Carolyn Barta has had her thumb on the pulse of Texas and national politics for many years. She first became interested in government after the Kennedy assassination. Carolyn was already involved in journalism, but wanted to cover governmental bodies and the making of public policy. She decided to return to school and earned a Master's degree in a program, Public Affairs Reporting, at the University of Texas at Austin. There she learned how to cover the Legislature.

In 1972 Ms. Barta went to work for the Dallas Morning News. Her job was to cover local and state politics. She has 31 years experience at the Dallas Morning News. Host of that time she spent engaged in political reporting or editing. Her column ran on the Viewpoints page for 20 years. Carolyn's assignment for the last year has been to the national political desk covering the presidential and national congressional elections.

On the 20th anniversary of the assassination of John F. Kennedy The Dallas Morning News carried a special section on the event. Barta was editor of that award winning special section. She is also a frequent guest commentator on local and national television and radio. Perot and His People: Disrupting the Balance of Political Power and BILL CLEMENTS: Texian to His Toenails are books written by Carolyn Barta.

Barta revealed that Bill Clements was one of her favorite Texas governors even though there were many who are interesting for different reasons.

"Clements is interesting because he made such a difference in the political landscape," she remarked. "At the time he was elected in 1978 the only Republican that had ever been elected statewide in Texas was John Tower to the Senate. Clements' election was a big upset and he was able to do it largely by sheer force of his own personality — and a few million dollars. "He was such an optimistic and determined person that even though it never had been done before, when he got into the race he was absolutely determined that he was going to win. In June of that year he was 60 points behind in the polls. People didn't give him a chance for winning." She noted that had Bob Dole run a better campaign, it would not have been impossible for him to come from 15 points behind in the polls to defeat Bill Clinton.

Barta described Clements as having a dominant personality which was apparent throughout his life. He made a fortune as an oil drilling contractor. According to Barta, Clements could be described as having three successful careers. He started an oil drilling contractor. Texas he ran for, and was elected, gover-nor of Texas. Now at age 78 he raises cattle on a ranch near Forney. "He made such an impact on Texas politics largely because of the appoint-ments he made when he was governor," Barta explained. "He brought a lot of people into Austin, into state govern-

Austin, into state government, a lot of Republicans, many of whom are still involved today, many whom have since run for elective office."

Texian to my toenails." She and other reporters covering him thought he said that he was Texan to his toenails and they reported it that way. When she interviewed Clements to write the book he told her what he had really said.

A Texian, back in the days of the Republic of Texas, was someone like Sam Houston. "A Texian is someone who is very courageous, steadfast, strong, independent minded, spirited, and all those things that he (Clements) actually is as a person and was as a governor."

Pointing to the November election Barta noted that there were 10 statewide races on the ballot and all 10 went to Republicans this time. Of the 29 statewide offices, 20 are now held by Republicans in Texas.

"I think the trend toward a Republican state is going to continue at least for the next few years," said Barta. "Down the road, beyond 2000 at some point, the Hispanic population is increasing so much in Texas and 1 think the demographic change could possibly stop that (Republic trend) at some point.

There were 1.6 million registered Hispanic voters and 400,000 of those were newly registered voters. There were one million out of that 1.6 million that actually voted, so 69 percent of the registered Hispanic voted which was higher than the percent of the electorate that voted." She added that 14 percent of the Hispanics who voted were new voters and that the theory was that they became interested because of the senate race between Phil Gramm and Victor Morales. Some feel that they

Came in to vote for Bill Clinton since 75
percent of the Hispanic who voted were
for Clinton.

"I don't know at what point Texas is
projected to be a majority minority state,
but it is," Barta noted, "Unless Republicans are able to change those voting
habits where Hispanics vote 75 percent
for the
Democrat,
that could
potentially be
a stumbling
block for
Republicans
in the future."

"For whatever reasons
a lot of people
were not

voter turnout since 1964. "For whatever reasons a lot of people were not involved this year," Barta in politics sort of like they got involved in their church. It was just something that you did. Throughout the country there has been this decline in civic responsibility where people are just so consumed with their own problems and their own lives that they are less involved in their communities and doing civic work. It may not be so much in small communities."

Barta's book on Bill Clements is available in the major book stores in the Metropolitan area. It is a full life biography of Clements. "He is a fascinating character in himself and his whole life is interesting," said Carolyn. "But it also goes a lot into his impact into the Texas political landscape and reviews both of his gubernatorial terms. It treats his role as a pivotal figure in Texas politics, but it doesn't just deal entirely with that." People can order the book directly from the publisher, Eakin Press, in Austin. Carolyn Barta was in Cooke County in November as a guest of the Cooke County Republican Women's Group. She spoke to the group about the November General Election, about Texas changing into a two-party state, and about her book on Bill Clements.

A Dallas native, Carolyn lives in Dallas with her husband Joe. They have two sons.

Sen. Committee recommends initiative and referendum for Texans

On November 7, 1996, after several months of holding hearings around Texas and listening to extensive citizen and expert testimony, the Texas Senate Interim Committee on Initiative and Referendum (1&R) recommended that "the Texas Legislature adopt a joint resolution requiring submission to the voters of a constitutional amendment to reserve to the people the powers of initiative and referendum." The Committee recommendations include an impressive array of safeguards, making up a proposal knowledgeable observers called the best 1&R proposal in the U.S. The committee vote was 4 to 1.

Thus Senators Jane Nelson, Teel Bivins, David Cain, and Tom Haywood join the millions of other Texans (in favor by 68% to 20%) who are asking the Legislature for I&R rights. These Texans include Governor George W. Bush and Lt. Governor Bob Bullock, U.S. House Majority Leader Dick Armey, the members of United We Stand - Texas, National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB), Texas Silver-Haired Legislature, Texas Association of Concerned Taxpayers, and most of the Texans living in the 237 homerule cities in Texas with I&R. This recommendation will now be supported by 58 members of the Texas House of Representatives and 14 Texas Senators who have signed a Texans for Initiative and Referendum pledge to "...support and campaign actively for the enactment of a constitutional amendment providing Texans with rights of Initiative and Referendum and further pledging, "to cosponsor such an amendment in the 75th session of the Texas Legislature."

Note to the Muenster Enterprise,
This week I certainly enjoyed the article "Muenster Enterprise Celebrates 60 Years" by Elfreda Fette.
The mention of the ice storms of 1948 and 1950 when the electric lines were all down brought back memory of my purchase of an old Putt Putt or axillary power plant as was a part of the B-17 and the B-24 bombers of W.W.II. In the early part of 1947 I purchased two of these units from what was then called the War Assets Adm. later known as Texas Surplus Property Agency. I found one unit functional and we used it in 1948 and again in 1950.

The unit was a 90 amp. 24 volt DC current; but I got 24 volt bulbs from Santa Fe Railroad and used them to replace the 110 volt bulbs. The smoke house just back of the old farm house was wind and there I plugged in the old "Putt Putt" and we had lights.

The unit was made by Homelight and had a 2 stroke, 15 hp. engine pulling a 90 amp DC generator. The gas tank only held one gallon, for it was only used in starting the first engine (normally #3). I always kept an extra gallon of gasoline and oil mixed ready for use. The unit would run approximately 1 1/2 hours on that amount of fuel and we learned to time our operation both evening and morning when we had lights.

Today my old Putt Putt is flying again in the restored B-24 bomber - the All American of Collings Foundation, Storr, Mass., as I sent Bob Collings those units along with a P1 generator.







There are three major and seven minor species in freshwater and two saltwater catfish. The most common freshwater is the channel catfish, found throughout the state. The next common is the flathead catfish, usually found in rivers and lakes. The third species is the blue catfish.

Minor species are yellow bullhead, brown bullhead, black bullhead, toothless blindcat, widemouth blindcat, tadpole madton and freckled madton.

To tell catfish apart, look at the tail. If the tail is forked, the fish is a channel or blue catfish. If the tail is square or round it is a flathead or bullhead. If the dorsal and anal fins appear to be continuous with the tail fin, it is

a madton or stone cat.

Flatheads and bullheads are easily separated since the flathead has a broad, flat head while the head on the bullhead is more round. Channel cat and blue cat can be separated by their anal fin.

Channel catfish have 23-29 fin rays while blue catfish have 30-36. The channel has a round-edged anal fin compared to a straight-edge one for the blue-cat. Usually the blue catfish has a sharp rise behind the head.

County Agent's Report

Old World Bluestems are introduced grasses that have been in the U.S. since the 1920's and 30's. The variety that many producers are most familiar with is King Ranch Bluestem. This grass has been in Cooke County and Texas for many years. However, during the past 15 years, we have seen many new varieties established in Texas and Oklahoma. They will adapt to many soil types and have the ability to produce large amounts of high quality forage for grazing livestock.

drill companies also make fluffy seed attachments for their grain drills.

One interesting method of establishment that has worked very well for the Dangelmayr Brothers is planting using the tread-in method. Richard Dangelmayr showed me two plantings using this method. One was on an extremely rocky hill and the other was following a winter small grain planting. In this method, you apply the seed to the ground surface and then let cattle stomp in the seed during their grazing activity in the spring. On both of these locations the stand was excellent and the Dangelmayrs have used this method in other plantings in the past several years with very satisfactory results.

Planting is usually done by applying two pounds of pure live seed per acre. The rates may vary somewhat on the various varieties. Producers should plant soon after the last killing frost date in the spring and plant shallow. As with all grass plantings, fertility should be on soil recommendations.

Usually hay or grazing can happen during late first summer if adequate growing conditions have occurred.

Congress passes new law to treat farm animals

A bill passed by Congress and expected to be signed by President Clinton will increase the availability of new medicines used to treat farm animals, poultry and pets. The legislation was unanimously passed by the Senate last week after having previously cleared the House.

The legislation fixes some of the problems with the animal drug review process at the Food and Drug Administration by allowing the agency to operate more efficiently as it reviews potential animal health products. However, the bill preserves all the current requirements for proving that a new product is safe for animals, people, and the environment.

The Animal Drug Availability Act of 1996 (H.R. 2508) was supported by the FDA and administration officials have said Clinton will sign the bill.

Animal health officials have said there are not enough approved animal medicines to treat all diseases in all species

of animals. The changes in FDA procedures will provide the agency with the flexibility to approve more products that are safe and effective for various types of animals.

The bill includes the following:

Clarifies and expands the types of tests FDA can accept as evidence of an animal drug's effectiveness.

Removes the requirement that field investigations of drug's efficiency be required in every instance, while preserving FDA's right to require such test when necessary.

Creates a binding presubmission conference at which FDA and drug sponsors will agree on the types of data the agency will need for reviewing an application.

Streamlines the approval requirements when companies seek to market two previously approved drugs in combination.

Enhances the veterinary oversight of many nonprescription drugs by establishing a veterinary feed directive classification for some drugs.




