Frank Crossen 1923-2005

1923-2005

Frank Marvin Crossen died at the age of 82 on Tuesday, Nov. 1, 2005 at Muenster Memorial Hospital. He was born July 27, 1923 in Dallas to Bert and Katherine Crossen. He graduated from North Dallas High School. His college experience, which began at Texas Tech University, was interrupted by World War II, as he voluntarily enlisted and became a decorated lieutenant and pilot in the Naval Air Corps. After receiving an honorable discharge from military service, Crossen returned to college, graduating from Southern Methodist University in 1949 with a Bachelor of Arts in Business and Finance. He continued his education at Rutgers University Graduate School of Banking and later began his career as a national bank examiner. In 1952, Crossen joined Highland Park State Bank as a vice president and loan officer.

At age 33, Frank Crossen hecame vice president of Gentex Corporation, a company that experienced rapid growth as home building became increasingly popular. While at Centex, he served as president from 1965 until 1972. In 1972, Crossen was named chairman of the board and co-chief executive officer.

a capacity in which he served until his retirement in 1987. Since 1960, Centex has remained one of the nation's largest homebuilders, in large part due to the leadership of Frank Crossen.

A consistently generous supporter in time, talent, and wealth of many local organizations and institutions, creating an esteemed legacy that will serve as a model for many generations to come. Crossen was a past president of the Texas Brangus Breeders Association and supported the Era Methodist Church. The Crossen family established the Frank M. Crossen Family Medical Research Fund at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. Mr. and Mrs. Crossen were among the founders of the Episcopal School of Dallas. As a result of his dedication and service, Mr. Crossen was the recipient of numerous awards and honors. He was an avid hunter, fisher, cattle rancher, and Brangus breeder, who also enjoyed golf.

Crossen was preceded in death by his parents, daughter Jill Elizabeth Crossen, and brothers Harold and Gerald.

He is survived by wife Bo Crossen; son Frank M. Crossen, Jr.; daughters Criss Katherine Crossen and her husband Mack Elam, Lisa Crossen Selby, Collin and James Ewton; three grand-children Sara and Bradley Selby and Elizabeth Elam; brother Jack Burton Crossen; and several nieces and nephews.

Brad Huggins of Resource Stewards, L.C. is a certified wildlife biologist working on the project. He is the burn manager and will decide when and how the burn will be conducted. He said it is a simple burn.

Letter to the Editor:

I write to urge you to endorse the passage of Proposition 4, the constitutional amendment granting judges additional discretion to deny bail in certain limited circumstances. This measure needs to be approved by Texas voters when they go to the polls on Nov. 8 so that our criminal justice system can better ensure the safety of our community.

Under the current language in the Texas Constitution, a judge can deny bail to a defendant awaiting trial only in a few limited situations. That means that a judge must grant reasonable bail to almost all defendants. Those judges are permitted to impose certain conditions upon those bail bonds (such as staying away from the crime victim), and if the defendant violates one or more of those conditions, the judge can have the defendant re-arrested for those violations. However, despite those violations.

tions, that judge must grant the defendant another bond under our current law. Stated another way, defendants who violate a condition of their bond and have that bond revoked due to their own misconduct are guaranteed another bond because our state constitution does not allow those defendants to be held without bond, even those charged with violent felonies. Proposition 4 would amend the Texas Constitution to authorize the denial of bail pending trial to those criminal defendants who have already violated a condition of a previous release in the same case. This new judicial authority would still be very limited - Proposition 4 applies only to violations of conditions that were reasonably related to the safety of a crime victim or the safety of the community; it guarantees those defendants the right to a hearing before the judge to contest the alleged violations; and it applies only to defendants who have been charged with a felony. But even with those limitations, granting this limited authority to our state's judges would help close the "revolving door" that currently requires the repeated release of some dangerous felons.

The legislation that created Proposition 4, Senate Joint Resolution 17, unanimously passed our state Senate and House of Representatives earlier this year to make it onto the Nov. 8 ballot. This measure has also been endorsed by respected victims' rights groups.

For these reasons, I encourage you to share this information with your readers, and I hope you will urge them to vote "FOR" Proposition 4 when they go to the voting booth in the coming weeks. Early voting has started at the courthouse on this and other issues.

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New treatment for congestive heart failure approved

Following are analyses by the Texas Legislature Council of propositions that specifically affect property owners. Proposition 1 would create the Texas rail relocation and improvement fund. The Texas Transportation Commission would be allowed to issue and sell obligations to fund the relocation and improvement of privately and publicly owned passenger and freight rail facilities.

The obligations would be

passenger and freight rail facilities.

The obligations would be payable from the money in the fund. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to dedicate to the fund, state money that is otherwise not dedicated by the constitution.

Arguments For: Traffic congestion on state

Arguments For: Traffic congestion on state highways has increased, partially due to the inability of the railroad industry to meet the demand for freight transportation. The ability to ship more goods by rail would decrease the number of trucks on the highways.

Relocation of rail lines would improve efficiency, encourage investment, and promote safety. Goods would be delivered faster if freight lines were moved from congested urban areas. Relocating railroads out of populated urban areas would also reduce the number of potentially fatal train accidents.

Freight rail is more fuel-efficient per ton-mile than trucks, and would help Texas comply with federal air quality standards.

Arguments Against: The private sector should be responsible for the improvement and relocation of railroads. The railroad industry is not state regulated, and it is not the state's responsibility to aid private companies in investing in and improving rail lines owned by the companies private companies in investing in and improving rail lines owned by the companies.

Borrowing does not create new money for the improvement of rail infrastructure; it only delays the time when payment is due. The debt service on the bonds issued could cost the state \$87.5 million per year beginning in fiscal year 2007.

The primary duties of the Texas Department of Transportation involved planning and making policies for the location, construction, and maintenance of state highways. TxDOT should continue to use its resources to carry out its primary duties without using state continue to use its resources to carry out its primary duties without using state resources to aid an industry over which it has little control. Proposition 5 allows the legislature to define rates of

interest for commercial loans. The amendment defines a commercial loan as a loan made primarily for business, commercial, investment, agricultural, or similar purposes, and not primarily for personal, family, or household purposes.

Application of usury laws to commercial transactions limits the parties' ability to structure the transactions in flexible and imaginative ways that could benefit both parties.

Texas usury laws place lenders in this state at a competitive disadvantage against out-of-state lenders.

Arguments Against: Not all commercial lenders and borrowers have equal sophistication and bargaining power. Owners of small businesses and other borrowers that need smaller amounts for commercial purposes may be forced to accept contractual provisions that they do not understand or that are disadvantageous.

The proposed amendment does not limit the exception from usury laws to large commercial transactions. The legislature is permitted to exempt even the smallest commercial transaction.

Proposition 8 provides for the clearing of land titles by relinquishing and releasing any state claim to sovereign ownership or title to interest in certain land in Upshur and Smith Counties, including mineral rights and surface rights.

Arguments For: The proposed amendment is necessary to resolve inequity by clearing the title to land held by persons and their successors who in good faith purchased, occupied, and paid taxes on the land and in which the General Land Offices, and in most cases, a district court, has already determined that the state has no interest.

The proposed amendment would save taxpayers money because the cost of litigating the title with each landowner is potentially far greater than the cost of putting the amendment on the ballot.

AG BRIEFS FDA plans to expand the ban of bovine protein in feed

In a proposed rule published in the Oct. 6 Federal Register, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration announced changes to animal feed regulations. In an effort to further strengthen protections against the spread of bovine spongiform encephalopathy, certain high-risk cattle materials would be prohibited in the food or feed of all animals, including pet food. These materials include brains and spinal cords from cattle 30 months and older, brains and spinal cords from cattle of any age not inspected and passed for human consumption, the entire carcass of cattle not inspected and passed for human consumption if the brains and spinal cords from materials prohibited by the rule if the tallow contains

more than 0.15% insoluble impurities, mechanically separated beef derived from materials prohibited by the rule. All of the proposed prohibitions, except for those related to tallow, have been applied to cattle since 1997. Public comment on the rule will be accepted for 75 days from the date of publication. —Food and Drug, Administration
