

## City cuts paving project to balance budget

Taking on a couple of projects that hadn't been planned for in Muenster's City budget created a deficit. Knowing the carefulness of the Mayor in trying to keep a balanced budget, and realizing that some recently completed projects were not in the 2006 budget, Street Commissioner John Pagel said he'd discussed ways of cutting the deficit now existing in Muenster's budget. Those included the new City storage building, a proposed fence to go around the City yard, and repair to the Park street where it was curbed.

"There are a number of this year's paving projects that are marginal," Pagel noted. "They are going to need doing eventually. They're not in any kind of bad shape." He said he'd rather see the work done at the Park.

According to Pagel, the Street budget this year is \$132,000. He then defined which projects he felt needed to be done and which could wait.

City Council members were divided on their opinions of the use of hot mix on some streets and oil and chip on others, especially if Maple Street by the Park received hot mix. Another mix of opinions were expressed on the proposed fence around the City yard. The old one, which was considered very unsightly by some, had been taken down while the new building was constructed. Some wanted an all-new fence that was more attractive. Others felt that the old one should be put back and only replaced where necessary.

Gary Fisher stated on the fence, "It doesn't look pretty, but if you are talking about taking any money away from maintaining the streets, you are crazy to put up the fence. It doesn't make sense." He said the priority should be the streets where people live.

It was unanimously agreed to pave with hot mix Maple Street from Fifth Street to

Seventh Street; Second Street from Main to Oak; Oak Street from Hwy. 82 to Fourth Street and to pave with oil and chip the road through the City Park and Maple Street from Hwy. 82 to Cross Street. The City hopes to get assistance with the Park paving from Precinct #4, as it did on Ash Street. This saves money as it only costs the City the expense of the materials. There is \$15,000 budgeted for Park paving.

Building inspection policies were set as submitted. All buildings being built or remodeled within the City limits or its Extra-Territorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) will be required to have a building permit and to be inspected by a certified building inspector. The City contracted with Bureau Veritas at the last meeting to perform the building code inspections. Certain small buildings without gas or plumbing are not required to have inspections. This requirement is now in effect.

Rick Hanning, TXU public relations manager, informed the Council that with the adoption of the Building Code Inspections, TXU would no longer be able to set a meter until the City provides them with an inspection report. City Manager Stan Endres said that it wouldn't be a problem and had already been discussed with Bureau Veritas.

Mayor Weinzapfel called an election for three Council positions. Those holding terms that expire this May are Gary Fisher in Place 1; John Pagel in Place 2; and Jewel Otto in Place 4. Anyone interested in seeking election to one of these positions can file at City Hall between Feb. 13 and March 13.

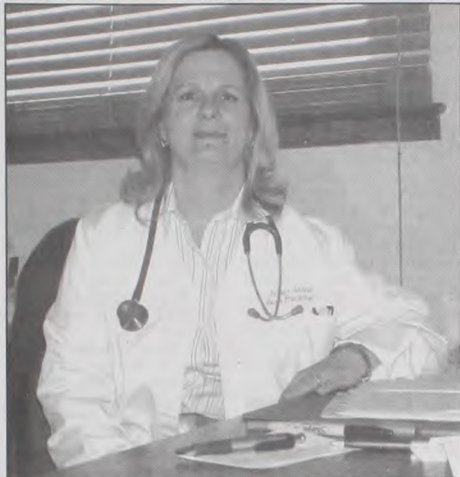
Bids were opened on materials for the new fence around the City yard - all new fence and partial fence. Community Lumber submitted the only materials bid. It was for \$6,329.15 or about \$9 a foot with three gates included.

There were two bids on the labor to install the fence. Earl Charles bid \$9.50 per linear foot on the six-foot cyclone fence. Jon Anderle bid \$811.25 for 255 feet of fence that must be replaced and for the other 318 feet \$938.10 or a total of \$1,749.35.

Fisher said he didn't think that what was installed had to be pretty since it would just get run into anyway. Pagel countered, "It would be a disgrace for the City to do a half ass job."

The bid from Community was approved 4-0-1 with Pagel abstaining. Anderle's bid was approved unanimously.

## Yvonne Ambrose joins hometown medical staff

Muenster Memorial Hospital and Family Health Clinic have announced the addition of skilled health care professional Yvonne Ambrose, FNP-C, ACNP-C to their staff. She began her work hours with Muenster Hospital on Monday, Feb. 6.

"The Board, the Physicians, and the employees are all very pleased to have Yvonne join our local medical family," remarked MMH Administrator Lynn Heller. "For a little over two years, I have been observing the care and love our staff gives our patients. For the most part it is local folks taking care of local folks. Yvonne brings this same caring attitude towards her job, and her joining our medical community is indeed a win win for the hospital, the clinic, and for the people of this area of North Texas."

Since 1974, Yvonne has worked as a registered nurse primarily in the critical care setting taking care of a wide variety of critically ill pa-

tients. The patients suffered from acute illnesses such as heart, lung, gastrointestinal, circulatory problems, heart attacks, respiratory distress, bleeding, high blood pressure, strokes, and diabetic emergencies. "Although as a nurse I was not prescribing the care, I was delivering the care, and this gave me valuable on the job training for what I do now," she related.

Yvonne decided to further her medical education and enrolled in the nurse practitioner program at the University of Texas at Arlington. She graduated from there in 1998. She is now nationally board certified in family practice and acute care and has practiced in both since becoming certified.

"I believe the most important work that I do as a nurse practitioner is in disease prevention," Yvonne commented. "By identifying and modifying risk factors that cause serious illness in a patient's lifetime, a person is able to

## Freeman to seek re-election to Cooke County Judge seat

Cooke County Judge Freeman is seeking re-election as Cooke County judge, planning to move his public service career into a third decade.

"My 27-plus years of service as a county official have equipped me to be able to handle the many different situations that arise in the County Judge's office. My experience locally with county government, plus statewide government, has equipped me to understand county government from top to bottom," he said.

Judge Freeman, who had served as a justice of the

peace for 23 years, was appointed to the County's top post in 2001 to fulfill an unexpired term. He was elected to a full term in 2002.

Along with the County's top job comes the responsibility of managing a budget of roughly \$18 million, something Judge Freeman says is a balancing act.

"It is not always a popular job, but it is always a hard job to make sure that each facet of county government is funded sufficiently to operate. And while budget decisions rarely make everyone happy, some choices prove them-

selves profitable down the road," he said.

Judge Freeman cited the creation of the position of emergency management coordinator in 2002, the current

construction of a new 212-bed jail, work on new EMS stations and restoration of the courthouse.

"I want to finish all the projects we've started. I want to continue to bring the information technology age to Cooke County for better accessibility by the public for county services and we need to plan for the future by further expanding our EMS stations, updating our County Library, and increasing subsidies for our County volunteer firefighters. In addition, I will continue to encourage the Commissioners' Court to advance our commitment to the law and order priorities of the County," he said.

Judge Freeman is a member of Hillcrest Church of Christ. He is married to Rae Freeman and has eight children, 18 grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

## Filing time nears for local candidates

With local elections scheduled to take place on Saturday, May 13, it is time for anyone considering a position on a local entity to file. Saturday, Feb. 11 is the first day to file an application for a place on a local ballot. Most offices are only open Monday through Friday, so it will probably be Monday before applications can be filed. The final day to file is Monday, March 13 at 5 p.m.

Muenster City Council has three positions open. They are Place #1 now held by Gary Fisher; Place #2 held by John Pagel; and Place #4 held by Jewel Otto.

Muenster Memorial Hospital also has three positions open. It is an at large election with the three candidates with the most votes being elected to the board. The three board

members with terms expiring in May are Kenny Klement, Dr. Walter Knight, and Dan Hamric.

The Lindsay City Council also holds an at large election for its aldermen. There are two aldermen positions up for election and also the position of mayor. Currently serving as mayor is Steven K. Zwinggi. Aldermen with expiring terms are Wilbert "Sonny" Block and Robin Rose. Packets will be available at Lindsay City Hall for candidates beginning Monday.

Lindsay ISD will be accepting applications for two candidate positions. Those seats are currently held by Bruce Bezner and Lloyd Reiter.

Most entities have the option of canceling an election if there is no opposition in an election. Elections are usually only called if there is at least one candidate with an opponent or for the Hospital District, more than three candidates for the Board.

Seniors Neil Bayer and Joelle Fuhrmann led the effort for the Sacred Heart Tiger Sharks at the 2006 TAPPS State Diving and Swimming finals held at the Jamail Texas Swimming Center on the University of Texas campus in Austin.

## Linn found dead Tuesday at home south of Muenster

After being contacted by a relative on Tuesday, Feb. 7, Muenster Police Chief Bob Stovall and Deputy Mark Westbrook found the body of Russell Jack Linn in his home south of Muenster.

Stovall said he was contacted by Linn's sister after she could not get in touch with him. Stovall and Westbrook proceeded to the house to conduct a welfare check and discovered the 76

year old man dead from an apparent gunshot wound to the head at about 1 p.m. Justice of the Peace Precinct 4 John Roane and Cooke County investigators were summoned to the scene where Roane pronounced Linn dead.

Roane sent Linn's body to the Southwest Institute of Forensic Science in Dallas for an autopsy and noted that the death occurred from the gunshot wound.

In May of 1944 their lives radically changed. My mother Christina died, leaving Daddy with eight children... Daddy was holding the baby of three weeks. He said... nothing other to do but have them go to an orphanage. Aunt Dora Henschel stood up and said "As long as I have life in my body, these children will not go to an orphanage. Joe, give me baby Robert." Aunt Theresa said "I



Theresa Hesse can take little Jane... "In 1952, I wanted to enter the convent. One condition was made: that I find a place for my younger brother and sisters. Bernard, Caroline, and Edna were welcomed by

Aunt Theresa without hesitation. Aunt Theresa was a universal lover of children. She was not partial to anyone..."

live a long, healthy life feeling energetic, productive, and ultimately reduce their overall lifetime health care costs."

As an example of what she was referring to, Yvonne cited menopausal and perimenopausal women who are at risk for osteoporosis and the likely sequela of bone fractures that can result in pain, surgery, and loss of mobility. "This is a common problem affecting women," said Yvonne. "This needs to be addressed in a woman's 40s and 50s in order to prevent these effects in their 70s or 80s. Osteoporosis can affect men as well, and long-term steroid users are also at risk.

have until Jan. 1, 2007 to get the certification. Included will be members of the Public Library Board and the Water District Board. The information is also available on the Attorney General's website.

Curbing in the Park is completed. The cost was about \$20,000. Endres said it looked like they'd done a real good job.

Ira Schoppa is nearing completion of the new City map. The cost to the City is

\$5,000. He had been working on it for about a year and a half.

Water and sewer are now available to the Jerry Fleitman subdivision and it is ready for purchase and building on.

A slab was poured for the City's generator and is ready for the generator to be hooked up.

Endres noted that letters have been sent to businesses regarding Back Flow Prevention. There have been many phone calls from businesses not knowing what it is about. TCEQ has offered to hold a meeting to explain the situation. It was decided to get more information and have it published in the newspaper.

"Anything that has to do with the drinking supply, there is no grandfathering allowed any way," Endres stressed. "When it comes to your drinking water, it doesn't matter how long anything has been there, if it is not in compliance, it's not grandfathered in."

Main Street in Muenster is without a streetlight since Thursday afternoon. A crane going through town hit the light, knocking it down. An insurance claim will be filed.

Endres remarked, "The big problem is that the thing got pretty banged up and we probably won't be able to fix it. The highway department has been telling us for several years that we are supposed to take that thing down."

Jewel Otto noted that it was noticeable Saturday night at church that the light wasn't there. There was a lot of confusion.

Endres said he doesn't think that the highway department will help to put up another one. A new one must be like the one at the intersection of Main and Hwy. 82. It would cost about \$80,000.

The following is the essay he wrote under the title "Who Are Today's Patriots?":

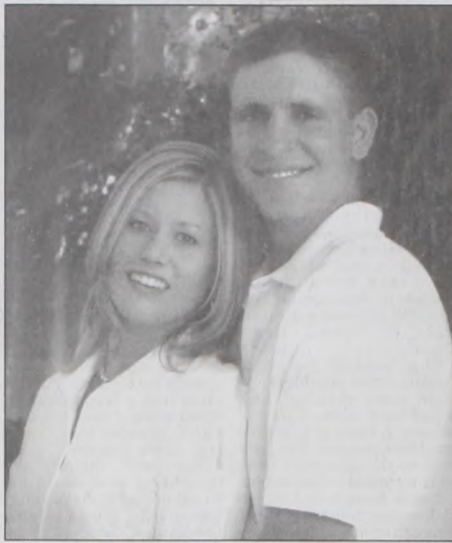

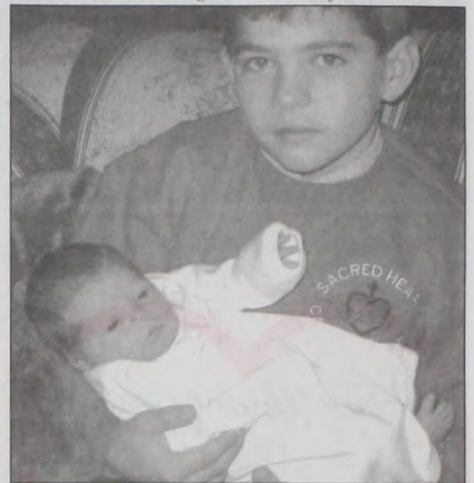

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## Warning signs of carbon monoxide poisoning

The carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning incident recently that sent 13 Dallas residents to hospitals is all too common. Each year, more than 250 people die and 10,000 seek medical attention after accidental carbon monoxide poisoning, primarily because they don't recognize the warning signs of exposure or because their residence is among the 80% of U.S. homes that don't have a CO alarm. If not maintained or used properly, gas-burning appliances such as water heaters, ranges, and clothes dryers as well as fire places, gas or kerosene space heaters and oil and gas furnaces can generate CO.

Safety experts at Underwriters Laboratories (UL), the not-for-profit product safety testing organization, are offering advice for consumers on CO, often called the silent killer.

John Drengenberg, manager of consumer affairs for UL, said, "One way to protect yourself and your family is to install UL-Listed CO alarms. They're designed to detect elevated levels of CO and sound an alarm to alert you and your family of a potential poisoning risk."

The UL safety professionals suggest consumers take the following measures to prevent CO poisoning:

Have a qualified technician inspect fuel-burning appliances at least once each year. Fuel-burning appliances such as furnaces, hot water heaters, and stoves require yearly maintenance. Over time, components can become damaged or deteriorate. A qualified technician can identify and repair problems with your fuel-burning appliances.

Be alert to the danger signs that signal a CO problem: streaks of carbon or soot around the service door of your fuel-burning appliances; the absence of a draft in your chimney; excessive rusting on flue pipes or appliance jackets; moisture collecting on the windows and walls of furnace rooms; fallen soot from the fireplace; small amounts of water leaking from the base of the chimney, vent or flue pipe; damaged or discolored bricks at the top of your chimney and rust on the portion of the vent pipe visible from outside your home.

Be aware that CO poisoning may be the cause of flu-like symptoms such as headaches, tightness of chest, dizziness, fatigue, confusion and breathing difficulties. Because CO poisoning often causes a victim's blood pressure to rise, the victim's skin may take on a pink or red cast.

Install a UL Listed CO detector outside sleeping areas. A UL Listed CO detector will sound an alarm before dangerous levels of CO accumulate. CO indicator cards and other devices are also intended to detect elevated levels of CO, but most are not equipped with an audible alarm, and cannot wake you at night, when most CO poisonings occur.

Read the manufacturer's instructions carefully before installing a CO detector. Do not place the detector within five feet of household chemicals. If your detector is wired directly into your home's electrical system, you should test it monthly. If your unit operates off of a battery, test the detector weekly and replace the battery at least once a year.

Avoid placing your detector directly on top of or directly across from fuel-burning appliances. These appliances will emit some CO when initially turned-on. Never use charcoal grills inside a home, tent, camper, or unventilated garage. Don't

leave vehicles running in an enclosed garage, even to "warm up" your car on a cold morning.

Know how to respond to a CO detector alarm. If your alarm sounds, immediately open windows and doors for ventilation. If anyone in the home is experiencing symptoms of CO poisoning — headache, dizziness or other flu-like symptoms — immediately evacuate the house and call the fire department. If no one is experiencing these symptoms, continue to ventilate, turn off fuel-burning appliances, and call a qualified technician to inspect your heating system and appliances as soon as possible.

Because you have provided ventilation, the CO buildup may have dissipated by the time help responds and your problem may appear to be temporarily solved. Do not operate any fuel-burning appliances until you have clearly identified the source of the problem. A CO detector alarm indicates elevated levels of CO in the home. Never ignore the alarm.

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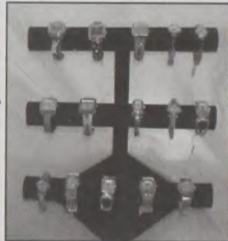

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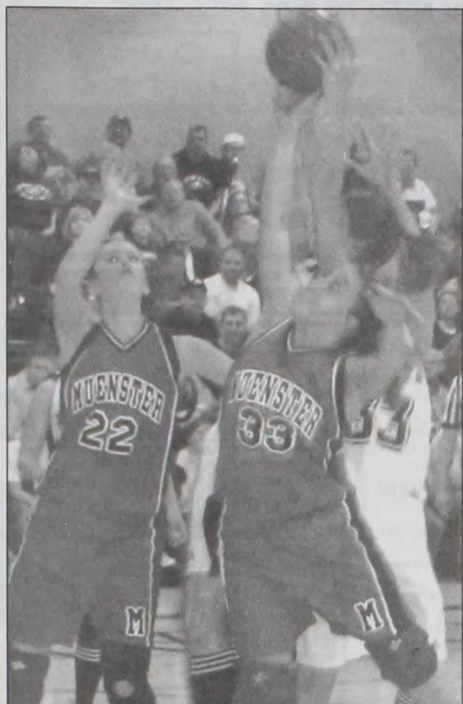
