US beef exports to China soar

U.S. beef exports to China increased 78 percent during the first eight months of 2002. The U.S. Department of Agriculture reports that U.S. beef muscle meat exports have jumped to 14,372 metric tons. The U.S. Meat Export Federation attributes the increased demand to rising incomes, a torrid expansion of the foodservice industry, tight Chinese supplies and favorable U.S. pricing. Sales of U.S. beef also have been helped by other factors. Since China's accession to the World Trade Organization, competitors have had to obtain plant-by-plant approval in order to ship product to China for distribution into general market channels. Under a bilateral agreement preceding China's entry into the WTO China agreed to recognize all federally inspected meat and poultry plants. This gave the United States an edge over competitors because U.S. imports did not require cumbersome individual plant approvals. According to China's emport statistics, the United States captured a 75 percent share of China's imported beef market in the first eight months of 2002. However, almost all competing suppliers are expected to obtain approvals for their largest export plants in the near future.
