



Henderson Broadcasting, L.P. announces the acquisition of 500 watt KNTX-AM 1410, Bowie, from Buckalew Media, Austin. Buckalew Media has operated the local frequency for the past three years. The station license was granted to Henderson Broadcasting Company, L.P. by the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C. and ownership was recently transferred. Henderson Broadcasting Company, L.P. is the former licensee of KXGM-FM, Hit 106.5. Menster/Gamesville. Charley and Pam Henderson sold the 106.5 FM frequency to First Broadcasting in Septemoer 2000 who later sold the frequency to Entravision Holding Corporation. The Hendersons owned and operated the station for 10 years, the last two years under a Local Marketing Agreement with both First Broadcasting in Septemoor 100,000 watts and change the dial position to 106.7. KIGM-FM went silent on the source the new call Letters are KKDLFM. Henderson Broadcasting plans to make several months to KNTX including a new antenna and ground system and an increase in power at night to improve
