Bynum tells how "duty, honor, country" guide soldiers

Monday, Nov. 11 Veterans of the United States Armed Services were remembered. A number of programs were planned throughout the county in their honor.

Bynum told of his arrival in West Point, New York for the first time 15 years ago. Coming from a small town

develop those who serve our country. I began to see that a soldier is truly a servant of the highest calling. I began to understand that a soldier symbolizes a great moral code - a code of conduct and chivalry of those who guard this beloved nation.

"I asked myself early on what could possibly dictate men to give up their riches, land and wealth to fight for

the birth of a new country as the men of the Revolutionary War did. What could cause brother to fight against brother during the Civil War? How could these men endure the trench warfare of WWI on foreign soil? What could possibly possess men to storm the beaches of Normandy, knowing their chances of survival were slim to none? How could men endure the cold, frigid conditions of Korea or the sweltering heat of Vietnam? What made a man willing to give his life for his country? And finally, I asked the question of whether I could measure up?"

"I learned that this was the life of a soldier; for a soldier trains to protect his country at all costs," Bynum continued. "In doing so, he endures many hardships and gives up many freedoms that other enjoy. Three words began to direct my life in the service of my nation: Duty, Honor, and Country."

"Duty is the sense of obligation, which motivates one to do, to the best of his ability, what is expected of him in any assigned position or situation. Honor includes complete integrity in word and deed. Love of

country is the essence of the fighting man - an enduring love for this great nation that was founded on the biblical principals of God our Creator.

Bynum then asked those assembled, "Do we remember the prices veterans have paid? Do we care? Are we too busy in our fast paced world to give thought to those who have

been true servants to this great Nation? Today, Veteran's Day, was set aside to honor the men and women who have sworn to protect and defend the Constitution of the United States of America and have done so without question. It's an important day. How we perceive this day: how we honor those who have

Commissioners approve exemption resolution

In accordance with Texas HB1689 from the 77th session, Cooke County Commissioners Court voted 5-0 to adopt a resolution for exemption of certain property owned by charitable organizations from ad valorem taxation. Cooke County Judge Bill

Freeman stated at the Tuesday, Nov. 12 meeting that Cooke County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser Doug Smithson said all other entities in the county had already passed the resolution.

Judge Freeman further explained that organization

must apply to the State Comptroller for exemption. If the Comptroller determines that the organization is qualified for the exemption, then the county's chief appraiser must determine the amount of the exemption. Some properties receive only a partial exemption because a portion is used for other purposes. According to information from Smithson, the resolution won't have a significant effect on the tax rate.

The resolution can be passed in either of two ways. One is by the Commissioners Court and the other is if a petition asking for it is signed by at least 20% of the voters.

Dee Blanton, Cooke County's Emergency Management Coordinator,

asked that Commissioners approve a joint resolution establishing an interjurisdictional Emergency Management Program with the City of Lindsay. Blanton said he anticipates that this is the first of several such requests. If a community does not agree to join with the countywide plan, that city or community must establish an appropriate emergency plan of its own. Commissioners approved the request.

In other business Commissioners Court:

- Canvassed and approved votes from the Nov. 5 General Election.

- Approved purchase of a \$399 duplication recorder for the District Attorney's office. Currently when

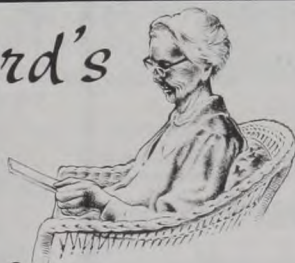

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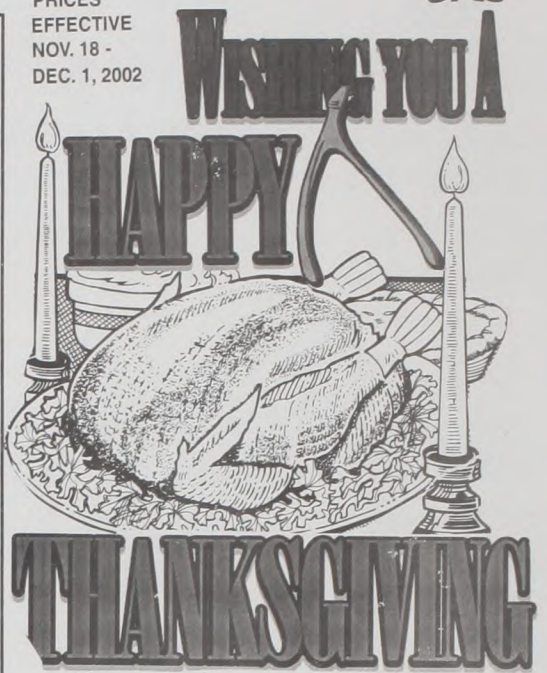

Hornets shock Panthers

It was total domination Friday night at Hornet Stadium, as the Muenster Hornets blew out the play-off bound Saint Jo Panthers 29-0, in a game that shut down the high scoring Panther offense.

One of the bright spots in the contest for the Hornets was the play of the defense, as it stiffened, limiting the highly potent Panther offense to no points, four first downs, and a total of 28 offensive yards.

"We played our best game. We didn't turn the ball over. If we don't have turnovers, we play a good game," noted Muenster Coach Monte Endres. "I was real pleased with the boys' effort all year and disappointed that we're not in the play-offs, but this was a good way to end the season. We're looking forward to next year." The Hornets have six home victories in a row.

At least early on, it looked like the game could be a defensive struggle, as both teams punted the ball away after three plays. Muenster then wasted little time putting this game in the win column, as they started from their 18 yard line, taking ten runs to find pay dirt.

Justin Wolf had four short runs, but the drive was controlled by Cody Cory and highlighted by runs of 17, 9, 24, and 17 yards - the final run making the game's first points with 2:01 remaining in the first quarter. The extra points score gave Muenster an 8-0 lead when PAT kick holder Sean Fuhrmann picked up the ball and completed a pass to Mitch Felderhoff.

Muenster's defense, led by a quarterback sack by Clint Miller, continued to ruffle the Panthers, who quick-kicked on 3rd and 19. The Hornets carried the ball into the second quarter with the Panthers ending the 1st period with zero yards gained.

After a 7 yard Dustin Walterscheid pass to Felderhoff, the work done between Daniel Russell and the Hornet offensive line borders on amazing. While most folks were watching a big pile up in the Hornet backfield, Russell broke free and raced down the sidelines 50 yards before getting caught at the 4 yard line. The run left fans asking how, where, and when he took the hand-off. The long run was capped by a beautiful 4 yard catch when D. Walterscheid hit

his receiver Tyler Walterscheid in the end zone. D. Walterscheid's extra kick put the Hornets in the lead 15-0 with 10:14 remaining on the clock.

Saint Jo appeared shell-shocked from the Hornets' big plays, and sputtered offensively on the next possession. A short punt was followed by a Walterscheid to Walterscheid pass for a 28 yard gain to the 10 yard line. Three Cory runs later, big Cody Cory blasted through the line to score. The PAT kick failed and with 6:54 on the clock Muenster took a 21-0 lead.

The Panthers' next drive was shortened by a fumble recovered by Kyle Endres. The Hornets struggled on the next two plays, losing ground, then throwing an interception. Saint Jo could do nothing with the ball and punted after Cameron Walterscheid and Jake Freeman sacked the quarterback.

The Hornet offense again failed to get the needed 10 yards and punted. Two plays later, Saint Jo fumbled and Jared Ledbetter recovered on the four yard line. The Hornets put an exclamation point on the night with a 4 yard Walterscheid to Walterscheid pass with 29 seconds on the clock. The PAT failed and it was 27-0, Muenster, going into the locker room at half-time and this game was starting to look like a blowout forming.

The 3rd quarter was full of tough defense and turnover recoveries by the Hornets, but by the end of the period, neither team had scored. Saint Jo was forced to punt after they couldn't move against the Hornet defense, including a sack by Freeman and Ledbetter. Two plays later, a loose ball was covered by the Panthers to give Saint Jo their only possession in Hornet territory. The drive ended on 4th and 7 when Tyler Walterscheid picked off a pass on the 24 yard line.

Muenster drove to the 35 before a sack, a flag, and incomplete pass forced a punt. Saint Jo finally showed some spark on their next drive, getting a first down before a 14 yard pass completion was fumbled, covered by Dustin Hiser and returned to midfield.

The Hornets gained only 7 yards. Ledbetter's 41 yard punt put the Panthers deep on their 2 yard line to end the 3rd quarter. An interference flag on the

Hornets assisted in getting Saint Jo to the 20 yard line, but a 5 yard flag and three busted plays, including a sack by Justin Hess and Kirk Hartman, forced a punt from the end zone on 4th and 21. A high snap out of the zone gave Muenster 2 points for a 29-0 score.

Saint Jo kicked the ball from the 20 yard line with 9:39 remaining in the game, placing Muenster 30 yards from pay dirt. A D. Walterscheid to Cody Cory pass gained 20 yards with Hiser and Cory running for 6 more. Saint Jo ended any scoring threat when they intercepted the ball in the end zone. The Panther offense got the ball on the 20, but were soon 4th and 27 at the 8 after a personal foul call against their coach. The punt gave the Hornets possession on the Panther 47.

Runs by Cory and Wolf and a 13 yard pass from Walterscheid to Felderhoff got Muenster to the 7 yard line. However, Coach Endres said enough was enough and had the quarterback take a knee to end the game.

Elections could propel FB priorities

The American Farm Bureau Federation expects the change in Senate leadership as a result of last week's elections will result in progress on policy priorities, including permanently eliminating estate taxes and lowering capital gains taxes, passing an energy bill and completing appropriations bills.

Republicans won enough House races to expand their majority there. But, since Republicans already controlled the House, the big news is the changes in the Senate.

A Republican will now chair each committee in the 108th Congress, and Sen. Trent Lott (R-Miss.) will retake the helm as majority leader, a post he had to give up to Sen. Tom Daschle (D-S.D.) last year when the Senate changed hands after Sen. Jim Jeffords (I-Vt.) left the Republican party and handed Democrats a one-seat majority.

Republicans picked up two Senate seats last week to win a 51-49 majority, with the potential to add another seat depending on the outcome of a runoff election in Louisiana in December.

That's still an almost even split of Republican and Democratic votes. Dick Newpher, executive director of AFBF's Washington, D.C., office, said that may not make much difference in whether the Senate can pass major legislation because 60 votes are usually needed to break a filibuster. It will not be possible for Republicans to pass controversial legislation without some Democratic support. But getting a bill to the floor is at least half the battle, and the change in Senate control will have an enormous impact on which legislation makes it onto the agenda.

There is a possibility that Republicans would not have to wait until the 108th Congress begins in January to start pushing their legislative agenda. Because Sen.-elect Jim Talent (R-Mo.) defeated Sen. Jean Carnahan (D-Mo.) to complete the term of her late husband Sen.-elect Mel Carnahan (D-Mo.), Talent could be sworn in immediately and take part in the lame-duck session beginning Nov. 12.

Newpher said that means Senate Republicans could bring up the final energy bill and it might stand a

better chance of passage. He expects the renewable energy provisions that would triple the use of ethanol and biodiesel to stay in the bill and become law.

Newpher said there is also hope that up to \$6 billion in emergency agricultural disaster assistance in the Senate Interior appropriations bill can now be approved.

"I think if [the Senate chooses] to pass an Interior appropriations bill, disaster assistance for agriculture is still an issue that could very easily become part of that and be signed by the president," Newpher explained.

The Interior bill also contains forest management reform provisions that are important to Farm Bureau members with permits to graze livestock on national forests, and language to allow forest thinning to prevent wildfires. Two provisions that could get more support in a Republican-controlled Senate.

Because there is a limited amount of time to deal with issues in the lame-duck session, and several appropriations bills still have to be dealt with, Newpher said it's going to be difficult to deal with many other major issues before January.

Over the long-term, however, he believes there will be an effort in the 108th Congress to make the tax cuts Congress passed in 2001 permanent, a huge goal for Farm Bureau. Congress voted last year to phase out the estate tax by 2010, but the law expires that same year, allowing the estate tax to return in full in 2011.

There is already a great deal of speculation that Republicans will not waste any time introducing legislation next year to make the 2001 tax cuts permanent, as well as reduce capital gains taxes and make other changes in the tax code to benefit businesses and the self-employed and generate economic activity.

Taxes on estates or "death taxes," capital gains taxes and self-employment taxes dilute farmers' income and assets, impairing their ability to keep and expand their operations and pass them on to their heirs, according to AFBF.

The new Senate leadership also is expected

to bring up several Bush administration nominations for judicial appointments for which Senate consideration is long overdue. Farm Bureau believes breaking the logjam over judicial nominees could result in more court rulings in favor of property rights in court cases on environmental issues. In addition, if any current members of the Supreme Court retire in the next couple of years, the president will now have an easier time of getting his nominees confirmed, assuming they are not hugely controversial.

"Probably the most dramatic thing that will come from [this election] is in the area of judgeships," Newpher said. "I think that the possibility that President Bush will have an opportunity to fill some Supreme Court positions and certainly appeals courts and many other federal court positions in his tenure is probably the thing that will have the most dramatic effect, long-term, on the future of America and American agriculture."

Court decisions, especially on environmental issues, have been particularly important to agriculture in recent years, according to Newpher.

"A lot of the decisions are made either by regulatory agencies as a result of court suit by someone who doesn't like what they've done, or by court suit from our side with regard to something we don't like that they've done," Newpher explained. "I think there could be a case made that possibly on a day-to-day operational basis, especially on environmental issues, regulatory agencies and the court system of America have more impact on our lives than do the members of Congress."

Concerning leadership of the Senate Agriculture Committee and the direction of farm policy, Newpher said he does not expect much change.

"Given the fact that the farm bill, which is one of the most major pieces of legislation that can come out of the Senate Agriculture Committee, is over and has already become law," he said, "I don't expect that there will be dramatic differences between how the [committee] operates under either [Sen. Tom Harkin's (D-Iowa)] leadership or [Sen. Thad Cochran's (R-Miss.)] leadership."

It is not guaranteed that Cochran will chair the committee, but Sen. Richard Lugar (R-Ind.) who is next in line for the chairmanship is rumored to be more interested in chairing the Committee on Foreign Relations, which would open the door for Cochran to take over the Agriculture Committee chair. Cochran is known to oppose limits on farm payments because they disproportionately affect Southern cotton and rice producers who receive larger payments but who also have higher costs of production.

Organic vs. high yield

With both high-yield farming and organic farming gaining popularity, the obvious question is, "Which is better?" A 21-year study by Swiss researchers found that organic farming produced an average of 20 percent less food than conventional farming, but the organic system used resources more efficiently.

However, the Swiss study failed to include the practice of conservation tillage, the "newest and most rapidly spreading form of high-yield farming," according to Dennis Avery, director of the Center for Global Food Issues. With conservation tillage, the soil is not plowed and herbicides are used to control weeds. A new study by the Conservation Technology Information Center praised the use of biotech crops, when coupled with conservation tillage, for helping reduce soil erosion, improve air and water quality, lessen fossil fuel consumption and increase natural habitat.

As the debate between conventional and organic farming methods continues, the world will need a sustainable way to produce enough food for a population that is expected to reach 9 billion by 2050. High-yield farming proponents believe biotechnology that allows farmers to produce more per acre, coupled with conservation practices, is the answer.

Prior to being offered for adoption they are thoroughly inspected by veterinarians, dewormed and tested for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA, also known as swamp fever), and vaccinated for West Nile Virus, Rabies, Strangles, Eastern and Western Encephalomyelitis, Tetanus, Rhinopneumonitis and Influenza.


