

City forges ahead with Park project

It was the goal of the Muenster City Council to hire a contractor to complete the City Park fence along Maple Street. There was no bid submitted for the whole process. The sole bid submitted this time was for metal only. Aiming for a start date soon after Germanfest, the City Council at its March 3 regular meeting, decided to act as their own contractor. Bids submitted at the February meeting were reviewed. City Administrator Stan Endres said that they checked with those submitting the bids and the prices remained the same. They decided to have Dangelmayr Construction, Inc. do the cement work and Mike Hofbauer the masonry work. The City will purchase pre-made metal panels for the fence and seek someone local to install them.

Endres said that the cost is estimated at \$40,000 for the 400 feet along Maple Street. No decision was made on approving the lease by Muenster ISD for the use of water well #3. It is used to water the football field. The school district pays \$600 and the electric bill on the well. It was discussed that the Muenster Jaycees hope to plant grass around their new baseball fields and would need water for the grass. Sharing the well between the two may be possible if there is sufficient water and a plan for sharing can be worked out. A decision was tabled until it could be discussed further with those involved.

The City will be advertising for bids on its 2008 paving project. Endres said that currently they are seeking

Runoff to determine Republican DA nominee

Election night was quite tense for candidates in the race for the Republican nominee for District Attorney of

the 235th Judicial District. Neither incumbent Cindy Stormer or her opponent Janice Warder attained more than 50% of the votes, so there must be a runoff to declare a winner. That election will take place on Tuesday, April 8 with early voting beginning on March 31 and ending on April 4. Only those who voted in the Republican Primary will be allowed to cast a ballot in the runoff election for District Attorney of the 235th Judicial District. There were 5,794 Republican voters taking part in the Republican Primary election in Cooke County.

In that contest, Warder received 2,831 votes or 49% of the votes. Stormer received 2,052 votes or 35%. The third candidate Chris Fostel received 903 votes (16%). In Muenster's Precinct #17, Stormer was the favorite with 77 votes compared to Warder's 63 and Fostel's 18. In Muenster's Precinct #18, Stormer was also the favorite there by a slim margin. Stormer received 283 votes, Warder 244, and Fostel 67. In other County Republican contests, Janelle Haverkamp got 3,975 votes to defeat her opponent Martin Peterson who received 1,782

votes. Since there was no opponent on the Democratic ticket, Haverkamp retains her seat as Judge of the 235th Judicial Court.

Tanya Davis also held on to her position as County Attorney. She got the Republican nomination with 3,369 votes to Frieda Fiske's 2,109.

Incumbent Mike Compton won the Republican nomination for Sheriff with 3,743 votes to the 2,006 cast for Ken Fogus. Compton will face Democratic nominee Ben Thurman who had no opponent. Thurman received

Warning sirens to blare Monday

Muenster, Lindsay, Valley View, and Lake Kiowa are planning to hold a severe weather warning test on March 10 at 6 p.m. Residents are encouraged to go through the drill they developed so that there is less panic when and if the real warning sounds. In the event of

threatening weather on Monday, the drill will be postponed to Monday, March 17. At 6 p.m., the tornado warning sirens will begin to sound. (The sound is cut from all channels when the sirens are sounding.) At that time, tune in to Nortex Channel 2 for more information. The

voice message will begin a few minutes after the warning sirens begin to sound. You will be told of the siren and warning system test.

This will provide the Volunteer Fire Departments the opportunity to test their sirens

and familiarize themselves with their drills.

During periods of possible severe weather, Muenster Volunteer Fire Department dispatches storm spotters to designated areas around Muenster. They watch the sky for any signs of approaching tornadoes and also warn when hail is headed to town. Radar is closely observed during this period also. If a tornado is spotted that could have Muenster in its path, a message is sent and the warning sirens sounded just as it will be on the 10th or 17th. The voice message will come on Channel 2 with more information and tell residents to take shelter.

The National Weather Service warns that tornadoes can destroy a building in a few seconds. Therefore it is important to know the safety rules for surviving a tornado.

In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or a small interior room such as a closet, bathroom, or an interior hallway on the lowest

level. Protect yourself from flying debris with thick blankets, sleeping bags, or mattresses.

At schools, as well as hospitals, factories, and shopping malls, go to the designated shelter areas, usually an interior hallway on the lowest floor without windows. Kneel on the floor against the wall and place your hands over your head to provide some protection for your head.

For mobile homes, portable classrooms, or vehicles, leave them and go to a strong building for shelter. If there is no shelter nearby, get into the nearest ditch or depression. Lie flat with your hands over your head.

MMH approves ORCA grant application

Muenster Memorial Hospital's Board of Directors agreed at the Feb. 19 meeting to pursue a capital improvement grant, possibly with a facility master plan grant attached, through ORCA. The ORCA grant is available every two years. The \$50,000 capital improvement grant has a 5% match requirement from the Hospital.

"What we are proposing is to replace all of the wall covering in all patient rooms, do away with the carpet in the hallways, and put up a PVC paneling," explained MMH Administrator Lynn Heller. "It's really nice looking stuff. It's tough, holds up to scratches, is easy to clean, and with the MRSA and all the other infections going around, cleanliness is real important. In the kitchen area, we need to upgrade our washing machine. There is a proposal here for television replacement with hospital grade high definition TVs (26 inch screen). This will be a big leap in the service that we provide our patients."

Besides the applying for a grant for the above items, the Board authorized applying for a \$20,000 facility master plan to be attached to the \$50,000 grant application if allowable.

Grant applications at MMH are handled by

Michael Kent. Administrator Heller deemed January as a "pretty good month" in regard to revenue. He noted that there was about 97 days of operating cash on hand.

January had 24 acute care patients admitted with 18 discharged for a total of 99 inpatient days and an average length of stay of 4.33 days.

Long term or swing bed patients totaled 10 in January with 12 discharges for a total of 238 days and a daily census of 7.68 for an average length of stay of 34.75 days. Other statistics showed that 337 patients were seen in the ER, 782 were treated in the Family Health Clinic, and 591 Home Health visits were made.

The Board officially called an election for May 10 for the three positions on the Board with expiring three-year terms. Should there be no contest, they agreed to authorize the Executive Committee to call off the election.

Bad debts totaling \$44,222.90 were approved for write off. This amount was a combination of 99 accounts that had been with collection agencies and could not be recovered.

Due to a conflict, the date of the March meeting was moved back one week. It will be held at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, March 25.

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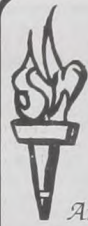
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Alexander brings Western Swing to NCTC with concert

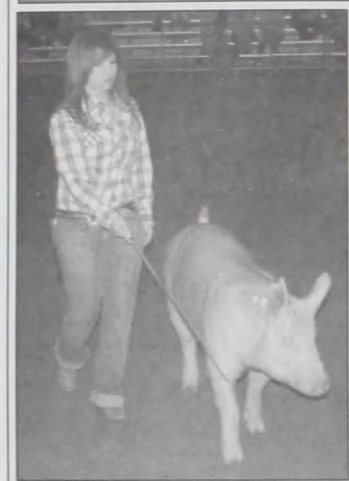

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Cancer threat often unidentified in women

Ovarian cancer, which has a reputation as a silent killer, will claim thousands of lives this year. For many women, the trouble is that the symptoms are often mistaken for other problems.

"Patients are often symptomatic for several months before the diagnosis, even with early-stage disease," said Dr. John Schorge, a gynecologic oncologist at UT Southwestern Medical Center, of the fifth-leading cause of cancer death in women. "The difficulty is distinguishing these symptoms from those that normally occur in women."

The most common symptoms of ovarian cancer include:

- Bloating;
- Pelvic or abdominal pain;
- Trouble eating or feeling full quickly;
- Urinary symptoms, such as urgency or frequency.

These symptoms are relatively common and can occur with any number of other

conditions. That's why Dr. Schorge said it's important to pay attention to the symptoms and consult a gynecologist if they persist daily for more than a few weeks.

In 2007, health-care experts predict about 22,000 new cases of cervical cancer for women in the U.S., and more than 15,000 deaths.

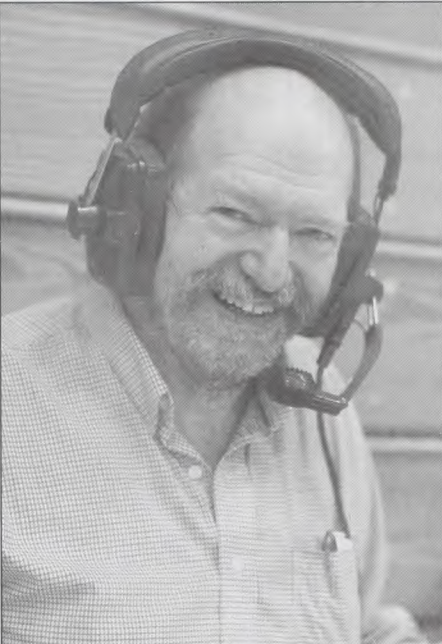
