculture inspects these facilities annually and certifies the slaughtering and processing as equal to that done at federally inspected plants.

The new Farm Bill maintains the Conservation Reserve Program and adds a voluntary natural resource conservation management program. The Environmental Quality Incentive Program will provide producers with technical assistance and cost-share or incentive payments for implementing one or many conservation plans aimed at protecting water and soil quality.

Overall, the act should help strengthen the nation's agricultural industry, the commissioner said.

"Our farmers are facing an intensive globally competitive market," Perry said. "The new Farm Bill should help maintain and enhance their dominance in producing the best, the safest and the most economical food and fiber supply in the world."
