# The exemplary life of Brother Michael Fuhrmann OSB spanned 85 years, begin-ning with his birth in Centralia, Oklahoma on March 26, 1920 to Joseph and Mary Orth Fuhrmann. He was anned Paul at birth and was the third oldest in a fam-ily of eight children. He was of preschool age when his family returned to north Texas, settling on a farm northwest of Lindsay. He graduated in 1937 in Lindsay. Because of his unselfishness and unassuming good nature, he was always elected as an officer in parish organiza-tions to which he belonged. By the age of 15, Paul was putting in a full day's work drying a tractor on the fam-ily farm. During his high school years he also hauled approximately 15 children to school from north Lindsay in his father's Model T truck, a distance of three to five miles for the students. After graduation, Paul ontinued his work on the farm until Oct. 22, 1942, when he was drafted into the United States war effort. He vas drafted in the sudaton of the Army Air Force stationed in the Pacific. As an airplane mechanic, he followed right behind the island-hopping troops help-ing to build artifields in the enemy-infested jungles from New Caledonia to Guadaleanal to the Dutch East Indies, and then to the Philippine Islands. He was honorably discharged from the Army on Oct. 31, 1945. Typical of his dedication to "get the job done well", he never asked for or received a furlough during these three years of service for his coun-try.

never asked for or received a furlough during these three years of service for his coun-try. For his participation in World War II, Sgt. Paul Fuhrmann earned one Ser-vice Stripe, four Overseas Service Bars, Asiatic-Pacific Theater Campaign Medal with eight Bronze Stars, Phil-ippine Liberation Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal, and one Oak Leaf Cluster with Distinguished Unit Badge. As a civilian he returned to his works on the family farm in Lindsay, where he knew he would have time to discern his future. Trusting in God's faithfulness, Paul went to Subiaco in 1948 as a candi-date for the monastic life where his talents in farming and mechanics were put to good use. He professed his monastic vows on March 19, 1950, receiving the religious name of Michael. He worked as an assistant and heating systems of the Abbey and in 1956 he was also assigned to the farm and dairy. He helped build the stock pond southeast of the Abbey that bears his name Michael's Pond'. In the early 1960s he was appointed Ab-bey forester and sawmill op-erator.

(EIA). Texas law requires that equine animals eight months of age or older have a nega-tive blood test for EIA, an in-curable viral disease, within 12 months prior to a change of ownership. (Nursing foals, transferred with their tested dams, are exempt from the test.) The EIA test document, also known as a VS 10-11, is sufficient proof of testing.
