If the people want the Sheriff's department to continue to work with 10 deputies, two investigators, and a civil deputy, then people will have to understand that they will have to wait their turn for something to get investigated, Compton explained. "If this is what the people want us to do then we will give 110 percent effort to do what ever," noted the Sheriff. "With what we've got, we are going to work as hard as we can and we're not going to look back one bit. People need to know and then they need to let us know or let their elected officials know, what they want from their sheriff's office. If people let their officials know what they want, then the officials will know what they need to do." What Sheriff Compton sees as being ideal for his mental health officer because mental health problems arise constantly and require special training; two transport officers, two more criminal investigators and the automobiles needed for their transportation. "That will just allow us to begin to get our nose above the water a little bit. We're not going to get dry with that, but we need that to try to get things back to an even keel," he said.

Wet weather sprouts problems for corn growers Key considerations include herbicide label restrictions, potential for crop injury, expense of weed control, and timing treatment to growth stage of the crop and weeds. If weeds and grass emerge before or with the corn, their size may make control difficult. Because early season weed control is vital for preserving strop yield, and many herbicides are most effective on small weeds, producers should be prepared to control weeds while small, preferably less than two inches in height.

An unusually cold, wet April in Texas has created a variety of problems for coren producers. Cool soil temperatures have slowed crop emergence, wet soil has delayed planting while creating ideal moisture conditions for weed seed germination, and snowfall in many areas disrupted key field work for several days. In addition, untimely rainfall created havoc with herbicides already applied or delayed herbicide application. Weed control in corn is off to a poor start.



The pecan nut casebearer com-pletes several generations each year. Adults of the overwintering generation emerge in April and May throughout Texas and lay eggs on pecan nutlets soon after pollination. These eggs result in first generation larvae which feed on nutlets and generally cause the most damage. Second generation larvae attack the nuts in mid-summer about 6 weeks after nut entry by first generation larvae.

CONTROLLING THE PECAN NUT CASEBEARER

First generation larvae feeding on nutlets usually have the great-est potential to cause economic loss. For this reason, control is

directed primarily at this spring generation.

County Agent's Report

Insecticide applications must be accurately timed to control newly hatched casebearer larvae before they enter the nuts. Once inside, larvae are protected from insecti-cide treatments.

In the spring, nutlets should be carefully examined for casebearer eggs to determine 1) if egg infes-tations are great enough to justify treatment and 2) the optimum timing of an insecticide appli-cation.

This week I visited with Dr. Allen Knutson, Extension Ento-mologist, and he found the first egg lay in Ellis County. From this he feels the best spray time for Cooke County will be about the 1st and 2nd of June. Possibly even the last day or two of May.

Insecticde sprays should be applied with caution in backyard and urban areas because of the great potential for spray drift onto nearby gardens, pets and living areas.



Corn acres projected higher, sorghum lower

The April 1 USDA planting intentions report projected farmers will plant 81.4 million acres of corn for all purposes in 1997, up 2% from last year and 14% above 1995. If these intentions materialize, this would be the largest planting acreage since 1985. Expected acreage's are up in most Corn Belt states with the exception of Iowa, Michigan, and Minnesota. Texas plantings are projected at 2.1 million acres, the same as '95, and '96. National sorghum plantings
