

Thanks to the swift action of authori-ties and implementation of the AMBER Alert system, the boy was safely recovered 13 hours later and returned to bis family. For more than 40 years, variations of the EAS have worked in concert with radio and television broad-casters, cable companies, and satellite providers to inform the public of emergencies. Today, it warns citizens about severe weather hazards, helps mobilize communities to search for and recover kid-naped children, and enables the government to immedi-ately address the nation in the event of a national emer-gency. 
