

Fr. Ken Robinson arrives to serve Sacred Heart Parish

After months without a pastor, Sacred Heart Parish was excited to welcome Fr. Ken Robinson, a diocesan priest. He arrived in Muenster to fill the position of pastor just after the first of the year.

"I came here to serve," remarked Fr. Ken when asked if he had any plans or goals for Sacred Heart Parish. "Usually the bishop tells you when you are transferred, at least Bishop Delaney did, and I'm sure Bishop Vann would agree. First of all, if at all possible, you don't change anything for a year. And you didn't come to change in the first place; you came simply to serve the people where they are. I have no plans for any change whatsoever."

In the past, Benedictine priests and then Augustinians served Sacred Heart Parish. Fr. Tom Craig was in Muenster for three years between the Benedictines and the Augustinians.

Fr. Ken explained the difference between an order priest and a diocesan priest. He said, "An order priest takes his vows to the community and they take vows of obedience to that community. They take vows of poverty - that means they don't own anything, and a vow of chastity meaning they don't marry. A diocesan priest makes his vows to the local bishop. They take a vow of chastity, but they don't take a vow of poverty. We supposedly understand it to be a vow of poverty of spirit in the sense that we seek not to be controlled by possessions, but technically, a diocesan priest can own things." As an example he said he owns his car.

Also, diocesan priests always serve within the diocese. Order priests can serve anywhere that the order happens to have priests. An order priest might serve in any state or country, whereas a diocesan priest serves within the boundaries of the diocese.

"More and more of our parishes are being taken over by diocesan priests to cover, as in this case, the Augustinians," stated Sacred Heart's new pastor. "They didn't pull out of all the parishes, because they are still in Gainesville and Lindsay, but they pulled out of Sacred Heart. The superior said, 'We don't have anyone to send.'"

Ken Robinson was born in Austria while his father served in the military. The family also lived in Germany and England. Fr. Ken said that he was about 12 years old when his family moved back to North Texas, so he remembers a lot about the time he spent in other countries. As a youth, Fr. Ken attended school at Azle and graduated high school at Castleberry in River Oaks. He then went to Waco and at-

tended Baylor University where he earned a degree in secondary education for history, English, and microbiology. His next step in education was to attend Ohio State University in Athens. There he earned a Master's degree in History.

Since teachers were not in demand at the time he was ready to begin a teaching career, Fr. Ken decided to use his microbiology degree. He said he worked some small private labs in Fort Worth. He then worked at St. Joseph's Hospital and then in the blood bank at Parkland Hospital in Dallas. From there he entered the seminary.

Fr. Ken's parents are no longer living, but he has two sisters, one in San Antonio and the other in Oregon, and a brother in Oklahoma.

Explaining what inspired him to become a priest, Fr. Ken noted, "I wasn't born into a Catholic family, I have an aunt who's Catholic, but I didn't grow up as Catholic. I entered the Catholic Church as an adult. There were a number of priests who were important for me when I began looking at the Catholic faith and a number of friends as well. In college, one of my roommates was Catholic. So it's been a series of people over the years that I've known and then just that slow process of thinking that maybe that's what I would do with my life. Slow over the time, but pervasive."

At the age of 18, Fr. Ken began attending Mass. He was attending college at Baylor, the world's largest Baptist university, he said. He actually entered the Church in 1985 in St. Rita's in Fort Worth. One and a half years later he entered the seminary. There were members of Fr. Ken's mostly Baptist family who were not very happy with his decision to become a Catholic and certainly not with his being a priest. "My mother was very supportive," recalls Fr. Ken. "She said, 'If that's what the Lord is calling you to do, then that's what you need to do.'"

He hesitated to do anything that would upset the family, particularly his grandfather who died in 1978. He said his grandmother was not unhappy about his decision, but a bit disappointed. "She would have preferred if I'd have been a good Baptist, married, and given her lots of granddaughters." She had great-grandsons, but there are no girls in the next generation. He added, "She had knitted all these pink booties and she was looking for a great-granddaughter. It didn't work."

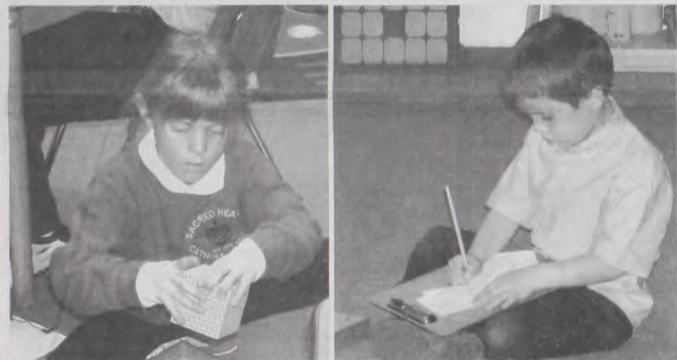
Fr. Ken said that his grandmother died only a few years ago at the age of 102. "My mother died before she did, so I

MMH Census shows high patient count

Readying another room for patients topped the priority list at Muenster Memorial Hospital last week. With the patient count at 14 or 15 many days recently, MMH Administrator Lynn Heller informed the Board at the Jan. 23 meeting, "We're very busy. In fact, we are having troubles finding rooms for everybody." They have been juggling patients to make the best use of available beds. He said hospitals used to consider 80% full as being full. He said MMH is running pretty full. Rooms 101 and 102 are now ready for use, and had patients in them the night of the Board meeting. Administrator Heller said that made 18 beds available for patients use and that is the number that the Hospital is licensed to have.

Board member Mary Dangelmayr inquired if it would be possible to open more rooms. Heller said that they are currently discussing that option. It would mean getting surveyed by the Department of Health, etc. To accomplish it, people would have to be moved around. Heller then described several possibilities that would open more rooms. At one time the Hospital had 32 beds available.

During December, MMH Health Clinic recorded 554 patient visits. Home Health made 448 home visits. There were 351 outpatient visits made at the Hospital and 116

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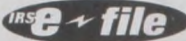

visits to the emergency room. There were 321 total patients days (acute and long term care). In December there were 15 acute care patients admitted for a total of 87 patient days. The average daily census was 2.81 and average length of stay was 3.63. Long-term care patients had nine admissions and eight discharges for a total of 234 patient days. The average length of stay was 39.13 days and the average daily census was 7.55. Combined average daily census was 10.35 and average length of stay was 15.46.

Financials for December

showed revenues over expense of \$176,160. Fiscal year to date revenue over expense is \$399,807. In December 2005, the revenue over expense was \$230,101 and the year to date was \$278,791.

Heller reported that the Hospital is again providing meals for employees. The practice was stopped a number of years ago due to the cost factor. "They have to buy a meal ticket," he said. "We get quite a bit of participation. We'll be tracking that real close to see if that is a budget neutral type of deal."

Board member John Aytes noted that when they stopped providing meals, the dietary expense dropped \$40,000. He said, "I am forecasting that it will be considerably higher, but it's one of the benefits." Heller said it is a good benefit to keep people there. Cost of the meal varies according to what they order, and the food is served to them by the dietary staff.

Board members whose terms expire this May are James Walterscheid, John Aytes, and Angelo Nasche. Feb. 10 is the first day that a candidate may file for election to the Board, and Monday, March 12 at 5 p.m. is the last day to file. Elections will be held on Saturday, May 12, the day that elections are scheduled for contested seats.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

The Mandamus suit we filed last week has been mischaracterized as being one brought by the District Attorney against the District Judge. The party bringing the suit is the State of Texas (Herman Williams is the criminal defendant). This is called a Mandamus and this is a type of appeal. Judges usually take no personal interest in proceedings in the appellate court. It is even rarer for a Judge to have their own private attorney in a Mandamus. Herman Williams will have his own attorney that will be saying the same thing that the Judge's attorney would say. In fact, there is a Mandamus currently pending against a visiting judge because a defendant did not like something about a judgment. This judge did not retain his own attorney. We are simply asking the Court of Appeals to determine if the Judge's rulings in a criminal case exceeded the law, e.g. she is ordering that scientists write a summary of their testimony and that this be provided to the defense attorneys well in advance of trial and she is ordering us to create reports that don't exist. We have already agreed to provide everything that the law requires and more through our open file policy. Under the Judge's orders we are required to provide copies of items to the defense attorneys that they have already had access to in our files; and deliver these copies to the defense attorney's offices (many of whom are out-of-county). If the requested items are not provided, the Judge has indicated that the evidence will be excluded at trial. We are compelled to do the Mandamus because case law supports our position that the rulings exceed the scope of the Judge's authority. We are seeking relief from a time consuming and expensive chore that sets up unnecessary technicalities for the criminal defense attorneys. We don't know of any other Judge in the State requiring this level of response. If the appellate court does not rule in our favor, the District Attorney's Office will need additional personnel and funds to comply with the judge's orders. The bottom line is that it will cost the taxpayers more money in the extra time that is required to provide the documents to which the defense have already had access. I want to protect the citizens from frivolous and unnecessary costs and loopholes that may allow a criminal to walk free.

After numerous court hearings in which we objected and presented the violated law to the Judge, the Judge's orders continued. We had no further recourse but to file the Mandamus.

A ruling like this encourages criminal defense attorneys to drag their cases out and not resolve them timely.

Criminal defendants appeal all the time and the Judge does not get personally involved in those cases. We simply think the Judge is giving the criminal defendants too much and that it is jeopardizing criminal cases and we are appealing that ruling.

It will make Cooke County a safer place if the District Attorney's Office prevails in the Mandamus as the backlog will continue to shrink and criminal cases will reach trial faster.

was pretty much the one who used to visit her and take care of things," he said. On his visits he would take a prayer list from whatever parish he was in and ask her to pray for the people on the list. His grandmother said she couldn't pray for them because they were Catholic and she didn't think it would help. Fr. Ken explained to her that it wasn't a problem and it would work. If he would forget to take the prayer list, she would wonder what she would do that week. "She became very, very influential in my ministry of the sick, at least in the sense that she prayed each week for all of those," he remarked. "Prayer counts; it doesn't matter who gives it."

The first parish that Fr. Ken served was St. Michael's in Bedford. After 18 months, the Bishop asked him to go to St. George, a small inner city parish just off of downtown Fort Worth. He served as pastor at St. George's for three years.

Then the Bishop asked him to go to Grapevine and serve as pastor for St. Francis of Assisi. The pastor he replaced had served there for 36 years. Fr. Ken made his home there for more than nine years.

Bishop Kevin Vann asked him to head north to Muenster. Serving in Muenster hadn't occurred to Fr. Ken, he said, in part because he works with the deaf community in the Diocese. "I am the only priest in the Diocese who signs," he noted. "So, it was a challenge to say yes to here because it's meant some real hardships to the deaf community. He said that since he was at St. George's, whenever someone was needed to visit a deaf person at the hospital or whatever, he could just go, and now it will be more of a challenge."

Fr. Ken said that he visited with the deaf community about the move and they were okay with it even though they wish he could be closer to them.

"It was difficult to leave after nine years," reflected Fr. Ken. "You make a lot of friends, you get to baptize people and children, you see them growing up and First Communion. It's a real nice aspect of religious life to think in terms of walking that journey with families."

Several hobbies bring enjoyment to Fr. Ken. Genealogy is one. "I'm the family genealogist," he commented. "I guess because I'm a History major, I've always been intrigued by the past. My grandmother and my great-grandmother passed on to me a lot of the

things family related, so I'm the genealogist of the family."

Stained glass is another hobby that interests Fr. Ken. He doesn't do large windows, but creates small pieces. He was excited to discover a workshop behind the rectory's garage. Before, he turned part of his kitchen into a workshop. Other hobbies of interest to Fr. Ken are reading and riding his bicycle for exercise, fresh air, and seeing the sites. Going to museums is also an enjoyable pastime for him.

Psalm 131 is Fr. Ken's favorite. "It's important to calm down situations," he explained. "It begins, 'My soul is still like a child on its mother's lap.' When things get really crazy and hectic, and they can, we all at times get so caught up in things that we are swept away by the chaos. It is kind of nice to have that thought to just think okay, calm down; we're going to take care of this. The Lord is there. It's not the end of the world."

Fr. Ken said that his sisters gave him a plaque when he was ordained. He keeps it in his office in every parish. It has the Bible verse from John where they come to him and ask if he is the Messiah. John the Baptist responds, "I am not the Messiah." Father said his sisters wanted to remind him that he shouldn't think he was in charge of anything. "They are right, and I put it in every parish where I am because it is a reminder that, no I am not in charge and I don't control anything. I am not the Messiah, I am here to serve."

Commenting on his new assignment Fr. Ken remarked, "I'm glad to be here. Some people have said to me, 'We

thank you for taking this assignment. We know we are difficult.' I said, 'Folks, everyone has their challenges.' But when the Bishop asked me to come, he called me in the middle of October and asked me to come by and visit with him."

Fr. Ken said he wasn't surprised to be asked to move, because they normally move after six years and sometimes stay a second term of six years. Bishop Delaney was ill at the time that Fr. Ken's six years were up at St. Francis and Bishop Delaney asked him to stay on there unless it was a problem.

Every move that Fr. Ken has made has been at the request of the Bishop. He did request a special place for his first assignment, but didn't get it. "I've always trusted that the Spirit is going to work and it has every time," he said. "Every assignment has been a challenge, but every one has been a very positive experience as well. People are pretty much the same everywhere."

"I'm glad to be here; I truly am." Someone asked Fr. Ken how long he was staying and he said he had absolutely no idea because he goes when the Bishop asks him. Retirement is possible at age 70. "I'm, 58 so I told the bishop, 'After this move, I certainly don't want to move again so you can leave me here for 12 years if you like.'" He said that the Bishop has to see the larger picture of the entire Diocese, not just one parish or one priest. "I take very seriously my vow of obedience to him because someone has to direct that larger scheme. That's what his job is," concluded Fr. Ken.

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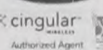
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ID kits to be provided to Texas school children

The Sheriff's Association of Texas has joined efforts with the American Football Coaches Association, FBI's National Child Identification Program, Texas Association of School Administrators (TASA), and the office of Governor Rick Perry to provide ID kits to all Texas children, grades K-6.

This initiative will reach over 2 million children, the fourth largest ID kit distribution in U.S. history.

With the help of Texas sheriffs and superintendents, ID kits will be distributed through the public school systems and sheriff's offices. Students enrolled in the public school system in grades K-6 will receive an ID kit through their superintendent. Each sheriff in Texas will also receive 600 kits to be handed out on a first come, first serve basis to children who fall outside of the K-6 age range or do not attend public school.

Each kit contains an inkless fingerprinting card, DNA swab and preservation envelope, and a wallet card. All information can be completed by a parent or guardian and stored at home. In event of an emergency, the ID kit can be handed over to authorities to help locate a missing child.

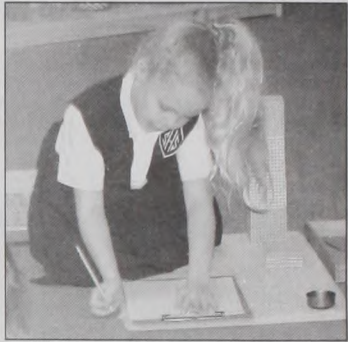

National feeder and stocker cattle summary week ending Jan. 27

Last week's feeder cattle sales through the heart of cattle country were too light for a comparison to trend this week's national market. Plus, receipts were once again very light this week as impassable country roads from either ice or mud brought livestock movement to a halt across much of the Plains and the Midwest.

The only major feeder cattle marketing areas with measurable sales during both of the past two weeks are the Southeastern lightweight calf markets and the Northern Plains heavyweight calf markets. They rebounded this week with trends from steady to \$5 higher, after selling cattle \$3-10 lower during the previous week.

According to the USDA's Livestock Market News Service, nationwide reported auction receipts through the first four weeks of 2007 are down 33% from the same time a year ago. Feeder cattle sellers are backed up and if the weather allows, cow/calf producers and backgrounders

have a lot of catching up to do in marketing feeders.

Direct feedlot sales in five major feeding areas through the first three trading weeks of this year were over 150,000 head less than 2006.

Friday's cattle-on-feed report estimated more than 12 million head on feed Jan. 1, which is the highest beginning year inventory since the series began in 1996.

December placements were 91% of a year ago and more than analysts had guessed, while marketings were near predictions at 95% of 2006.

Southern feedlot areas sold cattle steady late Friday at mostly \$87, while northern feedlots \$1-2 lower dressed from \$137-138. This week's reported auction volume included 56% over 600 lbs and 42% heifers.

80th Texas Legislature - Regular Session

Raising minimum wage
Four bills filed in the House would raise the minimum wage in Texas to between \$5.85 to \$6.65 for 2007 and up to \$7.65 by the end of 2008. One bill, HB 262, would then implement automatic increases indexed to inflation for each subsequent year.

HB 49, as of Sept. 1, 2007, \$6.25 per hour and as of Sept. 1, 2008, \$7.25 per hour.

HB 193, raises minimum wage to not less than \$6.00 per hour.

HB 262, raises minimum wage to as of Sept. 1, 2007, \$6.65 per hour and as of Oct. 1, 2009 and each year thereafter, adjusted for inflation.

HB 327, raises minimum wage to the greater of the Federal Minimum Wage or as of Sept. 1, 2007, \$5.85 per hour, as of Sept. 1, 2008, \$6.55 per hour and as of Sept. 1, 2009, \$7.25 per hour.

Stay alert for Hessian Fly

With higher wheat prices, many producers may be contemplating harvesting more wheat for grain than usual here in Cooke County. Prior to making this decision, producers should consider the likelihood of infestation by the Hessian fly. The Hessian fly came from Russia and was first reported in the United States in 1779. Hessian fly is thought to have been introduced into the United States in wheat bedding straw used by Hessian troops during the Revolutionary War. Within 120 years of its introduction into New York state, this insect had spread into most of the eastern and midwestern United States and as far west as Washington state.

In the northern Blacklands of Texas, continuous wheat breeding has been winning the battle against the pest since 1955. But by 2000, the flies had overcome four of the latest primary wheat resistance genes that had protected wheat successfully since 1986. Some Hessian fly damage has been noticed in Cooke County wheat fields each of the last three years.

Injury to wheat is caused by Hessian fly larvae feeding on stem tissue at the crown of young plants or just above the nodes on jointed wheat. The extent of injury generally is greater in newly emerged or younger seedling than in older, established plants. Larval feeding stunts infested tillers, broadening leaves and turning them a darker green. Significant grain losses can be expected when the number of stems infested exceeds 5-8% in fall or 20% in spring. Serious infestations may lead to thin wheat stands with poorer yields and more weed problems than in healthy stands.

Additionally, Hessian-fly feeding weakens wheat stems at feeding sites and may cause significant lodging or stem breakage, resulting in harvesting difficulties. Larval feeding also can interfere

with nutrient flow to wheat heads during kernel formation, resulting in reduced grain quantities and quality.

Some wheat varieties are resistant to certain Hessian fly populations but are susceptible to others. Unique populations (or races) of Hessian flies are called biotypes; biotypes result from genetic changes that allow flies to feed and survive on different varieties of wheat. Sixteen Hessian fly biotypes are known to occur in the United States. Knowing which biotypes are present in an area can help growers select wheat varieties known to be resistant to those specific biotypes.

The most reliable way to identify Hessian fly infestations in seedling plants involves digging plants out from the soil and carefully pulling apart tillers, looking for white larvae or brown pupa attached to the base of the tillers in the crown. Leaf sheaths should be pulled back to expose larvae and pupae on stems. In the spring, larvae and pupae are found at the base of tillers in the crown but also may be present at the nodes. Again, leaf sheaths must be pulled back to expose Hessian flies feeding on stems. Strategies for managing Hessian fly infestations of wheat include variety resistance, delayed planting, seed treatments, destruction of volunteer wheat, crop rotation, and beneficial insects.

Grass harvest time vs. nutritional content

Recent research gives evidence that cutting summer forages later in the afternoon provides greater nutrient content in hay, compared to those cut in the morning. North Carolina State University researchers harvested gamagrass and switchgrass at 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. and stored all material as

baleage. Harvested forages were then fed to steers of evidently high Angus breeding. Compared to the morning harvest, the evening had higher starch and nonstructural carbohydrate content and greater dry matter consumption. There were no differences in apparent digestibility of dry matter or fiber components. However, because of greater consumption, animal performance should be higher from the evening harvest. The animal preference is a result of the higher sugar content of the forage during the evening due to the photosynthesis. Processed plants utilize stored energy during the night, while creating more during sun-light hours. Thus, energy content is usually higher in the evening.
