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Third generation buys into Fischer's Market tradition

Fischer's Meat Market, a family owned local business, carries a reputation for its meat products and personal service. It was started in 1927 by brothers Joe and John Fisher and sold in 1975 to John's sons and their wives, John C. and Louise and Francis "Butch" and Eileen. Now 30 years later, John decided to sell his part to two of Butch's children and their spouses, Steven and Penny Fisher and Stanley Hess.

"We hope to continue with things as is," remarked Butch of the change in ownership that became official on Monday, Oct. 3. Butch has 52 years of experience in the business. Steven has been at Fischer's for the last two years. Stanley worked there just under a year, coming in as needed. He is leaving a job at Peterbilt. Tonya has logged 10 years at Fischer's. She started at age 13 and worked part-time until age 23. Tonya teaches school at St. Mary's, but plans to come in to help out when it is busy at the store. Penny works in the office. She has previous work experience in the store.

Steven and Penny have three daughters and Tonya and Stanley have two daughters and a son.

"We want to continue offering personal service," Butch said. "That's what brings customers from the Metroplex - good meat specials, and well trimmed meat cuts."

The business is now at its third location. A major expansion project was completed at the current location in May of 1997. This almost doubled the size of the facility and included an exterior that reflects the community's German heritage. Later a glockenspiel or clock tower was added. Figures make their exit from the tower door on cue and spin about to music. This attracts visitors who are

Fischer's makes a wide variety of meats. Turbulent weather strikes Muenster

Strong winds swept across the Muenster area Friday night, paving the way for the violent thunderstorms that followed on its heels. Rainfall began sometime after midnight and continued intermittently into mid morning Saturday.

Lightning accompanying the storm caused power outages, tank battery fires, and reportedly damaged appliances in some area homes. According to Herbie Knabe, chief of the Muenster

Volunteer Fire Department, the Fire Department received three calls within two minutes.

The first call came at 5:10 a.m. for a transformer fire at the corner of Elm and Sixth Streets. Within seconds another call came to respond to a fire caused by a lightning strike to an oil tank battery north of Muenster on CR 425. About a minute and a half later, before the trucks pulled out of the station, a call requested assistance for another transformer fire.

"The Fire Department responded immediately to all of these calls," Knabe noted. "Two mini-pumpers, a tank truck, and a rescue truck responded to the oil tank fire. Upon arrival at the oil tanks, we found two tanks with tops blown off, one with the bottom blown off, and a fiberglass tank burning. Water was immediately applied to the good tanks, and foam used to extinguish the immense amount of fire around the area." Fourteen

TXU alerts consumers of scheduled meter changes

Beginning Monday, Oct. 10, TXU customers in Muenster and Myra may see activity around residential and commercial TXU electrical meters. "Customers need to know that there will be limited electric service interruptions as the meters are being changed out," explained TXU Community Relations Manager Rick Hanning. He addressed the Muenster City Council at its regular monthly meeting held Monday, Oct. 3. Most meters will be changed out within one to five minutes.

Hanning explained that TXU Electric Delivery was entering its second phase of a system-wide automated meter reading installation project in the Texoma district.

There are several facets of this new system that will make service less costly to consumers. A meter reader will no longer be required to go from house to house to acquire meter readings for billing purposes.

"Automated meters will improve customer service and service reliability," stated Hanning. "Eventually, TXU Electric Delivery will be able to communicate with the meter to disconnect or reconnect service. With the leading edge technology, we can avoid estimated meter readings and the inconvenience to our customers with hard to reach meters. When fully implemented, our system will provide an up-to-date picture of our electric power grid 24

hours a day to determine the location and extent of any outages."

According to Hanning, the new system technology should reduce the number and frequency of outages. By providing an ongoing picture of system outages and potential trouble spots, the number and duration of power outages should be minimized. "Our primary goal is to use technology to progress from primarily outage repair to outage prevention," Hanning noted.

Hanning stressed that the teams of employees who will be changing out meters will all have TXU Electric Delivery identification with them. All work done by the employees will be on the outside of homes and businesses, he added.

"Once all the meters are installed and tests are completed, technology will allow the information to be sent either by way of the electric lines to our computer system or by way of radio frequency relays," Hanning explained. "These two technologies might be compared to traditional telephone service, which uses physical wires to communicate and cell phone service, which sends information from tower to tower."

It is expected to take from five to eight years to change out all of the meters across the state of Texas, which has around two million meters.

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry to visit

On issues ranging from transformation of the military and nuclear proliferation to homeland security and intelligence, he has played a key role in trying to protect the nation. confront the growing threat of terrorism. Six months before the tragic events of 9/11, Mac introduced a bill to create a new Department of Homeland Security, which formed the basis of the legislation signed into law by President Bush 20 months later.

As a lifelong resident of the 13th District of Texas, Mac knows the people and the unique interests of the region. Raised on the family ranch, Mac is one of the few

members of Congress personally involved in agriculture. He has been active in efforts to support agricultural producers, to boost domestic energy production, and to bolster rural health care.

A longtime advocate of tax reduction and limited government, Mac has pushed legislation to permanently repeal the death tax and bring greater fiscal discipline to the federal government.

MMH and Clinic to get a new phone system

Problems with the phone system at Muenster Memorial Hospital and the Family Health Clinic have been many. This should change soon. At the Sept. 20 meeting of the MMH Board of Directors, it was agreed to select a suitable system. A list of problems and needs were submitted to several companies who submitted proposals for new systems.

To finance a new phone system and computer upgrade, the Board authorized the Executive Committee to negotiate the details of borrowing money from Muenster State Bank

for that purpose.

As publicized, the Board in a unanimous vote adopted a 2005 tax rate of .20998 per \$100 of value. It will decrease the amount of taxes collected in the Muenster Hospital District by \$210 below the adjusted operating taxes for 2004.

As recommended by the Medical Staff, Henry Hewes, D.O. was approved to be active medical staff. It was noted that he's been doing many surgical procedures. Signing of a collection contract with the Cooke County Appraisal District was approved.

County votes to raze Poor Farm

Yes, the Poor Farm really did exist. There was at one time a place where County residents without money could go for a roof over their heads and food to eat. It is a small farm located south of Kaden's Landscape Company. There was a house for the farm manager, a large building that could accommodate about 20 people, and a number of

outbuildings. The place was called the Poor Farm.

No longer is there a need for such a facility, and over time its buildings have deteriorated. Cooke County has found a new use for the property. One of the three EMS substations planned for the County ambulance service will be constructed on the property.

Also neighbors of the property have complained

because it is unsafe and children are at times drawn to play there. No trespassing signs are posted, but do not deter all who would defy the signage and make use of the property, even at times for unlawful purposes.

James Puckett said that he's lived across from the property for 50 years. "I ran off some scavengers last week that were stripping wires at

Pallbearers were David Scarborough, Corey Oman, Steve Paroski, Chris Wall, Mike Psaromatis, and Gavin Preston.

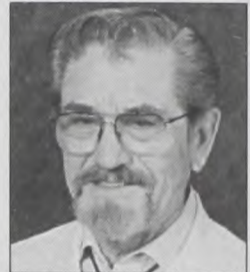
Ray Klement dies at age 89

men responded from Muenster VFD and two firefighters and a truck assisted from Saint Jo. Meantime, firefighters with two of Muenster's trucks searched the town for the reported burning transformers. They discovered several power lines on the ground with no threat from the transformers. Firemen blocked off the downed lines until TXU Electric arrived to remedy the

situation. Sections of the City were without electricity for varying periods of time. City Hall and the Fire Station were included in the power outage. A small generator in the Fire Station provided some light. "It took some time to get everything ready to go on the next call, but at about 7:15 we were ready," said Knabe. This was fortunate, since the next call came within the hour. At 8:09 a.m., the fourth

call of the short day came in. This was for an oil tank fire ignited by lightning. It was located on CR 350 just south of Muenster. Foam was used to douse the blaze. Knabe reported that it required 20 gallons of foam and 5,500 gallons of water to extinguish the two fires. Rick Hanning, community relations manager for TXU Electric, reported that the power outages in Muenster Saturday morning occurred when lightning hit power lines causing fuses to blow. "This intense electrical storm blew the lid off a transformer," said Hanning. "Electricity was off in sections of town for about an hour while our TXU serviceman worked to make the repairs. It was a very dangerous storm."

The Sacred Heart Teachers Sustainment Fund is having a luncheon starting immediately after 10:30 Mass on Sunday, Oct. 9 at the Sacred Heart Community Center. This annual event reports on the status of the funds kept for the benefit of supplementing the salaries of the Sacred Heart School teachers. This year, Peter Wall from Solomon Smith-Barney will give a financial report, explaining the Trust Fund investments, their current balances, and the outlook for the future. The new principal of Sacred Heart School, Chad Riley, will be the special

speaker, focusing on his own "Sacred Heart Story". Mr. Riley will stress the importance of the availability of a Catholic education, more particularly how it relates to what he found at Sacred Heart School and what he sees for the future of Catholic education at Sacred Heart. Admission to the luncheon is \$25 per person. Tickets can be purchased at the door. The doors will open at 11:30 a.m., followed by a reception. Luncheon will be served at approximately 12:10, and the program will be presented towards the end of the meal. the house," Puckett said. County Judge Freeman suggested that they clean the property off completely. That would mean demolishing and hauling away the Poor Farm house, manager's house, and an old barn. Commissioner Virgil Hess reminded them to remember that there is a gas line located on the property. It is used to bring fuel to an emergency generator in the event of a power outage to keep the County's radio tower operational. Commissioner Gary Hollowell remarked, "With the Court's approval, we plan to take a pretty drastic approach and start doing this site." The Court instructed Hollowell to proceed with the demolition. "Back in the days when they couldn't make it any other way, they'd move to the Poor Farm," explained Commissioner Virgil Hess. "They had room and board and they worked on the farm. They milked cows, fed chickens, grew gardens."

Commissioner Al Smith said that surplus from the Poor Farm would be distributed. Hess said that the first Poor Farm was located along the south side of the present Hwy. 82 and still is the site of the paupers' cemetery. That farm was sold and for a short time discontinued. "Then it got back to where they had to have a place again, so they bought the one by Kaden's Florist on Rice Avenue," said Hess. "They gardened plots in all the land below there, and raised cattle. They milked cows and raised their own beef. They had a man who lived in the little house behind there. It's about to fall down."

inset in the bricks of the Poor House bears the names of those who served on Commissioners Court when it was built. Those names were J. C. Cox, county judge, D.A. Cox, G.W. Burch, Scott Willis, and John Fette, commissioners, and Clay Newton, auditor. According to information in the *Muenster Centennial History Book*, Fette served as County Commissioner from 1928-1930, so the building would have been constructed in that time frame. Judge Freeman said that he would like to preserve that block.

Hess thinks that the Poor Farm was no longer used for that purpose by the late 1940s or early 1950s. Food was still distributed from that location for some time. That was then moved to the Courthouse basement. VISTO serves that purpose now. What was the manager's house was lived in by one of the county employees, a jailer, for many years. Until the buildings became too dilapidated, the County's radio system for EMS and commissioners was housed there. A cement builder's block

Leveling completed
 Don't go to the Poor Farm expecting to see it before things come down. Since this story was written last week, the site had been cleared. Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell said that leveling of the Poor Farm site was completed last Friday. "It is leveled and cleared and pretty much ready to build on," he reported. Demolition by the County began last Wednesday and was completed that Friday. The County is advertising for competitive sealed bid proposals. They are due by Oct. 20 and will be distributed among the members of Commissioners Court on Monday, Oct. 24. After review, the proposals will be selected for interviews with information submitted by the interested contractors. Hollowell said that they look at things such as how long a contractor says it will take to complete the projects, estimated value, references, and similar buildings done previously. The Board instructed the administrator to send its By-Laws to an attorney for updates and revisions.

In the Administrator's Report, Lynn Heller said that there could be a shortage situation with the flu vaccine just as there was last year. The Hospital District ordered 2000 doses, but received only 500. After making them available to Hospital employees, St. Richard's Villa employees, and residents of St. Richard's, Heller estimated that there would be about 300 doses left. They would be made available to persons in the District and those who use the physicians at the MMH Clinic as long as they meet the CCD criteria. It is anticipated that more doses will be sent after Oct. 24 when the vaccine will be offered to others.

Heller noted that patients and staff have been using the new patient patio that the MMH Auxiliary has been working to build and furnish. "They use it all the time. People just love it," Heller remarked.

Frank Zimmerer relates steeplejacks experience

Frank Zimmerer recently brought in, for exhibit and also as a conversation piece, one of his treasured keepsakes, a newspaper clipping 61 years old. It included a photo that was published by an Army newspaper at McDill field, Florida in April 1944. Frank Zimmerer was stationed there at the time, and is one of the three servicemen mentioned and quoted.

Although the newspaper and clipping had yellowed with age, and was quite fragile, its information was still readable and of great interest. It related, as follows:

Steeplejacks Erect Towers in Two Days
Climbing to unusual heights will be duck-soup for three radio repairmen of the 954th Signal Radio Intelligence Co. by the time they have finished erecting

four 90-foot metal towers to be used by the company's radio intercept division.

Each tower, made of galvanized struss steel, weighs 1,000 pounds and is supported by six well insulated guys.

The base for each consists of a four-foot square and one-foot thick concrete slab beneath the surface of the ground, on which stands a two-foot square cement pier.

First, three 15-foot sections are bolted together and set in perpendicular. The three remaining 15-foot sections are attached, one at a time, by use of pulleys.

The four towers, when completed, will make up what is known in radio parlance as a rhombic antenna. The four positions will simulate the four corners of a diamond.

The first tower, now completed, stands in the 954th intercept division, near the base motor pool. The second will be erected near the BOQ, the third near the 922 Boat Co., and the fourth within the 952nd Signal Radio Intelligence Co. area.

Red electric warning lights atop each tower are permanently installed for the safety of flying crews after darkness.

Two days' labor is required to assemble and erect each tower.

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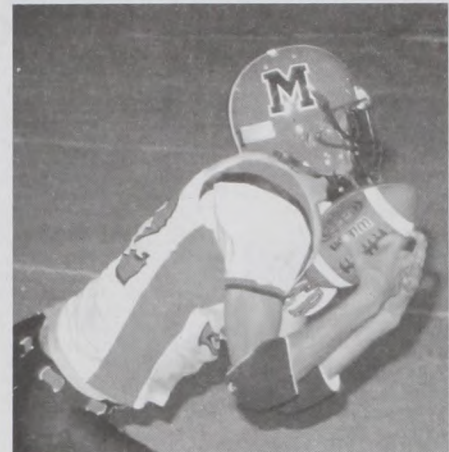
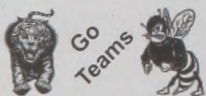

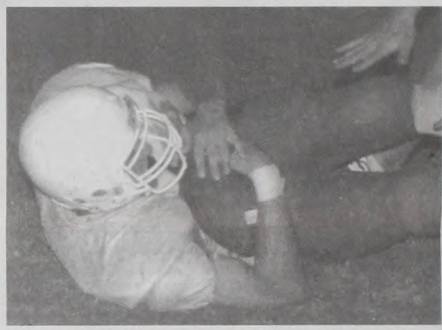

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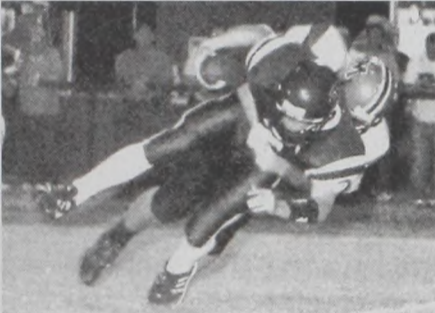

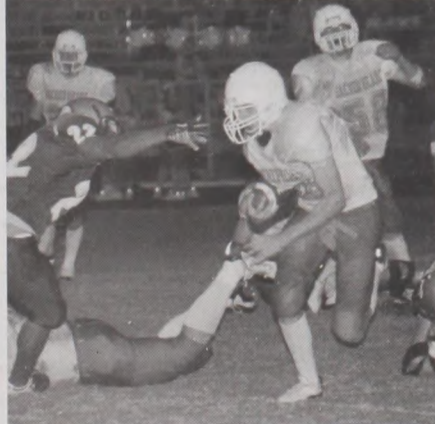

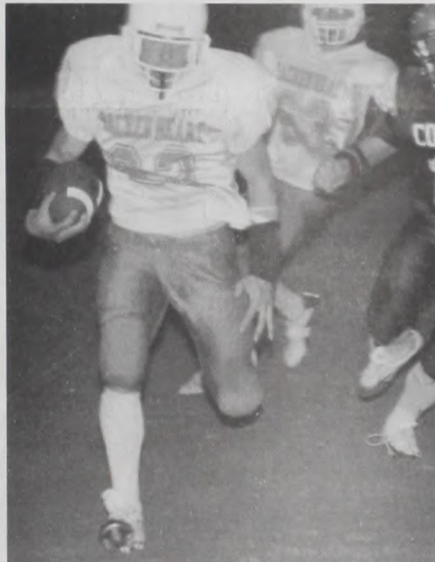

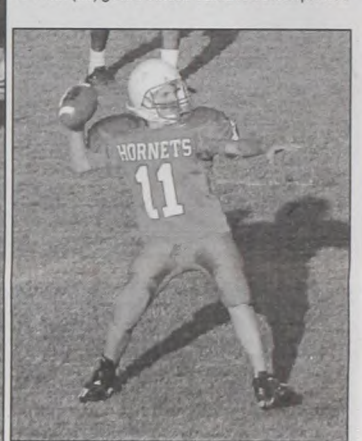
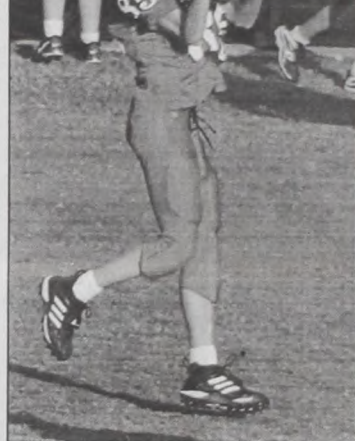

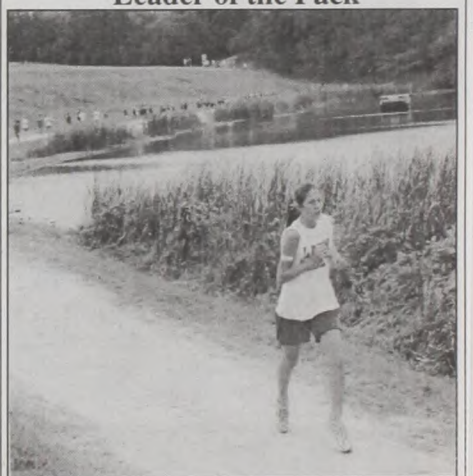

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Knights bring home 2nd district win

The Lindsay Knights brought home their 2nd district victory last Friday, defeating the Collinsville Pirates 47-0. After a scoreless 1st period, the Knights took control of the game, racking up a total of 623 yards and 23 1st downs.

"I thought we had a slow start, but after watching the film, we didn't start slow, we just had a bad start with two turnovers," noted Lindsay Coach John Erwin. "Overall, the team performed very well." Erwin also stated that he was proud of the Knight defense, getting another shutout. "Collinsville threatened a few times, but we kept them out of the end zone."

The Pirates got in six plays before having to punt away their opening drive. The

Knights quickly moved to the 5 yard line with runs by Alan Trammell, Dustin Hughes, and Adam Kasperek, but a fumble returned the ball to Collinsville. Tackles by Kasperek, Michael Eckart, Trammell, and John Mosman dropped the Pirates for three consecutive losses, forcing a punt. The next play, the Pirates intercepted a Lindsay pass and their offense returned to the field. Collinsville got to the Knight 25 before running out of downs as the 1st quarter ended.

A 51 yard run by Kasperek moved the Knights quickly to the Pirate 21 yard line. Four more runs and Kasperek was in for 6 points. With 9:36 on the clock, Dustin Neu added the point after for a 7-0 score.

Collinsville got in six plays and punted. Derick Murray ran for 25 yards, then a Hughes to Travis Endres pass was good for a 55 yard touchdown. With 6:14 remaining in the 2nd quarter, the Knights took a 13-0 lead.

It was two plays and punt for the Pirates, with the quick-kick placing Lindsay on their 31. The Knights got in a dozen plays with the drive ending three yards from the end zone as time ticked off the clock for the halftime break.

Lindsay took the 3rd quarter kick to their 45. Trammell ran for 7, then 27 yards. Hughes then scored on a 23 yard run with 10:50 on the clock. Neu added the extra point for a 20-0 score. After the kick, Kasperek recovered a fumble 18 yards from

playdir. Hughes then scored with 10:28 remaining in the 3rd quarter. Neu kicked the PAT for a 27-0 lead.

The Pirates got in six plays and punted. From their 1 yard line, Lindsay took 10 runs by Hughes, Murray, and Trammell, and a pass play to Murray, to score on a 13 yard run by Hughes. Neu hit the PAT for a 34-0 score.

The Pirates moved into the final quarter, getting to the Knight 21 yard line before Levi Hermes intercepted a pass. From the 25, a Hughes to Brandon Huckaby pass picked up 34 yards. Several plays later Kasperek scored from the 18. With 9:31 remaining in the game, the Knights had a 40-0 lead.

The Pirates again had a good drive going, until Travis Endres picked off a Pirate pass at the Knight 12 yard line. Three runs by Josh Jones gained 47 yards, with Kasperek picking up 29 on the way to the Pirate 1 yard line. Jones finished the drive with a touchdown. The PAT kick was good for the 47-0 final score.
