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County bids farewell to 167 years of experience

"Come next week, there's a lot of experience that's going to be moving on down the road and we're going to kind of start over a little bit," stated Cooke County Judge Bill Freeman. He was addressing the crowd gathered at the Gainesville Civic Center on Tuesday, Dec. 28 to honor a number of retiring County officials and employees. Each received a framed document with a resolution adopted and signed by Cooke County Commissioners Court noting the recipient's service to the County.

Tom Woods was called forward to hear a resolution honoring his late wife Ann Woods. She served as library director for the Cooke County Library from April 1, 1977 until her death earlier in 2004. She had 27 years work experience with the County. The resolution stated that Ann Woods would be remembered, not only as a librarian, but also as a teacher, a mentor, and a loving colleague and friend. A copy of the resolution will be framed and placed in the County Library.

Ginger Herrmann, court reporter of 28 years, began her employment with Cooke County on July 3, 1976 for the County courts. She served there for 19 years. On Sept. 5, 1995 she began work as the official court reporter for the 235th District Court, adding another nine years to her employment with the

County.

The resolution passed by Commissioners Court regarding Herrmann's service noted in part, "Ginger Herrmann has been entrusted, with the responsibility of not only taking and filing records for the court, but also storing evidence submitted during court proceedings...has always gone above and beyond her duties to provide prosecutors and attorneys with accurate and thorough transcripts of court proceedings..."

Chief Adult Probation Officer Sandy Russell accrued 30 years of service in Cooke County. Judge Freeman noted, "Sandy Russell is the youngest oldest employee in Cooke County." Russell's employment began Oct. 10, 1974. She eventually became chief probation officer. Her resolution noted in part, "Sandy Russell has had an enormous impact on the rehabilitation of criminal offenders in Cooke County... has consistently gone above and beyond to keep probating criminals on the road to success by monitoring criminal offenders and preventing them from violating probation orders."

Gloria Parrish served as the third auditor of Cooke County. "Gloria has been a good auditor," stated Judge Freeman. "She has watched over your funds very close."

Parrish's 28 years of service to Cooke County

started in 1977 when she was appointed County Auditor. In part Parrish's resolution read, "Gloria Parrish has served the County with honesty, integrity, and professionalism... helped initiate many programs to assist County employees with medical, dental, and other benefits...Gloria Parrish is more than the Cooke County Auditor, she is an icon to trust, integrity, and loyalty."

Parrish responded, "It has been a pleasure to work for the County for 28 years. I feel like a part of the courthouse. You know I've been there for 35 years. I'm going to miss climbing those steps every day, but it's going to be a good miss."

Precinct #3 Commissioner Jerry Lewis is retiring after 28 years of service to the County. His first term in office began Jan. 1, 1977. He chose not to seek re-election for 2005.

The resolution honoring Lewis read in part, "Commissioner Lewis was a member of the Texoma Council of Government governing board for 20 years and served as president for three years... served on the Texas Association of County (TAC) Health Insurance Trust board for 13 years and served as chairman for eight years... worked tirelessly to keep the cost of employee insured benefits low... was an original member of the Cooke,

Crackdown on drugs for Montague County

The Montague County Sheriff's Office (M.C.S.O.), Nocona Police Department, and Pct. 1 and Pct. 2 Constable's Offices assisted the North Texas Regional Drug Task Force on the first of what is believed will be many search warrants issued in the coming months for methamphetamine manufacturers and users.

On Jan. 3, the above departments arrested one individual after an extensive search of a residence, several vehicles,

and a garage in northeast Montague County, pursuant to the search warrant. Methamphetamines and marijuana were located during the search, as well as counterfeit money. An investigation continues and the M.C.S.O. will withhold the identification of the suspects until the investigation is complete.

Conducting the search and seizure were officers from the Task Force, Sheriff Bill Keating, Chief Deputy Lloyd, Captain Wright, and

Lieutenant Pat Walters of the Montague County Sheriff's Office, Chief Holcomb of the Nocona Police Department, as well as Constable Herman Conway Pct. 2, and Deputy Kelly McNabb of the Pct. 1 Constable's Office.

Sheriff Keating stated that he appreciated the fact that all of the departments were already up and working together in the fight against drugs in Montague County.

County hires new library director; caps auditor salary

Commissioners Court selected Jennifer Johnson Spence of New York to serve as the new director of the Cooke County Library. She will begin her duties Feb. 16. Spence signed a two-year commitment at a salary of \$42,000 a year.

Spence is originally from this area. Her mother is Nell Hess and her sister is Monica Parkhill. She holds a Master's in Library Science from St. John's in Queens, New York. For the last eight years Spence has worked at John Sorrellson's non-profit organization. She said she worked as a librarian there on different issues such as end-of-life care, debate items for schools and after-school projects.

"I'm looking forward to becoming the director of a public library since I've just been dealing with special libraries mainly as my career," Spence remarked. "My emphasis in Library School was Children's Library. I always wanted to be a public school librarian first and I have dual in assisting special libraries. When the opportunity came up to take a job, when I was in school, at a special library I took it. It is very hard to get into a public library job in New York and in the schools there."

Judge Freeman, Commissioner Jerry Lewis, and Patsy Wilson, the NCTC librarian, interviewed several applicants before asking Spence to interview with

Commissioners Court at the Monday, Dec. 27 meeting.

Ann Woods, the Cooke County Library director of 27 years, died this past year.

District Judge-Elect Janelle Haverkamp was authorized by the Court to offer a salary of up to \$75,000 for a certified public accountant (CPA) to serve as the new County Auditor. The Court was unanimous in its salary sealing decision.

The Court had been in agreement that the county auditor should be a CPA. Haverkamp had tried unsuccessfully to hire a CPA with the salary available, but had been unsuccessful due to the low salary. "The problem being

County officials pledge service Jan. 1

Many offices in Cooke County will have new faces beginning the first week of January. The retirement of several long-time County officials became effective Dec. 31. Those who will be stepping into their shoes pledged their office oaths at a special ceremony held at 10 a.m. Jan. 1 in the Cooke County Courthouse. Of the nine officials taking the oath of office, five were new to that office.

Administering the oath of office to the Cooke County elected officials was the Honorable Justice Sue Walker of the Texas 2nd Court of Appeals from Fort Worth. She is board certified in Civil Appellate Law by the Texas Board of Legal Specialization. Before her judicial service, Justice Walker practiced civil and criminal appellate law. She is a former adjunct professor of law at Texas Wesleyan School of Law where she taught Criminal Appellate Procedure. She has also served as a law clerk and staff attorney for the Fifth District Court of Appeals.

Assisting Justice Walker was the Honorable Justice

Bob McCoy, also of Fort Worth.

Serving as master of ceremonies was Cooke County Judge Bill Freeman. He requested that Justice of the Peace John Roane offer the invocation. County Court At Law Judge John Morris led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Before the administration of oath ceremony Justice Walker remarked, "I know today, as members of our military make sacrifices for our freedom, that more than ever, we are really proud to be Americans. As Americans we enjoy so many freedoms, including the freedom to hold public office. In America we do not have a papal organization where leadership is dictated by the church and we also do not have a situation where we have a monarchy where leadership is handed down from generation to generation. You all, the citizens of Cooke County, have elected these officials and I know that they will do a very good job and make you proud."

Newly elected officials were Janelle Haverkamp as 235th district judge, Cindy Stormer as 235th district

attorney, Gary Hollowell commissioner Precinct #1, Alan "Al" Smith commissioner Precinct #3, and Terry Gilbert constable Precinct #1.

Haverkamp replaces Judge Jerry Woodlock who retired after 26 years. She served as Cooke County's district attorney since Jan. 1, 1993. Cindy Stormer was elected to serve as the new DA. Jerry Lewis retired from that position as

commissioner Precinct #3 after 28 years. Al Smith was elected as Precinct #3's commissioner. Another new commissioner is Gary Hollowell who beat the Precinct #1 commissioner incumbent Phil Young. Young held that office for two four-year terms. Terry Gilbert replaces David Tharp as Constable Precinct #1.

Re-elected to another term in office were County

Attorney Tanya Davis, Sheriff Mike Compton, Tax Assessor-Collector Billie Jean Knight, and Constable Precinct #4 Anthony "Tony" Ward. At his request, the newly installed 235th District Judge Janelle Haverkamp administered Sheriff Mike Compton's oath. This was her first action as District Judge.

Each official was called forward to be sworn into

office. Their families assembled with them. Each had invited someone special to hold the Bible as the official placed his or her hand on it to take the oath.

Cooke County Republican Women hosted a reception for officials and their guests after the ceremony. The public was invited to the event. Guests filled the first and second floor hallways to observe the formalities.

Also, he gave up his seat on the Texoma Council of Governments and it was the same way there. They gave him a lot of awards. He works quietly, but he works diligently and has done a wonderful job."

Kevin Farley of Texoma Council of Governments made a special presentation to Commissioner Lewis. "It is a small, little token of appreciation for all of his volunteer work and all of his efforts," he noted. "We

have a flag that's certified as having flown over the U.S. Capitol."

Judge Jerry Woodlock was recognized for 26 years of service in Cooke County with a lengthy resolution. It originated in November of 1970 when he was appointed assistant county attorney. He served in that capacity until being appointed county attorney in September 1971. Woodlock held that office until being appointed 235th District Attorney in August 1974. He served there until February 1979. He was elected as 235th District Judge and took office Jan. 1, 1989 and has served there for the last 16 years.

As District Judge, Woodlock served on the Cooke County Juvenile Board, the Cooke County Courthouse Security Committee, and the County Technology Committee.

In part his resolution noted, "Judge Woodlock has become a symbol of justice and equality to the citizens of Cooke County... has worked hard to ensure the security and well-being of Cooke County citizens and has worked diligently to ensure the safety and welfare of Cooke County's most precious citizens, our children... has shown the citizens of Cooke County nothing but respect, honesty, loyalty, and integrity."

Judge Woodlock recognized his staff, noting that they made his job much easier.

"Don't forget that this is 167 years of experience that we're losing, so bear with us next week," stressed Judge Freeman.

Each retiree was recognized with a cake decorated in a theme denoting their job.

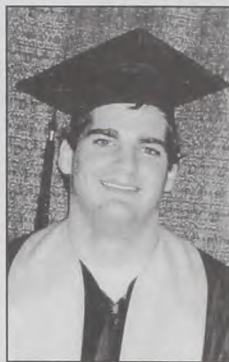
Cheryl is currently in the process of applying to graduate school at Texas State University to pursue a Masters degree in Family and Marriage Counseling.

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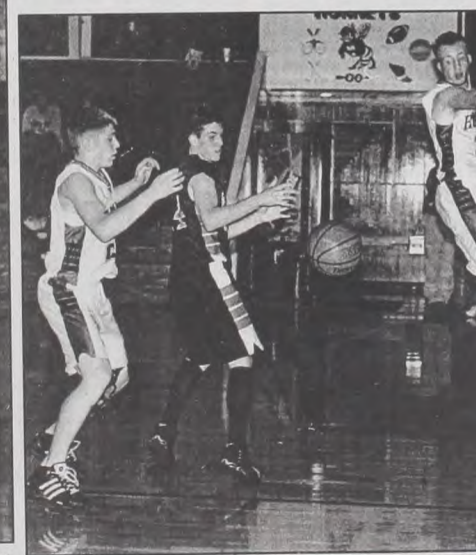

Virus against fire ants discovered

The first virus known to infect fire ants has been discovered by scientists with USDA's Agricultural Research Service. The destructive and costly red imported fire ant (RFIA) currently infests about 300

million acres in the United States. A native of South America, it thrives here because of a lack of natural enemies. Fire ants cost Americans hundreds of millions of dollars annually, occasionally kill young,

unprotected livestock and wildlife, and inflict a painful sting that is sometimes deadly to humans.

A survey of fire ant locations in Florida found that approximately 23 percent of RFIA nests examined were infected with the virus. Scientists have sequenced the entire genome of the virus, and studies show it may be an excellent biological control agent for the ants.

The virus infects all fire ant castes and stages of development, and the scientists were able to transmit the viral infection to uninfected fire ant nests. Brood in infected colonies died within three months during laboratory studies, but the effect of the virus on field populations is still being evaluated.

Texas Farm Bureau

Preparing for the Upcoming Legislative Session

It seems like the legislative sessions begin earlier and earlier. Hundreds of bills have already been pre-filed and meetings are taking place all over the Capitol on a broad range of issues.

Below you will find the list of priority issues that were approved by the Texas Farm Bureau State Board of Directors after the 2004 Texas Farm Bureau Annual Meeting in San Antonio earlier in December.

The next issue of the *Austin Newsletter* will be on Jan. 7. At that time, Farm Bureau will begin reporting on bills of interest that have been filed.

Priority Issues for the 2005 Session of the Texas Legislature

1. Taxes
• Oppose changes to the current sales tax exemption on agricultural inputs and off-road diesel.

• Oppose any changes to the current law to qualify land for open-space or agricultural use valuation.

• Support tax alternatives that provide a proportional reduction in local school property taxes.

2. Water
• Oppose any attempt to mandate conservation measures for agriculture.

• Oppose the complete repeal of the Junior Water Rights provision on inter-basin transfers of surface water.

• Oppose any recommendation to address the instream flows issue that negatively impacts agricultural producers.

• Oppose any changes to the authority of groundwater conservation districts that negatively impact the rights of landowners or rural areas.

3. Public School Funding

• Maintain adequate level of funding for rural schools under the school finance formulas.

• Oppose any attempt to mandate consolidation of school districts

4. State Budget

• Maintain current baseline funding for agricultural agencies and programs.

• Oppose unreasonable fee increases on agricultural producers.

• Support the current level of funding for food and fiber research.

5. Property Rights
• Support changes to the current land vacancy process to ensure the fair treatment of landowners.

• Support legislation to re-establish the requirement that good faith negotiations to purchase land precede condemnation.

• Support legislation to give landowners the option of receiving a participation payment for the use of their land as a utility right-of-way.

• Support changes to the current annexation law that gives landowners more rights to prevent annexation.

6. Electrical Work on Agricultural Property or Equipment

• Support legislation to give agriculture an exemption from the law requiring all electrical work be performed by a state licensed electrician.

7. Texas Food and Fiber Commission

• Monitor legislation to consolidate the Texas Food

New state annexation law passed in Oklahoma Senate

A new Oklahoma state annexation law, Senate Bill 905, became effective Nov. 1. The law limits the power of a city or town to annex property without the consent of the landowners in cases where three sides of the property to be annexed are adjacent or share a border with property already within the municipal limits and requires the adjacent

property on each side to constitute an area greater than 300 feet wide at its narrowest point.

The new law also requires the city or town to provide notice to property owners and to hold a public hearing regarding the proposed annexation, even when consent of the property owners is required for an annexation to occur.

BROWN RECLUSE SPIDERS

One of the most dreaded household pests in Texas is the brown recluse spider. Unfortunately, the bad reputation of this spider is well deserved, for the bite of brown recluse can be painful and may result in disfiguring skin ulcers, severe pain, and, occasionally, life-threatening complications.

As its name implies, the brown recluse is shy and not naturally aggressive. It is most often found in sites that are rarely disturbed, such as under old boards, in piles of discarded junk, and in seldom-disturbed storage spaces in houses and outbuildings. Indoors, they are most common in cluttered closets, garages, crawl-spaces, and attics.

Brown recluse spiders are hunting spiders and do not seem to spend a great deal of time on webs. When webs are constructed, they are large and of irregular construction, with thick, sticky threads. Nests serve as a site to lay eggs, and as a retreat. They are usually constructed in dark, out-of-the-way corners. Brown recluse spiders are mostly nocturnal, coming out at night to hunt for their insect prey.

Look for a light brown spider, with slender legs extending over an area about the size of a quarter to a half-dollar. Two characteristics that help distinguish this spider from similar species include the dark violin-shaped marking on the back of the front portion of the body, and the semicircular, paired arrangement of the six eyes.

Adult brown recluse spiders are most frequently seen during the spring months. Brown recluse spiders found outside hibernate in the winter, but those that are indoors are a problem year-round.

Mating season in Texas lasts from April to early July, during which time female spiders produce up to five egg sacs, containing about 50 eggs each. The length of time required for development to the adult stage is slightly less than a year, and in the laboratory, spiders have been observed to live for up to two and a half years.

Because of the seriousness of a brown recluse bite, the best solution to a household infestation of these spiders is to hire a professional pest control company.

The brown recluse is difficult to control. Look for a reputable company that is willing to take the time to work with you and your infestation. A combination of chemical treatments and vigorous sanitation measures are usually required to significantly reduce or eliminate a well-entrenched brown recluse infestation. Brown recluse spiders can be controlled using a four step, integrated approach:

*Sanitation. Unnecessary clutter should be eliminated, spider webs removed from interior and exterior areas, and a thorough vacuuming should be undertaken around, under, and behind furniture. Brown recluse spiders are frequently found in and around boxes stored in closets and attics. Boxes in such places should be taped shut to eliminate potential nesting sites. These actions are best done before your pest control operator comes to treat.

*Residual sprays. Liquid insecticide sprays should be applied to the exterior foundation, eaves, closets, storage areas, and rugs, if necessary. Sprays with residual killing activity should be selected.

*Residual dusts. Insecticidal dusts should be

applied in wall voids, attics, and inaccessible crawl spaces. Dusts penetrate places that cannot be reached by sprays, and often provide longer control. Avoid contaminating belongings in storage areas by covering them with a plastic tarp before you treat.

*ULV or Aerosol sprays. An ultra-low volume (ULV) or aerosol treatment with pyrethrins or resmethrin is the final step in a complete spider control program. Alone, ULV treatments are not very effective in controlling spiders; however they will kill any exposed spiders and encourage others to move and contact surfaces treated with residual sprays and dusts.

PESTICIDE LICENSE TRAINING

Jan. 26 has been selected as the next training opportunity for those interested in obtaining TDA Private Applicator pesticide licenses. A person that wishes to use restricted use pesticides on their own land, must have a license from the Texas Department of Agriculture. Completion of a training course and passing a written exam is required for obtaining this license. Texas Cooperative Extension has an agreement with TDA to provide the training course.

Immediately following the training, a TDA agent will be available to give the individuals who just completed the training the opportunity to take the required test. The day will begin at 8 a.m., in the basement of the Courthouse in Gainesville, room B-4. The completion of the training and the test will take until approximately 3 p.m.

The end of January is an ideal time to take the course for individuals wishing to apply pesticides this spring. It generally takes 6 to 10 weeks after completion of the course and the test, before qualified individuals receive their license. This allows enough time for the license to be returned to trainees prior to the spring spray season.
