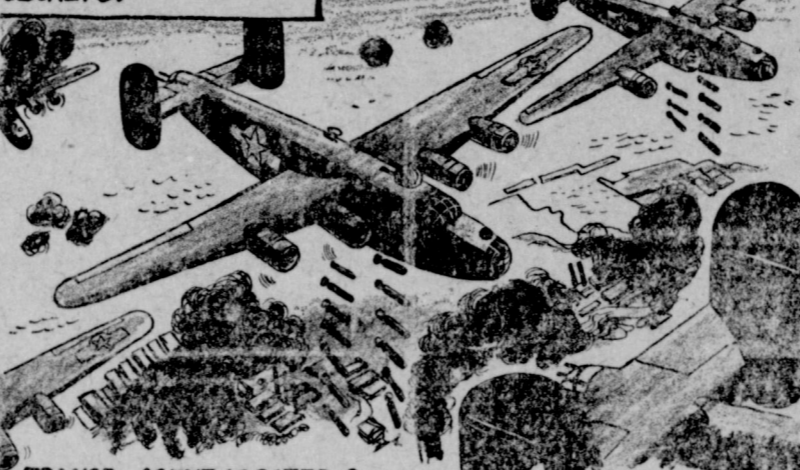

Washington Notes

By Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D. C., May 10—The House this week reversed itself on the question of housing subsidies. By a close vote the House agreed to a Senate compromise on a 400 million dollar housing subsidy. Five Texas Congressmen including myself voted against this huge subsidy because we feel it to be unsound, if not actually dishonest. The 400 millions will be paid to processors and manufacturers in lieu of a price increase. 100 millions of the amount is intended to be paid to processors of prefabricated houses. Most of this, it is said, will go to industrialist, Henry Kaiser.

Most of us who voted against this subsidy believe it will not benefit veterans. We favor giving priorities, loans, and other aids. The subsidy will come out of the taxpayers' pocket and will simply be added to the cost of the house, whether it is bought by the veteran or someone else.

Consumers' subsidies voted out of the U.S. Treasury are more costly and more inflationary than price increases on the commodities subsidized.

I was the first Member of Congress to condemn the coal strike and to predict its dire consequences. Although a truce has been called, our troubles are not nearly over. Even if the strike is settled without further loss of production, reconversion has been greatly retarded. As of this week the coal strike had reduced our steel production alone by 50 per cent. RAISE FEWER CHICKS TO CONSERVE GRAIN JSDA RECOMMENDS

To save grain this spring farmers in general were asked to feed less grain to livestock, and poultry farmers were asked to raise fewer chickens.

Of course, the number of chicks hatched during January, February, March and April differs very little from year to year, but it is the number of chicks hatched after April which really determines whether the year's hatch is big or little compared to other years.

Now that nearly all farmers order baby chicks from the hatchery advanced booking at the hatchery are fairly good indications of production. U.S.D.A. reports of booking for this year indicate that the hatch during April and May and probably June will run much smaller than last year. Hatcherymen anticipate a short season and are trying to avoid over production.

Police Program For Traffic Safety



Since the end of gas rationing, traffic deaths have mounted alarmingly. In 1945, 28,500 persons were killed, 1,000,000 injured. There will be a much higher toll in 1946 unless all car owners drive safely and carefully in cars that are in safe mechanical condition. To curb the slaughter, the International Association of Chiefs of Police will launch a six week Traffic Safety Check program on May 15. The program will be conducted in all parts of the United States and Canada, with police officers checking the brakes, lights, tires, windshield wipers and horns of cars involved in accidents or traffic violations. Drivers are urged by the police to drive safely and courteously in cars that are mechanically sound, in order to reduce the shameful toll of automobile accidents.

GAS COMPANY WILL SPEND MILLIONS ON IMPROVED SERVICES

Growth of the territory served by Lone Star Gas Company demands expenditures of millions of dollars in service facilities this year, D.A. Hulcy, president of the company has announced. **Isolate Mumps Cases
To Prevent Contagion,
Health Officer Warns**

AUSTIN, TEXAS.— With a total of 5,906 cases of mumps having been reported in Texas in the first seventeen weeks of this year, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a statement stressing the fact that the contagion factor exists before the symptoms appear, and urging strict isolation of all patients, in order to control the spread of this disease.

Mumps is transmitted by direct contact with an infected person and with articles freshly soiled by the secretions or discharges from the mouth or nose of persons having the disease. It takes 12 to 26 days for mumps to manifest itself after the infection takes place. The disease can be easily transmitted, but one attack usually establishes immunity although second attacks some times occur.

"The patient suffering with this disease should be isolated from other members of the family immediately upon the suspicion that mumps exists, and the family physician should be called promptly," Dr. Cox advises. "In the meantime, complete rest in bed is indicated. The doctor's orders should be followed strictly. Violating his instructions can lead to serious injury which may permanently affect the individual's health."

This will be effective until January 1, 1947. I have the forms for reinstatement and will be glad to furnish any veteran with one, who wishes to reinstate his insurance."

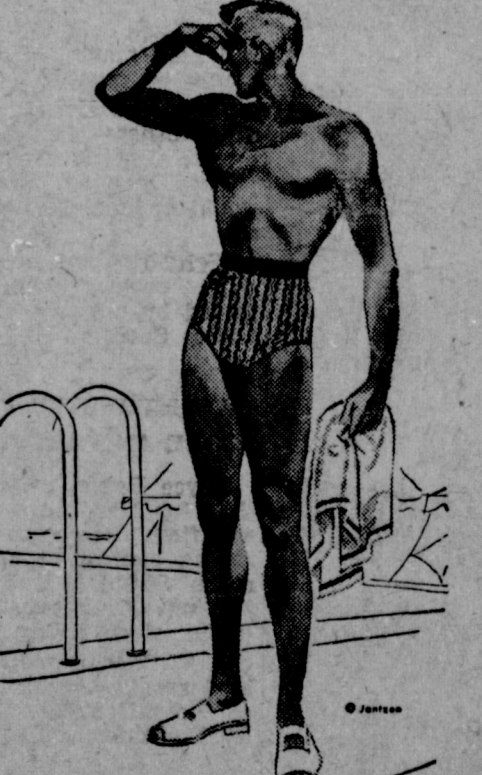
