## Republicans triumph on county level

There were three contested races for county offices in this election. In each the Republican candidate came out the victor. Many local voters, 2,375, simply voted straight ticket Republican. Other straight ticket votes were 1,045 Democrat, 15 Libertarian, and 6 Green. There were 9,751 Cooke County voter participating in Tuesday's General Election.

many was the John Morris defeat over Bill Harris for the position of county court at law judge. Harris was appointed to the newly created position last December. He was serving as the county judge at that time and resigned that office and gave up his law practice to accept the Commissioners Court appointment. Morris received 5,243 votes to Judge Harris' 4,229.

county races John Roane retained his position as justice of the peace for Precinct #4. Judge Roane tallied 2,281 votes compared to his Democratic opponent Royce Martin's 766. Rebecca Lawson will be the new county clerk in January. County Clerk Evelyn Walterscheid opted to retire when her term expires Jan. 1. Lawson received 7,118 votes to her opponent Johnny Koonce's 2,279.

contested candidate of the Democratic Party to fare well in Cooke County. He captured 5,347 votes to his Republican opponent John Graves' 3,995. Congressman Hall retained his seat as U.S. Representative, District 4.

Rick Hardcastle won state Representative, District 68. He and his opponent were both incumbents due to redistricting. After the

election Counts said, "I want to express my heartfelt appreciation to all of those who have volunteered and supported my campaign. With almost all of the population in this districting being new to me, this race has been an uphill battle. However, I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to meet all the folks and listen to their concerns. "I still believe rural Texas

is worth saving and that will never change. Our families, neighbors, and way of life are second to none.

"There will be many crucial issues facing the next Legislature, and I wish my colleague Rick Hardcastle the very best in the upcoming session."

## CCAD budget approved by County Commissioners

Members of Cooke County Commissioners Court unanimously approved the proposed budget of the Cooke County Appraisal District for 2003 at the Oct. 28 meeting. "It looks good; there's only a small increase on both (appraisal and collections) budgets," remarked Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess.

The proposed Collection budget for 2003 is \$196,750.00, an increase of \$9,550.01. The proposed Appraisal budget is \$725,150.00, an increase of \$12,499.98. For the County

that means its share is an increase of \$4,277.46 and \$4.85 on the Cooke County Lateral Road.

There is a speed limit change for County Road 333 from the intersection of 377 and CR 333 heading west on CR 333 to the intersection of CR 398. It is now 35 mph.

In other business Commissioners Court:

- Approved Bolivar Water Supply Corporation's request to install a fresh water line across Chisam Road approximately 2/10 of a mile north of Huling Road in Denton County.

- Approved preliminary

plat for Egrets Point Subdivision, lot 1-4, located off of CR 231 in Precinct #2.

- Awarded bids for corrugated galvanized metal pipe to be used in Precinct #1-4 to Contec and Texas Steel & Culvert Co.

- Decided to re-bid for four 2003 passenger cars of the Cooke County Sheriff's office since no bids were submitted.

- Approved bonds for Lacey Marshal deputy sheriff; David Province jailor; James Mast deputy sheriff; Casey Blackwell jailor; and Jody Lyons deputy sheriff.

## Texas Monthly ranks Muenster High School in Top Ten

Muenster Independent School District received more state and national recognition when the November 2002 issue of *Texas Monthly* ranked Muenster High School as one of the top ten high schools in the state. High schools were categorized into four economic categories ranked by the National Center for Educational Accountability (formally Just for the Kids). *Texas Monthly* and the Austin-based NCEA have joined forces to produce a comprehensive, one-through-five-star ranking of nearly every high school in Texas, five stars being the best and one star the worst. Schools are compared only to schools with similar or lower income levels and levels of English proficiency.

The State of Texas school rating system is based on the percentage of students in a school who pass the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test. The ratings developed by NCEA now help thirteen other states analyze their educational data, and go well beyond that simple standard of measurement in

several important ways:

**First**, students are judged based on the more rigorous measure of TAAS proficiency, which is roughly equivalent to a grade of 85. The idea is that passing-one considered a near miracle in many districts - is no longer good enough.

**Second**, NCEA has the ability to track performances by individual students, year by year. This enables NCEA to look at test performances of students who have been continuously enrolled in a school or district for three or more years - a highly accurate way to measure how well a school teaches them.

**Finally**, schools are compared only with schools with similar student bodies, based on economics as well as proficiency in English.

MHS's "score" is established by comparing it to an average of the best schools in the state with similar or greater disadvantages. The difference is called the "opportunity gap," and it is on the basis of this number that the schools are ranked. A positive "gap" means your

school is among the best of its kind.

The rankings list by NCEA in *Texas Monthly* embraced the same tough standards and accountability for the economic well-being of student populations in Texas' 1,264 school districts. Rankings were based on a variety of factors, including student performance on TAAS reading, writing, and math tests for the tenth grade; the school's success at educating two levels of student - proficient and low-proficient - as measured by junior high school TAAS tests; the promotion rate of first-time ninth graders to tenth grade; the percentage of low-income students at the school, which determines its economic grouping; and the percent of students taking advanced-placement tests or SAT/ACTs (to qualify for five stars, a high school must have at least 15% of its students taking AP tests or at least 70% of its students taking SAT/ACTs).

## Sewer plant upgrade starts in December

Mayor Weinzapfel and the Muenster City Council opened bids Monday night for the renovation and upgrade of the City's waste water treatment plant. The mayor said all bids were higher than expected or

hoped for. Engineer Jeff James from Kimley Horn said they would pursue study of potential areas of price reduction with Gracon Construction, Inc. of Mesquite, Texas who was awarded the contract with the low bid of \$559,000.00.

A \$250,000.00 Texas Community Development grant won by the City with the help of consultant Pat Dillon will apply to the cost. The balance will be paid by income from the section 4-B state sales tax rebate. Weinzapfel and City

Administrator Linda Webb feel confident that the money will be available without going into debt. Webb said that construction is expected to begin in December. The sewer plant changes will bring Muenster into full compliance with TNRCC rules for populations up to 3,000 or twice the treatment capacity currently available.

Next on the Council agenda were several items dealing with Muenster's park system. Daniel Bartush requested approval for his Boy Scout Eagle project. He proposes to plan and conduct a tree planting project around the Jaycees' new ball park. His project was approved.

Stick Lamar was approved to replace Ted Heers on the Park Board.

The Muenster Jaycees received approval for their plans to build a combination

concession, restroom, covered pavilion building in their new ball park.

The final park related agenda item concerned a request by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce for assistance in building an open air performing arts stage in the City Park. The Chamber submitted plans for the stage last year and proceeded to start raising funds for the construction. Monday night, the Chamber re-submitted the plans for the multi-use stage with minor changes and improvements to improve acoustics. Board member Dave Fette, speaking for the Chamber of Commerce, asked the City Council to join a partnership with them to solicit bids for the construction and proceed with the facility which would be a City asset. He briefly noted the benefits for

promoting the performing arts and the associated economic advantages and encouraged the Council to take a major part of the funding responsibility as a worthy use of a small part of the state sales tax money intended for economic development. The Chamber brings \$10,000.00 to the partnership and the Park Board proposed devoting another \$10,000.00 from accumulated Germanfest gate receipt payments over the last 12 years.

After some encouraging discussion the City Council voted to approve a motion to: 1. Approve the project in principle; 2. Set aside the \$10,000.00 recommended by the Park Board for the project; 3. Advertise for bids for the construction project; 4. Establish a working committee with Chamber members to identify sources for the rest of the money.

Other items of action and/or discussion included: • Approve purchase of a computer based water meter

reader, supporting software, and base charger unit for \$4,500.00.

• A solar powered sewer plant oxidizer unit was returned to the seller for a refund of \$27,000.00 because it did not improve water quality as intended.

• The Volunteer Fire Department submitted the only bid of \$26,257.00 for a 1984 pumper truck from the Gainesville Fire Department. Fire Chief Herb Knabe says the

pumper will help the City's ISO rating and help keep city-wide fire insurance rates lower. The sale awaits approval by the City of Gainesville. The money comes from the VFD's account from money raised by fund-raisers and contributions.

• Police Commissioner Troy Sicking discussed police activity on several recent incidents and said he is working on making more police activity information available to the media.

• Monthly bills totaling \$86,125.26 were approved for payment.

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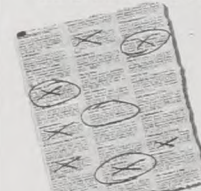

She seemed to be responding well for about a week, when complications developed, and she did not recover.

Survivors are her daughter, Ethel M. Hesse; her sons and daughters-in-law, Alfred and Anna Marie Bayer and Arthur (Art) and Frances Bayer; and her daughter-in-law Rosalee Bayer all of Muenster. There are 23 grandchildren and 61 great-grandchildren. Also one sister, Louise Bayer of Muenster.

Preceding her in death were her parents; her husband Joseph Bernard Bayer; one son Robert Joseph Bayer; four sisters, Elfreda Dangelmayr, Adelaide Bayer, Olivia Wimmer, and Katie Mae Ellison; three brothers Adolph, Theodore, and Joe Henry Walterscheid.

Preceding the day of funeral, a Rosary Service was held on Sunday at 4:00 p.m. in McCoy Chapel, led by Marge Hesse Devers, granddaughter. Vigil at 8:00 p.m. was led by Father John Ohner, OSA.

Participating in the special liturgy of the funeral Mass with Father John Ohner, Father Kyle Walterscheid, and Father Harry Fisher, were altar servers Mitchell Hesse, Zachary Barnhill, and Joe Hesse, all great-grandsons of Mrs. Bayer.

Readings from the Old and New Testaments, respectively were given by Frances Bayer. Prayers of the Faithful were given by a granddaughter, Julie Bayer Simpson.

Offertory gifts of bread and wine were presented at the altar by Sunni Bayer,

Music Ministers were Ruth Felderhoff, organist, accompanied by vocalists Christi Hesse and Katie Cox. Sacred music included "How Great Thou Art" for the gathering song; "The Lord Bless You And Keep You" at Offertory; "The Beatitudes" at Communion; "Edelweiss Blessing" at the Meditation; and "For All The Saints" for the recessional.

The Remarks of Remembrance were given by Larry Bayer, a grandson. He said, in part... "My grandma was the oldest child in the family of five sisters and three brothers and learned responsibility at an early age. She attended Sacred Heart School in the building we have nicknamed 'The Tin University.' With her beautiful handwriting, she was proud of the certificate she earned using the 'Palmer Method..."

"...married in 1923 and widowed in 1933, Grandma was left to raise four children, ages one to nine years. She was a loving, devoted mother to Alfred, Robert, Arthur, and Ethel Mae, drawing strength from her Catholic faith through the Great Depression..."

"...as her work load was lightened... after employment at Sacred Heart lunchroom... employment at the rectory..."

she busied herself making clothing, afghans, lap robes, quilts, etc. for orphanages and missions in and out of the United States, thus touching the lives of many..."

"... as her life went on, and she moved to St. Richard's Villa, her philosophy and attitude remained up-beat. When us kids asked her 'How are you doing?' her favorite answer and laugh were 'I'm still kicking, just not so high!'"

"My grandma was spiritually prepared to meet Jesus... It is suitable that she went to Him on All Saints Day. After 69 years as a widow, Grandma was reunited in heaven with her husband, Joe. What a reunion!!! My grandma was a wonderful wife, mother, grandmother, sister, aunt, and friend. We all are blessed to have known her."

Gertrude Bayer was born in Muenster on Aug. 19, 1903 to Joseph Phillip Walterscheid and Katie Hess Walterscheid at a farm home outside of town.

On Nov. 6, 1923 she was married to Joseph Bernard Bayer in Sacred Heart Church. She was a homemaker, devoted wife, mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother, loving her family deeply. They, in turn, lavished their love and respect. She is held in tender memory by many, many friends as "Gertie."

In her active years, Gertrude Bayer was a housekeeper at Sacred Heart Rectory; worked in the school lunch room; and assisted in catering for many weddings. She loved gardening, baking, sewing, crocheting, and caring for her family. One of her greatest delights was having fresh, warm, sweet cinnamon rolls ready for her family members after they had attended Sunday Mass in Sacred Heart Church, and stopped by her house, enroute home. She also played the piano, one of the last times they heard her play was about six months ago at St. Richard's Villa.

Burial in Sacred Heart Cemetery was directed by McCoy Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Janet Bayer Barnhill, Bert Hesse, Mark Hesse, Carl Bayer, Joe Bayer, and Mary Bayer Roberts.

## Alphonse Tony Felderhoff 1922 - 2002

Mass of Christian Burial was held for Alphonse (Al) Tony Felderhoff in Sacred Heart Church on Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2002 at 10:00 a.m., officiated by Father John Ohner OSA, pastor.

Al Felderhoff died at age 80 on Saturday, Nov. 2, 2002 at 8:50 p.m. in Muenster Memorial Hospital, where he had been a patient for several days.

Al Felderhoff was born Aug. 13, 1922 north of Muenster to John and Helena Hesse Felderhoff. He attended Sacred Heart School through the ninth grade. A veteran of W.W.II, he entered the Armed Services and later joined the paratroopers. He was a member of the 101st Airborne Division. Wounded twice, he was awarded the Purple Heart.

After receiving his discharge from the Services on Mar. 25, 1946, Al Felderhoff returned home to work in the oil fields. On June 1, 1949 he and his brother Vince Felderhoff bought interest in an oil rig with George Mollenkopf, Sr. In 1953 the two brothers bought out Mollenkopf's half and started operating as Felderhoff Brothers Drilling Company. In 1999, his 50th year in business, he received a Distinguished Service Award from North Texas Oil & Gas Association.

On June 6, 1950 he married Emma (Sis) Lutkenhaus in Sacred Heart Church. They built a new home in Muenster on North Hickory Street and were known as Good Neighbors and Good Friends to the entire community. They became parents of three sons. Ross was born in 1953, Scott in 1957, and Kenny in 1960.

Al and Sis took keen interest in the school activities of their sons, and were supportive of their classes, studies, sports, and games. They took many family vacations.

Al treasured his family and friends. He cared about people and his community. Always willing to lend a hand when he could, he spent great energy and numerous hours serving on various boards. That included 35 years as a director on the Muenster Memorial Hospital Board, as an alderman on the Muenster City Council, as a board member of the Cooke County Education Board, as a vice-president of North Texas Oil & Gas Association from 1980 to 1982. He was honored by the Muenster Jaycees who named him the Outstanding Citizen of 1988 and presented a plaque that read "For outstanding contributions in service resulting in lasting contributions to the community and nation. From the Muenster Jaycees."

He was a lifetime member of Muenster VFW Post 6205. He took pride in keeping his landscaping around his home well-maintained, doing the mowing, weeding, and other chores himself. He walked daily. He made daily trips to the company's business offices to work. He enjoyed his grandkids and they loved him in return. The grandkids said they delighted in riding with Grandpa in his pickup or truck.

In January 2000, Al Felderhoff lost his best friend and companion of nearly 50 years, the love of his life. He missed Sis sorely and made many trips to Sacred Heart Cemetery to visit her grave.

In August this year, Al Felderhoff received the devastating news that his illness was cancer. An energetic man, he had always kept busy, until illness robbed him of the necessary strength and energy.

Survivors are his sons and daughters-in-law Ross and Janet Felderhoff, Scott and Sandra Felderhoff, and Kenny and Kim Felderhoff, all of Muenster. There are eight grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. He received his discharge on Mar. 25, 1946... he attended several army reunions at which he enjoyed visiting with old buddies..."

"Back at home he worked in the oil field... he and his brother Vince bought interest in an oil rig with George Mollenkopf Sr.... bought him out in 1953 and started operating as Felderhoff Brothers Drilling Company..."

"Al and Emma (Sis) Lutkenhaus were married on June 6, 1950... They became parents of three sons, Ross, Scott, and Kenny... Al enjoyed teaching them about the outdoors... fishing... hunting... taking family vacations..."

"Grandchildren were a pleasure Al and Sis joyfully anticipated, and were blessed with eight: Jody, Deann, Kayla, Keith, Kara, Kirk, Kaitlyn, and Ryan... and now three great-grandchildren Samantha, Ethan, and Logan..."

"In January 2000 Al lost his best friend and companion of nearly 50 years, when Sis died of cancer... he grieved terribly for her and missed her dearly... tried to fill his days with work... visiting relatives and friends in nursing homes... and making time for his grandkids. The great-grandkids were soon going with Grandpa Al too... lavishing him with love and respect..."

"One of the crosses he found hardest to bear in his last days was not being able to do something constructive..."

"On Nov. 2, 2002 Al was called home to his Father in Heaven... for 80 good years we had the privilege of knowing him as Dad, father-in-law, granddad, brother, uncle, neighbor, and friend..."

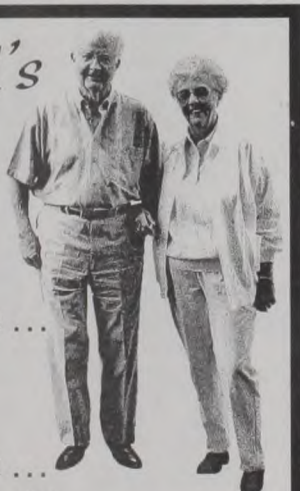

## Al Felderhoff recalled D-Day

A day that was forever etched in Al Felderhoff's memory was the day they jumped into Normandy. Years later, Al very graciously consented to come into the *Muenster Enterprise* to give us an account of that day, June 6, 1944. Accompanied by Sis, Al said, reflecting, "Airborne units led the invasion. Just past midnight, the U.S. 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions dropped near Ste. Mere Eglese (our Drop Zone) and Carentan to secure roads and beach exits from which the U.S. VII Corps could push to capture Cherbourg." Pausing, he backed up several days, in memory, explaining, "On

June 1, 1944 the 101st Airborne Division Paratroopers moved from our base camp, about 60 miles south of London, to the marshaling area, staying about a week in preparation for the jump, studying the terrain, aerial photos of gun emplacements and maps... Our mission was to knock out four coastal guns inland from the beaches... where troops would come ashore from landing craft."

Al Felderhoff continued "On the eve of D-Day, June 5 General Eisenhower visited us to give moral support and prayers. Then we went immediately to our planes. Also going to his plane was a friend of mine,

Ernest Pike of Gainesville, was also a Paratrooper. He waved... said 'See you back across the river'... but I never did see him again..."

"We crossed the English Channel in air formation, just after dark... the mood inside the plane was somber, quiet and reflective and prayerful... we crossed over the west coastline of Normandy... we did not encounter opposition until we got a few miles inland when all hell broke loose... we drew flak and anti-aircraft fire. At 12:30 a.m. just past midnight we jumped near Ste. Mere Eglese from about 600 feet up. Pretty Low!!! See FELDERHOFF, Page 6

The Graveside Service held in Sacred Heart Cemetery included music "By Take 5 Ministries" and Laura, Chris and Jose, and the song "How Great Thou Art" and the hymn "Song Of Farewell."

## D-DAY RECALLED

"I landed in a small village, by myself, on a hard surface road, near a cemetery. I got out of the parachute and got into a shadow. Hearing another man approaching, I recognized the sound of his boots on the road. We communicated by cricket signals. We had not been permitted to load our rifles prior to the jump. By first light, the two of us picked up several more guys. By morning we picked up several more from the 82nd Airborne Division who had also jumped. By daylight we met Cecil Harry of Rosston, Texas, of Company A, another paratrooper. Together we went into an old building that might have been living quarters for German soldiers who we discovered hiding in a nearby ditch. They actually were men for the Polish

Army conscripted and forced to serve in Hitler's army... "To get back to our own company we turned back toward the beaches and met an American tank. We had a constant ebb and flow of skirmishes with the Germans. Resistance and fire power on June 7 were bad. We were reunited with our company on June 8 and began moving toward Carentan, a French village. I was wounded by shrapnel and sent back to England to a hospital and then was sent back to base camp at Chilton Foliate. The 101st Airborne was returned from France for reorganization and replacement. Losses had been heavy. In our own Company "I" only 40 came back out of the original 130 men... "We were put on Alert twice before being sent in to jump for the 101st Airborne

in the battle for Holland on Sept. 17. "I learned years later that my friend, Cecil Harry was killed in the fighting in the Holland campaign." Memories flooded in. Al Felderhoff stopped speaking. His wife told me later, "I heard more today than ever before." He was severely wounded in the battle for Holland on Sept. 19, spent three months in a hospital, was re-classified for ground personnel in the Air Force and sent to Brooke General Hospital in San Antonio for more surgery. His next contact with Cecil Harry was for the military re-burial in Rosston. Al was a member of the Muenster VFW Rifle Squad and Muenster VFW Post #6205 that conducted the military rites.

other schools could improve by imitating good ones. Identify the best schools, study what they do, and share their successful practices with the up-and-comers. The other nine high schools to share the top honors with MHS were 4AAAA-5AAAA schools, including College Station/A&M Consolidated, Coppell, Fort Bend/Clements, Friendswood, Highland Park-Dallas, Kath/Taylor, Randolph Field, Round Rock, Westwood, and Spring Branch/Memorial. MISD is bracing for even tougher standards as the rigorous Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test becomes reality. Students will be tested in social studies and science in addition to math, reading, and writing. The new accountability ratings system is still in the works. "With the new standards, all school districts statewide may see a drop in scores," said Muenster ISD Superintendent Clyde W. Steelman, Jr. "Our goal is not to drop our standards, but to continue to set

standards for other schools. This ranking is another measuring tool to show taxpayers that they are receiving a maximum return on their tax dollars in financing public education. Recognition and other academic honors of this magnitude have continued to put Muenster ISD in the state and national spotlight. This recognition calls attention to the important roles that all stakeholders contribute in developing and maintaining a successful school district with some of the best teachers in the state, a school board that is focused on providing the resources and financial support for success in all academic and co-curricular activities, parents that are involved in their students' academic and co-curricular activities, administrators that continue to advise their campuses in the direction of academic success, and a community that demands an education system that provides a solid foundation for post-secondary education or work force.

## THC developing World War II web page

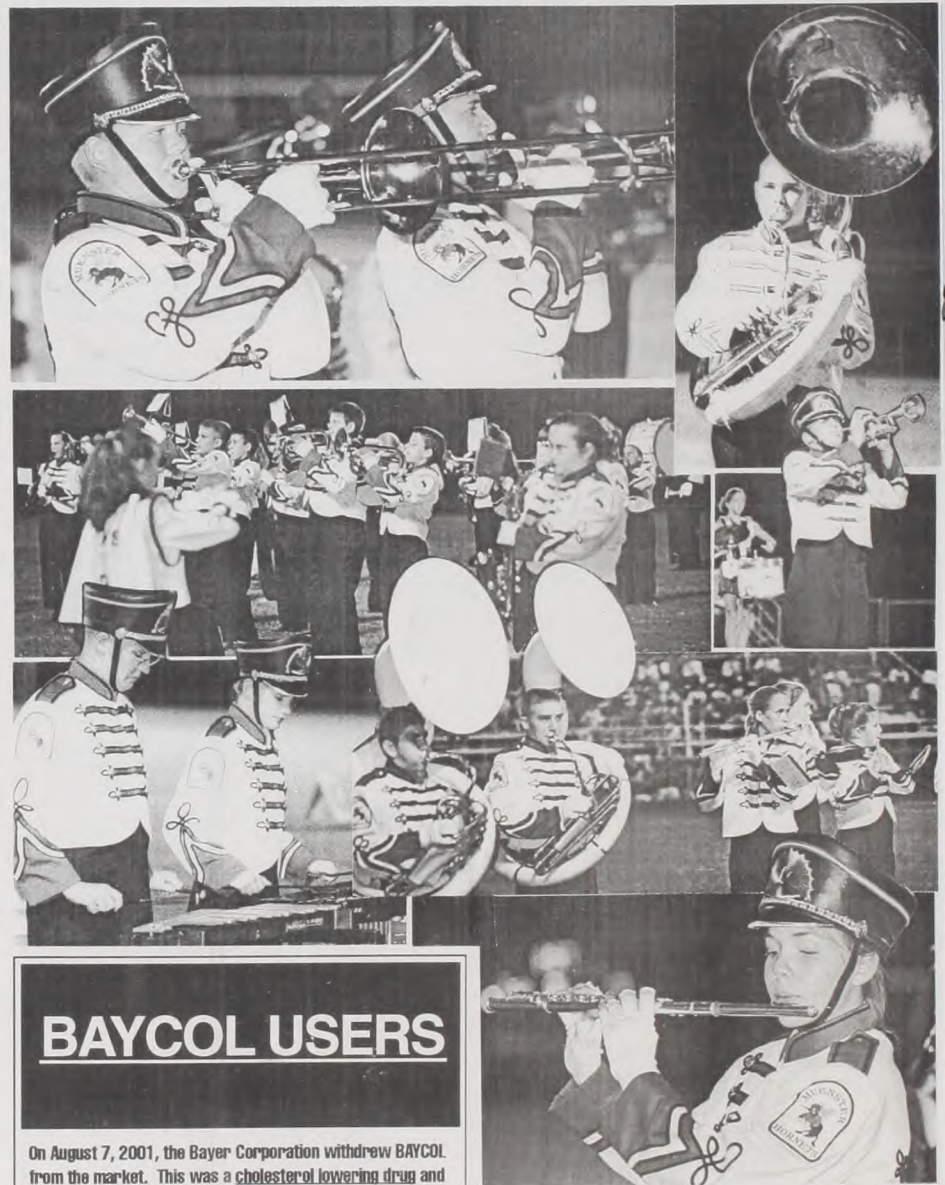
From fighting on foreign battlefields to establishing military posts on Texas soil, more Texans served in the armed forces of World War II than residents of any other state in the nation.

## Spring Break trips organized for NCTC

North Central Texas College students looking for excitement and cultural enrichment on a shoestring have a couple of great options for Spring Break 2003: \$1,085 package trip to London England or a \$250 trip to Santa Fe for skiing and sight-seeing. Spaces on the trips are being booked this month to lock in special rates.

London, long recognized as one of the world's most important cultural centers, provides a great opportunity for students to experience a foreign culture, ancient museums and historical sites in a country where people speak English. The \$1,085 travel package put together by Paul Hutchins and Dr. Michael Linder, NCTC professors and veteran foreign travelers, includes airfare, seven nights in a three-star hotel, unlimited use of London bus

and subways, a guided trip to Canterbury Cathedral and a group fine-dining experience at the Chaucer Hotel.

After some initial guidance on how to use the subway system and advice on how to get the most out of their tour, students and others are free to break up and spend time seeking their areas of interest. Some even take the tube under the English Channel to visit Paris.

"It was an incredible trip," said Erin Moss, an NCTC student from Sanger who went last year. "There is so much to see - and it's very easy to get around. The public transportation is wonderful."

Moss had some initial apprehension when trying to decide whether to make the trip. For one, she expected to be traveling with people whom she had barely met or outright strangers. What was special and surprising to her was the bond she developed with other students and adults taking the trips, many of whom she now counts as close friends. Also, she had concerns about how safe she would feel on the streets of one of the world's largest cities. On that count, Moss said she felt much safer than she would feel in typical large American cities.

She said being part of the group led by Hutchins and Linder allowed her to enjoy London much more than if she had been traveling on her own.

Hutchins, who has been to London 20 times, knows the city better than most Londoners, at least from a tourists' viewpoint. He loves the city, where he can see world-class live theater and important historical sites in a range from ancient Roman occupation through the Norman Conquest, Middle Ages and World War II.

Linder, head of the NCTC

music department, has been to London 18 times himself, says students can learn a lot by visiting cultural sites, but can also find it easy to engage the locals.

On the Santa Fe trip, students can get transportation, lodging and most of their meals covered for only \$250. Staying in nearby Glorieta, students will have van transportation to Ski Santa Fe and to the city of Santa Fe, an important center for the arts, history and tourism. Founded in 1607, Santa Fe is the oldest and highest elevation state capital in the United States. It's the country's third largest art-market with more than 250 galleries and art dealers. The package includes bus transportation, three-nights of lodging (three or four to a room), breakfast and evening meals. A three-day lift ticket, purchased separately, costs \$85 for skiers 21 and younger. For older skiers, tickets are \$104.50. Participants in the ski trip board a bus on the NCTC campus on Friday evening, ski Sunday, Monday and Tuesday and return Wednesday.

While the intended audience for both trips is NCTC students, community members are welcome on the London trip if space is available. ## Muenster loses playoff chance

"You work all season to make the playoffs, then it doesn't happen. It just wasn't meant to be," commented Muenster Coach Monte Endres on the Hornets' 27-7 loss to Collinsville last Friday. "It was a tough loss. We'll do our best to bounce back against Saint Jo and keep our home winning streak alive."

Muenster beat the Pirates on first downs and total yards, but also had more turnovers (5-1) which turned into points for Collinsville. The victory for the Pirates keeps their playoff chances alive, but they must beat Petrolia this Friday by 8 points.

Collinsville struck quickly, taking the first offensive play of the game 74 yards for the first touchdown. The extra kick lit up the scoreboard 7-0 with just 14 seconds off the clock.

Muenster took the ball on their 33 yard line. A fumbled snap lost 3 yards, then Cody Cory picked up 14. Another fumbled play forced a Hornet punt. The next play Cameron Walterscheid caused a fumble with Justin Hess covering the loose Pirate ball on the Collinsville 35 yard line.

Cory picked up 5 yards, then a fumble in the backfield lost 2. Clint Miller picked up 10 yards for a first down on the 22 yard line. A flag set the Hornets back 10 yards, then two plays later Cody Cory scored on a 29 yard run. Dustin Walterscheid booted the extra point for a 7-7 tie with six minutes on the clock.

The Pirates came back the next drive, taking nine plays to go 65 yards, scoring on a 1 yard run. The PAT kick was no good for a 13-7 score with 1:33 remaining on the first quarter clock.

Three Cory runs gained 15 yards as the first period ended. Cory picked up 9 more yards to the Pirate 29, but a 4th and 4 attempt failed and Collinsville took over offensively for three plays, then punted.

Muenster, from their 17 yard line, moved to midfield with runs by Justin Wolf, Cory, Dustin Hiser, D. Walterscheid, and a Walterscheid to Hiser pass. A flag and quarterback sack halted the drive and Jared Ledbetter punted. The teams exchanged punts as time ticked off the clock towards the half-time break.

The third quarter began as bad as the first when Muenster fumbled the kick return, setting up the next Pirate touchdown. Three runs and the Pirates had a 21-7 lead with 10:29 on the clock.

The Hornets got in eight runs, converting one 4th

down play into a 1st, but couldn't get the needed yards in the second series, losing the ball on downs. The Pirates got in six plays to the Hornet 30, but were stopped short by the Hornet defense.

Muenster was on the move, with Hiser getting 10 yards, and Cody Cory 16 to get into Pirate territory. But two quarterback sacks were followed by an interception, which allowed Collinsville to carry the ball into the final period of play. A 4th down punt put Muenster on their 14 yard line. A pass from Sean Fuhrmann to Mitch Felderhoff gained 14 yards. Three plays later, Fuhrmann connected with Cory for another 11 yards to get to the Hornet 45 yard line. Wolf gained 9 yards, but two runs lost 11 to keep Muenster from getting a first down, turning the ball over to the Pirates at midfield. Muenster's defense held Collinsville to no gain. The punt placed the Hornets on their 18 yard line. Two plays later, Collinsville picked up a fumbled ball and scored their last touchdown of the night. With 4:55 remaining in the game, the Pirates had a 27-7 lead.

From their 35 yard line, three runs by Cody Cory picked up 24 yards. A 15 yard penalty assisted in getting Muenster to the Collinsville 22. Three plays later, the Pirates picked off a Muenster pass, ran three plays, and punted. The Hornets got in two plays before the time ticked off the clock.

## Local teams participate in Regional Meet Nov. 2

The UIL Regional Cross Country Meet was held Saturday, Nov. 2, at Arlington. Muenster, Lindsay and Era were among the teams participating.

The Lindsay Knights won the regional meet and will advance to state competition this Saturday. The Knights took the championship with 64 points, followed by Era with 82 and Huckabay 89. One-hundred and sixty-four boys ran at the regional meet.

The Lady Hornets of Muenster finished 3rd and Lindsay girls 4th as teams. Miles High School won the girls' division with 72 points, Aspermont was 2nd with 83, followed by Era 107, Muenster 119 and Lindsay 171 points. There were 172 girls running at the meet.

Muenster's Jenna Felderhoff qualified for the state meet, finishing in 9th place with a time of 13:07. Knights advancing to state,

Denton's next drive began on their 17 yard line. A fumbled snap, a tackle by Daniel Bartush, and two flags were followed by a quarterback sack by Whitecotton, another penalty and a short punt from the end zone putting the Tigers on the Lion 27, just inside the 2nd quarter. Two plays later, Hoedebeck scored on a 28 yard run behind the blocking of Clayton Truebenbach. The PAT pass failed, for a 18-0 score with 11:24 still on the clock.

A good kick return by the Lions was followed by a 36 yard scoring run. With 10:05 on the clock, Calvary was on the board 18-6 after the extra pass play failed.

Hoedebeck returned the Lion kick to the Lion 20 yard line, but the Tigers failed to get the needed yards, turning the ball over on downs at the 17. Five plays later Andy Davis covered a fumbled ball on the 20 to set up the Tigers' next touchdown.

A screen pass from Bartush to Whitecotton moved the Tigers to the 10 yard line. A motion flag backed the ball 5 yards, then Johnny Krahl scored, assisted by a block by Truebenbach. Again the PAT failed for a 24-6 score with 4:25 remaining in the first half.

Calvary moved the ball for a few plays then threw an interception to Paul Bartush at the 15 yard line. Any scoring threat by the Tigers quickly ended when Calvary picked off a pass seconds before the half-time break.

The Tiger offense began the 3rd period, but struggled making yards. A Sacred Heart punt was covered by Clint Fuhrmann to keep the drive going to the Lion 14 yard line before running out of downs. A quarterback sack by Adam Krahl was followed by an 88 yard touchdown run by Calvary. The PAT failed and with 4:52 on the clock, the score read 24-12.

Sacred Heart picked up 12 yards, fumbled to the Lions, then held their opponent to minus 6 yards for a punt. Now Sacred Heart head coach Jon LeBrasseur, who was named the Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools Coach Of The Year in 2001-2002, must look to continue a long storied tradition of basketball success in a new district.

Sacred Heart lost three key players to graduation, including Audrey Barnhill, Andrea Bauer, and Kristin Zimmerer. Barnhill will be missed as she directed the Tigerettes from her point guard position and Bauer goes down as the number two Tigerette in combination of points and rebounds for her career. Zimmerer, an outstanding defensive ace, will be missed for her relentless pressure on opposing players. "We lost three important elements from a great squad," said Coach Jon. Andrea was an outstanding athlete, Audrey was a coach on the floor, and Kristin was such a great leader." The talent will be missed as

Bauer will lace the shoes up for Austin College this season and Zimmerer will be playing for Saint Gregory's. Barnhill will take a year off and is expected to continue her basketball career next season.

However, the cupboard is far from bare. Sacred Heart's 2, 3 and 4 scorers from last year's team are among seven veterans back for another season at the Catholic school in Muenster. And those seven veterans along with some newcomers are aiming to continue a tradition of excellence as they strive for their sixth consecutive state title.

Returning for the Tigerettes will be seniors Raney Bauer, Mary Jane Callahan, Jennifer Hoedebeck, and Jana Truebenbach. Bauer, an all state player from a season ago, averaged 10.8 points per game and was third on the team in steals and assists last season. Bauer is a scorer and will be counted on to pick up some of the scoring power that was lost via graduation. Callahan, a 5'10" forward, will be counted on to give the Tigerettes the inside-outside threat with her outside shooting and her inside moves. Hoedebeck is as solid as they come at her position. The 5'7" forward has had an outstanding preseason and is expected to add some scoring to the Tigerette attack. Truebenbach, a 5'9" forward, had an outstanding

performance in last year's semi-final win and is expected to build on that performance this season. "Our seniors are solid," said Coach Jon. Dieter then found pay dirt and with Kasperek's extra boot, the Knights closed the score to 13-7 with 7:24 on the clock.

Petrolia got in eight plays, before Joey Arendt covered a loose ball. The next play, the Knights lost possession with a fumble. Three plays later - 21-7.

The Knight offense again struggled and punted. On the second play from scrimmage, the Pirates scored on a 57 yard run for a 27-7 score with 52 seconds before the half-time break. A fumble, recovered by Lindsay on the 3rd quarter kick prevented a good return. Horner made a 12 yard run, then another fumbled play, a short run, and an incomplete pass forced another punt.

From their 32, the Pirates again mixed runs and passes, taking seven plays to find the end zone. The PAT pass put Petrolia ahead 35-7.

The teams then exchanged punts with the Knight drive highlighted with a 29 yard run by Hellingner, before punting on 4th and 9. A fumble on the return was recovered by Ryan Kasperek putting the Knights inside the Pirate 20

to start the final quarter. Lindsay's offense came up 2 yards short and the ball went over on downs.

A 68 yard Pirate run quickly took Petrolia into scoring range, but tackles by Rimmer, Dieter, and Mark Schreiber gave Lindsay the ball on their 25. Hellingner and Horner picked up 18 yards then failed to get a first down and punted. Three plays quickly moved the Pirates 59 yards for their final touchdown of the game with 5:31 on the clock and a 42-7 score.

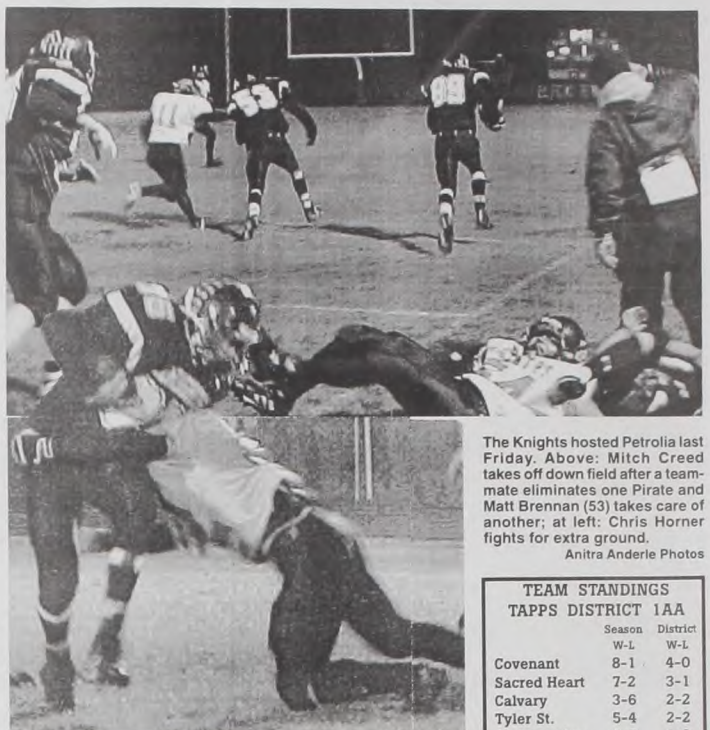

## US trade to Cuba on the rise

A Cuban government report released this week shows that the U.S. is about to become the island nation's 10th largest trading partner in 2002. The move comes less than one year after food sales to Cuba from the United States were allowed on a cash basis.

Cuba's statistical abstract, combined with 2002 trade information from diplomats, shows the U.S. will replace Brazil for the number 10 spot.

U.S. food exports including grain, cereal and meat are estimated at \$160 million this year, according to Alimport, Havana's main food importer. According to the Commerce Department, estimates through August were \$97 million.

Michelle Lynn Pagel of Muenster recently earned an award for logging 2,000.0 hours in the American Quarter Horse Association Horseback Riding Program. The program recognizes and rewards AQHA members for time spent with their American Quarter Horses in

activities such as trail rides, working cattle, pleasure driving, and simply riding.

A unique aspect of the program is its simplicity. Current AQHA members complete a program application and pay a one-time \$25 enrollment fee. Each enrollee receives an official AQHA log sheet to record their hours driving or riding an American Quarter Horse. Participants need not own their own horse, but all official hours must be accrued with a registered American Quarter Horse.

The first award, a program recognition patch, is given after only 50 hours have been logged and verified. Patches and nine subsequent awards are presented at 100 to 5,000 hour levels and range from merchandise gift certificates to a Montana Silversmith trophy belt buckle at the highest level. Other awards are provided by AQHA corporate sponsors.

## It's A Stat!

Monthly Report by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service

### CROP PRODUCTION FORECAST

The 2002 Texas Upland cotton crop is expected to total 5.0 million bales, up 17 percent from 2001.

Corn production is forecast at 198 million bushels, up 18 percent from last year's production. Statewide yield is expected to average 110 bushels per acre, 8 bushels less than in 2001.

Sorghum production is forecast at 72,800 million hundredweight (cwt), equal to last year but up 4 percent from last month. Yield, at 2,800 pounds per acre, is equal to last year, but 112 pounds more than last month.

The 2002 Texas soybean crop is forecast at 6.72 million bushels, up 15 from last year's production and unchanged from last month. Yield is expected to average 28 bushels per acre, up 2 bushels from last year.

### TEXAS CATTLE ON FEED

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.72 million head on Oct. 1, down 9 percent from a year ago. Producers placed 530,000 head in commercial feedlots during September, up 10 percent from a year ago but unchanged from the August 2002, total. Texas commercial feeders marketed 470,000 head during September, up 1 percent from last year but 19 percent below the August 2002, total.

## Agriculture Briefs

**Kaufman DA wants to close horse processing plant.** Kaufman County District Attorney Bill Conrad is investigating the Dallas Crown horse processing plant with the aim of closing it under a rarely used 1949 law. On Aug. 7, Texas Attorney General John Cornyn issued an opinion that the law forbids the sale, possession, transport, and export of

horse meat for human consumption. The Kaufman plant and Fort Worth-based Beltex Corp. are the only remaining plants in the United States which process horse meat for human consumption. Most of the meat is transported to Europe and Asia. The two plants processed 38,000 horses in 2001.

Animal antibiotic use poses an extremely small

risk to humans, according to an evaluation by an independent group of microbiologists, risk assessors, veterinarians and animal health experts. Evaluating available facts persuaded the group that while the use of antibiotics in humans and animals undoubtedly leads to resistance, and while some resistant organisms reach humans via the food chain, little additional harm results from resistance, even when infection occurs, said Ian Phillips, M.D., chairman of the group. Phillips is an emeritus professor of medical microbiology at the medical school of Guy's and St. Thomas Hospitals, University of London. The group of experts concluded that banning any antibiotic usage in animals, in the absence of a full risk assessment, is not useful and could even be harmful to both human and animal health. "Rather than banning the use of antibiotics in animals, we believe that efforts should focus on reducing the transmission of all food-borne pathogens regardless of their antibiotic susceptibility," Dr. Phillips asserted.

**Antibiotic use in animals is declining,** according to a new survey of animal health companies. The volume of antibiotics used in animals in the United States has steadily declined over the past three years. In 2001, 21.8 million pounds of antibiotics were sold, dropping from 23.7 million pounds in 2000 and 24 million in 1999. The data were collected from a survey of members of the Animal Health Institute, consisting of companies that make medicines for pets and farm animals. The survey data include antibiotics used for both farm and companion animals. AHI President and CEO Alexander S. Mathews emphasized the decline in meat-producing animals. "While meat production between 1999 and 2001 rose 1.1 million pounds, use of antibiotics is not rising. Therefore, the amount of antibiotics used per pound of meat produced is going down."
