



Dear Un-Trusting,
YES, I can give you the scoop, but the Savvy Senior also recommends that you talk
with a lawyer who has savvy experience in estate planning for more detailed
information. NOW, here's the Savvy Senior's attempt to simplify the scoop!!! A
living trust, like a will, is a legal document that contains your instructions for what
you want to happen to your assets (your money and stuff) when you die. But, unlike
a will, a living trust avoids probate at death, can control all of your assets, and
prevent the court from controlling your assets at incapacity.

What's the scoop on probate? Probate is the legal process through which the ourt sees that, when you die, your debts are paid and your assets are distributed according to your will. If you don't have a valid will, your assets are distributed according to state law. The negative aspects of the probate legal process are TIME, sually taking between nine months to two years, LEGAL EXPENSES, ranging netween 3-8 percent of the estate's value, and PRIVACY. Probate is a public process, so any interested party can see what you owned and whom you owed.

How does a living trust avoid probate? Easy!!! When you set up a living trust you transfer assets from your name to the name of your trust, which you control. Legally you no longer own anything but - DON'T PANIC- everything now belor to your trust, so there is nothing for the courts to control when you die or become

Do you lose control of the assets in your trust? NO... With a living trust you keep full control. As trustee of your trust, you can do anything you could do before; buy or sell assets, change or even cancel your trust. You even file the same tax returns. Nothing changes but the names on the titles.

How do you fund or transfer your assets into the trust? The attorney who sets up your trust can help you. You need to change titles on real estate and other titled assets (stocks, CDs, bank accounts, other investments, insurance, etc.). Most living trusts also include jewelry, art, furniture, and other assets that do not have titles. SAVVY NOTE: Remember that simply writing a trust will not help you avoid probate. You must transfer your assets into your trust, or the trust isn't worth any more to you than the paper it's written on.

Is a living trust expensive? How much you pay will depend on how complyour plan is. Be sure to get estimates but an average fee is between \$1,000 - \$2,000.

Should I have an attorney do my trust? An attorney with savvy experience in living trust can provide quality guidance and can be a wise decision.

If I have a living trust, do I still need a will? It's a good idea to have a "pou over" will that acts as a safety net if you forget to transfer an asset to your trust. When you die, the will catches the forgotten asset and sends it into your trust.

Who should have a living trust? If you own titled assets and want your low ones (spouse, children or parents) to avoid court interference at your death or neapacity, you should consider a living trust.

over 30 hours in the past two weeks, including 5 1/2 hours Monday night, on this one problem. With sufficient staff, funds, and time, all of these problems can be easily remedied. Our school employs only two custodians and one maintenance person. When the original maintenance issues were raised last year, there was no time line for completion given to Mr. Winn. Many of these problems were addressed, and many more were planned to be taken care of this summer when there weren't any children on campus. This needs to be taken into account before the board goes to the extreme of threatening Mr. Winn's job for problems that by all accounts have existed for many years before Mr. Winn was even hired to run our school."

THC launches survey to save historic buildings

The THC is conducing a public architectural survey to encourage awareness of architecture that best represents the last fifty years of the 20th century. The Nifty from the Last Fifty survey offers an opportunity to recommend the structure for preservation for future generations. Survey participants are encouraged to be creative - skyscrapers, BBQ joints, homes, or a condaide architecture are all potential candidates. Any bounding that reflects the culture, industry, ecreation, and interests of a Texas community is eligible for nomination.

Survey forms will be available in August on the twww.thc.state.tx.us. A photograph of the structure is required. The results will be available in the spring of 2003 when the THC celebrates fifty years as the state's historic preservation agency.

July baseline analysis for representative farms

The Agricultural and Food Policy Center at Texas A&M University released ts July 2002 Baseline Analysis Wednesday, the first comprehensive analysis of the effects of the new farm bill on farmers.

"The baseline shows that the economic viability of crop farmers is much improved over our last baseline," said Dr. Joe Outlaw, Texas Cooperative Extension policy specialist in the Agricultural and Food Policy Center.

"Under the old farm bill, three-fourths of our representative crop farms were classified in poor financial condition. With the new farm bill in place, about 10 percent of the representative farms are classified as poor."

While the 2002 Farm Bill provides a greater income safety net than the old farm bill, not all farmers are classified in a good financial position. Dr. James Richardson, a professor in the policy center, pointed out that almost half of the representative crop farms that the policy center tracks will likely face cash flow deficits more often than one year in four. The report indicates much of this risk is associated with production.

"While the new farm program does contain an income safety net, poor crops could result in cash flow problems as a portion of support is tied to crop production," Richardson said.

The report, which includes 95 representative more often than half of the policy center monitors will suffer cash flow deficits more often than one in four years.

Of the 17 Texas crop farms included in the policy center baseline analysis, 10 are classified in good financial shape, five are classified as marginal due to cash flow pressures, and only two are classified as poor. The two farms classified in poor financial condition (a 2,000- acre Hill County feed grain farm and a 400-head Stephenville dairy farm) experienced financial difficulties under the old farm bill. Under the new bill, they will likely see cash flow deficits in three out of four years.

Dr. David Anderson, Extension specialist in the policy center, indicated cattle and hog producers also appear more profitable under the new farm bill ctives affected.


