

## Muenster Memorial has good month

According to Muenster Memorial Hospital CFO Dick Teeter, "It was a pretty good month." He gave the financial report for September at the Oct. 18 regular Board meeting.

Total operating revenue over expenses in September was \$63,406. Taxes collected totaled \$5,217 and nonoperating expenses totaled \$2,601 for a total revenue over expense of \$66,022 for September.

There were 15 acute inpatients logging a total of 68 days. Average daily acute inpatient days were 2.27. There were nine swing bed patients logging 179 days in September for an average daily census of 5.97. The combined daily census was 8.23. In August it was 5.26 and July was 4.48. Home Health made 367 visits in September. Therapy visits were: physical - 251; occupational - 207; and speech - 14, for a total of 472.

Outpatients visits to the Hospital were up considerably from August. There were 614 patients seen at the Family Health Clinic. Two statistics were pointed out as being significant by MMH Administrator Lynn Heller. New patients were listed as 40 in July, 51 in August, and 56 in September. Patients requesting their records for transfer to a new physician were 22 in July, three in August, and nine in September. A new patient is someone who has never been to the Clinic or who hasn't been to the Clinic in three years.

The Hospital District has two accounts (bond interest and sinking fund and indigent fund), each with a balance of over \$100, that are not being used. Heller said that the auditor was consulted and saw no problem with closing the two inactive accounts. He asked for Board approval to close them and the Board gave unanimous

approval. It is time to apply for an ORCA grant again, said Heller. It is for a computer radiology system that eliminates all film, uses no chemicals or paper supplies, and doesn't require a laser camera that could break. Films could possibly be read five days a week. It would digitalize the system.

Cost for radiology system is about \$75,000. The grant they would like to apply for is around \$45,000, which would leave about \$35,000 for the Hospital to pay.

"This is a beginning step in an imaging program that would bring us one leap forward in our capabilities," Heller remarked. "We'd actually have the capability of doing a CAT scan in the middle of the night and sending the physical image to a radiologist who would get you an interpretation right then." Heller noted that there

would be a savings in film and chemical costs, but an increase in the maintenance contract cost for the CR system. Then in about a year, a storage system would be looked at. It would allow a doctor to access the image from his or her office.

The Board approved the grant application. This was requested since there is a matching grant and the Hospital would be responsible for about \$47,000.

It was noted that the City did some patch work on Maple Street. The Hospital will do a little patch work on its parking lot since the City has the street repairs planned for next Spring. After the street is repaired, the Hospital will redo its parking lot.

Personnel policies are being reviewed by Joe Rodgers of TORCH. He did job description updates several years ago for MMH.

All Board members were present except Dan Hamric.

## Voters encouraged to participate in Tuesday's elections

The State of Texas has nine proposed Constitutional Amendments on the ballot for voters to decide on in an election set for Tuesday, Nov. 8. Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Also on the ballot in Cooke County is a proposition that, if approved, would establish an ad valorem tax freeze on residence homesteads of the disabled and the those 65 years of age or older and their spouses.

The tax freeze has been much debated. Some say that since it doesn't distinguish income, it would give a tax break to some who could afford to pay and put that burden on people with young families struggling to pay bills. Others feel that the disabled and elderly are doing without things like food and medicine to pay their property taxes. It has been pointed out by some that the similar school tax freeze is a contributing factor in the current elevated school taxes.

What is your opinion? Come to the polls Tuesday and vote your conscience!

Many people have strong feelings on proposed Amendment #2. It would provide that marriage in Texas is solely the union of a man and woman and the state and its subdivisions could not create or recognize any legal status identical to or similar to marriage. That includes those unions other than male/female created outside of Texas.

## Cooke County allows Burn Ban exemption for Enviroengineering, Inc.

With some reluctance, Cooke County Commissioners Court granted permission to Enviroengineering, Inc. of Houston to proceed with a prescribed burn. The acreage to be burned off is between the Old Sivells Bend Road, CR 401, I-35, and BNSF Railway. This request was addressed at the Oct. 24 regular meeting of Commissioners Court.

A Burn Ban currently prohibits any outdoor burning in Cooke County. "There are stipulations in the Burn Ban legislation that allow for Commissioners Court to allow burning during a Burn Ban provided certain requirements are met," noted Ray Fletcher, emergency management coordinator.

Doc Heath of Oxydental Petroleum Corporation gave a history of events leading up to the request. A refinery was built on the property in question many years ago by oil producers. Empire Oil bought the refinery in about 1935.

Empire was a part of Cities Service, which was bought by Oxydental in 1982. "Five years ago we did not know that we ever operated at this refinery," Heath related. "We found out real fast." Oil that impacted migratory birds was removed; plans to restore that land are now being studied by the State.

As part of the restoration of natural resources, Oxydental is being required to restore a certain 100-120 acres to wetlands, five acres in woods, and about 40 acres in grasses. Heath said that the Coastal Bermuda now covering the property is not approved and since it is hard to get rid of, a burn is part of the plan to eradicate it. The grass will be burned and then the land tilled in the hopes that the Coastal Bermuda doesn't come back. Herbicides alone will not be sufficient, he said.

"We want to get this all built so that we get the winter and spring precipitation to fill up these areas that will

become wetlands and let it sit for a while so that we can go in and plant the wetland plants," Heath continued.

Enviroengineering, Inc. was hired by Oxydental to oversee the project. Bill Stevens of Enviroengineering said that they are dealing with two components. One is to try and clean up all the places where oil may exist and the other is the natural resources damage assessment response, which is planting the wetlands, woods, and grasslands.

"We need to get rid of the Coastal Bermuda," Stevens noted. "It is one of the invasive species that Texas Parks and Wildlife do not want in our wetlands. It is not conducive to the habitat they want to create. It is very important to have everything ready to go this spring."

The area in question is in Precinct #4 and Commissioner Virgil Hess was concerned about the drainage. At times, the county road is under water during heavy rains.

Frank Crossen

**Frank Crossen  
1923-2005**

Frank Marvin Crossen died at the age of 82 on Tuesday, Nov. 1, 2005 at Muenster Memorial Hospital. He was born July 27, 1923 in Dallas to Bert and Katherine Crossen. He graduated from North Dallas High School. His college experience, which began at Texas Tech University, was interrupted by World War II, as he voluntarily enlisted and became a decorated lieutenant and pilot in the Naval Air Corps. After receiving an honorable discharge from military service, Crossen returned to college, graduating from Southern Methodist University in 1949 with a Bachelor of Arts in Business and Finance. He continued his education at Rutgers University Graduate School of Banking and later began his career as a national bank examiner. In 1952, Crossen joined Highland Park State Bank as a vice president and loan officer. At age 33, Frank Crossen became vice president of Centex Corporation, a company that experienced rapid growth as home building became increasingly popular. While at Centex, he served as president from 1965 until 1972. In 1972, Crossen was named chairman of the board and co-chief executive officer,

a capacity in which he served until his retirement in 1987. Since 1960, Centex has remained one of the nation's largest homebuilders, in large part due to the leadership of Frank Crossen.

A consistently generous supporter in time, talent, and wealth of many local organizations and institutions, creating an esteemed legacy that will serve as a model for many generations to come. Crossen was a past president of the Texas Brangus Breeders Association and supported the Era Methodist Church. The Crossen family established the Frank M. Crossen Family Medical Research Fund at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. Mr. and Mrs. Crossen were among the founders of the Episcopal School of Dallas. As a result of his dedication and service, Mr. Crossen was the recipient of numerous awards and honors. He was an avid hunter, fisher, cattle rancher, and Brangus breeder, who also enjoyed golf.

Crossen was preceded in death by his parents, daughter Jill Elizabeth Crossen, and brothers Harold and Gerald.

He is survived by wife Bo Crossen; son Frank M. Crossen, Jr.; daughters Criss Katherine Crossen and her husband Mack Elam, Lisa Crossen Selby; Collin and James Ewton; three grandchildren Sara and Bradley Selby and Elizabeth Elam; brother Jack Burton Crossen; and several nieces and nephews.

Graveside and memorial service was set at the Cross N Ranch, Era, on Friday, Nov. 4 at 2 p.m. under the direction of Clement-Keel Funeral Home. Hess wondered if some of the water might be diverted so it wouldn't flood the roadway. It was agreed to meet and consider options to divert the water.

Brad Huggins of Resource Stewards, L.C. is a certified wildlife biologist working on the project. He is the burn manager and will decide when and how the burn will be conducted. He said it is a simple burn.

County Judge Bill Freeman asked if it was necessary to burn while the Burn Ban was in place. "We had a lot of citizens who have got brush piles and want to burn them right now," he commented.

The response was that there had to be 99.99% kill on the Coastal or it would cause problems down the road. Also there is a need to capture as much water as possible before spring for the wetlands.

Freeman warned them not to burn when the wind might carry smoke into residential areas. "The burn plan specifies a prescription within which the burn will be conducted," said the specialist. "We have to meet the humidity, temperature, wind speed, and wind direction requirements before the burn will be initiated. The burn itself is very simple. We just want to keep smoke off the Interstate and keep smoke off the hospital." The land is next to North Texas Medical Center.

Commissioner Bill Cox worried that if one request for a burn exception was honored, the Court would be flooded with requests. It was noted by Fletcher that there was a lot more to it than just asking for an exception. Anyone willing to go through the exemption process as Enviroengineering did, would be considered for an exception. Commissioners then approved the request unanimously.

Competitive sealed bid proposals were opened for the three EMS substations. There were two bidders. B.J. Construction submitted a bid for \$374,270. Sedalco's bid was \$767,000. These will be studied and considered at a special meeting set for Tuesday, Nov. 1 at 10 a.m.

Resolutions were adopted honoring volunteers Kim Brown and Ray Fletcher for the outstanding job they did assisting Hurricane Katrina victims recently. Brown managed the shelter and kept things running smoothly until housing could be found or the evacuees could move back home. She was allowed time off from her job by NCTC to

manage the shelter, said Freeman. Fletcher was instrumental in finding funding and supplies to keep the shelter going. Fletcher remarked that he was only one of a host of volunteers who worked with the shelter.

Commissioner Al Smith remarked, "As a community, I don't know that we have ever seen anything quite like it where in 24 hours we went from no facility to a facility where it actually was dedicated in helping people. When you saw them step off the bus, I'll never forget that, they were truly brothers and sisters of our nation there in dire need of help. And you all stayed with them and gave them help for a new life."

Judge Freeman commented on all the different agencies working together so well.

In other business conducted at Commissioners Court:

- Adopted a resolution in which November was officially proclaimed Home Care and Hospice Month in Cooke County.

- Heard report from Cooke County Library Director Jennifer Johnson Spence. New library hours are well received and the number of patrons continues to increase.

- Reviewed and accepted District Attorney's FY 9-1-05 to 8-31-06 Asset Forfeiture Budget.

- Opened bids on corrugated galvanized metal pipe for the year beginning 11-1-05 through 10-31-06. Two companies submitted bids and both were accepted. Pipe will be purchased from West Tx Culverts of Seymour and Conntech Culverts of Irving, depending on what is needed.

- Approved a request by Virgil Taylor Drilling Company to install a two inch poly pipeline across CR 178, approximately 890 feet west of the intersection of CR 147, to transport salt water from one lease to another in Precinct #1.

- Approved Preliminary Plat for St. Onge Properties, Lots 1-4, located on the west side of FM 902 in Precinct #2.

- Accepted a sub-grant for the 2005 Home Land Security Grant Program in the amount of \$72,872.

- Approved purchase of Help America, Vote Act (H.A.V.A.) equipment at a total cost of \$204,400. That includes \$38,500 for scanner update; 30 machines at \$5,400 each; and \$3,900 for installation.

The Cooke County Tax-Freeze issue has been relatively quiet the past few months, but it is an issue which must be addressed by the voters of this county this coming Tuesday. For those of you unfamiliar with the issue, voters are being given the opportunity to vote on a county tax freeze benefiting citizens age 65 and older. I believe there are some seniors, who do need tax relief, but I do not believe a tax-freeze for the entire 65 and older population is the answer to their problem, there are other methods.

Approximately one-third of the population in this county will saddle the other two-thirds of the population with the county tax increases if this issue passes. This one third population will continue to be eligible to vote for new bond issues without having to pay anything for the new services - this is called "taxation without representation"! Please VOTE AGAINST the tax-freeze. Those under the age of 65 will have no right to complain about high taxes if they do not vote. Wake up taxpayers and voters - get to the polls - it's your right and responsibility to vote - and it's your only weapon to fight higher taxes. VOTE!

tions, that judge must grant the defendant another bond under our current law. Stated another way, defendants who violate a condition of their bond and have that bond revoked due to their own misconduct are guaranteed another bond because our state constitution does not allow those defendants to be held without bond, even those charged with violent felonies.

Proposition 4 would amend the Texas Constitution to authorize the denial of bail pending trial to those criminal defendants who have already violated a condition of a previous release in the same case. This new judicial authority would still be very limited - Proposition 4 applies only to violations of conditions that were reasonably related to the safety of a crime victim or the safety of the community; it guarantees those defendants the right to a hearing before the judge to contest the alleged violations; and it applies only to defendants who have been charged with a felony. But even with those limitations, granting this limited authority to our state's judges would help close the "revolving door" that currently requires the repeated release of some dangerous felons.

The legislation that created Proposition 4, Senate Joint Resolution 17, unanimously passed our state Senate and House of Representatives earlier this year to make it onto the Nov. 8 ballot. This measure has also been endorsed by respected victims' rights groups.

For these reasons, I encourage you to share this information with your readers, and I hope you will urge them to vote "FOR" Proposition 4 when they go to the voting booth in the coming weeks. Early voting has started at the courthouse on this and other issues.

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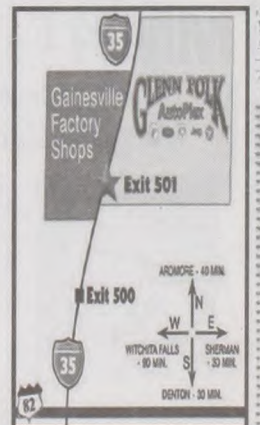
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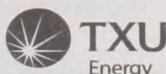

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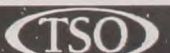

### New treatment for congestive heart failure approved

# Era out-stings Muenster

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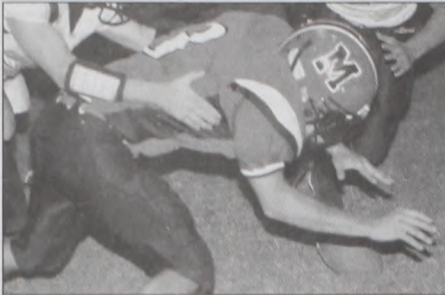

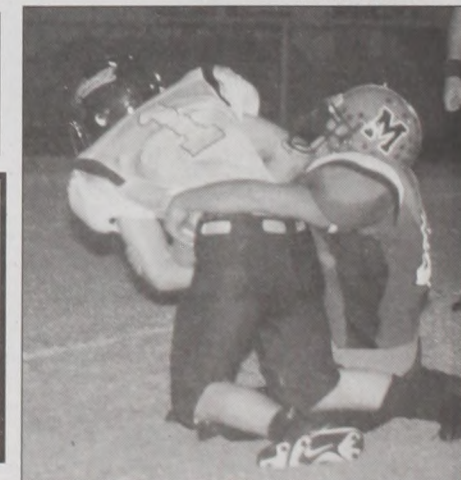

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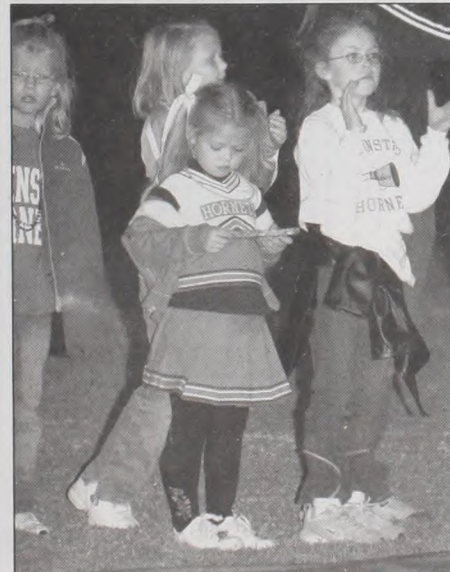
