Fr. Ken Robinson arrives to serve Sacred Heart Parish

After months without a pastor, Sacred Heart Parish was excited to welcome Fr. Ken Robinson, a diocesan priest. He arrived in Muenster to fill the position of pastor just after the first of the year.

"I came here to serve," remarked Fr. Ken when asked if he had any plans or goals for Sacred Heart Parish. "Usually the bishop tells you when you are transferred, at least Bishop Delaney did, and I'm sure Bishop Vann would agree, 'First of all, if at all possible, you don't change anything for a year.' And you didn't come to change in the first place; you came simply to serve the people where they are. I have no plans for any change whatsoever."

In the past, Benedictine priests and then Augustinians served Sacred Heart Parish. Fr. Tom Craig was in Muenster for three years between the Benedictines and the Augustinians.

Fr. Ken explained the difference between an order priest and a diocesan priest. He said, "An order priest takes his vows to the community and they take vows of obedience to that community. They take vows of poverty - that means they don't own anything, and a vow of chastity meaning they don't marry. A diocesan priest makes his vows to the local bishop. They take a vow of chastity, but they don't take a vow of poverty. We supposedly understand it to be a vow of poverty of spirit in the sense that we seek not to be controlled by possessions, but technically, a diocesan priest can own things." As an example he said he owns his car.

tended Baylor University where he earned a degree in secondary education for history, English, and microbiology. His next step in education was to attend Ohio State University in Athens. There he earned a Master's degree in History.

Since teachers were not in demand at the time he was ready to begin a teaching career, Fr. Ken decided to use his microbiology degree. He said he worked some small private labs in Fort Worth. He then worked at St. Joseph's Hospital and then in the blood bank at Parkland Hospital in Dallas. From there he entered the seminary.


Fr. Ken's parents are no longer living, but he has two sisters, one in San Antonio and the other in Oregon, and a brother in Oklahoma.

Explaining what inspired him to become a priest, Fr. Ken noted, "I wasn't born into a Catholic family. I have an aunt who's Catholic, but I didn't grow up as Catholic. I entered the Catholic Church as an adult. There were a number of priests who were important for me when I began looking at the Catholic faith and a number of friends as well. In college, one of my roommates was Catholic. So its been a series of people over the years that I've known and then just that slow process of thinking that maybe that's what I would do with my life. Slow over the time, but pervasive."

At the age of 18, Fr. Ken began attending Mass. He was attending college at Baylor, the world's largest Baptist university, he said. He actually entered the Church in 1985 in St. Rita's in Fort Worth. One and a half years later he entered the seminary. There were members of Fr. Ken's mostly Baptist family who were not very happy with his decision to become a Catholic and certainly not with his being a priest. "My mother was very supportive," recalls Fr. Ken. 'She said, 'If that's what the Lord is calling you to do, then that's what you need to do.'"

He hesitated to do anything that would upset the family, particularly his grandfather who died in 1978. He said his grandmother was not unhappy about his decision, but a bit disappointed. "She would have prefer

MMH Census shows high patient count

Readying another room for patients topped the priority list at Muenster Memorial Hospital last week. With the patient count at 14 or 15 many days recently, MMH Administrator Lynn Heller informed the Board at the Jan. 23 meeting, "We're very busy. In fact, we are having troubles finding rooms for everybody." They have been juggling patients to make the best use of available beds. He said hospitals used to consider 80% full as being full. He said MMH is running pretty full. Rooms 101 and 102 are now ready for use, and had patients in them the night of the Board meeting. Administrator Heller said that made 18 beds available for patients use and that is the number that the Hospital is licensed to have.

Board member Mary Dangelmayr inquired if it would be possible to open more rooms. Heller said that they are currently discussing that option. It would mean getting surveyed by the Department of Health, etc. To accomplish it, people would have to be moved around. Heller then described several possibilities that would open more rooms. At one time the Hospital had 32 beds available.

During December, MMH Health Clinic recorded 554 patient visits. Home Health made 448 home visits. There were 351 outpatient visits made at the Hospital and 116

In December there were 15 acute care patients admitted for a total of 87 patients days. The average daily census was 2.81 and average length of stay was 3.63. Financials for December

showed revenues over expense of \$176,160. Fiscal year to date revenue over expense is \$399,807. In December 2005, the revenue over expense was \$230,101 and the year to date was \$278,791.

Heller reported that the Hospital is again providing meals for employees. The practice was stopped a number of years ago due to the cost factor. "They have to buy a meal ticket," he said. "We get quite a bit of participation. Well be tracking that real close to see if that is a budget neutral type of deal."

Board member John Aytes noted that when they stopped providing meals, the dietary expense dropped \$40,000. He said, "I am forecasting that it will be considerably higher, but it's one of the benefits." Heller said it is a good benefit to keep people there. Cost of the meal varies according to what they order, and the food is served to them by the dietary staff.

Board members whose terms expire this May are James Walterscheid, John Aytes, and Angelo Nasche. Feb. 10 is the first day that a candidate may file for election to the Board, and Monday, March 12 at 5 p.m. is the last day to file. Dear Editor:

The Mandamus suit we filed last week has been mischaracterized as being one brought by the District Attorney against the District Judge. The party bringing the suit is the State of Texas (Herman Williams is the criminal defendant). This is called a Mandamus and this is a type of appeal. Judges usually take no personal interest in proceedings in the appellate court. It is even rarer for a Judge to have their own private attorney in a Mandamus. Herman Williams will have his own attorney that will be saying the same thing that the Judge's attorney would say. In fact, there is a Mandamus currently pending against a visiting judge because a defendant did not like something about a judgment. This judge did not retain his own attorney. We are simply asking the Court of Appeals to determine if the Judge's rulings in a criminal case exceeded the law, e.g. she is ordering that scientists write a summary of their testimony and that this be provided to the defense attorneys well in advance of trial and she is ordering us to create reports that don't exist. We have already agreed to provide everything that the law requires and more through our open file policy. Under the Judge's orders we are required to provide copies of items to the defense attorneys that they have already had access to in our files; and deliver these copies to the defense attorney's offices (many of whom are out-of-county). If the requested items are not provided, the Judge has indicated that the evidence will be excluded at trial. We are compelled to do the Mandamus because case law supports our position that the rulings exceed the scope of the Judge's authority. We are seeking relief from a time consuming and expensive chore that sets up unnecessary technicalities for the criminal defense attorneys. We don't know of any other Judge in the State requiring this level of response. If the appellate court does not rule in our favor, the District Attorney's Office will need additional personnel and funds to comply with the judge's orders. The b

continued. We had no further recourse but to file the Mandamus.

A ruling like this encourages criminal defense attorneys to drag their cases out and not resolve them timely.

Criminal defendants appeal all the time and the Judge does not get personally involved in those cases. We simply think the Judge is giving the criminal defendants too much and that it is jeopardizing criminal cases and we are appealing that ruling.

It will make Cooke County a safer place if the District Attorney's Office prevails in the Mandamus as the backlog will continue to shrink and criminal cases will reach trial faster.

Stay alert for Hessian Fly
With higher wheat prices, many producers may be contemplating harvesting more wheat for grain than usual here in Cooke County. Prior to making this decision, producers should consider the likelihood of infestation by the Hessian fly. The Hessian fly came from Russia and was first reported in the United States in 1779. Hessian fly is thought to have been introduced into the United States in wheat beddingstraw used by Hessian troops during the Revolutionary War. Within 120 years of its introduction into New York state, this insect had spread into most of the eastern and midwestern United States and as far west as Washington state.

In the northern Blacklands of Texas, continuous wheat breeding has been winning the battle against the pest since 1955. But by 2000, the flies had overcome four of the latest primary wheat resistance genes that had protected wheat successfully since 1986. Some Hessian fly damage has been noticed in Cooke County wheat fields each of the last three years. Injury to wheat is caused by Hessian fly larvae feeding on stem tissue at the crown of young plants or just above the nodes on jointed wheat. The extent of injury generally is greater in newly emerged or younger seedling than in older, established plants. Larval feeding stunts infested tillers, broadening leaves and turning them a darker green. Significant grain losses can be expected when the number of stems infested exceeds 5-8% in fall or 20% in spring. Serious infestations may lead to thin wheat stands with poorer yields and more weed problems than in healthy stands.

Additionally, Hessian-fly feeding weakens wheat stems at feeding sites and may cause significant lodging or stem breakage, resulting in harvesting difficulties. Larval feeding also can interfere

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with nutrient flow to wheat heads during kernel formation, resulting in reduced grain quantities and quality. Some wheat varieties are resistant to certain Hessian fly populations but are susceptible to others. Unique populations for races) of Hessian flies are called biotypes; biotypes result from genetic changes that allow flies to feed and survive on different varieties of wheat. Sixteen Hessian fly biotypes are known to occur in the United States. Knowing which biotypes are present in an area can help growers select wheat varieties known to be resistant to those specific biotypes. The most reliable way to identify Hessian fly infestations in seedling plants involves digging plants out from the soil and carefully pulling apart tillers, looking for white larvae or brown pupa attached to the base of the tillers in the crown. Leaf sheaths should be pulled back to expose larvae and pupae on stems. In the spring, larvae and pupae are found at the base of tillers in the crown but also may be present at the nodes. Again, leaf sheaths must be pulled back to expose Hessian flies feeding on stems. Strategies for managing Hessian fly infestations of wheat include variety resistance, delayed planting, seed treatments, destruction of volunteer wheat, crop rotation, or more information and pictures of damage see http://tcebookstore.org/tmppdfs/16074000-2083.pdf or contact the Extension Office for a copy of "Hessian Fly in Texas Wheat".

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
