The snow which began shortly after midnight Saturday continued throughout Sunday, sometimes taking on storm proportions. Visibility at times was cut to a minimum. #### Local Group Favors Consolidation and a Small Tax Levy

Again community interest is strong in favor of public school improvement, including a consolidation with Linn, a school tax and the purchase of buses to transport both parochial and public school children to

At an open meeting sponsored by the school trustees in the parish hall Tuesday evening some seventy persons approved the proposals

As explained during the meeting, with the levy of a 25 cent school tax, provided the consolidation with Linn passes, and with the per capita allotment, along with reserve money now on hand, at least three, and most likely four buses could be purchased

It was stated that these buses, purchased on the annual payment plan, will liquidate in from 4 to 5 years and a new reserve will be set up. This, it was mentioned, will permit a lower tax, and the sliding to 10 cents, when the buses are paid off and only actual operating expenses are required. It is not to exceed 25 cents at any time

The bus proposition, at this tim is of outstanding interest to local parents. With tire rationing, and with passenger cars completely excluded, the transportation of children to school is becoming a serious
