"Your brother, Frank Oliver Yosten, Seaman second class, United States Naval Reserve, has been carried on the official records of the Navy Department in the status of missing in action since 9 style, members in charge advised August 1942. He was serving on board the U.S.S. Jarvis when that vessel was damaged as the result of enemy air attacks off Guadal-

"The vessel was last seen by a ship on patrol in the early morning of 9 August, 1942, presumably enroute to a repair base at Noumea, New Caledonia. The Jarvis never reached the repair base and an intensive search by ships and aircraft failed to locate any trace of the missing ship or of the personnel aboard the ship. However. in the absence of conclusive evi-

Mayoroddities

By J. M. Weinzapfel Muenster Mayor

March 2nd, 1927, Muenster wa ncorporated and, we can hardly realize, over eighteen years have passed. Three past mayors, each have distinct accomplishments to their credit. In every case the proposal of any project later completed, would cause some to say, "The City Council must increase the tax rate to pay the debts to be made to pay for the proposed improve-

The Statutes under the title of which Muenster is incorporated, have set the tax limit to \$1.50 per hundred dollars of assessed value This has been the rate from the beginning of incorporation therefore no higher rate can be charged. This rate with the water revenue and miscellaneous receipts have provided sufficient income to meet promptly the operating expenses, improvements, bond maturities and accrued interest. The City of Muenster enjoys the reputation to have never defaulted on any obligation. The total delinquent taxes of \$632.58 for all these past eighteen years gives eviden-ce of the faithful support of property owners in payment of their taxes. Being 1/2 of 1 % delinquent or 991/2 % of all assessments coll-

In 1931, originally \$33.000.00 waterworks bonds were issued. \$18. 500 00 have been paid leaving a balance of \$14.500.00 outsanding. MOOS OF THE MOMENT

BY UNCLE BOB of the Kraft Dairy Farm Service



f you want bigger bits of butterfat, there's nothing better for bigger pats of butterfat than a better bull.

And that bunch of B's without honey brings me to the matter of insuring a better future milk production in your herd by care in picking out a herd sire.

The best way to judge a bull is by the milk production records of its daughters. So before you select the animal which will sire your calves, check back on the bull's daughters. If those daughters are producing at a high rate and have done so since the first time they freshened, then the bull is good enough for your herd.

In the next few months, cows which will freshen in the fall of 1946 will be bred. A year from now, the milk producers of 1948-49 and later will be arriving on farms.

If you want cows that will make more pounds of milk and more pounds of butterfat at no more cost than ordinary cows, you have the answer in the selection of your herd sire.



In making your plans for winter feeding, remember that the extension people recommend that a cow be fed on a basis of the quantity of milk it produces. If we fed humans on the amount of work done, I know some folks who'd be living on bread and water - and not very good water, either.

When you figure out how much feed you'll need to take your cows through the winter at top production, check the milk production records of each cow. Each animal needs as much high quality forage which it will eat, plus one pound of grain for each three to five pounds of milk produced.

The exact amount of grain to feed depends also on the quality of the roughage and the breed of cow. Holsteins and Brown Swiss need a pound of grain for each four or five pounds of milk, but Jerseys and Guernseys need a pound for each three to four pounds of milk, Missouri says. | agent.

I suggest you get copies of feeding bulletins from your county agent, and you might like to write for Cir-405, Extension Service, College of Agriculture, Columbia, Mo., and a new Special Circular called "Feeding the Dairy Herd" just published by the Extension Service, College of Agriculture, Madison, Wisc.*

And by all means watch for the winter feeding article in the September-October issue of the Kraftsman. It is a most interesting and helpful discussion of this important part of your program. Nearly starved to death one summer a lot of years ago. Worked on a farm which had a long-armed boarder who could reach the length of the table, with no trouble at all.

In case you've got any "boarders" n your herd, I suggest you check your feed supply and see if you can profitably replace such low produc-

ing cows with a well-bred heifer. There's a fine hay crop this year, but it is a bit early to talk about the size of the grain crop. Just how much you'll have for your winter feeding is something you will want to check into at this time.

If your feed supplies don't look too plentiful for your herd, you surely would be using the supply you have to better advantage if part of it feeds a new and promising producer, rather than going to a low producing cow.

Heavy milk producers use feed more efficiently than do low producers and return more dollars in milk for the dollars in grain and hay consumed.

Better look into this item before you start your barn feeding program.


