Rural hospitals survive

despite many troubles

"Profit, in and of itself, is not often a word you will hear in connection with rural hospitals," said David Pearson, Texas Organization of Rural and Community Hospitals' vice president of advocacy and communications.

Organized in 1990, TORCH defines itself as a voice to Texas' 180 rural community hospitals — the proud, the few, the survivors of more than two decades of assaults, ranging from a shortage of medical professionals to critical financial woes that slammed shut the front doors on numerous facilities.

Today, one-third of the rural hospitals in the state "are in the negative right now."

TORCH sees "red flags go up in certain communities" throughout the year, but fewer community hospitals are facing the direcircumstances that prevailed five years ago, Pearson said.

Rural medical centers that survived the financial crunch of the 1980s and problems in the last decade associated with the federal Balanced Budget Act of 1997 are holding their own in today's competitive market. The Critical Access Hospital Program implemented to counteract the impact of the Balanced Budget Act, staved off the "tide as far as closures are concerned for small hospitals," Pearson said.


Legislation or programs cannot transfuse life into a rural hospital tortured by a national nursing shortage and the overall acute shortage of all health care professionals, and physician recruitment troubles.

The nurse-to-patient ratio in most hospitals, especially RN-to-patient ratios, termed significantly low now, will be even more extreme soon when a large segment of the profession retires. Rural hospitals can't offer the same kind of incentives offered to nurses in urban areas, so personnel issues will continue to be an ongoing problem, Pearson said.







Texas farmers' help sought for quail conservation

Here in Texas, row crop farmers may hold the key to frontline quail conservation through a new federal habitat buffer program that was personally endorsed by President Bush last year. So far, only about 1,000 acres out of a possible 20,000 have been signed up in Texas.

out of a possible 20,000 have been signed up in Texas.

Throughout their range, bobwhite quail populations nationwide have declined from an estimated 59 million birds in 1980 to about 20 million birds in 1980 to about 20 million in 1999.

"What's really happening here is not the loss of one bird, but the steady loss of a type of prairie grass and savannah habitat that supports many other birds and animals," said Steve DeMaso, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department upland game bird program leader.

Last August, the president announced "Practice CP-33-Habitat Buffers for Upland Birds" as part of the Continuous Conservation Reserve Program under the federal farm bill. The goal is 250,000 acres of grass buffers along agricultural field borders nationwide.

"This isn't a complete solution, and it's not the only tactic urged by the quail plan, but it's a key first step to make agricultural landscapes more quail friendly," DeMaso said.

The CP-33 program will pay farmers to plant 30-to-120-foot wide buffers around their fields with native warm-season

grasses, legumes, wildflowers, forbs, and limited shrub and tree plantings, as specified in the program plan. Participants get incentive payments of up to \$100 per acre just for signing up. They get more payments after planting the buffers, and again annually during the 10-year contract. The deadline to sign up is Dec. 31, 2007.

"I think one of the main reasons we've had so little acreage signed up in Texas is that people don't know about it," said Chuck Kowaleski, TPWD farm bill coordinator. "We're hoping this will provide hunting opportunities and revenue for landowners."

Texas TB Update

The Texas Animal Health Commission has secured another \$500,000 from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to support Texas' quest to regain cattle tuberculosis (TB) -free status, lost in 2002. The state is addressing cattle TB with a five-pronged program that has included testing of dairy, purebred, and seed stock herds. More than 335,000 cattle in the state's \$12 dairies have been successfully tested last year. As of late August, TB tests also have been conducted on more than 1,300 of the 2,400 targeted purebred and seed stock herds in Texas.


