Americans under democratic government and a system of free enterprise have attained the highest standards of living ever known. While only 7 per cent of the world's 2 billion people live in our country, we consume three-fourths of the world's silk

In Russia there is one automobile for every 252 persons, in Italy one to each 93 persons, in Sweden one to 29 persons, in Great Britain one to 22, France one to 18, and in America an automobile for every 4 persons.

and came out a Colonel. The nomination by the President of Treasury Secretary Fred M. Vinson of Kentucky to be Chief Justice of the Supreme Court has occasioned much backstage comment in Washington. It is hoped Mr. Vinson will devote all of his talents to the Court, and will not be used by the President as a behind the scenes advisor in political affairs. In recent years Presidents have fallen into the exceedingly bad habit of calling on Supreme Court Justices for a variety of services outside their judicial duties.

Justice Jackson has been gone for a year as chief war crimes prosecutor in Germany. There are hundreds if not thousands of lawyers in America who could have done just as well with this job as Justice Jackson. Just this week the President has designated Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy to accompany the body of the late President of the Philippines, Manuel Quezon, to Manila. These extra-judicial errands of the Supreme Court Justices may in part be responsible for the ill repute into which the Court has fallen.

The founding fathers provided in the Constitution for three departments of government, legislative, judicial, and executive. It provided that each department should be a check and balance on the others. The separation of these departments and their effective use as checks and balances against each other is a fundamental necessity in a healthy democracy. In recent years the executive branch has grown in size and power at the expense of the other branches. We have been getting out of balance. The legislative and judicial branches should regain some of the power which is desirable if not necessary for our continued growth and progress as a democracy.

SCIENCE SCRATCHES POISON IVY OFF LIST

Science has happy tidings this summer for American vacationists allergic to that "Dracula" of summer vegetation known as poison ivy. The good news comes in the form of a new war-born chemical called 2,4-D (Dichlorophenoxyacetic acid), now available to operators of vacation playgrounds and owners of summer homes and camps.

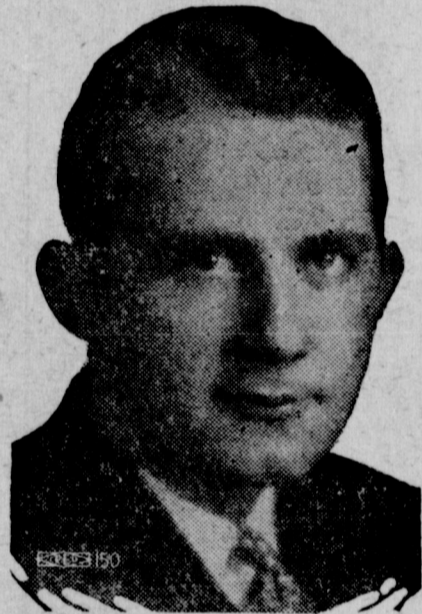
When sprayed on poison ivy plants, this new running mate of the other new chemical wonder, DDT, will render the obnoxious weed totally harmless. The nasty stuff collapses soon after spraying, as the chemical penetrates to the very roots of the plant and actually strangles it to death. Experiments conducted by Sherwin Williams scientists show that 1,600 square feet of a weed-infested area can be covered with approximately \$1.00 worth of the chemical 2,4-D, or Weed-No-More.

scribing it for some specific illness. For the sake of safety, left-over medicines should be destroyed immediately when they have fulfilled their purpose and never be stored in the medicine cabinet for future unprescribed use in case of another illness, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Self-medication with the use of left-over drugs which were of great benefit to some previous illness can sometimes turn a simple ailment into a very serious condition of actual poisoning," Dr. Cox said. "This is particularly true of the indiscriminate use of sulfa drugs which have been prescribed for some previous specific

condition.

"It is wise to use medicines as indicated for the illness for which they are prescribed by your doctor, and when they are no longer needed, destroy the remaining medicine immediately," Dr. Cox said. "Even if you expect a return of the same condition at some future date, it would be better to obtain new medicine if the condition recurs than to retain this old medicine in the cabinet and subject the members of your family to the danger of using it unwisely."

Old Dobbin Not Dead

Evidence that the gasoline buggy has not yet replaced the horse comes from the trade paper "Steelways." Horseshoes are still big business—in 1943 about 20,000,000 were turned out for the 12,000,000 steeds in the nation.

Horseshoes come in 300 different sizes and shapes. Metal horseshoes date back to 200 B.C. Before that, the ancients used cloth or straw sandals. Modern milk horses wear rubbers so you can sleep in the morning, but there's steel inside the rubber coating. Some race horses wear aluminum shoes because they're lighter. Expert horseshoe pitchers order 300,000 shoes a year, forged to specifications.

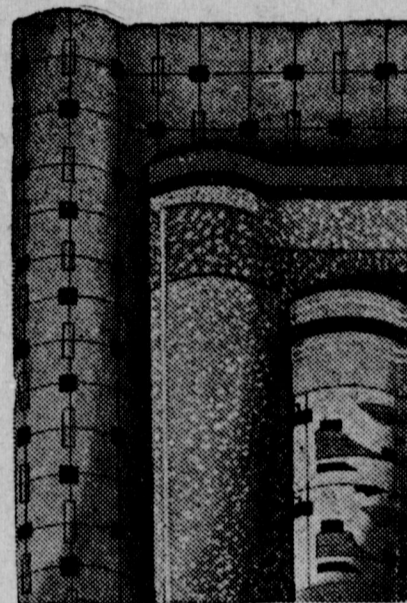

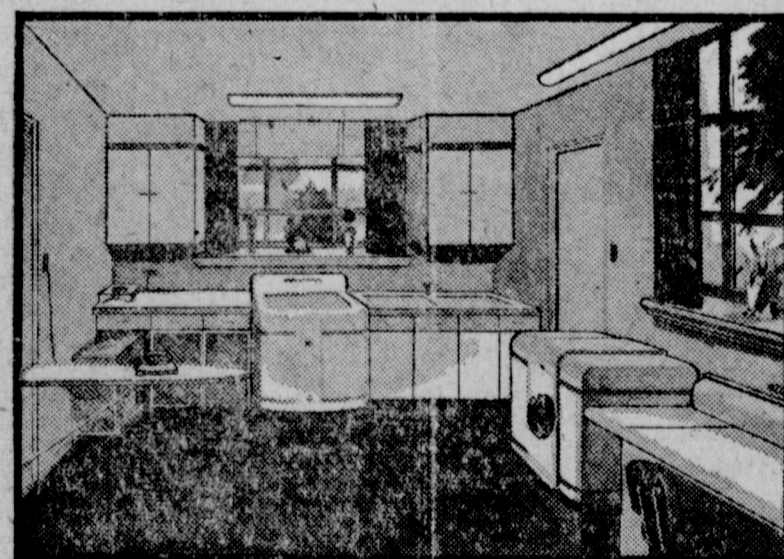

6 Army Areas Replace 9 Service Commands In New Organization

Washington. Six Armies, each with an assigned geographical area, will form the defense force of continental United States under the War Department's reorganization plan which becomes effective June 11. General Jacob L. Devers, Commanding General of the Army Ground Forces, announced. The Army commanders will be responsible to General Devers for the accomplishment of training and related operational missions.

The reorganization, in the interest of reduced costs, savings in personnel and the more efficient use of available troops, wipes out much of the organizational set-up established in this country during the war years. The Eastern and Western Defense Commands had previously been absorbed and now the nine Service Commands will be discontinued as administrative areas of the abolished Army Service Forces. Use will be made, however, of some of the old service command headquarters as suboffices of the New Army Areas.

General Jonathan Wainwright will command the Fourth Army and the Fourth Army Area, which includes Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, with headquarters at San Antonio, Texas. Eighth Service Command headquarters at Dallas, Texas is being discontinued.

The reorganization continues the Military District of Washington embracing the District of Columbia and adjacent military installations as a separate command directly under the War Department, with Brigadier General Robert N. Young in command.

Posts, camps and stations, except for Air Force installations and certain exempted stations under War Department control, will be under the Army commanders of the geographic areas.

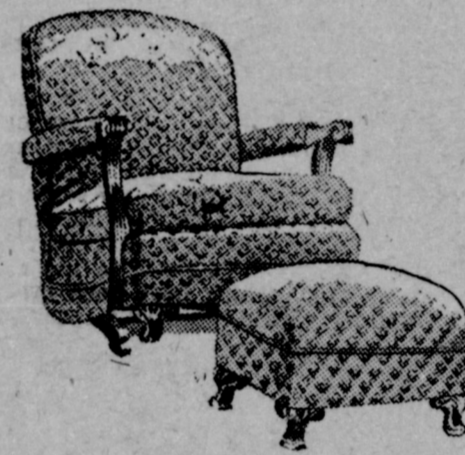

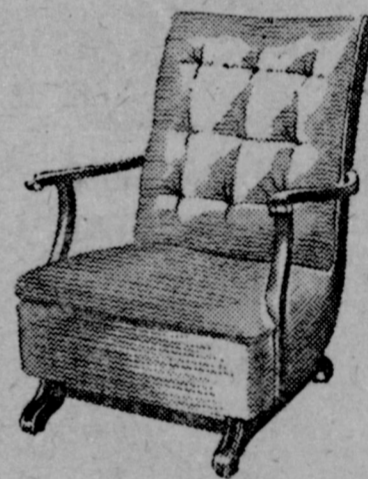

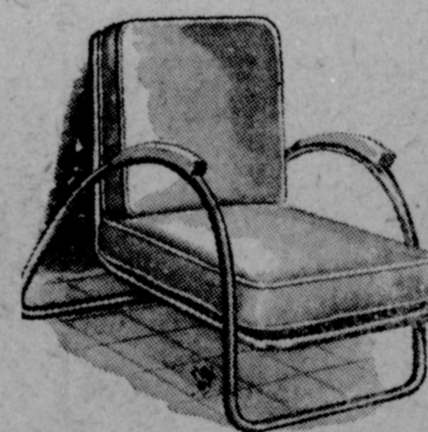

Many people seem to measure the extent of an infant's development in terms of how early he starts certain supplements to his diet. In an effort to "keep up with the Joneses," some mothers rush into extensive supplementary feeding without the counsel of the baby's physician.

Experience has shown that strained baby foods can be added with safety to the diets of most infants at comparatively early ages. In keeping with these observations, the medical profession has gradually lowered the starting age for most items.

But the doctor maintains a wide flexibility in the recommendations he makes. He recognizes, for instance that one baby's stomach is larger than another's. Such a baby can take more food at less frequent intervals. The physician knows that some babies have more sensitive digestive systems than others and governs the introductory time for solid foods accordingly. He also knows when sufficient teeth are present for efficient chewing and is thus guided in starting the "chopped" and coarser textured foods.

Be flattered and thankful, mother, that your baby is an individual and let his care and guidance be custom-made.

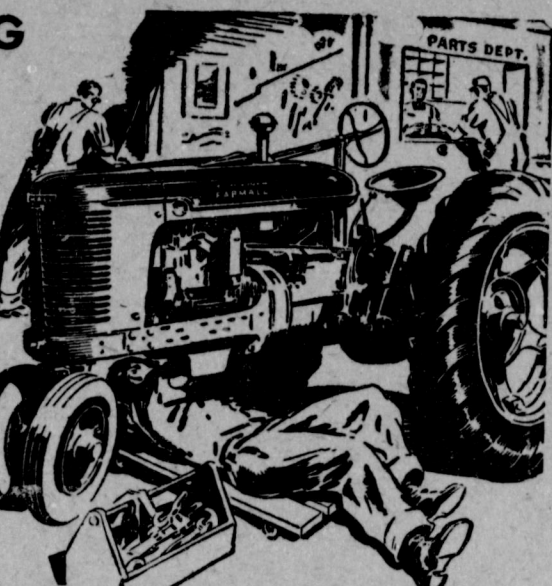
