## \$40,000+ raised during Relay For Life

It was a celebration of life for those who fought the battle and survived, a gift of hope for more cures, a time for remembering those who did not survive. Cooke County Relay for Life held last Friday and Saturday at the Muenster Hornet Stadium brought hundreds out to join the American Cancer Society in the fight against cancer.

The participants. Mary K. Endres, co-chairman, read the American Cancer Society's mission statement. It is a nationwide community based voluntary health organization dedicated to eliminating cancer as a major health problem by preventing cancer, saving lives from cancer, and diminishing suffering from cancer through research, education and service.

Activities such as storytelling, a pajama fashion show, scavenger hunt, water balloon volleyball, and relay games kept everyone busy.

At 10 p.m. the lights were dimmed and 755 decorated luminaria remembering or honoring those who have battled cancer illuminated the track. Carolyn and Chas Bayer read the names of each of these individuals as their friends and family walked a lap. HOPE was spelled out in lights in the east bleachers. Christi Hesse, Ruth Felderhoff, and Rose Felderhoff sang "Wind Beneath My Wings." Everyone seemed to be in agreement that this was a beautiful and moving tribute.

All Relay For Life participants were invited to join in the closing lap at 6 p.m. "Circle of Life" was played during that time.

As of press time Wednesday the event had grossed more than \$40,000. A complete report will be given by event co-chairmen Cheryl Pollard and Mary K. Endres when all donations are in and all bills have been paid.

"We're thrilled with the tremendous success of this first year and look forward to an even bigger and better Relay for Life in 1997," declared Cheryl Pollard enthusiastically.

Opening ceremonies were held at 6 p.m. with Tom Carson as emcee. Father Leonard Wangler, OSB offered the invocation. Mikkie Jones sang the National Anthem. Cheryl Pollard, Rally co-chairman, remarked on the overwhelming number of people present. She had attended events in other counties and they weren't as well attended.

Cancer survivors walked the opening lap wearing pink banners declaring "survivor", "Angel Among Us" and "God Bless the Child" were played during the lap. A cheering and emotional crowd rejoiced with the survivors as they completed their victory lap.

Then the 24-hour relay began as participants from the 40, 10-15 member, teams began to burn the tennis shoe rubber. Teams walked around the clock. Many set up camp in tents around the football field.

Husbands how often have you shivered through Sunday Mass because you were a gentleman and dropped your spouse and children off in front of church, parked the car and ran back to church splashing through rain puddles getting soaked from head to toe?

## Cooke County's safety program earns award

Cooke County's payment for improved safety programs is two-fold. At the Monday, June 10 regular Commissioners Court meeting Cooke County EMS Director Bob Harbin presented Cooke County Judge Paul Hesse with a plaque from the Texas Association of Counties for Cooke County's ongoing progressive safety program. The 1995 County Safety Award was presented in recognition of its ongoing record of safety in the work place 1995.

In a four year period the County has experienced a 64 percent reduction in workers compensation premiums. "We're having far fewer injuries and the injuries that we are having by county employees are much less injuries than they were having previously," Harbin explained.

Harbin noted that since the 1991-92 fiscal year Cooke

County's premiums have come down from \$189,439.00 to \$68,037.00 for this fiscal year. He credited those who implemented the program and the county employees who made it work.

Virgil Hess, Commissioner Precinct #4 praised Harbin for his contribution, "Bob saved us a ton of money by using his own personnel as far as EMS to do the first aid for all of our men and putting on those classes." Jerry Lewis Precinct #3 Commissioner agreed, "Bob has done an excellent job!"

No action was taken on a request from local Texas Department of Safety Troopers to approve using funds from the Drug Seizure Fund to pay for three Intoximeters, one for each highway patrol car. Commissioners agreed that approval for such purchases was at the discretion of the County District Attorney.

The Justice of the Peace office in Valley View will soon have its 30 plus year old air conditioning unit replaced with a new heat pump unit. It has required a great deal of servicing in the last few years and its replacement with a more efficient unit was recommended. The cost of the new unit is around \$3,134.50 and the money will be taken from the Property Improvements Fund.

In other business Commissioners:

- Approved application for indigent burial of Wesley C. Schoonover.
- Agreed to start department budget hearings as soon as possible. Judge Hesse asked Commissioners to turn in their schedules so that hearings could be set at times convenient for all five of them.
- Approved minutes from previous meeting.
- Approved monthly bills.
- Approved monthly reports except two that weren't submitted.

## Off the hook with ESA?

The din of battle of words over the Endangered Species Act has completely quieted down over the past months.

Is the battle over? Have private property owners prevailed in their cry for property privacy? Ranchers, are you richer today than ever before?

All those questions have one answer: NO!

The Endangered Species Act, which is now living on periodic extensions, no longer makes the news. Representative Dan Young's House Resources committee is *very quiet* on ESA. Secretary Bruce Babbitt of Interior Department is *very quiet* on ESA. Neither the Secretary nor U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services are drafting and publicizing any changes to ESA "as they come to realize" the Act tramples on rights to private property. *No change is reaching the news* that henceforth the federal government will not prohibit some actions by private landowners in the name of protecting small, insignificant insects—that no scientific body has found serving any need of humans.

Have the President and Vice President changed their views on protecting insects and birds and begun to think of people in need of a job or a home site?

If you think they have, call me. I have some beautiful waterfront property in northern Terrell county within easy shopping and golf distance of Dryden, Texas for sale.

The listing moratorium by Texas Senator Kay Bailey Hutchinson has now been lifted with the passage of the FY 1996 final budget.

Her putting the stopper earlier in the listing bottle and the drying up of tax dollars are the reasons for the ESA lull we have enjoyed. But do not think the field hands quit working and went to town for fun and games? Neither the federal nor state governments have terminated tax-dollar paid biologists and botanists.

Collecting the species for listing continues. The collectors, their bosses and eco-environmentalists look for the day they can smile again over protecting flies, fleas, spiders, rats, migratory birds, fairy shrimp and the lime from mean humans. Humans who do not understand that they need no protection. And also the expenditure of tax dollars on these critters rather than using those dollars to help in education and law enforcement and feeding the hungry. Please do not think that the impact of listing under ESA on your economy, state and local economies resulted from an oversight by the writers of the Act in 1973. The Act is designed to impact you, to make you come under its grant control scheme.

That impact on you, Mr. Landowner, could have been eliminated over these past 23 years—two plus decades—if your well-being had a higher priority than the taking of your property through the application of ESA across America.

The environmentalists in and out of government are still dedicated to land grabs by saving the environment. **Thirty-three percent of America is owned by the U.S. government.**

Our government could practice preservation of the environment and endangered species on one-third of the land mass of the US, and do very well at it. But the real issue, real problem to them is that

two-thirds of the US is held in private hands. The organizations and persons who envy you in that ownership are still in existence and still want what you have—independence, freedom of choice, and kowtowing to no one.

*They want your land to plan with, to work with, and to play with.*

What America will have come January 1997 in the way of national leadership cannot be predicted today, but we all need to awaken to the fact that the grand scheme of telling owners of private property how to act has now arrived in rural America.

Just as it did decades ago in big cities in the form of property zoning, rent control, building codes and traffic codes and the like. All these controls were sold to people on the basis they would make life in the city better. All each property owner had to do was surrender just a small part, yes, a small part of his rights to use his property as he believed best (*Give up a very small part of your many rights—for the benefit of the whole community.*)

## Muenster hosts 1st of 2 composting seminars

The first seminar on backyard composting was held Tuesday evening at MISD Auditorium. Master Composter, Carol Roberts of the Red River Ecology Center, spoke on the techniques and

demonstrated the methods of starting to compost.

She explained why recycling is so important for the environment as landfills are rapidly filling up. What is filling them up are paper—41 percent; yard trimmings—14.7 percent; food scraps—10.1 percent; plastic—8.3 percent; metal—7.9 percent; glass—4.8 percent; and other—13.1 percent. Recycling everything possible would make a big difference and stop landfill overloading.

A backyard compost bin can be used for grass clippings, leaves, food (except meat, grease, etc.) and paper, all of which turns into home-grown fertilizer. The needs of a bin are organic material, nitrogen,

surface area, air, moisture and volume—each item was explained by Roberts. Her talk was very informative and literature was given out with the bins to 24 interested citizens. A short video explaining a variety of composting ideas was also shown. Ms. Roberts complimented the City of Muenster for being interested in trying to help the solid waste problem.

Monday, June 17, information and give-away of bins will be in City Hall at 7 p.m. Those who missed the first seminar will certainly want to attend and be a part of this worthwhile project, Composting—the Natural Way to Recycle.

## Cooke & Montague land available July 16

The Texas General Land Office has scheduled a special sealed bid sale of surplus land and tax foreclosure land for July 16.

There are two types of property included in this sale. The first is surplus Permanent School Fund land. All revenue generated from these tracts goes to support public education in Texas.

The second is tax foreclosure land. These tracts were deemed to the state by counties that could not dispose of them through public auction. The General Land Office was given the authority to sell these tracts by states law.

The land office is authorized to dispose of surplus tracts that are not generating much

income for the state with the proceeds used to buy property that maximizes leasing incomes for the School Fund.

Minimum bids have been set for each tract. There is no limit on the amount that may be bid above the minimum. Bids must be received no later than 10 a.m. July 16, the time of the bid opening. Bid opening will be held in Room 831, Stephen F. Austin Build., 1700 N Congress, Austin.

## TDS ushers in new law on June 3

Beginning June 3, applicants for Class A or B Texas Commercial Driver Licenses will be required to pass pre-trip vehicle inspection tests.

"This is really just some fine-tuning of our CDL program," said DPS Inspector John Hall. "New applicants will be required to pass a test to make sure they can determine whether a commercial vehicle is safe to operate on the highway. It should only take about 10 minutes."

CDL applicants previously only had been required to pass an airbrake inspection of their vehicle, Hall said.

The new pre-trip vehicle inspection test, which will include the airbrake inspection, is mandated by federal and state regulations, the inspector said.

CDL applicants should prepare for the test by obtaining and studying a copy of Section 10 of the Texas CDL Handbook at any DPS Driver License office.

Since Texas' federally mandated CDL law went into effect on Sept. 1, 1990, some 560,000 Texans have been issued Commercial Driver Licenses. The pre-trip vehicle inspection test requirement is the first change in the licensing program since then, Hall said.

Anyone needing more information on this new requirement should contact their local Driver License office.

## Evelyn Yeatts earns food certification

Evelyn Yeatts, County Extension Agent - Family & Consumer Sciences with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, has recently been certified to train area food service managers in food safety.

Mrs. Yeatts was one of more than 190 county Extension agents certified as a trainer through the Food Protection Management Training Program sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the national Restaurant Association, Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association and the Texas Department of Health. The train-the-trainer program is designed to bring the latest in food safety information to food service establishments.

As a certified instructor, Yeatts will be offering this information to food managers, who in turn, will train their employees on food safety practices. Once managers have completed the 15-hour course, they will receive a certificate from the national Restaurant Association. They also will be eligible to join the Industry Council on Food Safety and to receive a decal to place in their window, which lets customers know the manager is certified in food safety.

Training materials for the course are being provided by the SERVSAFE Program from The Educational Foundation of the National Restaurant Association. Courses will be offered to food service managers beginning Fall, 1996.

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# Mary Haverkamp dies June 4

Mass of Christian Burial was held Friday, June 7 in Sacred Heart Church at 10:00 a.m. for Mary Haverkamp, 89, longtime Muenster resident, more recently residing in Gainesville. She died in Gainesville Memorial Hospital on Tuesday, June 4 about 9 p.m., following an illness of almost one month.

She was born on Feb. 20, 1907 in Lindsay to George Gebhart Spaeth and Mary Elizabeth (Sandmann) Spaeth. In her youth she attended St. Peter's School in Lindsay for six years, then worked for the Alex Pulte family on the family farm. On June 1, 1927 she was married to Alois "Lee" Haverkamp in St. Peter's church.

Following their wedding Mary and Lee lived on the address farm north of Muenster; later at the Richter place (now Weinzapfel) on the corner of Fifth and Oak streets, where they lived until 1941. They then bought a farm on Henry Fleitman, Sr. at 02 N. Sycamore, built a home and barn and other buildings. Here they lived out their lives. He preceded her in death on March 2, 1989.

Mary Rosalie Spaeth Haverkamp was a member of Sacred Heart Church, a seamstress, a devoted wife and mother, beloved grandmother, greatly respected by hundreds of friends, and loved affectionately by everyone of them as "Lee's Mary." Everyone knew her as a hard worker, strict but loving with her family. She loved to talk to people while delivering milk, eggs, and chickens.

For 36 years, she and her family bottled and delivered milk. For approximately ten years they sold eggs and chickens. She liked sewing, gardening, canning, and delighted in a good game of dominoes. Her eldest children recall that when starting out delivering milk, "Mama made canvas bags to hang across our shoulders, carrying three quart bottles on each side, delivering by bicycle at first. We also recall that not one of us ever fell. ... Mama was a believer in education. She contributed to Sacred Heart Trust Fund and to Mary's Trust Fund. ... In her old age, she was never known to complain, being confined to a wheel chair for eight years."

Survivors are five daughters and sons-in-law Florence and Richard Schumacher of Gainesville, (where she made her home the past five years); Olivia "Ollie" and David Forgy of Dallas; Dolores and Leroy Wiesman of Tulsa, OK;

Jeanette and Travis Wickliffe of Irving; and Joyce Boydston of Muenster; and two sons and daughters-in-law Walter "Chalkie" and Polly Haverkamp of Whitesboro and Robert and Toba Haverkamp of Las Vegas, Nevada.

## Extended local calling slated to begin July 9

Muenster Telephone Corporation plans to implement Extended Local Calling on July 9, 1996 for its Muenster, Rosston, Valley View and Valley View East exchanges. Expanded local calling allows customers to dial approved exchanges without long distance charges.

To receive Extended Local Calling, each telephone exchange had to submit a petition to the Public Utilities Commission. The customers were then balloted to approve the charges and calling areas. Ballots had to be approved by 70% or more of the customers who voted in that exchange. Each plan was originally approved with its own implementation date; however, to avoid confusion among customers as to when a call would be a local call versus

long distance, Muenster Telephone sought and was granted a common implementation date.

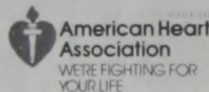
Muenster Telephone Corporation had to arrange for facilities with Southwestern Bell, GTE and Sprint/United/Centel to complete calls to the petitioned exchanges. These new facilities are being installed and tested by each of the telephone companies involved and they have indicated that the lines should be ready by the targeted start-up date of July 9, 1996.

The new toll-free calling scopes will enable Muenster to call Myra, Rosston, Forestburg, Valley View, Valley View East and Gainesville. Valley View will be able to call Myra, Muenster, Valley View East, Gainesville, Sanger and Pilot Point. Valley View East will be

able to call Valley View, Gainesville, Muenster, Sanger, Pilot Point and Tioga. Rosston will be able to call Myra, Forestburg, Muenster, Valley View, Gainesville, Sanger, Saint Jo and Decatur.

Residential and Business customers will see their local service rates increase by \$3.50 per line and \$7.00 per line respectively. Customers will see a partial month charge for July and a full month charge for August appearing on their August bill.

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
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## Robert Kralicke earns prestigious service award

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# Thomsens create preservation for native wildflowers & grasses

Nestled in a remote area south of Forestburg lies 220 acres dedicated to native plants. Officially it is called the Thomsen Foundation, locally many call it the Wildflower Farm. Although the area is fenced and its iron gate locked at night, visitors are welcome during the day.

Carl and Sissy Thomsen of Dallas bought the land and got started in 1984. They began preparing the land, collecting and planting wildflowers. It was five or six years before they felt that there was enough work done to open the gates to the public.

Pete Dunn of Saint Jo is caretaker for the place. "It was really going to be for wildflowers," he said. "You just can't have that many acres of wildflowers so they went into grasses. That really helped. Grasses and wildflowers kind of work together. If you go out and plant five acres of flowers, you have them this year, next year you don't. You've got bare spots so you plant grasses." According to Dunn, some wildflowers will do well one year and the next year you might have a poor stand of that flower.

started their project after she had done some of her work with wildflowers. The Thomsen's goal was to restore the land to the way it was around the 1900's - natural prairie, wildflowers, and grasses.

"A lot of the flowers I didn't know anything about," Dunn said. "I'm just an old farm boy. This is new to me. It has really been interesting."

They built a horseshoe pond and planted bluebells all around it. "It was really going to be beautiful," said Dunn. "The other day we had one blooming. They're hard to work with. One year you think you have them and the next year you don't. They're (bluebells) about as pretty a flower as you can get."

Windmills have been added to supply water for struggling young plant stands, a building meant for shelter provides benches - a place to rest or picnic. A bridge was recently added. Improvements continue, all meant to hold people's interest.

Visitors to the wildflower farm have come from as far away as Waco. Visitors from Holland were brought there by friends from the Metroplex. That was an interesting day, said Dunn. It is a popular place for school children. This year 25 groups of various sizes and ages have toured the grounds.

"The young children kind of amaze you," Dunn remarked. "We had a school out of Dallas that brought 50 to 55 students and split them into two groups. You'd think those kids were too young to take an interest, but it'll kind of surprise you how many do take an interest." Groups of students have also come from North Central Texas College (NCTC).

It is a point of interest to those who study plants. A number of researchers have done studies at the Thomsen Foundation. None of the work has been official according to Dunn. He says he has no idea of the number of varieties of flowers and grasses on the 220 acres.

FHA and 4-H members from Forestburg are very active in

grass judging competitions and one of the Thomsen Foundation's goals for this year is to provide as many as possible of the 63 varieties from the judging. The students don't have much time and often take a bus to a place where they might only get to see two or three varieties. They usually rank high in their competitions.

There is a walking trail that is very interesting. At the top of the trail climbers will find an old rock carved with "F. C. Fugate, September 1878". Dunn feels that those who visit the Thomsen Foundation will become more interested in preserving our grasses and flowers. "Development has already killed out a lot of the pretty places," noted Dunn. "That would be like your Shooting Star out here. There's only three or four places now that you can go find them. If anyone ever gets a hold of that (property) and hits it three years with a spray, that will be the end of that." Shooting Stars have been transplanted to the Thomsen Foundation and several of them bloomed when a group of 44 was visiting. They were excited about seeing the unusual prairie wildflower.

Dunn said that in the past

few years people's attitudes have changed. They are becoming more aware of the need to preserve our native wildflowers. Where once they would have sprayed and killed them all, many now leave stands.

Plans are already being discussed as to what will be done to improve the native plant preserve for next year. Planting is mostly done in the fall of the year. When the Thomsen's first started they were buying wildflowers seeds and had a crop failure. They discovered that the seed came from Colorado. Now they know to plant only what comes from this area. There are rows designated for plants or seeds that have been donated by people who have found unusual plants and want to share them. These are indicated by markers with the plant name and donor name.

The Thomsen Foundation is set up so that it will continue. There is a three member board of directors. Carl and Sissy are two of the members of the board. There is also an alternate board of directors and money set aside so that it will keep going. "About four years ago, the first real pretty year we had, they decided they

wanted to keep going," Dunn said. "Until then it was, 'Should we go on or should we go into something else?' Having a good year is what does that and the people. They've had people write them real nice letters."

Thanks to Carl and Sissy people from the cities will have a place to come and enjoy nature. They will see the beautiful prairie grasses that

once covered this area of Texas. The gently rolling hills covered with rainbow hues that are wildflowers in mass; prairie grasses of different shades of greens, blues and yellows dancing in the breeze; butterflies drinking their fill of flower nectar; breaths of air filled with the fresh, invigorating fragrance of outdoor life - all will be waiting for those who seek them.

Directions to the Thomsen Foundation: from Forestburg's main street, take Hwy. 455, stay on 455 at Y in highway to the right; go 4 to 5 miles to New Harp Cemetery Sign, turn right onto gravel road; road ends at T, go left, continue to four-way intersection; again go left, 1/2 to 1 mile to rock wall gate at left; enter.

Optimum times to visit the Thomsen Foundation are around mid April to the first part of May and again in late August or early September. This depends on weather conditions and rainfall, said Dunn. Last year was an excellent year for the wildflowers. This year some stands are sparse. The show so far this year isn't nearly what it had been in previous years.

"Last year we had one draw that covered four or five acres that was just unreal," recalled Dunn. "It had seven or eight different colors in it and they were pretty outstanding with the colors. It went from the white to just about every color you can imagine up and down that draw."

Carl and Sissy were friends of Lady Bird Johnson and

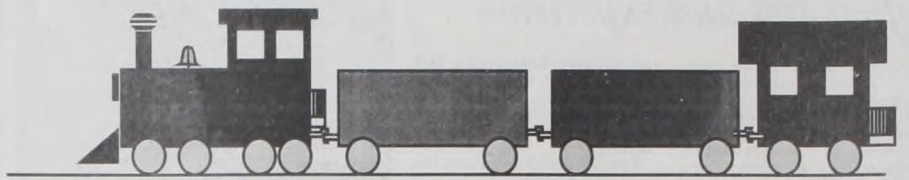

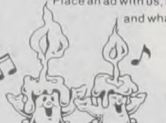

## NFU is critical of action taken by Subcommittee

National Farmers Union (NFU) is critical of, though not surprised by, recent action taken by the House Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee to cut transition payments to farmers as provided for by the 1996 farm bill. In a voice vote, the appropriations subcommittee last week passed a proposal to reduce farmers' transition payments by \$98 million for fiscal year 1997.

"The ink is barely dry on the new farm bill and Congress is discussing how to further cut agriculture," said Texas Farmers Union President Wes Sims. "The sign-up period for the new farm bill hasn't even ended and Congress is looking to get out of a deal it made with producers."

consider a more market-price oriented structure, one that would provide farmers with a safety net when prices are low, rather than spending limited resources on set payment schemes regardless of market price.

NFU has remained opposed to decoupling or disassociating farm payments from production, saying it moves farm programs into welfare programs. NFU believes that a market-price oriented farm program structure is vital to maintaining the U.S. system of independently-owned and operated family farms.

"The Family Farm Empowerment Act supported by National Farmers Union would have reduced federal farm program expenditures some \$9 billion over seven years," said Sims. "Instead, Congress adopted a farm bill that will cost considerably more than simply extending the 1990 farm bill which was criticized for being too costly." The NFU plan would also have enhanced crop insurance, as well as associating payments with commodity prices.

Since the Freedom to Farm Act was first proposed, Farmers Union has maintained that one of the major weaknesses in its structure is that it depends on annual appropriations by Congress while forcing farmers to make seven-year commitment. During the farm bill debate, NFU urged Congress to

## Corn prices look good

While old crop corn prices continue to be at near high records, prices for new crop corn dropped recently. But the market outlook for corn and feed grains appear bright through 1997.

July '96 corn futures contracts at the Chicago Board of Trade closed at \$5.03 per bushel. Most corn futures contracts fell the .12cents per bushel trading limit on May 20.

The projected price range for new crop corn is \$2.70 to 3.10 per bushel compared to \$3.15 to 3.25 for the 95-96 crop.

## Texas Crop Conditions

The statewide economic impact of the record-setting drought for Texas agriculture could be more than \$6.5 billion. The 1995-1996 wheat crop is a "bust" and cotton, corn and grain sorghum already planted are struggling to survive.

## Coating prevents spoilage

Three years of research on protecting big round bales confirms what field experience had previously shown. A thin coating of hydrogenated beef fat sheds water and prevents hay spoilage.

In a University of Missouri study, results showed that the hydrogenated tallow coating on the top and sides of large bales of legume or grass hay virtually eliminates spoilage,

says Dale Watson, regional extension livestock specialist, Carrollton, Mo.

The forage under study was stored for three years and feeding trials were conducted for two years. The treated hay was fed to mature cows, and no refusal was noted.

## July 12 is deadline to sign Farm Bill contract

President Clinton signed the new farm bill, officially the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996, or FAIR. Whether or not you think the new "Freedom to Farm" bill is fair, you should sign up. Final deadline to sign the 7 year "Production - Flexibility Contracts" is July 12. You'll get half the minimum 30 days after your contract is signed and the other half before Sept. 30.

## Winter wheat is hit hard

The '96 wheat outlook is fairly dim for producers over much of Texas. The Texas Agriculture Statistics Service estimates winter wheat production down 24% from last year.

Dryland wheat has suffered the most. The drought hit the driest period during the grain fill stage of the crop. When this period is shortened, yields go lower. Record temperatures also caused a shorter grain fill period.

On a more positive note, wheat harvested in Cooke County was mostly a pleasant surprise. This year the wheat crop is running an average of 30 bushel per acre.

## County Agent's Report

### NOBLE FOUNDATION TOUR

The Noble Foundation is a privately owned self-supported foundation that was started in 1945 for the purpose of providing information to farmers, ranchers, and other individuals involved in agriculture. The Foundation is located at Ardmore, Oklahoma.

Producers interested in touring the Red River Farm near Marietta, Oklahoma, will have an opportunity to do this on Thursday, June 27. We will be participating in the tour with a group of ranchers and farmers from Wise County. We will go by carpool and leave Gainesville at approximately 8 a.m. Anyone interested in attending should notify the Extension Office at 668-5412 by noon, June 24, so that we might arrange travel.

The Red River Farm near Marietta is an Angus/Brangus Commercial Beef Herd and has a bermudagrass rotational grazing system. In addition, Noble Foundation staff will discuss rye and crabgrass trials and wildlife management. We will also tour the irrigated pecan orchard and hear their management strategies.

The tour will last from approximately 9 a.m. until 12 noon. A noon meal will be on your own.

If you are interested, be sure and call the County Extension Office.

### TESTING FOR NITRATES IN FORAGES AND GRAIN SILAGE

The current drought situation has effected a significant percentage of the state's non-irrigated corn, sorghum, and forage lands. Coupled with the zero or near zero levels of available forages for livestock, many producers are looking at baling, making silage, or pasturing this cropland in an effort to salvage this potential forage. The low precipitation coupled with this season's above normal temperatures has resulted in potential accumulation of toxic nitrate concentrations in the above mentioned crops. These potential nitrate accumulations are most likely to occur in drought stricken, nitrogen fertilized fields and pastures.

### Testing for plant nitrates:

Field Quick Test - We currently have a quick field test kit at the Extension Office. The determination of plant nitrates is performed by plating a drop of solution on the freshly cut plant tissue. The development of a blue or blue-black color indicates the presence of nitrates. Several key points about this test: 1) the test should be performed at several locations on the plant (or on all plant parts to be harvested) and on a number of

plants within the same field, 2) The concentration of nitrates varies during the day, thus testing should be done as close to harvest time as possible, 3) the test is designed for actively growing plants and is not recommended for dry tissue, 4) the test is not quantitative, only qualitative. The development of a blue color does not necessarily mean the forage can't be fed. Any tissue showing color development should be tested by a commercial lab for actual nitrate concentrations. Laboratory testing for nitrates is available through many commercial labs and offer detailed nitrate levels so feeding recommendations can be more accurate. In general, nitrate levels less than 1% (10,000 ppm) on the Texas A&M Test are considered safe in healthy livestock. Dr. Provin says that the A&M Lab has received several samples which exceeded 1% level. Nitrate tainted forages can be fed to livestock if properly mixed with forages free of nitrate. Recommendations will be made for your submitted samples as to their feed quality. The A&M Lab has a current turn-around time for plant nitrate testing of two days (one day drying time). Cost is \$5 for plant nitrates only or \$10 for protein and nitrates. All results can be faxed if requested.

There is an Extension Publication available "Preventing Nitrate Problems in Drought Damaged Corn" that offers a more detailed description of recommendations. This publication is available by calling 668-5412.

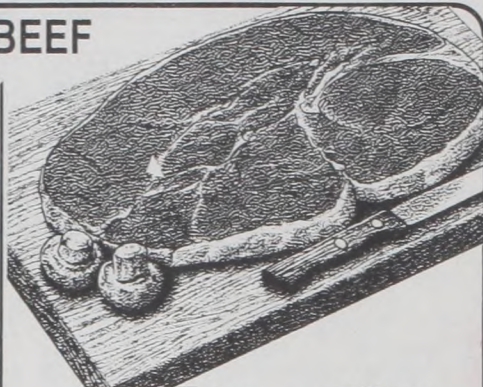

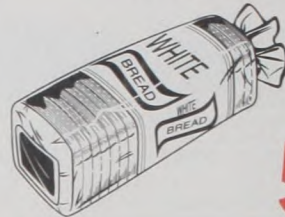
