Colostrum management in newborn calves

The immunity a calf attains by consuming colostrum is called passive immunity. Passive immunity is that which is received passively from an outside source; conversely, active immunity is derived from the calf's own body. Newborn calves achieve passive immunity by consuming colostrum shortly after birth. Colostrum is concentrated in essential proteins called immunoglobulins (1g). Many attempts have been made to manage passive immunity in newborn calves. Nonetheless, many calves fail to achieve the important benefits of this critical first meal. When this occurs, calves are considered to have Failure of Passive Transfer (FPT). A strong correlation exists between the incidence of FPT and calf illness and death. The incidence of calf death is increased when blood Ig levels fall. Absorption of Ig must occur before the calf's intestine becomes impermeable to the large Ig proteins. The deoccur before the calf's intes-tine becomes impermeable to the large Ig proteins. The de-velopment of impermeability is called gut closure. Typi-cally, a healthy calf which has access to liquid feed or has consumed colostrum will un-dergo complete gut closure by about 24 hours after birth. The best defense against FPT is good colostrum man-agement, making certain that every newborn calf receives an adequate amount of qual-ity Ig soon after birth. Immunoglobulin may be fed to calves using a nipple

consume three to four liters of colostrum within a few hours of birth.

If a producer wishes to provide a larger volume, or if the calf is unable or unwilling to suckle, an esophageal feeder may be used. The esophageal feeder is a long, narrow, rigid tube, which is inserted down the esophagus of the newborn calf. A bottle or bag attached to the other end of the tube contains the fluid, which, upon release, flows into the calf. The use of an esophageal feeder has been associated with a slight decrease in the efficiency of Ig absorption; nevertheless, it provides a quick and simple method for ensuring delivery of Ig to

In the past it has been acceptable for producers with Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) pesticide licenses to apply continuing education units (CEUs) earned in January or February to either the preceding licensing period, depending which would best suit the individual's CEU requirements. As of last fall, there has been a rule change. At that time TDA stated that Private Applicator licenses would be renewable five years after the date of issuance, and Commercial Applicator licenses will be renewable one year from the date of issuance, throughout the year. This is in contrast to the old law of all applicator licenses being renewable on Feb. 28.

With the change in renewal date, the rule that had allowed producers the flexibility to apply CEUs to the preceding or the following licensing period has changed. License holders may now only apply CEUs to the timeframe in which they are offered. Extra hours may not be carried over into the next licensing period.

pesticides on the food chain and on the ecosystem. It is a good idea to utilize organic practices. However, using some ammonium sulfate or superphosphate can sometimes be very beneficial. Synthetic fertilizers are not pesticides; they are not toxic, and when the nutrients dissolve, it makes no difference whether they came from a natural or synthetic source. Using fungicides is also practical and necessary from time to time.

Many people perceive organic gardening as a away of achieving the state of ecological purity. For them, organic gardening is partly a set of positive practices, but equally a set of prohibitions: practices and substances that must never be permitted in the garden. One should only utilize those practices that make sense and seem to be beneficial. The basic concepts of organic gardening are very effective.

First and foremost is the practice of building soil through adding organic matter in bulk. This really works. At one time, it was more or less believed that the right combination of chemical fertilizers, plus perhaps mineral particles of the proper size, were all the supplements a soil would need. Some success can be achieved that way. It is much more practical and effective to condition the soil with organic matter In quantity, organic matter In quantity, organic matter not only at the control of the proper size, were all the supplements a soil would need. Some success can be achieved that way. It is much working with it, rather than against that have a fighting chance of survival in your locality. To be sure, some will need extra attention, extra water, or modifications to the soil, but choosing water-wise, adapted plants should be the backbone of your garden. This also applies to placing plants within the landscape, noting sun, drainage, and soil conditions that are already present and working with them.
