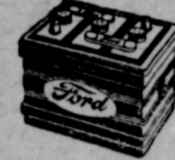

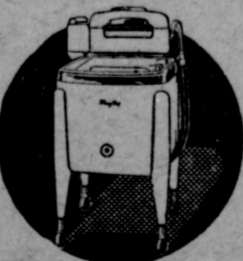

Washington, D.C., Feb. 15—The favorite topic of conversation in Washington this week has been the resignation of Harold J. Ickes, Secretary of the Interior. There are two extreme viewpoints concerning him. One group makes him out a villain; another group makes him a hero. Perhaps a majority hold opinions in between these extremes. Some say

Mr. Ickes has been an honest and fearless administrator and one of the few government heads who has fired employees for inefficiency and dishonesty. Others point out that he has been a vindictive trouble maker. A good many choice stories have been circulating concerning his record before he came into the government. However it is always wise to take malicious gossip concerning any person with a grain of salt. the best of us, that it hardly pays for any of us to talk about the rest of us." So I'm neither cheering nor crying on the exit of Mr. Ickes.

The Army and Navy this week made recommendations concerning the use of the atomic bomb which I have long expected. The Navy recommended fifty-three advance bases from which aircraft could take off, with atomic bombs kept at those bases. As a matter of fact it would be easy to build fifty or more secret, inaccessible bases for the storage of atomic bombs in our vast rugged territory of Alaska alone. We could then scatter a number of such bases almost around the world on various islands which we shall retain as a result of this war. These bases could be so distributed and concealed as to make it absolutely impossible for any combination of powers to wipe us out in one fell swoop. Such a chain of atomic fortresses might be one way to keep the peace. There is also a possibility of using submarines as bases for launching atomic attacks.

Most of us will applaud Senator Connally's opposition to the Russian demands that the World Federation of Trade Unions be given advisory posts to the United Nations Assembly. This World Federation of Trade Unions embraces the so-called unions of Soviet Russia, the British Trade Unions, and the C.I.O. The American Federation of Labor has been excluded from this world organization. If the WFTU is to have officials sitting in on the boards of the world organization then every other group of citizens farmers, bankers, doctors, lawyers, and so forth, should also have representatives upon their councils. Like Senator Connally, "I'm against it."

Washington columnist Drew Pearson this week published another false statement. In one of his columns he declared that: "Under an act of Congress quietly sneaked through by big business lobbies, the Army and Navy are not permitted to return surplus property to this country from overseas if it is to be sold in the U.S.A. It can only be returned if sold back to the companies which originally manufactured it." There's not a word of truth in this declaration. The day it came out in the press, I asked Major General Glen E. Edgerton, Assistant Administrator of War Assets Corporation, who was testifying before a House Committee, if such a statement was true and he said "no". Anyone who reads the Surplus Property Act knows Pearson's report to be contrary to the facts. It is too bad that such a widely read columnist does not have a high regard for truth. The Army and Navy have authority and will be expected to return to this country all war surpluses that cannot be disposed of to advantage abroad.

The labor government of England continues its program of socialization. This week it took over the Bank of England which henceforth will be operated by the government.

HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT GIVES HINTS ON LANDSCAPING

There are many jobs in landscaping at this time. Here are a few reminders from Mildred Chapman, County Home Demonstration Agent.

1. Remove unattractive or unhealthy shrubs and replace with better ones.
2. Prune the roots and tops of shrubs to make room and check root spread for growing flowers and vegetables near them.
3. Set out new roses from a reliable nursery in ground on which grass has been grown for the last three years. Better still, the last

five years in grass to insure health of plants. Do this any time the ground is not frozen.

4. If a shade tree is needed why not plant a pecan, or a fruit tree!
5. When shrubs, trees, or roses have abnormally yellow leaves, try correcting this by using one cup iron sulfate (copperas) to each 10 or 15 square feet of soil about the plant. Water after working Copperas into soil. The copperas may be mixed with 3 gallons of water and poured about the roots.
6. Examine flowering quince, peach, plum, gardenia, roses, wax ligustrum and other plants for scale. Lime-sulphur spray is used 1 to 12 strength for the evergreens and 1 to 8 for the deciduous

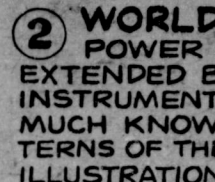

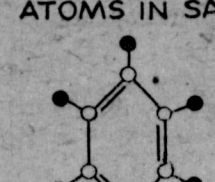

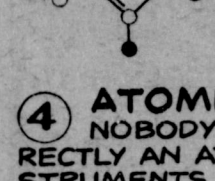
1 NAKED EYE LEVEL...

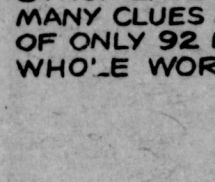
2 WORLD OF STRUCTURE...

7. After a late freeze, leave injured limbs on for a while as protection from further cold.
8. Prepare and fertilize soil for bulbs as for growing vegetables.
9. Sow in the open hardy plants such as cornflower, larkspur, phlox, snapdragon and others. Plant less hardy annuals in hotbed or frame gardens for transplanting later.
10. Plant cuttings and shrub seed now.

HEALTH, DISPOSITION BOTH SUFFER FROM TOO LITTLE SLEEP

Austin, Texas.—Sleep is a necessity of life and health, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and habitual loss of sleep will tend to retard the body's recovery from the fatigue of the day's activities.

"We may be able to go without sleep for a night or two, but too little sleep for a prolonged length of time will undermine the health of a rugged person and turn a cheerful individual into a cross, irritable one," Dr. Cox said. "When good health can be protected to such a large extent merely by sleeping, and thus allowing overtaxed bodies and minds to secure the proper rest, it is hard to understand how so many persons are heedless of this important health measure."

Some individuals require more sleep than others. How well we sleep is as important as how long we sleep. A "good night's rest" means a sufficient number of hours spent in sleep to enable each individual to feel well, do efficient work, and to keep in a cheerful humor the next day.

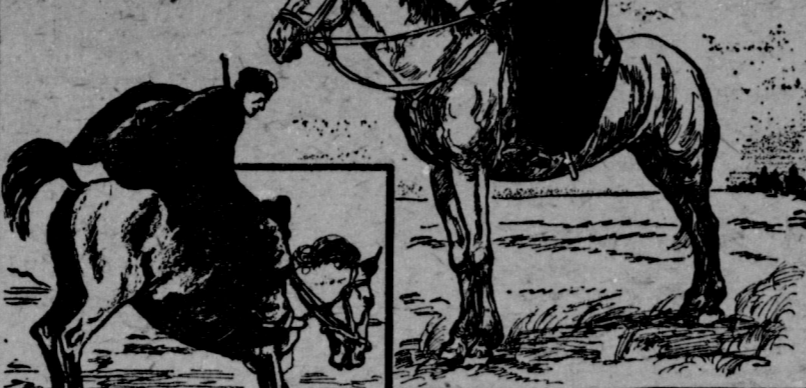

**Prior Approval Needed
To Qualify For Pay In
Conservation Program**

Reasons why farmers must obtain "prior approval" of conservation practices in order to qualify for payment under the Agricultural Conservation Program have been set forth by Production and Marketing Administration officials here.

In the 1946 conservation program, each county has received an allotment of a limited amount of money to be used in paying for conservation work done. B. F. Vance, State Director of PMA's Field Service Branch said. Since the amount of work for which payment can be made is limited by the size of the county budget, if the payments are to be apportioned fairly throughout the county, farmers must inform the county ACA committee just what conservation work they expect to carry out in earning payments. The committee will authorize the practice if funds are available.

If such a system of obtaining "prior approval" was not followed, some ACA cooperators probably would do conservation work expecting to earn payments and then find the county had exhausted its funds. In such an event, no payment could be made, Vance explained.

Another purpose of the "prior approval" system is to make certain that practices which are to qualify for payment will contribute to conservation on the farm and fit into the over-all conservation program of the county, Vance declared.
