Public probes for answers to Trans Texas Corridor

Before the event was held over, more than 75 people had come to see just what was what with the proposed Trans Texas Corridor (TTC-35). The meeting, held Tuesday, Nov. 9 in the Gainesville Civic Center was one of 44 public information meetings scheduled across Texas. Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is proposing to build a highway that would span about 800 miles from the Texas-Oklahoma border to Mexico and/or the Gulf Coast.

It was the purpose of the meeting to provide residents the opportunity to learn more about TTC-35 and the environmental study, ask questions and provide input to project planners, and TxDOT, review preliminary corridor alternatives, and to register comments.

Comments are being accepted verbally or in writing. To be included in the official record of the public meeting process, comments must be received by Friday, Dec. 3, 2004. These meetings are part of the Tier One Process of the project plan.

TTC-35 is one of four high priority elements of the proposed Trans-Texas Corridor system. Information provided by TxDOT stated, "As currently envisioned, TTC-35 would extend from the Texas/Oklahoma border, north of the Dallas/Fort Worth metropolitan area, south through central Texas, to the Texas/Mexico international border and/or the Texas Gulf Coast. It would be up to 1,200 feet wide and would include separate lanes for passenger

vehicles (three lanes in each direction) and trucks (two lanes in each direction). It would also include a total of six rail lines (one line in each direction for high-speed rail, commuter rail, and freight rail) and a 200 foot wide utility zone."

Included in the purpose of the proposed TTC-35 is faster and safer transportation of people and commodities; relief for congested roadways; an alternative route for the transport of hazardous materials; and the creation of new job markets and new jobs that would support economic growth and development.

At the Cooke County meeting, the Texas Department of

Transportation set up numerous posters with graphics depicting information such as proposed growth in Texas counties, truck traffic routes, time frames, and potential routes for the proposed corridor. Their support staff included engineers and environmentalists. All were ready to answer questions as best they could.

Some attending were just curious, others came because they felt their property might be in the path of the corridor. Questions and concerns varied and included where the most likely place was for the corridor, how wildlife would get from one side to the other, how would it be

paid for, where does it go from Texas, where will the on and off ramps be located, how far apart will they be, and will homes be demolished to accommodate the corridor. For some of the questions there were answers, to others speculations, and to some, they just didn't know.

Wichita Falls District Engineer Larry Tegtmeyer, P.E. noted, "From the series of public meetings earlier this year, things have been more defined, but we are still looking at trying to get down to a 10-mile wide corridor after these public meetings. Hopefully by the spring of next year, we will be able to define an actual 10-mile wide corridor throughout that entire area." Currently they are looking at some areas that are 40 to 50 miles wide.

There are possible routes going around the west side of Fort Worth and two routes around the east side of Dallas. "Whether or not all those routes can be combined into one is uncertain at this time," said Tegtmeyer. "There may be two roads looked at in the future. One of the important things at these public meetings is to get the public's input."

"One thing to remember about the Trans Texas Corridor is that it is more than just the cars and trucks. We're still looking at utilities and possible rail

Transfers and honors highlight MISD School Board agenda

Representatives from Sivelis Bend ISD addressed the Muenster ISD Board of Trustees last Wednesday night regarding the consideration of a district to district transfer agreement. That, along with revisions to the junior high/high school honor roll program headlined the meeting.

Rodney Howell spoke on behalf of Sivelis Bend ISD regarding an agreement for Muenster ISD to take all of their students as transfers after 8th grade. Bill McCourry and Edward Johnson also spoke in favor of the transfer agreement. "We're not here to gripe. We are very pleased," noted one representative, who thanked the Board for the education their children received at Muenster. "As parents and students, we consider Muenster as our home town." Sivelis Bend has a student count of 63, six in the 8th grade. They presently have 13 enrolled in Muenster, averaging 15 to 20 total in the District, some choosing to go to Gainesville. "We need to know where our kids are going to go to high school. We're a little different from other transfers. Others have a district high school to go back to if there are discipline problems. It would be helpful if we have a written agreement. There's too much uncertainty right now."

Sivelis Bend had three transfers refused with either discipline or attendance problems, that had to find another high school to attend. "We will take this into consideration, put it on the next agenda, get some answers to the questions on a written agreement," Board President Jim Endres concluded.

Principal Phil Newton presented the Board with a recommendation to revise

the junior high/high school honor roll program. After conducting a survey of area schools, reviewing honor roll records for the last four years, and taking a survey of the teaching staff, Mr. Newton recommended the following changes to honor roll requirements in grades 7-12:

- * Continue to publish the "honor roll" in the newspaper

- * Count all classes for "honor roll" except PE and Athletics.

- * Count only major disciplinary consequences such as placement in ISS or DAEP, suspension, or assignment to Saturday School as reasons to exclude a student from the honor roll.

- * Continue the practice of adjusting grade points at the end of the year for AP classes rather than adding a certain number of points to a student's grade each six weeks.

- * Begin the changes the third six weeks of 2004-05.

During the discussion Newton noted that 17 students were left off the second six weeks honor roll because of a "U" or "N" teacher discipline. "I believe you are taking control away from the teachers," said Board member, Leon Klement.

"U and Ns are subjective calls in the classroom," Superintendent Clyde Steelman said. "If this was a disciplinary honor roll, it would be different."

"The teachers agree," said Newton, who noted that the question about the honor roll started with a base-site committee and their concern about the low amount of students listed on the honor roll. "If an 'A' student has one bad moment and does one bad thing, they are off the honor roll," Newton added.

After amending the recommendations to be

retroactive to the beginning of the school year, the Board passed the honor roll policy 6-1.

Prior to the above discussion, there was a public hearing on the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas, on which there were no comments from the audience.

Reports turned in to the Board included:

- Elementary: Current enrollment is 284. Largest class is 5th grade with 45. Smallest class is kindergarten with 30. Reports were given on teachers who attended Nova Net training, a workshop on parent involvement, No Child Left Behind workshop, and hands on science training for TAKS.

Muenster ISD will host the Elementary UIL District Meet on Dec. 6. Recent field trips taken were NCTC Planetarium, Gainesville Police and Fire Department, the Pumpkin Patch, and the Fort Worth Museum of Science and Natural History.

A second six weeks report was also given, noting that 182 (82%) of the students in 1st - 6th grades were either on the "A" or "A-B" honor roll. It was also noted that nine (4%) of the students did not pass at least one class during the six weeks and that three failed more than one class.

- High School/Junior High: Enrollment as of Nov. 4 was 82 in junior high and 182 in high school. Largest class is freshmen with 48 and smallest is the 8th grade at 39. Fifty-six (21%) on the Junior High, High School campus did not pass at least one class the second six weeks. A "Bullying Prevention" presentation was set for Nov. 15 and 16 for grades 7 and 8. A TAKS practice test will given Nov. 22 and 23 to all students in grades 7 through 11.

Fr. Corapi to bring word of God's mercy

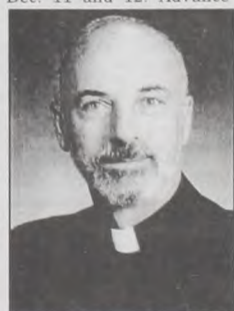
At the age of 44, Father Corapi was ordained a priest by Pope John Paul II at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome on May 26, 1991, Trinity Sunday. He has earned four academic degrees with honors in theology and scripture. Father earned his doctorate in sacred theology at the University of Navarre in Spain, writing his doctoral thesis on the theology of the Cross in the teaching of Pope John Paul II.

A perpetually professed priest member of the Society of Our Lady of the Most Holy Trinity, the three personal pillars of Father Corapi's preaching are: a love for our Blessed Virgin Mary, and a relationship with our spiritual Mother which leads us to Jesus Christ; great love and reverence for Jesus in the most holy Eucharist, and an uncompromising love and obedience for the Holy Father and the teaching of the Magisterium of the Church.

Father Corapi has preached in every state in the continental United States, all of the provinces of Canada except Newfoundland, and several

other countries. His widely acclaimed series on the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* is broadcast in over 100 countries, and is widely used throughout the world as a course in religious education and catechesis.

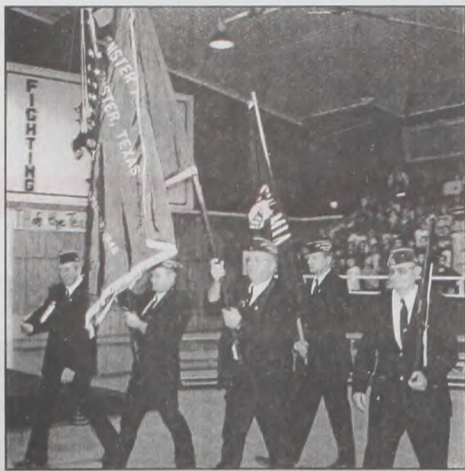

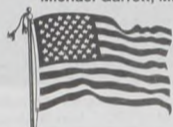

One of the most common, serious, and costly problems facing American families is premature birth. More than 49,000 babies are born prematurely each year in Texas. Premature birth is the leading cause of newborn death. Babies who survive can have serious, lifelong health problems. We do not know all causes of preterm birth, but we do know that smoking is a risk factor. Smokers are more likely than non-smokers to have babies that are born premature, stillborn, or die because of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS). lines. Let's say hypothetically if the west side is not conducive to the truck lanes or the car lanes, maybe it is conducive to a rail line or utility corridor. There are a lot of options available and time will tell and public comment will help us decide."

Tegtmeyer said that comments around the state indicate a mixture of opinions. "We believe that the Corridor is the right thing and we believe that the majority of the public supports it. If there are problems with it, we sure want to hear the problems. No one has a bad comment. If they don't support it, we want to hear their viewpoint because it is probably still valid."

According to Tegtmeyer, during the last Legislative Session, House Bill 3588 was passed. It gives TxDOT the authority to pursue the Trans Texas Corridor. He said that the Trans Texas Corridor will be a toll road. "If you're going to be driving on it in a car or truck, you're going to be paying a toll," he said. "If there's rail lines, possibly TxDOT will be building the rail lines and the rail companies will be paying rental fees. Generally it will be on a pay to use base."

TxDOT has been talking with officials in Oklahoma about the possibility of extending the road into Oklahoma. Information was not available on what Oklahoma thought it might do after tying into the Trans Texas Corridor.

Asked if they were looking to the more or less populated areas, Tegtmeyer responded, "We want to get away from the populated areas because the cost of right-of-ways is excessive unless you get out into the rural areas. Also it would affect less people." He noted that people in the rural areas may not want it near them, but everyone should view it from a state perspective. Even residents of rural areas have need of fast, easy access to the urban areas for things such as medical care.

"There are impacts, especially when you take that 1200 foot swath through ranch land and farm land and by houses and such," said the engineer. The 1200 feet is about a quarter mile wide path.

One official was asked how emergency response would be handled on a high-speed roadway with few on and off ramps. He said that hadn't been addressed yet.

A TxDOT official answered another question of how the corridor would be financed. "There are three consortiums that are trying to submit proposals to build it." TxDOT would still oversee the project and take care of it.

Some of the concerns voiced by Cooke County residents included what would happen if their farm property were divided in half by the corridor; that it would take a lot of property off of the tax rolls; that it would divide the county in half.

Will your property be included? One Muenster resident said she measured the preliminary north/south area according to the map to scale on display by TxDOT.

She found that, "Roughly (estimated), the preferred route that is west of Gainesville, would be highlighted starting five miles west of I-35, on Hwy. 82 up to the 10-mile mark westbound on Hwy. 82. The beginning of the five-mile would be from the area that drops off Hwy. 82 just past Michael Fuhrmann's farm, while the 10 mile line is the four way intersection of Hwy. 82 and FM 2739 north to Marysville. The south edge of the shaded area preferred route, west of I-35, originates at FM 51 or I-35 going 15 miles west, along the Cooke County southern border. That could impact the Hood Community or Myra."

By the spring of 2005 TxDOT hopes to have its draft environmental impact statement prepared and the

preferred corridor location identified to within 10 miles. Public hearings are planned for the summer of 2005 to gather public comments on the results of the draft environmental study. That fall they hope to present the final environmental impact statement. Federal approval is anticipated in late 2005. This does not authorize construction of the proposed corridor.

Remember TxDOT seeks public input, but asks that it be received by Dec. 3 to be considered this time.

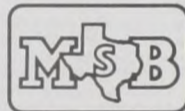

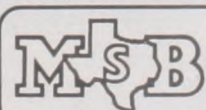

Marshall Scholars are talented, independent, and wide-ranging, and their time as Scholars enhances their intellectual and personal growth. Their direct engagement with Britain through its best academic programs

contributes to their ultimate personal success."

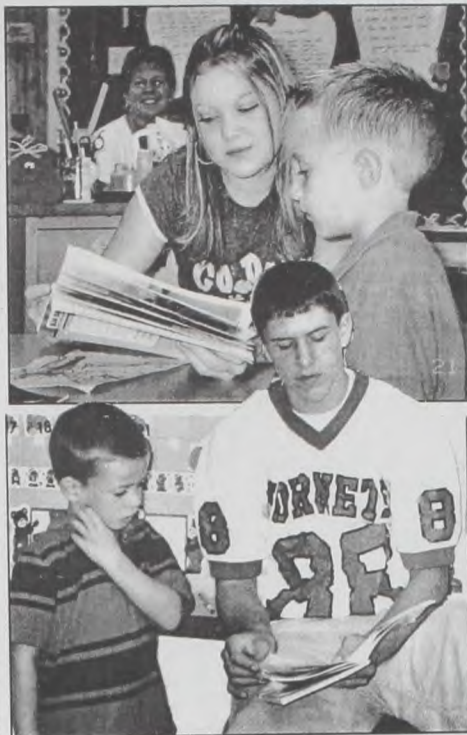

Technology: Over 70 obsolete computer systems were disposed of last month. There are still approximately 75 out-of-date and inoperable classroom machines that need to be removed and disposed of. Muenster ISD is in the process of receiving price quotes for 60 new computer systems for placement in individual classrooms.
Muenster ISD is currently in contact with two companies on their telephone, intercom, and network renovation project.
FIRST: The 2002-03 District status from the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST) gave Muenster ISD a rating of Superior Achievement, with all 21 indicators answered yes.
 A letter with a list of delinquent taxes that will be deleted from the Muenster ISD tax roll was received from the Cooke County Appraisal District. Nineteen accounts for a total of \$4,636.40 will be removed on Dec 1.
Jim Robertson, attorney at law, reported that \$9,631.90 in delinquent taxes were paid to Muenster ISD in October, including \$1,997.44 from IMAC and \$6,201.31 from Worldcom Network.
 The District's investment update included that 78% of its investments are in CDs, 9% in pool, and 13% in checking.
 The Board approved the Texas Education Agency Application for First Day of Instruction Waiver, to begin school before Aug. 21. The District must publish a notice in the newspaper and hold a public meeting. Muenster would like to begin the 2005-06 school year on Aug. 10, 2005.
 The adoption of a policy to account for the revenues and expenses of such booster clubs and support organizations that do not generate sufficient revenues and expenses to justify the cost of establishing a separate nonprofit 501, to be incorporated in the District's campus activity fund was discussed. Groups, such as FFA and athletic booster, find it unprofitable to buy a tax exempt number and set up their own account. If they go under the District's activity account, the school has control over the funds, not the club. The club must also follow rules given to the District by the State, such as no fundraising raffles. "It's always been law. It's just now being enforced," said Steelman. The Texas Association of School Boards policy service is drafting a policy for the Board to consider.
 The Board authorized Steelman to seek bids for roof repairs or replacement for the cafeteria and vo-ag buildings and overhangs.
 Jeff Pressnall informed the Board that he got a base bid on the intercom, phone, and network system. He noted that the major problem is the main feeder lines to the buildings from the main box "The phone system is old, but in good shape," noted Pressnall. "The intercom, it's scary, it's old, out of date, and the worst shape of the three." The network will need some minor adjustments. The estimated bid was \$112,690.
 The Board also directed Steelman to post the search for a superintendent.
 The trustees went into executive session to discuss the steps the District must take toward a land donation. No action was taken.

Tigers win over Tigers

A turnover late in the 4th quarter saved the Sacred Heart Tigers last Friday night as they took a 35-26 Bi-District playoff victory from the Tigers of Cedar Hill Trinity Christian. The win advances Sacred Heart to the 2nd round of the TAPPS State playoffs, where they will be challenged by the Hallettsville Sacred Heart Indians.

"We played our best game this season," said Coach Charles Boles. "The boys executed very well and played with as much enthusiasm and heart as they have all year long."

Sacred Heart scored on their first three possessions, then had a 28 point lead before allowing Trinity to get into the end zone.

Paul Bartush took the opening kick, returning it 15 yards to the 35 yard line. Three runs by Hoedebeck got the Tigers to the Trinity 39. A Bartush to Theo Otto pass picked up 5, and Aaron Krahl gained 5 to the get a 1st down. Krahl picked up 3 more, then Bartush scored on a 26 yard run. Bartush added the extra kick for a 7-0 score with 7:50 on the clock.

Trinity took the ball on the 20 yard line. Defensive plays by Bartush, Andy Davis, and Josh Yosten, allowed 9 yards. A 4th down play failed and the Tigers took the ball 29 yards from pay dirt.

Three Hoedebeck runs moved Sacred Heart to the 15 yard line. Bartush got the ball to the 1, then hooked up with Hoedebeck for the touchdown. Bartush's PAT was good for a 14-0 Sacred Heart lead with 3:39 remaining in the 1st quarter.

From their 12 yard line, Trinity took six plays to gain 13 yards, while banging heads with Jon Ambrose and Bartush. A 15 yard punt put Sacred Heart on Trinity's 38 yard line. Runs by Krahl carried the ball into the next quarter. A Bartush to Hoedebeck pass placed the ball on the 10 yard line. Bartush got 6 yards, then Hoedebeck scored with 11:12 on the clock. The PAT kick went wide for a 20-0 score.

Tackles by Otto, Ambrose, and Davis set Trinity back 11 yards, forcing a punt. The ball rolled to the Sacred Heart 27. Two runs each by Hoedebeck and Krahl got the ball to the 45, but were followed by a fumbled play for a loss of 6. On 3rd down, a screen pass to Hoedebeck was good, but not enough for a 1st, and Sacred Heart punted for the first time.

Trinity got in a few good plays, getting to the Tiger 18 yard line. A bad snap fumble was covered by Clayton Truebenbach, and Sacred Heart got the ball on their 39 yard line.

Hoedebeck carried for four straight plays for 29 yards. Krahl took the ball to the 25, then scored on a pitch from Bartush. Bartush ran in the extra points for a 28-0 score with 1:48 remaining in the 1st half.

The team from Cedar Hill got a new spark after a 44 yard pass play to the Sacred Heart 20. Two plays later, they scored. The PAT kick put 7 points on the board with 34 seconds on the clock.

Krahl got a good kick return to midfield. Bartush gained 16, then Krahl ran 22 yards to the end zone. A

yellow flag cost the Tigers 6 points. The next play, Trinity picked off a pass to end the 1st half.

Starting the 3rd quarter on their 19, three long runs breathed new life into the Blue Tiger team, quickly getting to the Red Tiger 1 yard line. A flag backed the ball 5 yards, but the next play a pass put points on the board. With 10:04 still on the clock, Trinity closed the score to 28-13.

Hoedebeck bounced the Tigers back with a 40 yard run. Krahl picked up 12 yards to the 23, but the fired-up Trinity defense picked off a Sacred Heart pass, giving them the ball on their 46 yard line. Six plays and a penalty moved the ball to the Sacred Heart 23. Tackles by Davis, Arlie Bayer, Krahl, and a flag put Trinity on the 21 with a 4th and 8. A successful pass gave Trinity a touchdown. The PAT failed and with 2:41 remaining in the 3rd quarter, Sacred Heart had their lead dwindle to 28-19.

Sacred Heart couldn't get the needed 10 yards and punted. Trinity seized the moment, putting together a quick drive of three plays that ended with a 71 yard touchdown run. The extra kick narrowed the score to 28-26 with 11:46 remaining in the game.

Seven, 19, and 12 yard runs by Hoedebeck gave the Tigers a little more breathing room. The Tigers controlled the clock by running the ball on the ground and taking the snap at the last second. Short runs by Hoedebeck, Bartush, and Krahl got the Tigers to the 7 yard line. But the Trinity defense was too tough and Sacred Heart lost the ball on downs.

The final touchdown came after Trinity fumbled the ball on their 8 yard line.

Bartush covered the fumble. Sacred Heart's defense gave the offense excellent field position to capitalize on the mistake. On Hoedebeck's third run, he plunged into the end zone for the touchdown. Bartush booted the point after for a 35-26 score with 2:40 on the clock.

The rugged Sacred Heart defense held off Trinity's last attempt to score, then took a knee to kill out the time, for a Sacred Heart Bi-District victory.

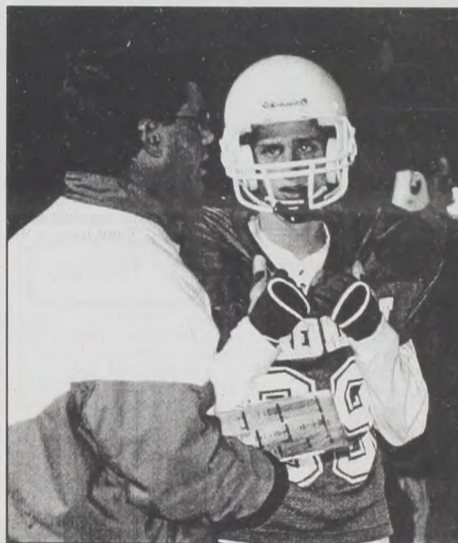

Game Warden Field Notes

The following are excerpts from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.
A Grayson County Game Warden cited a Denison man for killing a timber rattlesnake after the man had his picture with the snake put in the local newspaper. The suspect was quoted in the paper as

saying, "The only good snake is a dead snake." The timber rattlesnake is listed as a threatened species in Texas. Parks and Wildlife regulations prohibit the taking, possession, transportation, or sale of any animal species designated by state law as endangered or threatened without the issuance of a permit. Case pending.

BANKING

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100 Snakes Seized — Abilene-area wardens and a TPWD Wildlife Investigator executed a search warrant and seized 75 venomous snakes and five turtles. Nongame permit violations were identified as well as city ordinance violations dealing with the prohibition of venomous reptiles. Later in the day, another residence was identified as being suspected of containing venomous snakes. An investigation resulted in another search warrant being executed and 25 more venomous snakes being seized.

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
