



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Study: girls are victimized by dates

One in five high school girls has been physically or sexually abused by a dating partner, significantly increasing their risk of drug abuse, suicide and other harmful behavior, a study suggests.

The research published in a recent Journal of the American Medical Association stems from surveys of 4,163 public school students in Massachusetts, but the authors say the results likely apply to teens nationwide.

According to recent

authors say the results likely apply to teens nationwide.

According to recent estimates from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 22 percent of high school students are victims of nonsexual dating violence, with gids slightly more likely to be victims.

The results also mirror domestic violence rates among adult women, although some statistics indicate young women and teens are especially prone, perhaps in part because they generally have more dating partners.

The study also suggests that a disturbing number of adolescent boys "have adopted attitudes that men are entitled to control their girlfriends through violence," said lead author Jay G. Silverman of Harvard University's School of Public Health.

The study was based on results of statewide surveys given to students in grades nine through 12 in 1997 and 1999. More than 70 percent of the girls who participated were white, about 10 percent were Hispanic, and about 6 percent each were black or Asian.

They also were asked about recent risky behavior. Victimized girls were:

- About eight to nine times more likely to have attempted suicide in the previous year.

- Four to six times more likely to have ever been pregnant.

- Three to five times more likely to have ever used cocaine.

- Three to have times more likely to have ever used cocaine.
- Three to four times more likely to have used unhealthy dieting methods such as laxatives or vomiting.

The data don't indicate whether date violence is a cause of teens engaging in unhealthy behaviors or whether already troubled girls are more likely to date violent partners.

Silverman said some of the statistics and previous research suggest the violence likely preceded the unhealthy behavior.

orioence likely preceded the unhealthy behavior.

Dr. Marla Kushner, director of adolescent medicine at Chicago's Weiss Memorial Hospital, said she suspects the problem may be more widespread than Silverman's data suggest since so few blacks were sampled and previous studies found that blacks were more likely than whites to report such violence.

The prevalence of date rape and other sexual assaults prompted the American Academy of Pediatrics in June to issue updated guidelines for pediatricians.

Citing statistics showing adolescents have the nation's highest rate of rape, the academy said doctors should ask patients at regular checkups if they've ever been sexually assaulted.

Gladiolus in the garden

Gladiolus are grown for their showy spikes of flowers which come in many colors. There are large-flowering types as well as small.

Glads may be used as background plants in the garden, or in rows, or as cut flowers for the home. If care is given to a planting schedule, flowers can be available from early summer until frost. To achieve this, the corms are planted at various times, usually at 2- or 3-week intervals, from as early as mid-February until the last of April. Set the corms 4 to 5 inches deep and 5 to 6 inches apart in groups or rows.

Gladiolus prefer well-prepared garden soils with good drainage. As soon as plants are 6 to 8 inches tall, apply fertilizer, such as 13-13-13, at the rate of 3 to 4 days. Place the corms in boxes with dry peat moss or sawdust. If arge numbers are involved, make some boxes that are 3 to 4 inches deep with bottoms made of hardware cloth. Store in a dry, cool place at a temperature of 45 to 50 degrees F. Check them periodically during the winter for signs of rotting or rodent damage, and discard those affected.

At least two species of gladiolus are considered heirloom plants in our area and may be left in the ground and grown as perennials. Gladiolus byzantinus, sometimes known as cornflags, mark and rarely-white flower spikes are smaller than the hybrids usually available in florists and nurseries.

Organic fertilizer sources, such as cottonseed meal, also work well. Water thoroughly when soil appears dry, and stake if necessary.

To save gladiolus corms for next year, dig the corms after the foliage has dried in late summer or fall. Remove the soil and snap off the dead tops. The old or original corm may be removed and discarded at this time. Spread the corms out on the garage or storage-room floor and allow

florists and nurseries.

Another interesting gladiolus is Gladiolus natalensis, sometimes known as the parrot gladiolus. Flowers of this species, which is native to Africa, are larger than those of G. byzantinus, and are a brilliant combination of yellowish green and red.

Both of these gladiolus may be grown as perennials, and usually increase in numbers each year. They are commercially available, however, only from specialty bulb sources.



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



Stiffer poaching penalties are paying off, says Jim Stinebaugh, director of law enforcement for Texas Parks and Wildlife. The Texas legislature passed measures to get tough on poachers in both 1997 and 1999. Violations such as killing white-tailed deer, mule deer, pronghorn antelope or desert bighorn sheep without landowner consent are punishable by a mandatory jail sentence of 180 days to two years, even for first-time offenders, and fines of \$1,500 to \$10,000. From Sept. 1, 2000 through Aug. 31, 2001, the number of cases filed by game wardens involving hunting without landowner consent was 71.4 percent lower than in 1996-97. Cases involving hunting from a vehicle fell 71 percent, and cases involving hunting from a vehicle fell 80 percent.

Wildlife trail public meetings set for North Texas in April

Texas Parks and Wildlife and the Texas Department of Transportation have scheduled three public meetings in April to explain nature-based tourism opportunities for north Texas communities resulting from recent funding of the Prairies and Pineywoods Wildlife Trail.

The meetings will be held from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. in Wichita Falls, 1601 SW Parkway (April 2), Dallas (April 3), and Fort Worth (April 4). TxDOT earlier this year approved TPW's grant request for federal funding for a wildlifeviewing highway trail. At the meetings, landowners and communities will learn about marketing and economic development opportunities related to the nature tourism initiative. Criteria for site nominations and selection will be outlined, as well.

When completed, the driving trail will feature a network of prime wildlife-viewing sites throughout the region. Trail maps and highway signs guide motorists to each site, contain descriptions of birds and other wildlife and their habitats, and provide other tourism information.

"The trails bring tourism dollars to rural communities, raise awareness about Texas wildlife and habitats, provide recreational

opportunity, build public support for conservation and provide economic incentives for landowners and communities to conserve and manage wildlife habitats," Linda Campbell, TPW coordinator, said.



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

Weed alert: Johnsongrass - the peril in bermudagrass pastures and hay meadows

Johnsongrass is one of the most invasive weeds in agriculture. Considered one of the 10 worst weeds in the world. Johnsongrass reduces the yields of crops, including bermudagrass shay, by as much as 45 percent through shading and competing for water and nutrients. In addition, Johnsongrass serves as host and over-wintering site for insects and diseases that spread to crops during the growing season, further reducing crop yields.

"Weeds make pasture and hay meadows less productive by stealing moisture, nutrients and sunlight," said David Bade, extension forage specialist at Texas A&M University, "Weeds are particularly damaging in dry years."

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs is advising farmers and ranchers to be cautious when dealing with solicitors peddling pesticide products over the phone. The Texas Department of Agriculture has already heard from producers who have been contacted at their home by telephone marketers offering products for the start of the planting season.

"Legitimate pesticide dealers may call to see what you're going to need this year, but most don't initiate sales through telemarketing," Combs said.

"Products that are pushed over the phone are usually to uted as more concentrated, more effective safe use, its disk with the phone are usually to uted as more concentrated, more effectiveness and its success in your particular area."

If a producer wants to know if a pesticide product ives up to the claims from a phone salesman, they can always call the Texas Department of Agriculture's Pesticide Division at 1-800-TELL-TDA.

An effort to make repeal of the estate tax permanent is being mounted by Republicans in Congress, with strong support from President Bush. "Put the death tax to death," the president told producers attending National Cattlemen's Beef Association's annual convention last month. In a recent non-binding test vote, 56 senators indicated they support making the repeal permanent. However, 60 votes will be needed to overcome Senate procedural hurdles. Two of the 12 Democrats who supported repeal last year, sided against it, citing a different environment. "We had a big surplus," said Sen. Jean Carnahan, D-Mo. "We just have to look at this with a different eye."

A bill to ban the sale of horsemeat for human consumption has been introduced in Congress by U.S. Rep. Connie Morella, R-Md. Rep. Morella said the American Horse Slaughter Prevention Act is needed because the number of American horses going to slaughter has increased significantly in the past year. "More than 55,000 horses were slaughtered in America last year to satisfy consumer demand overseas," said Morella. "Thousands more were shipped live to Canada and Mexico for slaughter there." She said the trend may be due to European—and Japanese concerns about Mad Cow Disease and the subsequent desire to find "safer" sources of meat.

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Legislation to ban antibiotics in animal feed was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives Feb. 27. The bill is being cosponsored by Reps. Sherrod Brown, D-Ohio, Henry Waxman, D-Calif, and Louise Slaughter, D-N.Y. The legislators cite concerns that the routine feeding of antibiotics to healthy farm animals promotes development of antibioticresistant bacteria that can be transferred to humans. If passed, the bill would phase out the use of eight experts amounted to 2.2 million pounds, while imports were 3.2 million pounds. THANK YOU
