

THC bestows \$4 million for Courthouse restoration

Cooke County Commissioners Court announced that work had been received from the Texas Historical Commission (THC) that \$4,085,904 was awarded to Cooke County to complete its Courthouse restoration. This is Round V of the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program.

"I'm pretty proud to know that we got this because they had 47 applicants and they approved funding for 17 projects. We were right up there at the top," remarked Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess. Hess has spearheaded the Courthouse restoration project for many years.

"That money, as you know, is coming from the State and we have to put up a 15% match," Hess explained. "Anytime that we can get money back from the State, I'm for doing it because they don't pay us near what we need to do our roadwork off of gasoline tax. That's one place that we always lose. If we don't get this money, somebody else is going to get it."

County Judge Bill Freeman added, "As far as where we are going to go and what we are going to do to rehabilitate the Courthouse, that will be something that a future Court will have to decide. We will be working on it during this interim time."

Matching grants totaling nearly \$56 million are to be awarded to 17 Texas counties to help preserve their historic courthouses. Additional funding has been set aside for program contingencies, emergency, and potential planning work and will be allocated later to address specific projects' needs. Besides Cooke County, the counties to receive funds in Round V of the program are Cass, Fannin, Hall, Hamilton, Harris, Hood, Kendall, La Salle, Lavaca, McCulloch, Mills, Potter, Randall, Roberts, San Augustine, and Trinity. The awards include 14 construction projects totaling \$53,206,071 and three emergency grants totaling \$2,591,374.

"With so many qualified applicants, the selection process for this round has been very challenging, but our goal is to assist as many counties as possible," said THC Architecture Division Director Stan Graves in a press release. "Texas' historic county

courthouses represent the best of our state and we remain dedicated to helping preserve these important architectural landmarks."

The Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program was established in 1999 by Gov. George W. Bush and the Texas Legislature to restore Texas' county courthouses to their original splendor and make them safe, functional, and a source of pride for Texas communities. The Texas Historical Commission created and administers the \$207 million program.

Freeman then told of damage caused to the south side of the Courthouse Saturday when a driver hit the corner of it. Some of the stone was damaged, as well as the handicap entrance. The handicap entrance was closed until it could be inspected for safety. They planned to open it as soon as it was safely possible.

Commissioners declared Feb. 1 as National Red Dress Day. The day is dedicated to recognizing that more needs to be done in Cooke County to safeguard women's health for generations to come. Heart disease is the number one killer of women. One in three American women dies of heart disease. Most women don't realize that heart disease is a woman's problem and don't take it seriously. Smoking, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, overweight, obesity, physical inactivity, diabetes, or family history of early heart disease, and age contribute to women's heart disease. Cooke County women were urged to take action to make heart health their priority for themselves and their families.

Kris Kirk, a resident of CR 2070 in Gainesville, spoke during public comments. She said that she and her husband live along a gravel road. She understood the speed limit to be 60 m.p.h. Her complaint was gravel trucks barreling down their road as they take a shortcut to Hwy. 51. "We can't even let our children walk across the street to get the mail anymore," she noted. Kirk shared several other concerns.

Commissioner Hess explained that the speed limit on a gravel road is 55 m.p.h. unless posted differently. Judge Freeman said that the problem could possibly be addressed at another Court

meeting since it was not on the agenda this time.

Jennifer Johnson-Spence, Cooke County Library director, requested and received approval from the Court to apply for a TCA mini grant to help sponsor three special story hour performers over the next six months. Two would come in March for Texas History Month and the other in June for Summer Reading. The grant is for about \$850.

Melissa Williamson accepted a plaque of appreciation from Commissioners Court. Williamson was a compliance officer for the County prior to accepting a job from the State. She stepped in and assisted when the current compliance officer was seriously injured in an auto accident. Judge Freeman praised Williamson, "She stepped in and filled the office for a few days. She assisted us with finding someone to temporarily replace Shanna until she was rehabilitated."

In planning for the next agenda, Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell asked that burn ban be placed on it for future Court dates. That way it could be rescinded as soon as safely possible.

Commissioner Hess warned he'd seen on the news that two very windy days with low humidity were predicted this week. One with winds up to 50 m.p.h. "We can be glad we've got it (burn ban) on," he said. "It's very dangerous."

Auditor presents clean report for MMH

On Tuesday, Jan. 22, Larry Anderson, CPA presented his firm's audit report to the Muenster Memorial Hospital Board of Directors. "We are giving what accountants call a standard clean opinion," he reported. "These financial statements present fairly in all material respects the financial position of the Hospital District as of June 30, 07."

Included in the report on operating revenues for the year, Anderson noted, "Routine service four years ago was setting at 7% - the room and board care. It took a pretty significant jump in '05 and it increased a little in '06, and it increased again this year. It is setting right about 17% of your revenue coming

from room and board care... Probably the biggest percentage growth of any department was in radiology."

In explaining where the money came from and what it was used for Anderson said, "eighty-three percent of the money that we took in came from patient services. Our tax revenue provided about 7%, which is our other significant area. We paid money out for salaries and benefits, operating expenses, we retired some debt, and then we increased our cash with 10% of the money that came in."

Anderson said that in 2004, there was 10 days of cash on hand. As of June 30 this year, there was about 75 days of operating cash on hand. "That number has grown significantly," he commented. Although 75 days is a good number, he felt that 120 to

150 days would be more comfortable to have.

"All of the Critical Access hospitals are looking a lot more solid," Anderson noted. "Home Health is an area under Critical Access where you can make a profit off of Medicare. In a hospital setting, you don't get to make a profit because they are paying you cost, but Home Health you are on a fee schedule, so it is possible to make a profit in Home Health."

In the December financial report, Administrator Lynn Heller reported that the patient volume was down a bit. Net revenue in December was \$524,269 and operating expenses were \$575,959 for a loss of \$51,690. There was net other revenue of \$100,354, which included ad valorem taxes of \$98,402, to show a profit of \$48,664 for Decem-

Professional Ambulance of Comanche, Texas bid \$32,295.

United Way considers organization applications for 2009 allocations

The Cooke County United Way is now considering applications from qualified agencies for the 2009 Allocations. A qualified agency must be established as a tax-exempt organization under the IRS Code Section 501(c)(3). The allocation packet requests agency information in the areas of: constitution and by-laws, management, financial reports, statement of cooperation, and statement of nondiscrimination. The agency must additionally meet the funding criteria, financial accountability, community needs, program priorities, and program effectiveness.

The Cooke County United Way and its member agencies share two common goals in the allocation process relative to the overall mission: 1) To fund real community needs as fully as possible and 2) To allocate available funds for optimum effect among these needs. Whereas, each agency views community needs from its own specific viewpoint, the United Way must look at agencies and needs from the view of the total community.

Deadline approaching Texans can check their voter registration status online

With the registration deadline to vote in the upcoming Primary Elections fast-approaching, the Secretary of State's Office has launched a new web tool which enables Texans to check their registration status online. Additionally, the new "Online Voter Central" web portal allows individuals to determine their polling place as Election Day nears and provides contact information for local county voter registration officials.

"We are doing our part to ensure that voters are prepared and fully-equipped when they show up to vote on Election Day," stated Texas Secretary of State Phil Wilson. "Now, Texans can check their registration status from their computers in plenty of time to address any possible issues before the registration deadline on Feb. 4."

With the implementation of the Texas Election Administration Management System (TEAM), the Secretary of State's Office now maintains a, "uniform, official, centralized, interactive, computerized, statewide voter registra-

tion list," as mandated by the Help America Vote Act of 2002. Texans who registered to vote using their driver license will be able to check their status using their driver license number. All other Texans can enter their Voter Unique Identifier (VUID) found on their voter registration card to check their voting status and find polling locations.

"As we begin a busy 2008 election season, I hope all Texans will recognize their rights and duties to head to the polls on Election Day," added Wilson. "We are faced with some important decisions as we determine new leaders for our nation and our state, and my office is committed to making the elections process accessible and easy for Texans in every region of the Lone Star State."

The deadline to register to vote in the March 4 Primary Elections is Monday, Feb. 4. Voter registration applications are available on the Secretary of State's website: www.sos.state.tx.us, as well as county Voter Registrar's offices, and most libraries, post offices, and high schools.

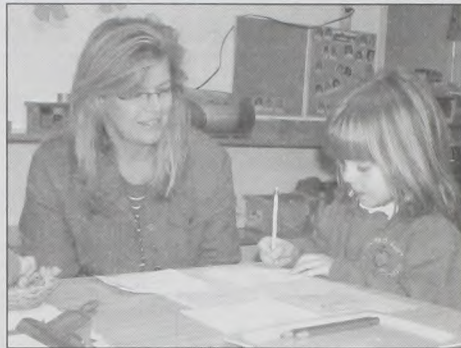

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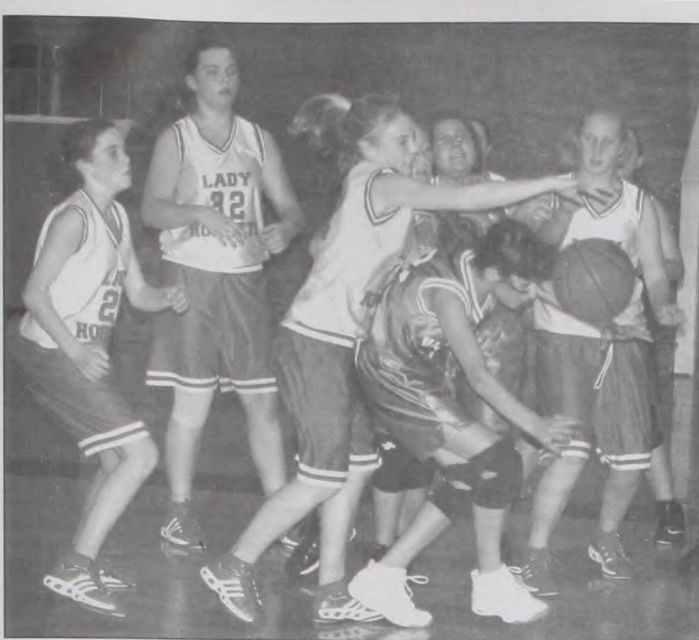

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TWDB makes organizational changes

The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) has undergone a revision of its organizational structure, including redirecting board leaders to more active focus areas and realigning resources to facilitate recent changes to TWDB operations.

TWDB staff are currently engaged in the implementation of a myriad of laws and appropriations to implement new policies for groundwater management, balancing the human and environmental needs for surface water flows, delivery of natural resources information, data dissemination services, delivery of flood protection, financial and technical assistance, and the state's role in financing of water-related infrastructure.

The challenges that lie ahead for the TWDB required changes within the organization in order to ensure success in meeting the charges the Board has been given by the Legislature.

Primarily, there was a need for some of the leaders to be redirected to a narrower but much more active focus on areas of increased workload and policy development. There was also a need to solidify current internal operational services to ensure good customer service through a more traditional alignment of resources.

To ensure that this occurred, TWDB Executive Administrator Kevin Ward directed a realignment of resources that begins at the highest level of leadership in the organization.

The first change to be made was to provide a renewed focus for the water resource science activities of the TWDB

to ensure full support of the broad range of new customers and stakeholders envisioned by recent legislative changes.

The recent shift from a planning to an implementation focus for these areas called for a corresponding separation of planning and science activities. Changes made in the 79th and 80th Legislative sessions have added several multi-faceted policy processes as well as staffing challenges for the TWDB to provide new services at the local, regional, and state level for environmental flows, water conservation, and groundwater management.

The TWDB is moving staff within the Texas Water Information Network (TXWIN). Bill Mullican will continue to lead this area - with the exception of the planning function - as deputy executive administrator. This new area is titled Water Science and Conservation.

In the second organizational change, the TWDB named Carolyn Brittin deputy over a new area,

which combines the Water Resources Planning Division with the Texas Natural Resources Information System (TNRIS), which will ensure the development of a more strategic direction for these services, and a more effective stakeholder process to ensure that policy issues are vetted in the appropriate forums. This new area is titled Regional Water and Flood Planning, and Natural Resources Information System.

A third move was to align the remaining operational information technology functions and the planning publications section under the Operations and Administration Service. Under the leadership of Lisa Glenn, the alignment of Programming and Applications Development, Information Technology, and Planning Publications into a more traditional arrangement with the administrative and operational support of the TWDB will ensure that there is a broad agency focus and improved delivery of information technology services to all internal and external customers.

Schafer is next Secretary of Ag

The U.S. Senate confirmed former North Dakota Governor Ed Schafer to be the next Secretary of Agriculture on Monday, clearing the way for him to take the reins at USDA at a critical farm policy juncture.

Schafer will assume his new role as Congress enters final negotiations toward the potential passage of an already-tardy farm bill. And,

according to President George W. Bush, he'll do so immediately.

"I look forward to seeing Ed take his seat along with the rest of my Cabinet at this evening's State of the Union (address)," Bush said Monday afternoon following Senate confirmation, during which there were no objections to the North Dakotan's appointment to lead USDA.

Congressman wants to end slaughter of U.S. horses abroad

A Kentucky congressman is co-sponsoring legislation that would ban the transport, sale, purchase, or donation of horses to be slaughtered for human consumption. According to the Associated Press, Ed Whitfield, a Republican from the 1st District, said he considers the practice inhumane and wants to see it end.

Whitfield said his legislation is necessary because horses are being transported eventually to be slaughtered beyond the U.S. border.

"The problem now is that people are moving more of the horses to Mexico, where the slaughter process is even worse than it was in the U.S.," he said.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, more than 100,000 horses were slaughtered in the United States in 2006 - mostly to be used as food in Asia and Europe.

Court decisions last year shuttered the last three slaughter plants in the United States, one in Illinois

and two in Texas. And a measure passed last month bars the USDA from collecting fees to pay for horse meat inspections, effectively barring slaughter in the U.S.

Some agriculture organizations, like the National Cattlemen's Beef Association, worry that banning horse slaughter is the first step of an animal activist plan to outlaw the processing of other meat.

"This is a slippery slope," said Colin Woodall, vice president and executive director of legislative affairs for the cattlemen's group.

Woodall and others have said the horse slaughter opponents are making an emotional appeal that doesn't deal with the possible glut of horses spared from the slaughterhouse.

AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS

The Texas Beef Council recently unveiled an updated version of their consumer-focused Web site, www.txbeef.org.

Complete with delicious beef recipes, cooking tips and beef nutrition information, the new Web site features include instructional beef cooking videos, a recipe rating system, and a 'My Profile' section where visitors can create a recipe book to save their favorite beef dishes.

Last week, the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimated total U.S. cattle slaughter at 640,000 head.

The five-year peak slaughter was on June 6, 2003, at 793,000 head. The industry hasn't slaughtered more than 713,000 head in the last three years.

Texas has had an increase of 340,000 acres planted in corn between 2006 and 2007.

TDA market recap

For the week ending Jan. 26, feeder steer prices at Texas auctions were \$2.49 per hundredweight higher than the previous week, as lower grain prices supported the feeder market. Fed cattle prices were steady.

Cotton and grain prices fell sharply at mid-week, mostly because of concerns about the general economy and pressure from non-agricultural commodity markets. Corn and grain sorghum prices recovered to close the week unchanged to slightly higher, but wheat finished lower.

As for futures markets, both feeder and finished

cattle closed the week modestly higher, while cotton, wheat, corn, and lumber futures were steady to lower.

Scattered showers were reported in many areas of the state, with the heaviest rains falling in the Upper Coast, Lower Rio Grande Valley, and parts of South Central Texas. However, most areas west of Interstate 35 reported that soil moisture is short to very short. The wheat crop continues to suffer from a lack of moisture in many areas and is rated in mostly poor to very poor condition. Fieldwork continues in preparation for spring planting.
