1. Buy machinery to keep up with your neighbor or for tax purposes. Buying to save taxes only works if you need equipment. The government pays a maximum of 43% on a piece of equipment. Will new century bring higher crop prices?

The USDA's 10 year projections say to look for higher prices, expanded acreage and increased export demand for corn and soybeans. The commodity projections cover 1997 through 2007.

According to USDA, corn prices should bottom out at \$2.55/bu. in 1999 and then strengthen to \$3.10 by 2007.

The average soybean farm price is expected to rise to \$7.25/bu. by the end of the 10 year period. That's after a low of \$5.65 projected for 1999-2000.

Corn acreage should reach 84.5 million by 2007, slightly higher than peak levels during the mid-1970s and early 1980s export boom. Soybean acreage should stay steady at around 70 million through 2007.

A rising foreign demand for soybeans will produce an upward trend in U.S. exports, from the current 980 million bushels to 1.1 billion by 2007-08 year.

Meal prices will push down, peaking in 1999-2000, then stay flat because of foreign competition.

Annual corn production is now a little over 9 billion bushels and should surpass 11 billion by 2005. Soybeans will increase from the current 2.7 billion bushels to just over 3 billion. Total corn demand should grow sharply assuming the U.S. stays the major corn supplier, and China becomes a major importer.

Food, seed and industrial corn use should grow by 425 million bushels over the 10 year period.

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
