

Luttmer recovering from war injuries

Administration's decision backed by MISD Board

Talk around town last week caused over 25 extra participants to attend last Wednesday's regular meeting of the Muenster ISD Board of Trustees. Due to the 15 minute time limit of open discussion, only seven in the audience were able to speak. Voicing concerns on the reassignment of Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Monte Endress to another position in the district, began with past Board member Wanda Flusche who noted that the transfer was "not professional."

wounded. He is now recovering in a military hospital at
Fort Hood.

Luttmer serves as a medic in the Army, He's been in the military more than five years. The first time he went to Iraq was for a whole year. He was again deployed to Iraq in early March this year.

On March 27, there was indirect fire on the base where Luttmer is stationed in Iraq. He sustained injuries to his lower leg. Both bones were broken close to the ankle.

The first treatment he re-

were broken close to the ankle.

The first treatment he received came from two other soldiers who did what Luttmer directed them to do for the injuries. "I was telling them what to do to my leg and what not. From there I got evaced on a truck up to the hospital that was on the same base," Luttmer recalled. "Then I got evaced out on a helicopter from there to a hospital in Baghdad." After Baghdad he returned to the military hospital at Fort Hood.

Luttmer said he is doing

Luttmer said he is doing fairly well. He currently has an infection in his wound. They discovered that he got it in Iraq. Besides being treated for that, Luttmer's leg is in a cast. He said he will have to wear the cast for about eight weeks. Rehab is the next step after the cast comes off. "We'll see how much I get back," he said. "It

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



The Gainesville Main Street Board is hard at work designating four additional buildings as Legends and Lore sites. The first designees to the program are Dustin Office Machines, Kinne's Jewelers, Sarah's on the Square, and the Lindsay House. Inaugurated Oct. 13, 2007, Legends and Lore celebrates the significant history of architecture in the Gainesville Main Street District. Buildings designated by Legends and Lore markers offer the historical life of the building and the businesses they housed.

Frank and Elvis Dustin purchased Dustin Office Machines, a stationery business, in July 1932 from W.W. Leverett. The business was operated in conjunction with a newspaper owned by Albert Herrmann by the name of the Gainesville Signal.

Kinne's is one of three Texas jewelers listed in the Jewelers of America 100 Club (over 100 years old). The walk-in vault in the back of the store, which can still be seen today, was purchased from First National Bank in Gainesville during the Great Depression.

"The Energy Star Sales Tax Holiday rewards Texans for choosing the most energy efficient appliances available and helping conserve the state's vital energy resources," Combs said. "Appliances that have earned the Energy Star label from the U.S. Department of Energy and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency use 10-50 % less energy and water than other models."

The Energy Star Sales Tax Holiday applies only to the following appliances and household equipment: air conditioners priced less than \$6,000, ceiling fans, dehumidifiers, dishwashers, incandescent, and fluorescent light bulbs, programmable thermostats, refrigerators priced less than \$2,000, and clothes washers, but not clothes dryers. Energy Star does not label clothes dryers, because most models use about the same amount of energy.

It ain't ethanol's fault

Wow, food prices are skyrocketing and it's all
ethanol's fault.
How easily that rolls off
the tongue. Ethanol. Evil
ethanol. It not only makes
grocery costs higher, but it's

In short, ethanol—once

In short, ethanol—once considered the White Knight of the energy crisis—is being considered by many in the national media and at least one major Texas newspaper as the Evil Lord of renewable energy.

I wish I could tell you what's happening. I'm dumbfounded.

Sure, the demand for ethanol has raised corn prices, but there are a whole lot of other factors in there that I'll discuss later. Sure, those higher corn prices have been tough on the cattle industry, but that has yet to translate to higher beef prices at the grocery store. And I'd be telling you

a lie if I said ethanol hasn't contributed to higher food prices, because it has—but only by a smidgen.

The real culprit behind higher food prices is \$100-plus and rising every day barrels of oil. And don't just take my word for it. Common sense and a new study by the International Food & Policy Center at Texas A&M University confirm that the underlying force driving changes in the agricultural industry, along with the economy and food prices as a whole, is not ethanol, but higher energy prices.

Think about that and it makes sense. Look how everything related to food is tied somehow to the cost of energy. Trucks and trains move the food supply within our nation's border. As the cost of energy soars, so does the price of energy-dependent processing and packaging. As energy prices skyrocket, so do the input costs such as fertilizers and diesel for farmers.




