# City faces \$100,000 water system upgrade

Gehrig of Rad and Associates, the council began discussion options.

The City has an antiquated (dictionary - old, obsolete, ill adapted to present use) water system that must be brought up to a good, approved standard to meet present and future requirement, Ronnie Felderhoff told the council.

The problem of financing brought the decision of the sales tax increase being the most fair way to go. This would bring a projected \$65,000 a year towards the \$100,000 needed for the project. A property tax would make the city residents bearing the burden alone, while a sales tax would have help from all who do business in Muenster - rural patrons and city visitors. The increase is in line with other area cities. The other option of obtaining a bond and paying interest right away would increase cost to the project.

The money raised from this tax will be for the new elevated water storage tank, in North Muenster and the required pipeline improvements, only.

To help with the balance needed for all improvements to the water system, other changes will have to be made. After many years of having the lowest water and sewer rates (150% lower) in the area, the council voted to raise Muenster rates slightly, which is still below all others. Water base rate increase for residents will be \$1.00 per meter. Sewer rate increase of \$3.00. These changes are to go into effect May 1, 1997. A sewer tap installation for new homes has been increased to \$300, which was necessitated as the city has been losing money on these tap installations.

Muenster Jaycee members appeared to request the finalization of plans to purchases the Schilling property for the ball park. President Neal Flusche spoke on their hard work to provide this facility for the city. Council park commissioner Jewel Otto praised the Jaycees and stated that the park board approved, with some changes in the contract with the city. A special meeting of the council will be held Friday morning to approve the purchase with contract changes to be made later. The Jaycees ball park is being done the same as the library, with the organizations paying for the property which then becomes a city facility.

### 817 area code to change

The Texas Public Utility Commission has approved plans for a three-way geographic split of the 817 area code due to the rapid exhaustion of available numbers. The two newly created area codes are 940 and 254 which will become effective May 25, 1997.

#### Sacred Heart swimmers take 1st and 2nd at State

Arms were stroking, legs were kicking, and water flying in the TAPPS State Meet at Palo Alto College in San Antonio, Saturday, Jan. 25. The Sacred Heart Tigers and Tigerettes competed in Division II of the state swim meet and came home with a State Championship Title for the Tigerettes and a second place for the Tigers. The two teams won a total of 43 medals, 17 first place finishes, 13 second places, 8 third places, and 5 fourth place finishes.

# by Stephen Broyles City employees will smoke test the city's sewer system next Tuesday through Thursday, February 11-13, 1997, weather permitting. The purpose of the smoke test is to identify sewer pipelines which have leaks in the pipes, so that a plan may be developed for replacing them. Pressurized smoke should escape from leaking sewer pipes and work its way up through the ground and into the air. People may see smoke rising from the ground. City employees will stake these areas as places with leaks. As funds permit, the pipelines with leaks will be repaired or replaced. Smoke should also go up private sewer lines and escape through the cleanouts and vents. Residents are asked to pour one or two gallons of water into seldom used sinks and other drains to prevent smoke from entering their houses. If smoke enters a home, then there may be improper or defective connections between the city sewer line and the plumbing in the house. Some commonly asked questions and answers include: - Is the smoke harmful? No. The smoke may make you cough, but is not harmful to your health. It is harmless to human, pets, food, clothing, drapes, and furniture. - What do I do if smoke gets into the house? Open windows and doors for ventilation. The smoke will dissipate soon. - I will not be at home during smoke testing and I have pets in the house. What should I do? A good idea would be to leave several windows partially open. - We have a sick person in the house. What should we do if smoke gets in? Open window and doors. If the person can stay in a well-ventilated room during the testing, the chance of encountering a high smoke concentration will be less. - If smoke gets into the building, how long does it take to dissipate? While that will depend on how much smoke gets into the building, how long does it take to dissipate? While that will depend on how much smoke gets into the building and-how well ventilated it is, the smoke normally dissipates after only a short period of time. 

### IRS backs off

Production agriculture ored a major victory today nen the Internal Revenue rvice issued a news release Notice 97-13 which structs farmers not to change eir method of accounting om previous years unless structed to do so by a evious IRS audit. "Farmers should complete eir 1996 returns as they have en doing in the past, or as ey have been directed to do ter an IRS audit," said IRS ommissioner Margaret ilner Richardson. "This will low those who want to operly report this income on eir 1996 tax returns."

The IRS announced today it intends to make it isier for farmers who receive serred crop and livestock ayments to change their counting method for Iternative minimum tax AMT) purposes. The change gill begin with the 1997 tax sturns to be filed in 1998, will ot require payment of a user se and will provide audit

returns to those who have not received an audit letter on this issue before today.

In Notice 97-13, the IRS explained that the way deferred contract commodity sales for the AMT is a method of accounting for tax purposes. The law provides that a taxpayer cannot change a method of accounting, even is it isn't the correct method, without the prior consent of the IRS.

The notice stated that farmers will be able to change the way they report deferred contract sales for AMT purposes to the proper method with automatic IRS approvals, beginning with their 1997 tax returns. They will not be required to request individual rulings or pay the normal user fee. Farmers who take advantage of the automatic change procedure will be protected from IRS audits on this issue for previous years unless they are currently under audit for this issue.

TIPS FOR NEW PASTURE

aking plans for establishing new stures in the spring might want to nsider a few pointers now. Like farming, early planning is im-rtant especially for seedbed

pastures in the spring might want to consider a few pointers now. Like all farming, early planning is important especially for seedbed preparation.

First, decide what you want the grass to do. There isn't a single grass that stays green 365 days a year, grows well during drought and cold weather, produces good forage all year long, and provides a high yield.

Be realistic in selecting the grass for your new pasture. Consider if you want the grass strictly for grazing or if hay will be harvested during times of lush growth. Also, consider root growth and its effect on conserving soil and water resources. Response to fertilizer and drought tolerance are important factors in our area of Texas in some summers.

While costs are important, con-

drought tolerance are important factors in our area of Texas in some summers.

While costs are important, consider long-term benefits of production and persistence before opting for the least expensive pasture to establish.

Some of the popular grasses being planted are bermudagrasses such as Coastal, Brazos, Tifton 85, and Tifton 44. Locally grown Coastal is a good choice in that it has stood the winters and has some cold tolerance. Kleingrasses such as Kleingrass 75 is still popular. Tall wheatgrass such as Jose is performing well in our county as a cool season perennial grass. The Old World Bluestems (Plains, WW Sparr, Ironmaster, Caucasian, T587, etc.) have been performing well in the county, too, and deserve consideration.

T587, etc.) have been performing well in the county, too, and deserve consideration.

Another consideration in new plantings is access. New grass plantings should be fenced. Some grasses are very palatable and free access to them will enable cattle to be more tolerant to pressure grazing than do the bunch grasses like Klein and Bluestems.

For establishing stands, growers should prepare the seedbed well in advance of planting. This is a must in heavier soils especially because of clods. This permits soil to settle and become firm before planting. Following planting, a good packing with a cultipacker is also important. Weeds can be controlled and fertilizer should be applied before seedbeds settle. Early soil testing is important for determining what nutrients are needed.

Most failures of new plantings result from short-term plans and last-minute decisions to prepare seedbeds. Remember that grass

seeds are small and seedlings are weak, so conditions must be favor-able for germination and establish-ment. Additional information on grass varieties, fertility, and herb-icides is available at the County Extension Office.

Grass varieties should provide both the quantity and quality of forage to meet livestock's nutritional needs. In order to address these topics, a Forage Conference will be held at 7 p.m., Tuesday, February 11, at the Cooke County Electric Co-Op on Highway 82 east of Muenster.

Dr. Don Dorsett, Extension Forage Specialist from Texas A&M, will present many of the topics concerning Establishment of Warm Season Perennial Grasses, Management During and Following Drought, and Selection of Warm Season Perennial Grass Varieties. In addition Result Demonstration Work from Cooke County concerning Herbicides and Forage Production will be covered. 1.5 Continuing Education Units toward recertification for private, commercial and non commercial license holders will be available at the session.

#### Is a cesarean worth it?

The procedure itself will cost \$150-250, says Purdue veterinarian Larry Horstman. Purdue research has shown that about 50% of the cows that undergo cesareans don't breed back the next year (60-day breeding season). And, about 10% of the cows die due to secondary infections. Those costs often make producers hesitate and pull a little harder.

But, if a c-section is necessary, you're best bet is to be timely. "If you can deliver a live calf, rarely do we lose a cow," explains Horstman. It's the one that goes too long-where the calf's been dead a day or two - that is most likely to cause problems with secondary infections.
"I'm not a big fan of doing a c-section to get a dead calf," says Horstman. If the calfs

already dead, he prefers to do a fetotomy, a procedure in which he dissects the calf inside the cow and removes the pieces. "You don't put the cow through surgery, plus those cows will usually get bred back better."

To tell if the calf is dead, Horstman puts his finger in its mouth to see if it will swallow or in its eye to see of it will wink. If you can reach the umbilical cord, he says, you can feel a pulse if it is alive.

There are no good guidelines for when to call the veterinarian in to do a cesarean, says Horstman, adding that it just takes experience. "The tendency is to wait too long and try everything else first." If your goal is a live cow and calf, quicker action will yield happier results, he says.



#### Let your ears detect hydraulic problems

Today's tractors use the nydraulic system for everything from braking and steering to transmission shifting and pto clutch peration. Keeping that circulatory system operating properly requires regular maintenance, but even then chings can go wrong. Finding those problems requires using a common, precise diagnostic tool found on every farm - the part of the same control of the same problems.

tool found on every farm - the sar.

In general, unusual noises in a tractor or combine hydraulic system are caused by one of two happenings. It's either air leaking into the system or a pump or motor that is cavitating (forming bubbles). Remember, noise is only a symptom of more serious troubles. These include vibrations that can loosen components and overheating of the hydraulic fluid that results in more wear and poorer performance. Also, cavitation can cause erosion of metal that can quickly destroy a pump or motor.

What to Look For
Use this checklist to match symptoms with their potential problems.

Pump noisy on start-up. Thick, cold hydraulic fluid causes cavitation. When the fluid warms, cavitation and noise should stop.

Noisy lines. This is caused by turbulence due to vibration of an aerated line.
Chatter and squeal in valves. Pockets of air causing erratic operation make this noise.

Erratic cylinder operation. Air in the fluid "softens" the system and increases compressibility.

Higher-than-normal temperature. Above-normal temperature can result from either aeration or cavitation.

Cloudy or frothy oil. Withdraw a sample of the fluid and let it stand for a while. If it clears, fluid is aerated. If is does not clear, water is

#### Applicators can reinstate certificates through CEC

Private pesticide applicators who still hold "grandfathered" certificates can reinstate their certificate by obtaining continuing education units (CEUs), Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. Prior to Jan. 10, 1989, applicators were issued certificates that were "grandfathered," meaning they never expire. However effective Jan. 1, 1991, the Texas Pesticide Regulations require certificate holders to earn 15 CEUs every five years if they want to apply restricted-use pesticides. "Grandfathered" certificate holders can renew their certificate at any time if they complete their CEU requirements. Private certificate holders cannot

supervise an employee in the use of pesticides.
Certificate holders also have the option of obtaining a private applicator license. Extension offices can provide study materials, and all TDA offices offer testing dates.

Private applicators must renew their license every five years and obtain 15 CEUs during that period. Two credits must be in integrated pest management and two in laws and regulations. Applicators must self-certify their credits by listing them on the renewal form, which they should receive by the end of January.

In Spanish, El Niño means "the little baby" and is a reference to the Christ child. It was so named by fisherman off the coast of South America because the weather phenomenon tends to occur around Christmas.

El Nino is a naturally occurring but irregular climate cycle born in the Pacific Ocean. Warmer than normal surface waters, a huge pool of it that currently is up to 10 degrees warmer than normal in some parts - shift from one sector of the ocean to the other. That pool of hot water is currently farther north and east than during normal El Ninos. In fact, it's off the west coast of Mexico.

Called the second largest factor in worldwide weather patterns (next to the seasons), El Nino's waters force changes in oceanic and atmospheric conditions and weather patterns. It produces a huge concentration of tropical rainfall which affects the frequency, severity and direction of storms in the Pacific. That, in turn, can make both the monsoons of India and the winter flooding in California much more severe than usual, and Pacific waters on the South American coast are a foot higher than normal

#### Weather report

From mid-December to mid-January, we should see warmer than normal temperatures, and above average rainfall for the period.

Variable cloudiness should move over Texas skies this weekend, with precipitation confined to the northeast. Early next week, rains should return statewide.

Prospects are good for dry weather Christmas day and into the weekend. However on December 28, rain and snow could occur in the north.

Variable cloudiness, mild temperatures and scattered precipitation are likely the last week of December.

Fair, mild weather is expected to start the New Year, with rain and cooler temperatures dominating the area by the 5th and 6th.

Prospects are good for warm, dry weather January 7-9 followed by continued mild temperatures and a chance of rain on the weekend of the 10th and 11th.

January 12 through 18 should see variable cloudiness and scattered showers.

In the summer following an El Niño, the effects are usually just the opposite. If it's warm and wet in the winter, it's often dry and cool the next summer. That effect has been dubbed either "La Niña" (the little girl) or "El Viejo" (the old man) by the scientific community.

There have been three outlandishly large El Niños in this century: 1905-1906, 1972-1973, and 1982-1983. Even the last of these could not be predicted. But today, with a lot of data now coming from satellites, ocean buoy sensors and other sources, computer models have been built that forecast potentially severe climatological changes from this El Niño.


