## Muenster State Bank observes 75th anniversary

Muenster State Bank, strength and mainstay of this community since its founding on July 3, 1923, is celebrating its 75th anniversary this week with several events.

A "Party in the Park" on Friday evening will be a nostalgic gathering for several generations of this community, and long-ago memories may be recalled with great pleasure. Beginning at 6 p.m. in the Muenster City Park, the celebration will include free hamburgers and hot dogs and watermelon. There will be drawings for over \$1,000 in door prizes. The swimming pool will be open from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Memorabilia of MSB will be featured in a historical display. Children are invited to participate in a patriotic bike/trike parade at 7:30 p.m. The all-inclusive announcement carried the note: "Where others have their branches, we have our roots."

Officers and employees of Muenster State Bank, their title and tenure are: Henry Weinzapfel, president, 40 years; Robert Weinzapfel, executive vice-president, 5 years; Lillian Walterscheid, vice-president, 20 years; John David Meurer, vice-president and cashier, 34 years; Shellie Hoedebeck, assistant vice-president, 16 years; Jeannine Walterscheid, loan processor and teller, 14 years; Carla Truebenbach, teller, 7 years; Carla Cunningham, assistant cashier, 24 years; Brenda Green, teller, 4 years; Pam Adwell, teller, 13 years; Cindy Koesler, proof operator, 1 year; Dan Hamric, customer relations, 1 year.

John Meurer was the Bank's first president, serving until his death in 1941. He was succeeded by J.M. Weinzapfel from 1941 to 1969. Meurer's son Herbert Meurer served as president from 1969 to 1980. He was succeeded by Earl Fisher, who retired on June 30, 1997.

Directors of MSB are David M. Bright, L.B. Bruns, James T. Dangelmayr, Urban J. Endres, Earl J. Fisher, Francis R. Fisher, John D. Meurer, Henry G. Weinzapfel and Robert G. Weinzapfel.

Full Service banking offered by MSB includes: loans - automobile, commercial, boat, home improvement, installment, personal, and real estate; deposit services - checking accounts, money market accounts, direct deposit - social security checks, government checks, railroad retirement checks, veterans administration check, certificates of deposit, savings accounts, individual retirement accounts, money orders and traveler's checks, credit cards, bank by mail, drive-in window, 24-hour depository, safe deposit boxes, wire transfer of funds, and discount brokerage. The lobby and drive-in banking hours are Monday through Thursday 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Friday 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Expansion plans being considered in the foreseeable future are intended to increase services, improve space and customer conveniences, and are sure to result in visual enhancement of the downtown business area. The bank is located at 201 N. Main Street. Current yearly dividends

over the last 15 years averaged \$500,000; Capital has grown to approximately \$11 million. Total assets have grown to upwards of \$60 million.

Growth is attributed to three factors: 1) the increased number of stockholders who support the bank; 2) good management; 3) inflated dollars.

Before stock was "spread out", MSB was down to 17 stockholders in 1982. Now, in 1998, there are 149 stockholders. The increase in the number of stockholders is a pertinent factor in the phenomenal growth of the bank.

Major changes in the past 15-20 years include the increase of total personnel; all employees are specialists in their fields; enhanced and increased services; and acquisition of an In-House Computer System.

Research into the Muenster Enterprise's chronicling in its pages by R.N. Fette of the founding, growth, and events related to Muenster State Bank, has shown and reported the steady upward direction of the institution.

Next to Muenster's birthday on Dec. 8, 1889, there is no occasion more meaningful to the history of this community than that which occurred on July 3, 1923, when Muenster State Bank received its charter from the State Banking Commission. It was a humble beginning for MSB - the minimum for their charter was a capital of \$17,500 plus a surplus of \$1,750. At that time of scarce, uninflated money, it was a higher goal than

## City earns local government award

The Texoma Council of Governments (TCOG) awarded the City of Muenster with its Innovation Award during its 10th Anniversary celebration on June 18, 1998. TCOG was looking for creative projects which address a local need or problem that could be replicated in other communities. Cities throughout Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson counties competed for the award.

The City of Muenster's award application covered two years accomplishments and documented internal audits of sanitation charges compared with business customers, and

of the tax appraisal rolls with individual property lots in the City of Muenster. The internal audit of the sanitation charges resulted in credits to the city totaling over \$5,000. The analysis of the tax appraisal roll identified property lots which were not being taxed or taxed properly, incorrect tax exemptions, and incorrect acreage listed. The appraisal district made the changes for the 1998 property taxes.

The award application also cited the improvements the city has made with computerized mapping of the city. Each city block is now mapped by property owner's name, individual lots and lot size. In

addition, the city has mapped detailed over-layering water and sewer lines onto the city blocks. Details include identification and location of different sizes and types of pipes, meter boxes, gate valves, fire hydrants, manholes, cleanouts, and specific information on pipeline depths and locations. Copies of these utility line mappings are provided to each field water and sewer operator, so they can easily be used at the site, without having to research line location at City Hall. These plans are kept up-to-date as changes occur. Future computerized mapping plans include over-layering a zoning layer.

## David Dewhurst seeks local votes during grassroots campaign

It is the goal of David Dewhurst to travel more miles and meet more Texans than anybody on the statewide ticket. In his quest to be elected as the next Land Commissioner of Texas, Dewhurst launched a 104 city grassroots campaign. He is traveling by bus and when he stopped in Gainesville on Tuesday, June 30 they had covered 5,400 miles and had 9,000 more to travel. Ten more cities have been added to the agenda.

Dewhurst's group stopped at the Farm Bureau office in Gainesville where he was greeted by Republican candidates sharing the political ticket with him this fall, as well as other interested citizens and supporters.

Introducing the Republican nominee for land commissioner was State Representative Ron

Clark of Sherman. Clark said that most people don't know much about the job of Land Commissioner. Dewhurst is ideally suited for the job, he said.

The Land Commissioner deals with veterans' issues and Dewhurst is a veteran. The office also deals with property and oil and gas for the state. The candidate ran his own energy business and knows oil and gas. He is a family man who worked his way up to being a successful business person.

"If you're a conservative, we don't want four more years of Garry Mauro as land commissioner," Dewhurst told the crowd gathered at the Farm Bureau office in Gainesville. "Although Garry Mauro's political career is soon to be ended by Governor Bush, he hand-picked his successor. My opponent is his protégé,

worked for him as his executive assistant for 2 1/2 years."

Dewhurst noted that he was traveling around the state talking to conservatives more than Republicans or Democrats. "I'm trying to attract conservative common sense men and women," he said.

Land Commissioner is an important office, said Dewhurst. He said that it predates the state of Texas and was one of the original constitutional offices of the Republic of Texas. The Land Commissioner is in charge of 20 million acres, said the candidate. That is like managing an area almost the size of the state of Louisiana. The land is managed like a business.

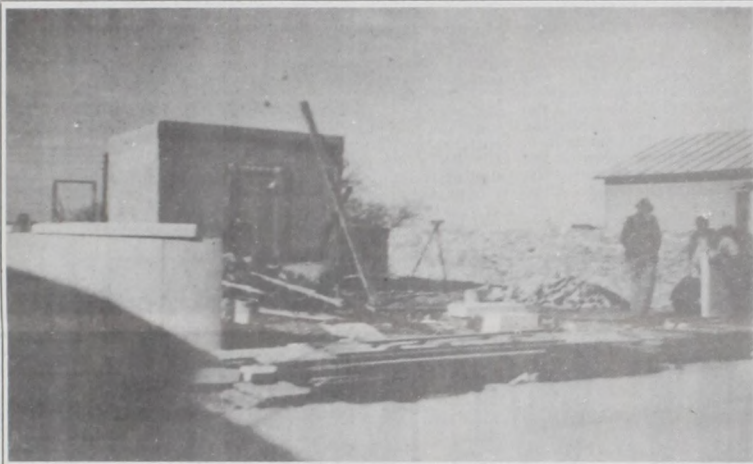

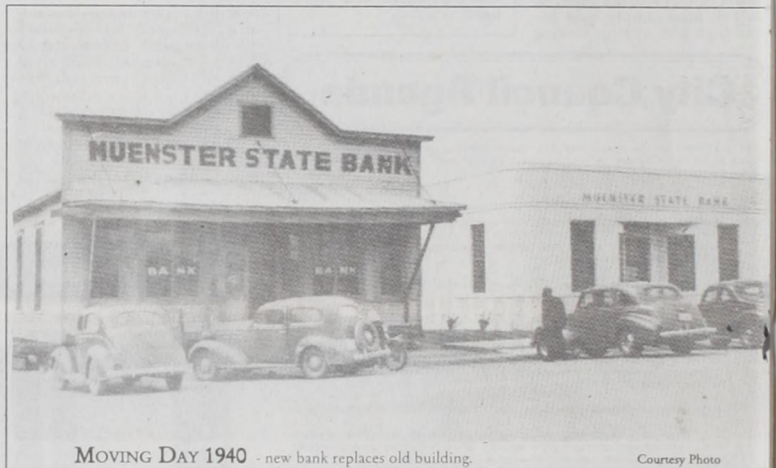

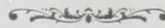

- Make application of a broad-spectrum sunscreen with minimum SPF of 15 as much a part of your year-round daily routine as brushing your teeth.
- Make sure there's a tube of sunscreen in the car for last-minute sun activities.
- Reapply sunscreen every two hours after you've been in the sun or water - even it claims to be "waterproof."
- Let the sunscreen dry on your skin for 20-30 minutes before going outside. It generally takes that long for the chemicals to start working and helps ensure that it stays on your skin where it belongs. And, try to avoid the sun between 10 A.M. and 4 P.M.
- Put your sunscreen on with your kids. Not only will you also be protected, you'll be a good role model, too.
- If you're in the sun and there's shade nearby, stand under it. If there's no shade, bring your own (i.e., a hat with a 4-inch brim). Also, wear sunglasses and tightly-woven protective clothing. Dark-colored clothing gives more protection.
- Sunscreens, combined with other skin-care products (such as moisturizers), are real step-savers. Just make sure the sunscreen in the product has an SPF of at least 15.

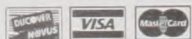

### Sports and Your Child

from the American Academy of Pediatrics

What if a child wants to quit a sports program?

A child has the right to share in the decision to end his or her involvement in a sport. If a child confronts you with a desire to quit a sports program, gather as many facts as you can. Talk with the child. Ask why he or she wants to quit. There may be a blunt and simple reason, such as not getting along with a coach, or the frustration of being "benched" and never playing in any games.

Observe your child. Are there any signs of stress related to sports participation, such as vomiting, loss of appetite, or headache? Does the child appear depressed - sleeping more often than usual, acting lethargic or withdrawn? These symptoms may suggest that the degree of stress is great enough to warrant withdrawing from the sport.

Base your decision on what your child says and what you observe. Remember, children also must learn not to "quit." Your child might have won a place on the team, preventing another child from playing in that sport. Simply quitting may waste an opportunity for your child and other young athletes. However, "sticking it out" is not always in the child's best interest when tough problems crop up. You may want to work with your child's pediatrician or coach to solve the problem.

## County agent offers drought tips

### BEEF MANAGEMENT TIPS DURING DROUGHT

Although the year seemed to begin well, with abundant spring rains that occurred generally across our area, hot dry weather over the last three months has sent cattle producers scrambling for pasture, purchasing hay and feed, or as a last resort, selling their cows.

Most ranchers were well aware that when the rains didn't continue into May or June, this summer was going to be hot and dry.

However, a lot of ranchers in the county and state still have more cows than they have forage to feed them.

This past week I traveled to College Station and pasture situations south of us are much worse than they are here. Pastures are in poor condition and the hot, windy days are taking their toll on forages.

This year is different from the last drought in that feed prices are still relatively cheap while calves are worth more. In the last drought, just the opposite was true and it was a triple whammy for livestock producers.

Dr. Joe Paschal, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Livestock Specialist in the south Texas area offers the following suggestions for managing during drought.

First, find out what the carrying capacity of your ranch is. A cow needs about 100 pounds of grass each and every day. She will only eat about 25 pounds of it, and an additional 25 pounds will be lost through trampling, defecation, and insect damage. The remaining 50 pounds is the "leave half" of the "take half, leave half" range management of native grasses.

By evaluating how much grass you have in each pasture, sometimes by visual appraisal other times by physically clipping, drying and weighing it, you can determine how long cows can graze the pasture without hurting it. Overgrazing, leaving less than what is needed for regrowth, makes it more likely that the plant won't make it through the drought. This amount will be less for sod forming grasses like the bermudas.

Remember that the grass that is available for the cow will also be lower quality (both in protein and

energy) and the cow will require more to meet her nutritional requirements. Additionally, she will take longer to digest the coarser, drought stressed grasses, and she may not be physically able to eat enough to maintain her body condition.

The cow will tell you when she's hungry. She'll be getting up earlier in the morning and afternoon and grazing later in the day and into the night.

Additionally, her manure pads will stack up, rather than lie flat, due to the high levels of undigested fiber. Soon after these signs appear, you can expect the cow to begin losing body condition and reducing her ability to get re-bred or maintain an early pregnancy. Even if you have ample supplies of grass, it still pays off to pay attention to your cows.

Although the ideal time to market cull cows is typically in April and May, nonproductive cows (open cows and old cows with bad eyes and teeth) should be sold as soon as possible before they lose condition. Fleishy cows are usually worth more per pound at marketing than thin cows. Considering this year's conditions, it is probably best to market these older cows as soon as possible. Also, some marketing economists are recommending that you sell your younger cows, heifers and 2-year-olds, due to the high cost of getting them into production compared to their small potential return. Usually during a drought, your best bet is to keep your 4- to 8-year-old cows. They have generally been through at least one drought and they will survive this one.

Getting the cows re-bred, if they are not already (send the open ones to market), is hard in a drought. Cows losing body condition are hard to get bred and keep bred. Reproduction is a luxury function for the cow and nursing a calf is hard on nutritional demands.

Ranchers should consider early weaning calves and selling them or keeping the top end of the heifers for replacements if needed. If you do keep the top end, remember to treat them extremely well nutritionally, at least as well as their dams, or it will be an exercise in futility.

They will never be productive cows unless they are grown out properly, and that is not an inexpensive proposition. Hot dry periods like we are experiencing are hard on the semen quality of bulls. Bulls passing their breeding soundness examination in March or April could be temporarily infertile due to the high ambient temperatures. This heat is hard on heat detection for artificial insemination, too. If you are checking heat and using AI, it is recommended that you check heat later in the evening or even at night.

If you are planning on feeding your cow herd for any length of time, go ahead and reserve a pasture or trap, as a sacrifice area to feed in. Don't open up all the gates and hope the cattle will "find something to eat." This causes unnecessary destruction of the grass and soil compaction.

When you decide to begin supplementation, feed the cattle in feed troughs or hay them in hay rings to save up to 20 percent of the cost of feed usually lost due to trampling or spoilage and to avoid additional ingestion of dirt to keep from aggravating further mineral imbalances. Cost of supplementation may double or triple the 50 cents to \$1 per head daily cost of maintaining a cow and many ranchers will look for "lower cost" options to supplement their cow.

Don't forget that cattle need water and lots of it. A dry cow will drink about 25 gallons a day, twice as much if it is a hot dry day. A wet cow will require even more. Pump or windmill water is better than tank water; usually, there is less mineral in the water.

In addition to a severe decline in water quality when tanks get low, they can become bog holes for young calves and weak cows. Check your watering areas frequently and shut cattle off from potential problems.

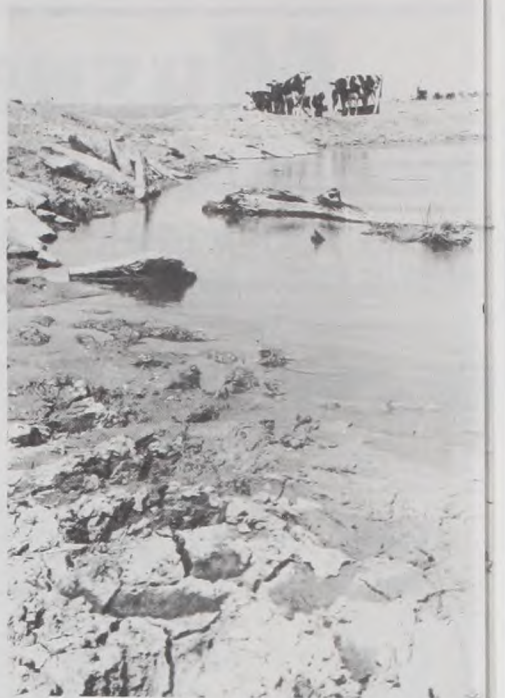
Finally, drought is not the time to slack off on herd health management either. Your best cattle should be those you have left after you sold the weak and older cattle. Continue your herd health management practices as outlined by your veterinarian. Remember that your cattle are eating closer to the ground and there are many disease spores in the soil waiting to be ingested like the clostridiums ("blackleg" or "sudden death" diseases). Check with your veterinarian for their specific recommendations.

Recent research by Texas A&M University on the tenderness of seven popular retail cuts showed that five of them improved through planned aging by the supermarket. That means consumers who have had a problem with tough beef can ask supermarket meat managers to sell only properly aged beef to ensure optimum tenderness.

"Aging refers to holding beef at refrigerated temperatures for an extended period of time," said Jeff Savell PhD, section leader of the meat science section at Texas A&M. "The process allows natural enzymatic reactions to take place that maximize the tenderness of beef. In other words, Aging makes beef better."

## Perry says TxDOT allows mowing along rights-of-way

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry announced that the Texas Department of Transportation has notified the Texas Department of Agriculture that farmers and ranchers can mow and bale forage along Texas highway rights-of-way. Procedures covering mowing and baling are in place in each TxDOT district office.

Dry conditions across the state have made this forage a source of fuel for potential wildfires.

"Texas farmers and ranchers appreciate TxDOT's cooperation during these adverse conditions," Perry said. "Mowing and baling of these rights-of-way help remove a fuel source for potential wildfires plus allow producers access to additional forage for their livestock."

The Texas Forest Service has classified more than half of Texas as being under high or extreme wildfire danger.

Farmers and ranchers wanting to mow or bale rights-of-way adjacent to their property should contact the district engineer in the appropriate TxDOT district office. TxDOT usually limits mowing and baling to areas along rural roads or to other areas along highway rights-of-way that will not create a safety hazard to travelers.
