City forges ahead with Park project

It was the goal of the Muenster City Council to hire a contractor to complete the City Park fence along Maple Street. There was no bid submitted for the whole process. The sole bid submitted this time was for metal only.

Aiming for a start date soon after Germanfest, the City Council at its March 3 regular meeting, decided to act as their own contractor. Bids submitted at the February meeting were reviewed. City Administrator Stan Endres said that they checked with those submitting the bids and the prices remained the same. They decided to have Dangelmayr Construction, Inc. do the cement work and Mike Hofbauer the masonry work. The City will purchase pre-made metal panels for the fence and seek someone local to install them.

Endres said that the cost is estimated at \$40,000 for the 400 feet along Maple Street. No decision was made on approving the lease by Muenster ISD for the use of water well #3. It is used to water the football field. The school district pays \$600 and the electric bill on the well.

It was discussed that the Muenster Jaycees hope to plant grass around their new baseball fields and would need water for the grass. Sharing the well between the two may be possible if there is sufficient water and a plan for sharing can be worked out. A decision was tabled until it could be discussed further with those involved.

The City will be advertising for bids on its 2008 paying project. Endres said that currently they are seeking

Runoff to determine Republican DA nominee

Election night was quite tense for candidates in the race for the Republican nomi-nee for District Attorney of

the 235th Judicial District. Neither incumbent Cindy Stormer or her opponent Janice Warder attained more than 50% of the votes, so there must be a run off to declare a winner. That election will take place on Tuesday, April 8 with early voting beginning on March 31 and ending on April 4. Only those who voted in the Republican Primary will be allowed to cast a ballot in the runoff election for District Attorney of the 235th Judicial District. There were 5,794 Republican voters taking part in the Republican Primary election in Cooke County.

In that contest, Warder received 2,831 votes or 49% of the votes. Stormer received 2,052 votes or 35%. The third candidate Chris Fostel received 903 votes (16%).

In Muenster's Precinct #17, Stormer was the favorite with 77 votes compared to Warder's 63 and Fostel's 18.

In Muenster's Precinct #18, Stormer was also the favorite there by a slim margin. Stormer received 283 votes, Warder 244, and Fostel 67.

In other County Republican contests, Janelle Haverkamp got 3,975 votes to defeat her opponent Martin Peterson who received 1,782

votes. Since there was no opponent on the Democratic ticket, Haverkamp retains her seat as Judge of the 235th Judicial Court.

Tanya Davis also held on to her position as County Attorney. She got the Republican nomination with 3,369 votes to Frieda Fiske's 2,109.

Incumbent Mike Compton won the Republican nomination for Sheriff with 3,743 votes to the 2,006 cast for Ken Fogus. Compton will face Democratic nominee Ben Thurman who had no opponent. Thurman received

and familiarize themselves with their drills.

During periods of possible severe weather, Muenster Volunteer Fire Department dispatches storm spotters to designated areas around Muenster. They watch the sky for any signs of approaching tornadoes and also warn when hail is headed to town. Radaris closely observed during this period also. If a tornado is spotted that could have Muenster in its path, a message is sent and the warning sirens sounded just as it will be on the 10th or 17th. The voice message will come on Channel 2 with more information and tell residents to take shelter.

The National Weather Service warns that tornadoes can destroy a building in a few seconds. Therefore it is important to know the safety rules for surviving a tornado. In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or a small interior room such as a closet, bathroom, or an interior hallway on the lowest

MMH approves ORCA grant application





Cancer threat often unidentified in women

Ovarian cancer, which has a reputation as a silent killer, will claim thousands of lives this year. For many women, the trouble is that the symptoms are often mistaken for other problems.

"Patients are often symptomatic for several months

"Patients are often symptomatic for several months before the diagnosis, even with early-stage disease," said Dr. John Schorge, a gynecologic oncologist at UT Southwestern Medical Center, of the fifth-leading cause of cancer death in women. "The difficulty is distinguishing these symptoms from those that normally occur in women."

The most common symptoms of ovarian cancer in-

clude:

• Bloating;
• Pelvic or abdominal pain;
• Trouble eating or feeling full quickly;
• Urinary symptoms, such as urgency or frequency.
These symptoms are relatively common and can occur with any number of other

conditions. That's why Dr. Schorge said it's important to pay attention to the symptoms and consult a gynecologist if they persist daily for more than a few weeks. In 2007, health-care experts predict about 22,000 new cases of cervical cancer for women in the U.S., and more than 15,000 deaths.







Staples says no to Canadian cattle until Mexico accepts U.S. breeding cattle

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples has issued an order to stop specific Canadian cattle from passing through the state's export facilities into Mexico.

"I am deeply disappointed that Canada has signed a live cattle trading protocol with Mexico that is inconsistent with international standards," Commissioner Staples said, "The World Organization for Animal Health (OIE) standards are paramount in ensuring trade decisions are based on sound science and not political science."

Initial reports stated the U.S. had signed off on this agreement between Canada and Mexico, allowing the trade of certain dairy and beef cattle less than 30 months of age - including breeding stock. However, Commissioner Staples confirmed through high-level conversations with U.S. Department of Agriculture officials that the U.S. has in fact not approved the pact. Rather, USDA officials have expressed disappointment expressed disappointment with their counterparts in Canada for yielding con-firmed science to political

firmed science to political maneuvering.
"If USDA allows these cattle to cross the Canadian border into the U.S., they will not move through the Texas Department of Agriculture's export facilities along the Mexican border," Commis-

sioner Staples said. "I have instructed TDA employees overseeing the agency's live-stock export facilities along the Mexican border to not facilitate the trade of any Canadian cattle that would be inconsistent with the protocol for exporting U.S. cattle to Mexico."

Mexico."
Currently, Mexico will only allow the importation of U.S. dairy heifers under the age of 24 months, despite in-depth international negotiations to broaden this to breeding stock. Commissioner Staples is asking states that border.

stock. Commissioner Staples is asking states that border Mexico to follow Texas' lead. "I call upon the owners and managers of all livestock export facilities along the U.S.-Mexico border to join me in this effort," Commissioner Staples said. "Please remember your most important cus-Staples said. "Please remember your most important customers - the U.S. livestock producers. Until Mexico recognizes OIE trading standards and begins to accept U.S. breeding cattle consistent with those standards, we will continue this firm prohibition of specific Canadian cattle."

cattle."
TDA manages five live-stock export facilities on the border in Brownsville, Del Rio, Eagle Pass, El Paso, and Laredo. Additionally, there are two privately owned live-stock export facilities in Texas and three other facili-ties in New Mexico and Ari-zona.

In December 2003, a single

Canadian-born cow in the state of Washington was confirmed to have Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE). Since then, the U.S. has worked with Mexico as well as trading partners around the world to reestablish beef and live cattle trade consistent with international standards. Several countries have recognized those standards and are accepting U.S. live cattle. In May 2007, the World Organization for Animal Health (OIE) formally classified the U.S. as a controlled risk country for BSE. This classification, combined with strong U.S. regulatory safeguards, allows broad trade of beef and live cattle consistent with international standards.

In January, Mexican and U.S. officials signed an agreement to establish a livestockworking group to resolve many outstanding issues. Commissioner Staples will offer any assistance to the group to come up with a solution that benefits both nations.

"Mexico must recognize international standards and allow the importation of U.S. breeding stock immediately," Commissioner Staples said. "I consider both Mexico and Canada to be excellent markets for Texas products, just as Texans consume many Mexican-made products. I look forward to these issues being resolved soon."

Texas goat numbers show decline

The Jan. 1 Texas goat inventory was down 3% from last year at 1.27 million head, according to numbers from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service.

Meat and other goats, previously referred to as Spanish and other goats, totaled 1.09 million head, equal to the 2007 estimate. Total inventory of Angora goats is 150,000 head, down 17% from the 2007 estimate. The inventory of milk goats on Jan. 1, totaled 25,000 head, down 17% from the 2007 estimate.

Fire Ants

Red imported fire ants are native to South America and arrived in the U.S. in the 1930s aboard ships in Mobile, 1930s aboard ships in Mobile, Alabama, according to the Texas Imported Fire Ant Research and Management Project. They spread to southern states, arriving in Texas in the 1950s.

In Texas, they cost \$1.2 billion annually in agricultural losses, ecological damage, and pesticide expenses. Their sting makes them dangerous to humans, livestock, pets,

sting makes them dangerous to humans, livestock, pets, and wildlife. In South America, phorid flies and other predators keep red im-ported fire ants in check, Schofield said. The female flies attack the ants and lay eggs in their bodies. Larvae

eventually hatch and burrow into the ants' heads. There, they grow and release en-zymes that cause the heads to fall off. Mature flies even-tually emerge from the de-capitated heads, and the cycle starts over

capitated heads, and the cycle starts over.

The flies attack and eventually kill the ants, but their real impact is that they stalk the fire ants when they re foraging. Kim Schofield, an Extension program specialist in Dallas says this will reduce foraging activity which, in turn, helps limit food within the fire ant colony.

duced, and released. Test re duced, and released. Test re-leases began in 1997 to deter-mine whether the flies would populate designated areas and to make sure they posed no threat to anything other than fire ants.

In 2000, a governmental initiative brought several agencies together to raise and release large quantities of phorid flies in southern states. The program involves Extension, the University of Texas at Austin, U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service, the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Since that time, phorid fly populations have been established in Bastrop, Brazoria, Burleson, Cameron, Denton, Kenedy, Kerr, Lamar, Orange, Polk, Travis, Walker, and Wharton counties. New attempts to establish phorid flies in an area are ongoing, with the most recent attempts occurring in Red River County. Not all attempts are successful, but hopefully in time, the flies will begin to have an impact against the fire ant.

Though fire ants are a menace, the war against them shouldn't extend to the nearly 300 ant species that are native the Traves Collectivaly.

shouldn't extend to the nearly 300 ant species that are native to Texas. Collectively, ants are regarded as beneficial organisms in the environment.
