Kentucky Oil Price Boosted By Several Leading Companies

OWENSBORO, Ky., Aug. 19.—(P)—Western Kentucky oil producers today were receiving 15 cents a barrel more for their product. The Ohio Oil Company and the Producers Pipeline Company posted a 6-cent price as compared to 50 cents paid previously.

The Producers Company also announced a 5-cent increase to producers in the LeGrand pool in Har and Barren counties. This brings the price there to 55 cents a barrel.

These increases followed by a few weeks another 15-cent increase which brought the western Kentucky and LeGrand price level from 35 cents to 50 cents.

Fire Burns 25,000 Barrels Gasoline At Berger Refinery

BORGER, Texas, Aug. 19.—(P)—Fire burned 25,000 barrels of gasoline in a storage tank at the Phillips Petroleum Company's refinery north of Borger today. Loss was estimated at approximately \$50,000.

Firemen used streams of chemicals to prevent spread of the fire to other parts of the plant.

The fire resulted from an overflow of the huge tank, witnesses say. The gasoline burst into flame as it flooded the area around the base of the tank. Just what caused the blaze had not been determined.

Three Prisoners At Victoria Saw Bars Of Jail And Escape

VICTORIA, Texas, Aug. 19.—(P)—Three prisoners escaped from the Victoria county jail last night after sawing the bars of their cell.

They were Sheridan Bradley, 26, Buffalo, Mo.; Fred Coulter, 24, Lubbock, and Leon Galaska, 18, Beaumont. Bradley and Coulter were held on car theft charges. Galaska was charged with theft over \$50.

Texas Cotton Co-Op Planning To Advance 90 Per Cent Value

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 19.—(P)—R. J. Murray, general manager of the Texas Cotton Cooperative Association announced today that the association will advance to its members within several dollars a bale of the actual market value of cotton delivered to its seasonal pool as an initial advance.

"This advance approximates the 90 per cent advance of last season," Murray said. "We anticipate Texas deliveries to the association in excess of one million bales this season."

Murray explained that the advance applies only to seasonal pool cotton and that periodic distributions and the final settlement will reflect back to the member the season's average price rather than the prevailing price on outright sale.

The member still has the right to use the price fixation or immediate fixation pooling facilities of the association. These pools give the member the privilege of fixing the price of his cotton at his own discretion.

Murray said Texas cotton growers have assurance of receiving almost the entire value of the cotton at time of delivery and of being paid upon the basis of the actual quality value of the commodity. Any profits accruing through the cooperative marketing set-up will be returned to the member during, or at the end of the cotton season.

DANIEL BAKER CLASS ADDRESS BY DR. FOSTER

Taking as his subject, "Beneficent Resistance," Rev. W. H. Foster addressed the graduating class of Daniel Baker summer school at the First Presbyterian Church Sunday at the 11:00 o'clock hour. Rev. Foster used Paul's letter to the Philippians as the basis of his sermon. He stressed oppositions of life and the ways of meeting these and told of Paul's meeting and overcoming all oppositions.

He spoke of the experiences which Paul had and the trouble and antagonism and opposition which he met and overcame in his work. He pointed out that these things had all turned out for the good in Paul's experiences and that these were the beneficent resistances of life.

Rev. Foster stated that there were two sources of studying the ways in which man meets opposition as shown through the study of history of man's seeking to obtain the answer to oppositions in life. He outlined these two sources as the study of philosophy and the idea of beneficent resistances as revealed in Christian virtues in human life.

Under the study of philosophy he spoke of the Epicurean philosophy of meeting an opposition lightly and the Stoic philosophy of bearing opposition. Under this he spoke of the reason Paul said what he did concerning resistance in the Christian revelation is the only thing which brings the idea of beneficent resistances.

He pictured Paul as never being impatient, never murmuring and never doubting, but at the end of life he could say that he had learned the secret to see things with the idea of beneficent resistances.

Under the second head of beneficent resistances he stated that Paul was a man of fortitude and faith, and that he was loyal to the principles he had learned after becoming a Christian. He contrasted this with the virtues of Paul as a Christian as compared to his persecutors of Christians before becoming one. He also contrasted virtues of life of Paul and the lack of the same things in the lives of such men as Robert Ingersoll. The third contrast was the idea that beneficent resistance brings to human life the proper philosophy and ethic of life.

He stated that there was something in the face of a man who had suffered to show strength of character and to show that he could be relied upon in times of stress and for an example to this contrast he used the life of Dr. George W. Truett.

He concluded by quoting the poem by Sidney Lanier, "Into the Woods My Master Went."

The program was carried out as scheduled in the remainder of the numbers.

FARMERS ALLOWED TO RETAIN \$5 PER BALE FOR MARKET EXPENSE

Farmers having government loans to aid in the production of this year's cotton crops will be permitted to use \$5 per bale from the proceeds of sales, together with the seed, to cover costs of picking, ginning and marketing, according to a telegram received in Brownwood from the Farmers Seed Loan office at St. Louis.

The Agricultural committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, acting jointly with the Agricultural committee of the State Bankers' association, petitioned the government to release from the production loan mortgages the costs of picking and ginning cotton. In reply to this request, according to Chester Harrison, of the Citizens National Bank who is a director in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. R. H. McElveen, administrative officer in charge of the Farmer's Seed Loan Office, of the United States Department of Agriculture, has today wired as follows:

"Agreeable that farmers be allowed the use of \$5 per bale from proceeds of sales, together with the seed, to cover the expenses of picking, ginning and marketing."

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 19.—(P)—An attempt to protect children under her care from a mad dog brought death today to Miss Elizabeth Fye, 45, of Manitou. Hydrophobia developed three weeks after she was severely bitten by the animal.

Miss Fye was staying at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Taylor Barton in Manitou on July 30 taking care of their children when a family pet suddenly became rabid and attacked her and the children. To save her charges, Miss Fye fought the dog barehanded. She was bitten 29 times.

The dog was shot. Miss Fye received prompt treatment to prevent hydrophobia but the serious nature of her injuries prevented checking the disease. A youth was bitten before the dog was killed but thus far he has shown no ill effects.

Enforcement Of Right Turn Rule Ordered by Hise

Small signs are being placed on all signal lights this week by City Manager H. V. Hennen. The signs are to instruct motorists about the right turn on red light ordinance recently passed. The sign states that right turns are allowed on red signals after stopping.

Three Drowned At Atlantic City As Waves Sweep Beach

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 19.—(P)—At least three persons are believed to have drowned and more than fifty bathers were rescued by life guards today when terrific waves broke over the beach.

Life guards stationed at the South Carolina Avenue beach ten and others stationed in the vicinity immediately went of the rescue of struggling men, women and children in the sea, going out in life boats and tossing can buoys to the bathers who had been swept out.

All but three are believed to have been accounted for. One man, about 55 years old, as yet unidentified, was found floating on the ocean. Although beach surgeons labored over him for more than an hour, they failed to revive him. Two others reported missing are John W. Cannaday, 25, Baltimore, and Eugene Baurier, 17, of Paterson, New Jersey.

The high sea, believed to have been caused by a storm at sea, swept in without warning.
