Winners proclaimed in May 10 elections

Voter interest lacked enthusiasm in area elections held Saturday, May 10. Turnout was low in the various races.

At Muenster ISD, the Superintendent's office reported 326 voters casting ballots. There was only one contested race. Incumbent Bert Walterscheid had no opponent for his Place 4 seat. He received 215 votes.

Ben Bindel won the Place 3 seat vacated by Jeff McAden. Bindel received 178 votes and his opponent Lee Buddy got 148 votes.

Lindsay ISD had four candidates seeking three positions on the Board of Trustees. The three with the highest votes will serve on the Board. Incumbent Wayne Fleitman held on to his seat

with 159 votes. Tommy Haverkamp received the most votes with 183. Rudy Zimmerman snagged the third place on the Board with 132 votes. Jim Ott had 114 votes.

Lindsay City Mayor Steven Zwinggi retained his job as mayor. He had no opposition and received 117 votes. There were three candidates for the two at large alderman seats. Incumbent Glen Block kept his seat with 121 votes. He will be joined by Danny Nortman who got 101 votes. Matthew Bezner had 29 votes. There were a total of 130 votes cast.

There will be some new faces on the North Central Texas College Board of Regents. Incumbents Dave Flusche, who was unopposed, and Lynn Williams, who surpassed his opponent Ken Arterbury by 985 votes, each go on to serve another term. Newly elected to the Board are Patsy Wilson and Karla Metzler.

There are 24,182 registered voters in the NCTC District. Only 1,601, or 6.6%, cast votes Saturday.

Places, candidates, and vote totals were: **Place 1** - Ken Arterbury 291 and Lynn Williams 1,276; **Place 3** - Mike Morrison 315 and Patsy Wilson 1,262; **Place 4** - Dave Flusche 1,217; and **Place 5** - Stephen Harlow 209 and Karla Metzler 1,392.

Other entities with terms that expired, were able to cancel elections because there was no opposition to those who filed.

FPL contracts for future energy



There is a new look to the skyline north of Muenster as Wolf Ridge Wind, L.L.C.'s wind turbine generators are in the process of being erected. Several turbine towers have been standing for a while, but last Thursday, the first glimpse was had of what they look like assembled. Above - the tower with nacelle atop awaits the blade assembly. The blades are assembled to the hub on the ground (see bottom left of photo). The whole unit is lifted by a crane measuring 330 to 340 total feet in height. The crane's boom is 314 feet long. Photo at right shows massive size of crane being used. Each of the three wind blades measures 132.2 feet in length. Total height is over 400 feet for the wind turbine generator. Each WTG will power 400 homes and when all 75 WTG are operating they can power 30,000 homes. They will generate electricity at wind speed as low as 8 m.p.h. and up to 55 m.p.h. Former Muenster mayor dies at age 81

William J. Miller, age 81, died Tuesday, May 6 from complications of cancer. Miller served as mayor of Muenster for one term, May 1993-1995. He succeeded Ted Henschel in that position.

During his mayoral term, Miller penned a weekly column Civic Outlook. Its purpose was to keep residents informed on what was going on in the City government.

One of Miller's accomplishments as Muenster mayor was to get an emergency plan adopted for the town. He twice promoted applying for federal grants to build a water tower on Muenster's north side. Both times his efforts were hindered when the City Council failed to support the effort.

Miller also owned and operated several businesses in Muenster over the years. In 1961, the assets of the Muenster Telephone Company were purchased by Miller and Alvin Fuhrman. They changed the name to Muenster Telephone Corporation.

There were 821 subscribers in 1961 and that number grew to thousands by the time Miller sold his share some 37 years later.

Muenster Livestock was another of Miller's endeavors. He and his wife Terese owned and operated that business from 1965 to 1971. In 1955 Miller bought a fleet of milk trucks to pick up milk from area dairies and deliver it to processing plants. In 1961, he added another fleet of trucks to expand the service.

Multipurpose vehicle approved for County

By joint effort and need, the Cooke County Sheriff's Department and Cooke County Emergency Management, Cooke County will soon have a multipurpose vehicle to use as a command post or for the County SWAT (Special Weapons And Tactics) team.

Emergency Management Coordinator Ray Fletcher gave some history on how funds for such a vehicle became a available and why they decided to use them for that type of vehicle. He said that since 2002, the federal government has been releasing Homeland Security funds to local entities. The money is designated to be spent two ways - Homeland Security and Law Enforcement Terror Prevention. Of this year's total, \$38,330 was earmarked for Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention. Another \$50,000 plus was for Homeland Security.

"In consultation with the Sheriff's Office, we came up with a project that would best

benefit everybody, which would be a mobile instant command vehicle that can also be used as a SWAT deployment vehicle," Fletcher said. "It's very multiuse, multifunctional in who can use it and the different ways we can use it."

Fletcher said that to get a good solid vehicle that would last comes to about \$4,000 above the amount that was granted. There were also some options that weren't included in the package that they hoped to add. The vehicle would be equipped with desk tables and power outlets for using laptops and such, and a power plug for long-term power.

"We are requesting the \$4,000 to buy a good solid vehicle, not something that we may regret in two or three years because it doesn't have enough space in the back of it, it doesn't have enough space in the box," said Fletcher. The proposed vehicle would carry up to 12.

Muenster students win in UIL State Academic competition

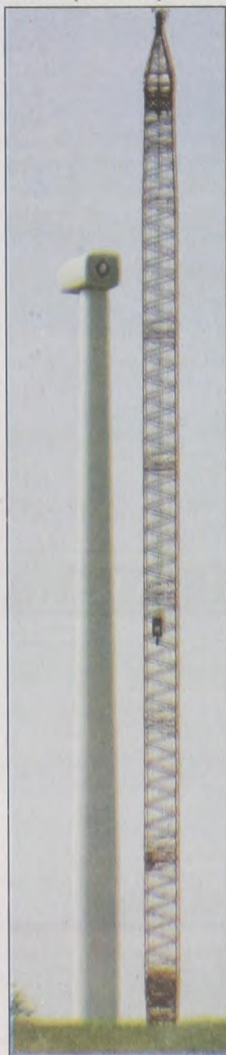

William "Bill" Miller 1926 - 2008

Mass of Christian burial for William "Bill" Joseph Miller, age 81 of Muenster, was held at 10 a.m. on Friday, May 9 at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Muenster, with Fr. Ken Robinson officiating the Mass. Burial followed in Sacred Heart Cemetery under the direction of McCoy Funeral Home of Muenster.

Bill died at 9:45 a.m. on Tuesday, May 6, 2008 in Muenster Memorial Hospital.

Born Nov. 4, 1926 in the Hood area, Bill was one of the nine children of Theo and Rose Herr Miller. He grew up in the Hood and Muenster areas and graduated from Sacred Heart High School. He married Terese Mary Walter on Aug. 23, 1948 in Sacred Heart Church.

Bill and Terese rented some farm land shortly after their wedding. He busied himself by bailing hay, then in 1949, went to work for the R.E.A. He ran a Texaco Service Station on Highway 82 in 1950, then changed to a Humble Station in 1951. Bill and Terese purchased a fleet of milk trucks in 1955. They made the routes daily, picking up the farmers' milk in Muenster and the surrounding area. They extended their fleet by purchasing another route in 1961.

Bill and Terese built a large house in Muenster in 1959. It was to accommodate the rapidly increasing family. They lived there until their deaths. Bill bought a 50% interest in the Muenster Telephone Corporation in 1961. He also, in 1965, bought the Muenster Sale Barn where he and Terese did the office work. This was sold in 1971. From there, they purchased land where they built a 132 unit apartment complex in Denton. Then they sold in 1979. Meanwhile, they had purchased a 137 unit complex in Dallas in 1973. This they sold in 1978.

Bill then began making wood burning stoves, setting up his plant in Gainesville. Along with all this, Bill had several other jobs including making chains for manufacturing in Tyler. Bill was an extremely busy, energetic person. He served as mayor of Muenster from 1993 - 95. Survivors include daughter

and son-in-law Linda and Jack Flusche of Muenster; sons and daughters-in-law Robert and Betty Miller and Alan and Darlene Miller, all of Muenster; and Mark Miller of Arlington; daughter-in-law Tracey Miller of The Colony; 14 grandchildren and one great-grandchild; sisters Rosabell Yosten of River Oaks, Barbara Felderhoff of Myra, Marilyn Bayer of Roanoke, Carol Ann Henscheid of Muenster; brothers Herbert Miller of Muenster and Ted Miller of Sherman.

Bill was preceded in death by his wife Terese; daughter Joan Terese Miller; son Terry Paul Miller; his parents; sister Bernice Miller Yosten; and brother Paul Miller.

Assisting Fr. Ken during the funeral Mass were altar servers Alvin Hartman and Chuck Bartush. The First Reading was given by grandson Greg Flusche, with the Second Reading read by grandson Eric Miller. Deanna Miller, granddaughter, read the Prayers of the Faithful. Granddaughters Julie Miller, Alison Miller, and Karen Flusche brought up the Offertory Gifts. Eucharistic ministers were Robert Miller, Herbie and Dolores Miller, Kathy Berres, and Bert Miller.

Music was provided by Diane Grewing, Doug Yosten, and Christi Klement. Sacred songs included "Amazing Grace," "Shepherd Me, O God," "Give Me Jesus," "I Am the Bread of Life," "You Are Near," "Edelweiss Blessing," and "I Am the Resurrection."

Jeanne Flusche, niece, gave the remarks of remembrance. She said, in part, "...As a young boy, Bill loved to play and work hard... An adventurous and curious spirit, he was always interested in how things worked. Most of his mechanical knowledge was self-taught... The Army made him a cook, a skill he acquired and enjoyed the rest of his life..."

"Bill's adventuresome spirit showed as an adult too, as he pursued many different occupations and ventures... He was concerned for and generous to those in need, and a very trusting person... Bill loved to garden... Sundays during summer meant

heading to the lake, leaving in the morning, and not going home until the sun set..."

"Bill worked hard, but he played hard too. The family took wonderful vacations... Flying with Bill in his airplane was quite an experience too! He took great joy in giving thrill rides!"

After retiring from Case, Joe rented and operated a tractor mechanic shop that he operated for many years.

Joe and Alvina were the parents of eight children. They were a close, loving family. Joe will be greatly missed by his family and friends.

Survivors include his daughters and sons-in-law Kathy and Jim O'Brien of Irving, Lola Kidinger of Whitesboro, and Joan McGilvray of Muenster; sons and daughters-in-law Jerome Voth and Robert and Peggy Voth, all of Gainesville, James and Fran Voth of Muenster, and Mark and Carol Voth of Arlington; 14 grandchildren, 23 great-grandchildren, and two great-great-grandchildren; sisters Katherine Kubis and Rita Dixon of Muenster; and brothers Tee Voth and Ray Voth of Muenster.

Preceding him in death were his wife Alvina on May 24, 2000; daughter Sheila

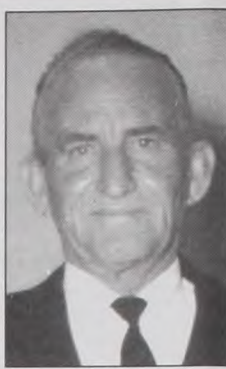

The sheet floated behind him, and in the moonlight it looked real. The girls were beside themselves, yelling, "Take us home." The next week, the Lindsay priest and some Lindsay parents paid a visit with the Voth boys' parents, who told them it was just a prank. The next day, the (haunted) house was torn down.

Willard also spoke of Joe being a dedicated worker, and how he didn't retire from the tractor repair business until the age of 86.

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Mag-1 lay down coat announced for roads by Wolf Ridge Project

About nine miles of county roads surrounding the Wolf Ridge Wind Project north of Muenster are getting a coating of Mag-1. This is a non toxic product to cut down on dust.

Field foreman and landowner advocate Suzen Barthold of Hillard Energy said that Wind Energy Constructors began laying the Mag-1 down on Wednesday and should be finished in seven to 10 days. According to Barthold, Mag-1 is a non toxic product and will not harm humans or animals. She said it is preferable that the roads not be driven on until after the Mag-1 that is applied has dried. If vehicles are driven on a road where the project is still wet, Barthold advises rinsing the product off the vehicle.

County roads to get the dust deterrent include 450, 425, 430, 431, and 477.

Spanish III students fuse Spanish, culture, and art

Pre-Columbian art from Mesoamerica is so named because it was made prior to European conquests in the 16th century. The region from northern Mexico to Central America supported a number of distinctive cultures that flourished from 1200 B.C. to the Spanish conquest in 1521. The art created by these cultures belonged to the religious and secular elite, and preeminently to rulers, who were considered the embodiment of gods.

The Spanish III students from Muenster ISD viewed this exhibit at The Kimbell Museum of Art on April 17. Their teacher, Carmen Reiter, was their docent to this collection which contains highly important works of Olmec, Zapotec, and Aztec art, and is particularly strong in the art of the Maya. The Mayan art includes finely painted, stuccoed, and incised pottery vessels depicting court rituals and stories from Maya mythology, realistically sculpted clay figurines, and carved stelae.

At the end of the tour, the Spanish III students were treated to an opportunity to view and visit with a Mayan warrior genuinely dressed in true Mayan splendor, creating music with his sacred conch shell. He explained the significance of his attire and his role in the Mayan culture. The students had the opportunity to ask questions and pose for pictures with him.

Eisenhower State Park celebrates 50th

Exhibitions, fly-casting demonstrations, star-gazing, ranger-led hikes, and children's programs will highlight Eisenhower State Park's 50th birthday celebration on Saturday, May 17.

This year's celebration will be attended by several dignitaries, including State Rep. Larry Phillips of Sherman, who will be on hand for the rededication of the park at 11 a.m. in the Recreation Hall, according to Park Superintendent Paul Kisel. A flag-raising by a Boy Scout color guard will kick off the event, followed by the recognition of dignitaries and a speech by Phillips.

Kisel said it is his understanding that when the state park first opened, people camped out and frequented the marina, but there were few park structures. The campgrounds and most facilities weren't built until the 1960s, he said.

The grand opening of the popular North Texas park May 18, 1958, lasted nine days and was attended by Earl Eisenhower, the brother of then-President Dwight D. Eisenhower, who was in the middle of his second term. While the campgrounds were only in the planning stage in those days, the marina on Lake Texoma was open.

Now, as then, Lake Texoma and Eisenhower State Park remain a major recreational draw for people of North Texas, especially those living in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex.

"Fifty years ago, Eisenhower State Park was a park name only. But it has always been a large, family-oriented park on a lake with vast recreational potential," Kisel said. "People can bring anything from a kayak to a 60-foot cruiser to enjoy the lake, which is renowned for its stripers and catfish."

Today, the state park boasts more than 180 camp-

sites, 35 screened shelters, a group camp with pavilion, and the air-conditioned and heated Recreation Hall that can be rented overnight or just for the day. The Eisenhower Yacht Club is operated by LJV Corp. under a lease from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department. The park also features a 10-acre section devoted to minibikes and ATV (all-terrain vehicles) use.

The 426-acre state park is located about 5 miles north of Denison and 75 miles north of Dallas. It bears the name of the former president, who was born in 1890 in Denison.

people. Sheriff Mike Compton identified the needs of his department. Currently, an old ambulance is being used as the SWAT team's vehicle. "We have a SWAT entry team that trains quite often," he noted. "In order to do what they need to do, they've got a lot of equipment. It's very difficult to put it in a regular vehicle." It is a 10 man team. He added that with the old ambulance they might get there and they're never sure if they'll get back with it.

"We've got a definite need for a vehicle like this, although I believe it is going to be used so many more times in the precinct type disaster where you don't call out the state or anything like that," said Sheriff Compton. He saw it being used more in the event of flood or fire events.

There was also the option of gas versus diesel. Commissioners agreed to the gas model and appropriated the additional \$3,996.78 to purchase the vehicle.

Fletcher also addressed the Court on another grant funded project. He said that six months ago the federal government awarded the state of Texas around 60 million dollars for communication projects. Of that amount, about \$35 million was left for division around the state. Texoma Council of Governments (TCOG), its emergency management coordinators, came together and decided to come up with a feasible project and apply for some of the grant money.

He said that they are required to obtain a level four interoperable communication capability. It would allow them to bring in anybody from a dissimilar region or radio and tie them together quickly for communication purpose.

"The system would be set up with all the available frequencies that we would have in our surrounding areas, including Denton and Wise counties, anywhere we might expect someone to come and help, all of those would be present in there," explained Fletcher.

The County would be required to provide a match. Fletcher said we might get \$20,000. The grant project is in its beginning stages.

Funds would be appropriated in the future if needed.

County Judge Bill Freeman added that technology has progressed to the point where a piece of equipment put into a PSAP can tie all communication equipment from various counties and entities together in an emergency such as a flood so that all frequencies can communicate. "This could be very, very important should we have some catastrophic event and you have to have help from outside."

Commissioners agreed to take part in the collaborative grant funded project with TCOG and the State of Texas for Public Safety Interoperable Communications Funds (PSIC).

EMS Director Bob Harbin requested additional funds in the amount of \$35,000 to the Cooke County EMS fuel budget. Harbin remarked, "Fuel costs. We're out of money."

County Auditor Shelly Saunders said that Harbin's budget was behind \$1,200 now. His original fuel budget was \$40,000 this fiscal year. The budget year is 60% complete. In the first seven months, \$41,000 was spent on fuel. His request was approved with money coming from the Contingency Fund to cover the shortfall.

May 17 was declared Cooke County Community Scout Day. A number of boy scouts and cub scouts attended the meeting to hear the proclamation and have their photo taken with Commissioners Court members.

In other business conducted at its May 12 meeting, Commissioners Court:

- Approved contract between Cooke County EMS and Lake Kiowa Landscaping for a period of one year for septic maintenance at the Muenster and Woodbine sub stations.

- Approved out of state travel for Jennifer Johnson-Spence, director of the Cooke County Library. She plans to

attend the Association for Rural & Small Communities conference in Sacramento, California in September. She said this provides an excellent opportunity to learn a variety of profitable things that the Library might do to bring in more money.

- Approved request by Nortex Communications, at its expense, to install a fiber optic cable along the right of way on CR 424, 457, and 431, located in Precinct #4.

- Approved monetary donation from Dana and Danny Knight in the amount of \$25 to the Cooke County Library.

- Approved change orders for the construction of the Cooke County Justice Center Road.

- Approved monetary donation from Tom Woods in the amount of \$50 to the Cooke County Library.

- Heard report from Cooke County Veteran's Service Officer Judson Perry. He said that he serves between 800 and 1100 Veterans a year with either contact in person or by mail. There are two new Veterans' clinics in the area, one in Sherman and the other in Denton.

- Approved indigent burial of Kadence Mitchell.

- Approved \$100 cash for the change fund in the County Clerk's Office. This is money only to make change with, not purchases.

- Approved request by Mountain Springs Water Supply, at its expense, to install one inch water line using a two inch casing on Neely Trail approximately 7/10 of a mile south of the intersection of Neely Trail and FM 372 running east and west across Neely Trail in Precinct #2.

- Approved purchase of a 12 yard dump truck utilizing HGAC (exempt from bidding per the cooperative purchasing contract) for Precinct #1 Road and Bridge.

- Approved property easement for land owned by Mary Carlisle, located in Precinct #1.

Make it less painful when working calves

The American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) recognizes that castration and dehorning of cattle are important for human and animal safety when cattle are used for agricultural purposes. Because castration and dehorning cause pain and discomfort, the AVMA recommends the use of procedures and practices that reduce or eliminate these effects, including the use of approved or AMDUCA-permissible clinically effective medications whenever possible. Studies indicate that preoperative use of non-steroidal anti-inflammatory agents and local anesthetics reduce pain and distress associated with castration and dehorning.

- Disbudding is the preferred method of dehorning calves. Local anesthetic should be considered for other dehorning procedures.

- Elastator rubber banding techniques have been associated with increased chronic pain and should be discouraged. High tension-banding systems may be used with appropriate veterinary supervision and/or training in those situations where surgical castration may predispose to postsurgical complications.

- There are a number of acceptable castration techniques utilized by the cattle industry. The castration method used should take into account the animal's age, weight, skill level of the technician, environmental conditions, and facilities available, as well as human and animal safety.

• Both dehorning and castration should be done at the earliest age practicable.

Research leading to new or improved techniques that reduce or eliminate pain and

distress associated with castration and dehorning, or development of viable alternatives to castration and dehorning, is encouraged.

Feedstock makes a difference in feeding distiller's grains

When it comes to using distiller's grains in finishing rations of High Plains cattle, a Texas AgriLife Research scientist says the type of grain used makes all the difference.

Dr. Jim MacDonald, AgriLife Research beef nutritionist at Amarillo, said there's been some skepticism about using distiller's grains in this region. Distiller's grains are a by-product of ethanol processing that can be used for animal feed.

"I believe we can do it successfully, provided we have distiller's grains that are equivalent in quality to those used in the North Plains states," he said.

Two years ago, MacDonald began investigating the dramatically different animal performance responses observed in the Northern Plains and Southern Plains, and to determine how to successfully incorporate distiller's grains into this region's finishing rations.

"There are two obvious differences in research conducted in those two regions,"

he said. "Researchers in the Northern Plains tend to use dry-rolled corn, and in the Southern Plains, they use steam-flaked corn-based diets."

Additionally, researchers in Nebraska and other Northern Plains states utilized distiller's grains derived from corn; whereas the southern research included distiller's grains derived from sorghum, he said.

MacDonald conducted three performance trials, two using corn-based distiller's grain shipped in from a Nebraska plant, and the third utilizing sorghum-derived distiller's grains that were similar to those used in research previously conducted in this region.

"Our study in feeding sorghum distiller's grain at 2% of dry matter, showed the energy value for that product was 73% of the value of steam-flaked corn," MacDonald said. "In general, that fits with previously conducted research at Texas Tech

and West Texas A&M."

Alternatively, he said, the research conducted with corn-derived distiller's grains from Nebraska would suggest the energy value was roughly equivalent to steam-flaked corn, which agrees with the northern data where distiller's grains were fed in steam-flaked diets.

"So what our observations are showing us is there are large variations in the energy value of distiller's grains derived from different cereal grain sources, similar to the differences in energy values of the cereal grains themselves," MacDonald said.

There will be a place for all of the different types of distiller's grains produced, but the producer needs to know what the energy value is and the product needs to be priced appropriately, he said.

"Additionally, our work with distiller's grains in different corn processing methods would indicate producers are able to retain the energetic advantage of flaking corn in diets containing distiller's grains," he said.

For decades, feed yards in the Southern Plains have flaked corn to increase the amount of energy, MacDonald said.

He said the question was, "If you add distiller's grains to the diet, will there still be an advantage to flaking the corn?" His research shows there is still an advantage.

MacDonald said another important thing for producers to understand is that distiller's grains from each plant may be different, so it is important to have a relationship with the provider of distiller's grain.

Data is being developed by MacDonald and other researchers concerning the effects of changes in the distiller's grain processing. "The more they understand what goes on in that ethanol plant, the better chance they'll have of accurately valuing the product," he said.

"Clearly the most important question is what cereal grain is being used. But they also need to know about control measures for things like sulfur content and are the solubles being added back at a consistent rate."

Market Recap

For the week ending May 10, the price trend for feeder cattle at Texas auctions was again mixed, from \$4 per hundredweight higher to \$5 lower, with the average for 500-600 pound steers virtually unchanged compared with a week ago. Fed cattle prices were up \$2 per hundredweight.

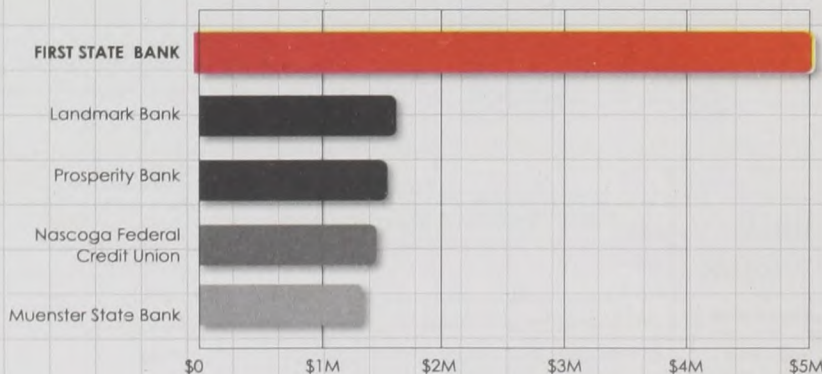
Corn and grain sorghum cash prices were also higher on continued planting delays in the Midwest. Wheat prices declined amid expectations for a large global crop.

As for futures markets, feeder cattle, finished cattle, and corn closed higher, while wheat finished lower. Most areas of the state recorded rain last week with up to four inches falling on the Plains and more than two inches in parts of East Texas.

The state's corn crop is 85% planted, compared with 91% on average by this date. Winter wheat is 71% headed, with the crop reported in fair to very poor condition. Topsoil moisture was rated short to adequate statewide.
