

## Troy Sicking fills vacancy on Council

Mayor Henry Weinzapfel administered the oath of office to Troy Sicking at the December meeting of Muenster City Council. Sicking replaces Bert Walterscheid who resigned in September. Ricky Wimmer presented a petition to the council with 25 signatures from residents on Pecan Street, asking the council to take action on zoning violations. He related incidents of racing cars, loud pipes and music, parking on front lawns and repairing of cars in yards. Chris Moster joined him, in

warning of the dangerous situation because of many children and elderly living on Pecan Street. School times are especially bad, as it is a main route to the schools. The mayor promised that the city would give high priority to try and solve the problems. Steve Broyles was authorized to invite bids, this week, for the water line replacement work on North Main Street and Hwy. 82 to Hickory, needed for the new water tower. The opening of bids will be December 30 and the expected work to begin in February. He

explained it will be a hardship on businesses and customers and take the cooperation of everyone to get through the project. It is planned to work on one area at a time so as not to completely disrupt the whole street. Mayor Weinzapfel congratulated John Pagel and Broyles on the completion of the route around Muenster. Culverts and bar ditches are still to be done on Eddy Street and work on South Walnut and Hickory is coming along, explained Pagel. Contracts for '99 work should be completed in January, he added.

## TIFB announces grant for internet connectivity

Muenster Public Library has received a Library Internet Connectivity Grant in the amount of \$9,600.00 from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board.

The Library Internet Connectivity grants will allow applicants to purchase the necessary equipment in order to provide Internet access to the public. Grants for up to \$50,000 have been awarded for the purchase of workstations, networking hardware, ISP costs, and other related telecommunications costs. These grant projects officially begin January 4, 1999.

The Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund, established in 1995 by the Texas Legislature, is expected to receive \$1.5 billion in revenues from telecommunications assessments over a ten-year period. The Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board, created in 1995 by House Bill 2128, is responsible for disbursing approximately \$1.44

billion in grants and loans to assist in developing the telecommunication capabilities in public schools, not-for-profit healthcare providers, institutions of higher education, and public libraries. The library applicants were required to complete a detailed application. The awarded libraries will serve as a public arena for access to the Internet. They have committed to developing and implementing Internet Access policies that will protect and encourage their patrons' Internet use. The staff will also attend scheduled Internet training in order to incorporate the Internet into the library as a valuable information source. "We are very pleased to receive this award," said Kay Broyles, library director. "We will use TIFB funds to bring the Internet into the library for public use as a researching and learning tool. We will receive the funds in January 1999 and hope to be operational by March. These funds will enable us to buy computers, to install the wiring, and pay for the first year of operating expenses."

To date, the TIFB has funded 1022 school districts, more than 1,700 school campuses, 197 public libraries, and 57 community colleges and purchased 34,000 Internet-ready computers. For more information regarding TIFB, please contact their website at <http://www.tifb.state.tx.us>.

## Local long distance opens to competition

Who is your long distance carrier? And what rate are you being charged for long distance calling? These are questions that Muenster Telephone would like you to consider due to recent regulatory changes by the Texas Public Utility Commission. Beginning January 1, 1999, state regulations will allow telephone subscribers to select any long distance carrier they want for both IntraLATA calling (within the LATA) and InterLATA calling (beyond the LATA).

The LATA, or local access transport area (see figure 1), is a geographic boundary set by the state that determines the cost of long distance calling. By rule, IntraLATA calls have been carried by the local telephone company at state-fixed rates and InterLATA calls were carried by the caller's choice of long distance companies. To access a subscriber's long distance company of choice within the LATA, the caller had to dial a special access number, such as 10+10+XXX before dialing the phone number.

Beginning January 1, two changes will occur. First, phone subscribers can now select a long distance carrier for IntraLATA calling. This selection can be made by contacting Muenster Telephone's business office. The telephone office can provide a list of carriers from which to choose along with a contact number to determine the carrier's long distance rates. The second change that occurs is that Muenster Telephone's regulated rates for IntraLATA calling will be reduced to a maximum of 20 cents per minute, depending primarily on the time of day you make calls.

While this 20 cents per minute rate is lower than in the past, Muenster Telephone had petitioned the Public Utility Commission for a larger rate reduction in an attempt to be more competitive. This petition was not approved, so Muenster Telephone created a new long distance service under its parent company North Texas Communications. This new service, North Texas Long Distance, has some of the lowest rates in the industry while being simple to

understand and use. North Texas Long Distance will charge only 14 cents per minute, all the time, to anywhere in Texas or the domestic U.S. In addition, the new long distance plan has no

monthly fees or minimum usage requirements. Customers of Muenster Telephone can select this service for both IntraLATA and InterLATA. **See LONG DISTANCE, pg. 2**

## MMH Board hears favorable audit report

Brandon Durbin of the auditing firm Durbin & Company LLP explained his company's audit findings to the Muenster Memorial Hospital Board of Directors Nov. 24. It was a favorable report and covered the fiscal year ending June 30, 1998.

Operating income went from \$128,504 in 1997 to \$232,085 in 1998. The Total Operating Revenue, after extraordinary items, increased from \$151,068 in 1997 to \$478,640 in 1998. Also the net patient service revenue went from \$3,245,284 in '97 to \$3,812,986 in '98.

Durbin explained notable changes to the board. "Home Health law changes are probably the most significant item on here," Durbin noted. "Home Health changed drastically effective July 1." Caps were decreased by 15 percent in 1997. Caps mean that you can have so much cost per visit and only that amount will be paid regarding hospital cost. This will result in a loss of between \$75,000 and \$80,000 for the Muenster Hospital. As a result of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997, some Home Health agencies will be able to do more for the home patient than others. This depends on whether their rates were set at the national or regional rate or an agency specific historic rate.

Issues dealing with the year 2000 were addressed. "I'm not doing this to be an alarmist to anybody, but it is a real issue," Durbin remarked. "I'm sure that many of you are aware of this issue." This issue doesn't just concern computer issues, Durbin said in answer to a board member's question. "There's a variety of issues and there is a variety of problems and some of them are controllable and some are not controllable," said Durbin. "You don't have a lot of risk in other areas. Air handling systems, elevator systems, those are known to fail dramatically. You do have to

go through all your basics to see what's going to fail, who cares if it fails - does it have any risk to it, or is it something that has to be replaced."

Another thing to look at is all of your suppliers, he said. He predicted that there could be problems with insurance companies and their programs. Private insurance companies will probably try to use the Y2K problems as a way to delay paying money owed to the hospital for up to six months. "Each city has a risk of losing its electricity or its power and that risk is anywhere from 25 to 30 percent," noted Durbin. "What happens if your natural gas supplier were to lose electricity for some reason?" He predicted that those problems shouldn't last but a day or two, but warned that an alternative source of power should be available. You might have to have water delivered by truck.

There is an excellent FDA web site for anything that one would want to check out for working in Y2K or not, said the auditor.

MMH Administrator Jack Endres reported to the Board that work on new flooring in the hospital was to begin the following week. A computer system linking St. Richard's Villa to the hospital was up and running.

After checking with the Cooke County Tax Appraisal District, Mr. Endres informed the Board that tax discounts for senior citizens are given only by entities who request that the discount be made. Muenster Memorial Hospital, Muenster Water District and the City of Muenster were entities in Cooke County who don't give the discount. The Board became aware of the difference after a local couple noticed the difference on their tax notice and came to the Hospital Board wondering what the reason was for the lack of a discount.

## Cooke County Firefighters warn of holiday fire hazards

Nothing is more poignant than a home fire during the holidays when it should be the happiest time of the year. The Cooke County Firefighters Association and the National Fire Protection Association list the following ways to minimize the risk of decorating, winter heating, and other factors that make this the deadliest time of the year for fires.

1. Keep your Christmas tree watered. Between 1991 and 1995 an average of 470 residential fires per year were started by the Christmas tree alone. If you purchase a real tree be sure to get one that is not shedding needles -- a sure indication of dryness. Cut at least one inch off the trunk and place in a stable, non-tip stand away from the fireplace, doors, and heat sources. Be sure to keep it watered, and after you take it down place it away from your house for safety. If you have an artificial tree be sure it is made of flame retardant material. Never place electric lights on a metal tree.

2. Check your lights carefully. Make sure all lights - both indoor and outdoor holiday lights bear the mark of

an independent testing laboratory. If the cords appear cracked, frayed or sockets are loose or damaged, throw them away. Always unplug lights before leaving home or going to bed.

3. Watch candles closely. Between 1993 and 1995 the percentage of candle fires jumped 43%. Be sure to put your candles in non-tip holders and put in a high location. This will help prevent someone knocking it over or onto something. Never burn a candle near a Christmas tree or other decorations that are combustible or leave it unattended.

4. Use heating devices wisely. Keep any space heater at least three feet from the wall, drapes, and anything else that will burn. If using flammable holiday decorations on or near the fireplace, do not light a fire in the fireplace unless the flames are completely enclosed by a glass fire screen.

The Cooke County Firefighters Association hopes everyone has a safe and happy holiday season.

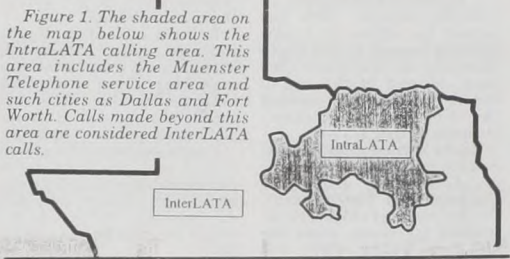

InterLATA calling. Customers who do not notify Muenster Telephone of a choice in IntraLATA carriers will continue to be served by Muenster Telephone at the new reduced rates. To access another carrier, a subscriber should notify Muenster Telephone of a change in IntraLATA carriers or continue to dial the access code for that carrier. The usual charge for changing carriers will be waived for six months for the initial choice of IntraLATA carriers. North Texas Communications will pay for the customer's required switching fees to switch to North Texas Long Distance for InterLATA calling.

## "If I were mayor, I would" contest announced by TML

The Texas Municipal League (TML) is a statewide organization representing over 630 Texas cities and 18,000 Texas city officials. TML is sponsoring an *If I Were Mayor, I Would...* essay contest for students at the seventh grade level. Prizes will be awarded to winning essays in each of TML's fifteen regions. Each region will have a first place winner and two honorable mentions. Each winning essayist will receive recognition in the form of a US Savings Bond. The sponsoring teacher or principal for each region will also receive recognition. The winning essays from all TML regions will then be judged for the election of one statewide grand prize winner.

The essay contest provides students with an opportunity to reflect on the role of the elected official in the city and describe, in a positive manner, what they would do if they were mayor. As the political head of the city, the mayor is expected to provide leadership necessary to keep the city moving in the proper direction. The role of the mayor is legislative, appointive, signatory, and ceremonial. For instance, the mayor presides over meetings of the city council; appoints others to carry out the official duties of the city; and serves as the official city speaker, cheerleader, and ambassador. The position of mayor is one of considerable

responsibility. While the Mayor sometimes takes actions and makes decisions that are not popular among the citizens, the Mayor must do what he believes is in the best interest of the city and its citizens.

The essays must be limited to 100 words or less, and must be legibly written *by hand* in ink. If a student is unable to write an essay by hand, the essay may be submitted in the manner in which the student normally communicates; an affidavit explaining the circumstances must be submitted and signed by the sponsoring teacher or principal. The essay should be written on standard white student notebook paper; spiral notebook paper is *not* permissible. Each essay submitted should include the following information: the name of the student, the student's social security number, the name of the sponsoring teacher or principal, the name of the school, the city with which the student identifies, and the address and phone number of the school and the school district.

Essays must be sent to the *Mayors Essay Contest*, Texas Municipal League, 1821 Rutherford Lane, Suite 400, Austin TX 78754. Essays must arrive at the above address by Friday, April 2, 1999. Late submissions will not be accepted. Essays will not be returned and become property of the Texas Municipal League.

## Debit and ATM cards can be risky to use

Debit and ATM cards are joining credit cards in pocketbooks across the nation to offer consumers another way to handle money. But the new cards are not without responsibilities. "Consumers need to know that debit cards and ATM cards are riskier than credit cards," warned Dr. Lynn White, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

While credit card losses are limited to \$50 per card if reported promptly, debit card losses can go up to \$500 if not reported within two business days. "Losses are unlimited if not reported within 60 days after the bank sends a person's statement," added White. One exception to this rule is that

debit cards bearing a Visa or MasterCard logo are required to cap losses at \$50.

Another challenge of ATM and debit cards is that since these cards draw money directly from the bank account, a person is without the money while the reported theft or loss is being investigated by the bank, she noted. "In contrast, charges to credit cards are suspended until the loss claim is investigated," White said.

Students also need to be careful with the ATM cards or debit cards offered through their university or college.

Texas A&M University at College Station offers students the Aggie Card, a student identification card with debit and ATM functions. The debit function is part of the Aggie Bucks program, administered through Texas A&M. Program administrator Steven Pace said students can call a 24-hour hotline to have Aggie

Bucks suspended in case of loss or theft. "There is also a clause that limits a student's liability," Pace said.

ATM access is offered through local financial institutions. Tim Wallace, manager of Norwest Pavilion Center, sets up ATM capabilities on Aggie Cards through Norwest Bank. "People need to learn the financial responsibility of having a card with such convenience. You have to watch your balances and be careful," he cautioned.

There are other steps students can take to protect themselves, he added. First, read account disclosures. Know the rules for using the card. If possible, use a card with a photo of the owner on the front. Never give out the card's PIN number, and call the financial institution immediately if the card is lost or stolen.
