The curbing of driveways Seventh Street; Second Street from Main to Oak; Oak Street from Hwy. 82 to Fourth Street and to pave with oil and chip the road through the City Park and Maple Street from Hwy. 82 to Cross Street. The City hopes to get assistance with the Park paving from Precinct #4, as it did on Ash Street. This saves money as it only costs the City the ex-pense of the materials. There is \$15,000 budgeted for Park paving.

The City contracted with Bu-reau Veritas at the last meet-ing to perform the building code inspections. Certain small buildings without gas or plumbing are not required to have inspections. This re-quirement is now in effect.



Be aware that CO poisoning may be the cause of flu-like symptoms such as headaches, tightness of chest, dizziness, fatigue, confusion and breathing difficulties.
 Because CO poisoning often causes a victim's blood pressure to rise, the victim's skin may take on a pink or red cast.
 Install a UL Listed CO

A UL Listed CO detector will sound an alarm before dangerous levels of CO accumulate. Bead the manufacturer's installing a CO detector Do not place the detector within five feet of household whendals. If your detector is whould test it monthly. If your unit operates off of a battery, test the detector weekly and relace the battery at least once a year.

replace the battery at least once a year. Avoid placing your detector directly on top of or directly across from fuel-burning appliances. These appliances will emit some CO when initially turned-on. Never use charcoal grills inside a home, tent, camper, or unventilated garage. Don't

Fire ants still around despite lack of mounds

The mild winter has plants and flowers confused. Many are already leafing, budding, and blooming. And that has many homeowners starting their spring yard rituals early.

Extension entomologists said one thing every homeowner should continue doing this spring is treat for fire ants. They said it's the one thing homeowners may not think about doing right now because the usual tell-tale signs of fire ants are missing.

how obtained in the same in the signs of fire ants are missing. "Fire ants are subterranean, so when you have a drought it just forces them to go deeper and deeper into the soil until they find a water table they can use for a source of water," said Kim Engler, Texas Cooperative Extension Program Specialist-Urban Integrated Pest Management. Engler said mounds that are usually evident in yards are not prevalent this year, because the ants are putting their efforts into burrowing their efforts into burrowing the rainfall that has come in recent weeks has not been enough to entice the ants are to move back closer to the surface.

move back surface. Engler said fire ants emerge only in search of food, and that means they are still a potential hazard for anyone working or relaxing in yards where the ants have made busic home.

round despite la "We recommend the Texas Two Step Method," Engler said. "Step one is to broadcast the fire ant hait over the entire area. Most homeowners can use a handheld spreader, but for large acreage a Herd Seeder (mower-mounted spreader) can be used. Step two is to go back a couple of days later and treat each individual mound." Engler said if homeowners targanular insectications argentar insectication be watered in by rain or with sprinklers. This option will will the fire ants without having to do the additional mounds," Engler said. This option also lasts longer, typically one year, compared to the baits which can last a mouth or several months, but tave to be repeated at least on the source the down side of granular insecticides for source. Engler said just because the focus is on treating yards to keep the fire ant population as low as possible, that doesn't mean fire ants have no redeeming qualities. "Fire ants eat ticks,


