## Washington Notes

By Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D.C. June 1 - Attorney General Tom Clark was scheduled to make a Memorial Day address at Vernon on May 30, and also to receive an honorary degree at that time from Texas Technological College. At the invitation of the Vernon arrangements committee I was to introduce Mr. Clark on that occasion. I had arranged to fly down with the Attorney General on the night of the 29th, and to fly back to Washington the night of the 30th. Luckily for the Gossetts, Mr. Clark was compelled to cancel his trip. On the morning of May 30 our third daughter, who was scheduled to be a second son, arrived at Garfield Memorial Hospital. The young lady, Mary Melissa, weighed in at eight and a third pounds. Mother and

daughter are doing well. These of us who have worked long and hard for some control over labor bosses are hopeful President Truman will sign the so-called Case bill which was sent to his desk this week. Briefly, the bill would do these things: (1) Set up a new and badly needed federal mediation board with limited powers. (2) Outlaw the extortion of money from farmers hauling their produce to market. (3) Ban exclusive union administration of welfare and similar funds financed by an employer. (4) Exempt supervisory employees from the scope of the Wagner Act. (5) Authorize suits for damages against labor unions for violation of collective bargaining contracts. (6) Curb secondary boycotts and jurisdiction strikes. (7) Provide penalties for the use of force or violence in labor controversies. (8) Deprive workers of their status as employees under the Wagner Act if they fail to observe a cooling-off period prior to striking. In his famous speech of last

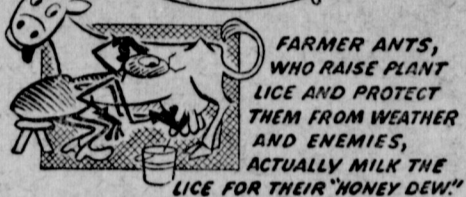

week the President asked for emergency legislation to deal with the current rash of crippling strikes. Apparently this bill is to be emasculated if not destroyed by left-wing Democrats and politically minded Republicans. Republican Senator Robert Taft and Republican Senator Morse of Oregon are two leaders in this move to scuttle the President's program. Evidently they are courting the support of the labor bosses. Perhaps Senator Taft thinks the PAC-CIO might support him for President.

The most serious pending strike is that of the maritime unions, set for the middle of June. This strike would tie up all shipping in both oceans. These unions are the most radical in America, and are generally known to be communist controlled. They are headed by notorious Harry Bridges and almost equally notorious Joseph Curran. I one time voted for a resolution to deport said Harry Bridges, who at that time was an alien. He was later saved by the Supreme Court and has since become a naturalized citizen.

Among the many recent strikes which have pushed prices ever upward have been those in the automobile, farm machinery, steel, coal and railroad industries. Although Chrysler employees were given an 18-1/2 cent per hour increase in January of this year, they are now serving notice of demand for another 18-1/2 cent increase. Thus another cycle of strikes and of price and wage increase would be started. The threatened strike in the Chrysler plant would of course be in violation of contract. Under existing laws the labor bosses have no regard for contracts, and seem to operate on a basis of "get all we can when we can—the public and consumer be damned." Nothing is ever settled until it is settled right.

For the government to continue to take over industries in which strikes have been called, and to settle them on the strikers' terms

is simply adding insult to injury. Apparently John L. Lewis got more out of the recent strike than even he expected. Of course we all know who will eventually pay the bill—the consumer.

In a June Coronet article entitled "silk stocking for you — from Texas": Willard C. Hasebush tells that with this revolutionary impetus from Texas, silk will become a No. 1 American enterprise.

Mineral Wells' unique venture began in 1944 — and by last December they had acquired 63,000 leaf producing trees, raised more than 1,000,000 worms, turned out hosiery made of Texas silk, and wound up the year with corporate assets \$6,000 greater than the initial investment.

Experts have known for years that mulberry trees could be grown and that silkworms could thrive almost anywhere in the world, says the Coronet article. But no country could compete against Japan's low labor costs. Beekman's machine produces in two hours as much silk as the Oriental system turns out in three days. It's better silk and actually cheaper. . . even when the costs are based on the white man's high wage and hour standards.

Millions of silkworm eggs now in cold storage at Mineral Wells will be hatched next spring. Already Texas silk has been manufactured into hosiery and fabrics, while applications for raw material have poured in from manufacturers all over the country. Meantime the Mineral Wells business men are looking for more mulberry trees.

**HEALTH OFFICER GIVES WARNING OF DANGERS OF SUMMER SPORTS**

Austin, Texas. — Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports during summer months was released from the State Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It was pointed out that in view of prevailing travel difficulties, vacation pleasures are apt to be limited to excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers, and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents and without the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted; "nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, through carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming in safety: when swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and currents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day; if you become chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float, this is most important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; never swim in water that may be polluted. Swimming close to or even a few miles below sewage outlets is inviting the possibility of acquiring disease.

"Excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to eliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous."

**Cautions on DDT**

In large doses DDT is poisonous to humans and to many animals; it should not be used directly on dogs, cats, fowls, and cattle, but their stalls and bedding and the fowl roosts may be sprayed. DDT is best used as a spray in a 3 to 5 per cent solution, or as a powder for certain specific purposes. As an aid on the farm, it is efficient against certain orchard pests and the cabbage worm. Against ants and termites, the drug is also poisonous, and when dissolved in kerosene and sprayed on house screens and around the doors it is effective in destroying flies and mosquitoes and preventing their entrance into the house for several months. When you use it in the kitchen, remove all food and cover all eating utensils. The Progressive Farmer.

**Navy Shows Rocket Power**



Photos made at Patuxent, Maryland, with cooperation of U.S. Navy.

Showing air and fire power far superior to anything any enemy nation ever developed, the navy has lifted the veil on research which has been carried on for years and which resulted in new uses for rocket power.

Rockets will replace cannon as chief armament for planes and ships, many naval officers believe. Because they have no recoil, rockets give small craft fire power impossible with heavy cannon. Fighter planes may be equipped with six rockets, three under each wing.

Demonstrating the mounting of the rockets in the top picture are William O'Neil, president of The General Tire & Rubber company which makes the rockets, and Dr. Theodore von Karman, one of the world's foremost aeronautical designers, who heads the company's rocket research.

The huge rocket shown in the lower picture produces more power by one-third than anything the Germans ever developed, according to navy experts. It has a thrust of 66,000 pounds and would throw 15,000 pounds 30 or 40 miles. Closest approach of any enemy development was the German V2, which developed 50,000 pounds thrust. Members of the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences are shown inspecting the rocket, known to the navy as Moby Dick.

The asset is a navy bomber being assisted in the take off by four rockets, each developing 350 horsepower. These rockets soon will be used on commercial transport to enable large ships and heavy payloads to take off from smaller fields, according to O'Neil, whose company also makes these units.

They can be counted upon to do an equally outstanding job in saving grain, especially when they realize that the single bushel of grain which we in our abundance think of as a small thing, is bread for 150 people for an entire day."

**GENEROUS RESPONSE NOTED IN NATIONAL FAMINE RELIEF DRIVE**

New York, May — The American people are responding with their traditional generosity to the nation-wide Emergency Food Collection for the hungry and starving millions overseas, according to Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace, national chairman of the drive.

The appeal for money to buy food and for gifts of goods canned in the for shipment to famine areas is now under way in more than 6,500 cities, towns and villages, of which 500 have been organized since the campaign officially opened May 12. Additional local chairmen are being enlisted daily, he stated.

Mr. Wallace said that every mail is bringing checks and

money orders made payable to Lee Marshall, executive director, at national headquarters of the Emergency Food Collection, 100 Maiden Lane, New York City. The contributions received, he declared, indicate that the average American is willing to make more than an average effort to give direct and personal help to some desperately hungry human being overseas.

The contributions include money saved in many communities by boys and girls who are giving up between-meal snacks, ice cream and sodas.

Many local groups and organizations, Mr. Wallace reported are arranging "famine" luncheons and dinners, with menus typical of the meager fare on which hunger victims overseas are trying to subsist. The proceeds are being turned over to the Emergency Food Collection. Adults who are skipping meals are also giving the price of those meals.

Checks covering costs saved at breadless, cakeless and pieless meals now being instituted at many public restaurants, college and university dining halls have also been pledged to the Food Collection, Mr. Wallace added.

**Make Silage, Not Hay Out Of Your Alfalfa, USDA Experts Advise**

College Station, — To the dairyman, alfalfa has greater value as silage than when it is field cured, according to recent studies of the USDA's Bureau of Dairy Industry.

Recent studies showed that cows on silage produced about seven per cent more milk than those on hay. At the beginning of the trials, the silage contained nine times as much carotene as the hay, but at the end the silage was 14 times as rich in carotene, because the hay lost carotene at a higher rate. In addition, cows fed silage, gave milk much higher in Vitamin A potency. The protein content of dry matter was found to be 21 per cent in the silage and 15 per cent in the hay.

J.W. Davis, assistant dairyman for the A. and M. Extension Service, says he believes this study and others similar will stimulate increased interest in trench silos in Texas.

"The world faces a food crisis far worse than anything experienced during the war, and it is important that farmers not only plant every acre possible, but also that they prevent waste and harvest every bushel," F.M. Aldridge, Jr., the Gainesville Massey-Harris dealer stated today at the launching of the "Famine Fighting" program in Cooke county.

"One of the greatest sources of waste is the tramping down of grain in the openings of fields.
