

## Rennels feels at home in Muenster City secretary job

Marcie Rennels of Myra accepted the position of City secretary in Muenster and began work on Monday, Nov. 10. "Everyone who has come in has made me feel very welcome," remarked Marcie.

The new secretary credits City Administrator Stan Endres and Chris Yosten with being a great help in adjusting to the job. "I'm excited about getting the new software that has been installed on this computer up and going," she said. "It's been installed, but we're not using it yet. Hopefully we will get all of that up to date before the end of the year."

Circuit Breaker Sales in Gainesville employed Marcie before she took on the position of Muenster's secretary. She held two previous jobs in Muenster. Marcie worked as office manager for Dr. Currier for about four years and in the 1980s she was employed at Muenster Milling Company.

Marcie attended and graduated from Gainesville High School and attended Cooke County College, which is

now North Central Texas College.

Marcie is married to Paul Rennels. Their daughter and son-in-law Clarissa and Gary Hess live in Muenster with their three daughters, Haylie, age 16, Kylie, age 13, and Mikinzie, age 11. The girls attend Sacred Heart Catholic School.

A hobby that has occupied much of Marcie's time over the last two decades is raising English bulldogs. ## Klement pledges to serve as Precinct #4's commissioner

Surrounded by his family, and County officials and staff, Leon Klement took the oath of office as commissioner of Precinct #4. Standing at his side during the ceremony were his wife Christi, son Elliot, and daughter Bridgette. His other daughter Andrea Klement could not attend due to work obligations.

Klement will serve the two years remaining on the term of Commissioner Virgil Hess who died in July. Judy Hess served as commissioner for the interim between her husband's death and the election of someone to complete his term.

Votes from Cooke County cast in the Nov. 4 General Election were canvassed. Commissioners Court compared the number of ballots scanned with the number of signatures in each voting precinct. Precinct 17 showed 287 signatures and 290 ballots counted. Early voting had 6,756 scanned and 6,755 signatures. A provisional ballot was not scanned.

It was determined that out of the 15,000 votes, there was a discrepancy of around 30 votes. The Court unanimously approved the canvass of the election results. Commissioners Court then

certified the election results. Judge Freeman read names of County officials who ran for another term in office and were elected. Those were Precinct #1 Commissioner Gary Hollowell, Precinct #3 Commissioner Al Smith, Tax Assessor Collector Billie Jean Knight, 235th District Judge Janelle Haverkamp, 235th District Attorney Janice Warder, County Sheriff Michael Compton, County Attorney Tanya Davis, and Precinct 1 Constable Terry Gilbert. Certificates of election were presented to the officials who were present.

Names were read and certificates of election given to newly elected officials Dick Roth as Precinct 4 constable and Leon Klement as Precinct #4 commissioner.

Judge Freeman commended Judy Hess for serving as interim commissioner. "You took a lot of pressure off of the Court and you represented the people of Precinct #4 well." She received a standing ovation in appreciation for her service.

Since taking office, Klement said he has been busy getting acquainted with procedures, catching up with paperwork, and learning how things run. "It's going well," he noted. "Precinct #4

has a good crew. They know what they are doing. Work is continuing as it has." The Precinct #4 crew is currently busy stockpiling gravel as they ready for putting gravel on roads. They are also replacing the many county road signs that continuously disappear.

Another work in progress is the new Precinct #4 maintenance barn. The project was started by the late Precinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess. It has been a work in progress for several years. Hess oversaw the purchase of land for the barn and bought enough land to put an EMS substation on for the western side of Cooke County. The EMS station shares a water well and septic system with the maintenance barn, something Hess did to save the cost of two water wells and septic systems.

According to Commissioner Klement, the interior of the barn should be completed by mid December. The area that will be used to repair equipment is mostly finished. The office area is currently being wired for electricity, with other interior construction following.

Klement said an open house will be held after the building is completed.

## Drivers cautioned to keep vehicle titles up

Soaring gas prices are prompting many energy-conscious motorists to consider replacing what they're currently driving with more fuel-efficient models. With millions of cars and trucks expected to change hands in the upcoming months, the Texas Department of Transportation launched its *Protect Your Title, Texas* public awareness outreach campaign to remind consumers not to overlook the paperwork side of buying or selling a vehicle.

State law requires buyers and sellers to provide specific information to TxDOT to keep vehicle ownership records correct and up to date. When a vehicle is sold, traded in, or given away, the vehicle's title must be re-assigned to its new owner.

According to state officials, this is where things often go wrong.

"A vehicle's title lists who officially owns it," said Rebecca Davio, director of TxDOT's Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. "If the seller doesn't let us know when a vehicle is sold or traded, he or she will continue to show up in our records as the owner, which means the individual can be held responsible if the new owner racks up parking tickets, toll violations, or even more serious infractions."

Speaking at TxDOT's press event to announce the agency's new outreach effort, Tom Frost III, senior executive vice president of Frost Bank, warned motorists not to make the same mistake he did when he traded in his car two years ago.

"I assumed the dealership was taking care of the paperwork," Frost said. "I didn't know it was my responsibility to file a simple one-page piece of paper that could have saved me two years of stress and aggravation because of things the new owner did in a vehicle that was still titled in my name."

That one-page piece of paper, the Vehicle Transfer Notification, is now as simple as a few computer clicks. You can file the transfer notification for free on-line at [www.txdot.gov](http://www.txdot.gov). When you submit the notification within 30 days of selling your vehicle, you are protecting yourself from actions the new owner may commit with the vehicle.

As an additional precau-

tion, sellers also should take advantage of a new state law that allows them to transfer the license plates to another vehicle they own. When the plates and windshield registration sticker are removed, it forces the buyer of your car or truck to apply for a new title and register the vehicle in his or her name.

By law, buyers must retitle a vehicle within 20 days of purchase. Recurring penalties apply to procrastinators, beginning with an initial \$25 fine and \$25 for every month that the buyer fails to turn in an application for a new title.

"The best advice I can give to buyers and sellers who aren't sure what to do and what forms to fill out is to go together to their local county tax office to complete the sale," said Davio. "If that isn't possible, everything they need to know and all the necessary forms are on our Web site."

## The Counseling Corner Demands of an aging parent

Improvements in health care and lifestyles have resulted in more of us living longer lives. Many families now have one or more parents in their 70s, 80s, or older, parents who can complicate their grown children's lives with care and help demands.

It can be a difficult situation. While we may feel a strong sense of responsibility to an elderly parent, we also have very real obligations to our spouse and children. Balancing what we can do for an aging parent with our family's and own needs can be difficult.

One important consideration is how real an elderly parent's needs may be. Health issues certainly can bring demands that we want and need to meet.

But there are also elderly parents who are simply demanding, insisting that their adult children "owe" them and who present never-ending lists of needs, many of them unimportant.

Giving in to such demands out of guilt often leaves a person feeling angry and frustrated, and can create the same anger and frustration in his or her spouse and children. Such resentment is natural when the demands are overwhelming and coming at the expense of the immediate family.

In such cases, it's neces-

sary to look for alternatives to ease the stress, tension, and overall burden the elderly parent is placing on the family. For example:

- Are there siblings who can help? Even when geographically separated, your siblings may find various ways to contribute and ease your burden if asked.

- Are there neighbors or friends of your aging parent willing, perhaps eager, to help?

- Many areas also offer free or low cost Elder Day Care programs that can provide daily assistance.

- Can you manage your time better to make room for both an aging parent and your own life and family? Setting a schedule to visit and help, rather than being constantly "on-call," often makes things easier.

- Set priorities and stick to them. While it can be difficult to just say "no," it's often helpful to separate what's absolutely necessary for a parent's well being (doctor visits) from things that really can wait (gardening).

When you let an aging parent overextend you, everyone involved ends up suffering the consequences. While we all want to help someone who loved and nurtured us, it's also essential to understand our own limits, reasonably and realistically.

## Pre-holiday Preparation

- Clean the refrigerator: Take advantage of Clean Your Refrigerator Day on Nov. 15 and clean the icebox before it is loaded with turkey, mashed potatoes, and all those holiday treats. Start by removing the shelving and drawers, spray down the interior with a solution of 1-cup water and 1-teaspoon dishwashing liquid and clean condiment tops. Also, do not forget to clean the outside.
- Polish the silver: After spending a year in storage, silver serving pieces and candlesticks may become dusty or tarnished. Use a silver polish, which is safe to use on silver pieces that come in contact with food.
- Clean the fireplace and stock up on wood/propane: Place newspaper around the fireplace to protect the floor and shovel ashes into a bag. Use a vacuum to pick up the remaining lightweight ashes. For glass doors, scrape off any baked-on soot with a razor and use a vinegar-water solution (1/2-cup vinegar to 1-gallon water) to clean the glass. Stock up on wood and fire starters or check the propane tank to ensure the fire will burn brightly throughout the holiday season.

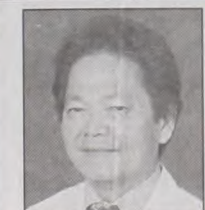

## Take a stroll through Christmases past

In addition to being on the main route for several famous cattle trails, Gainesville became famous in the 1930s for its Community Circus. Hometown performers spent their days at their regular jobs, and during their spare time, practiced with professional circus acts. At one time, there were over 75 acts in the three ring circus. After a catastrophic fire in the early 1960s, the circus ended.

Gainesville features many large homes listed on the National Register of Historic Homes or the Texas Historic Registry. Each year, during Victorian Stroll Weekend, the Historic South Gainesville Neighborhood Association chooses homes to display. This year, Dec. 11 - 13, six houses have been selected for the tour. The centerpiece is an 1898 three-story home, nearly destroyed by fire in 2005.

While the fire raged in December of that year, neighbors came out to offer hot chocolate, blankets, and support to the victims and firefighters. The home was believed by most to be a total loss. In the spring of 2006, a couple and their three teenage daughters purchased the house, and began the monumental task of restoration, with much of the work done by hand. This year, the family celebrates their first Christmas in this restored beauty and shares their experience with you through pictures and words. Five other homes are featured as well, ranging in age from circa 1893 to a 1948 ranch style cottage with the first central heat and air conditioning and a walk-in refrigerator. as well as maps, information and gifts may be purchased at the Morton Museum of Cooke County, 210 S. Dixon Street (one block south of the square). The Museum, celebrating its 40th anniversary, is in an 1884 building which has served as a city hall, fire station, and calaboose. The bell, originally atop the two-story brick building, rang every night at 9 p.m. for curfew and each time a fire broke out. In 1966, demolition of the building was begun and the top story was taken down. Concerned citizens requested that the demolition halt until the city could take steps to preserve the building as a county historical museum.

With the aid of the newly formed Historical Society, and a substantial grant from a former resident, the Morton Museum of Cooke County opened in December, 1968, and holds many items of historical interest as well as some architectural features, including a stained glass skylight, which came from the former home of U.S. Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey. This mansion, remodeled by a subsequent owner, William H. Dougherty, was donated to the City of Gainesville in the early 1920s as a memorial to their son, Newsome. With wings added, the building served as the local High School until 1958.

The Museum serves as a research facility, providing exhibits on events such as the "Great Hangings" during the Civil War, the Community Circus, and Camp Howze, a large military training base and POW camp for German prisoners. ## CASA hosts competition to win prizes for children

Throughout the State of Texas, only half of the more than 33,000 children in foster care because of abuse or neglect have a Court Appointed Special Advocate or a CASA Volunteer Advocate to look out for their best interests. This means that only 50% of the children who need a CASA volunteer looking out for them, has one.

In an effort to make certain that every child who needs an advocate has one, Texas CASA, the state organization that provides assistance and oversight to local CASA programs, has set up a state wide competition for volunteer recruitment that will result in prizes awarded to winning programs that include funds to provide "extras" that the foster care system cannot provide. This effort and the contest are known throughout the state CASA network as "volunteer roundup."

Prizes will be awarded to the individual volunteer who recruits the most volunteers this year, the program that increases its volunteer base by the largest percentage, and to the region that has the largest increase in its

number of volunteer advocates. The winning region will win more than \$20,000 in prizes for the children of that region.

Cooke County's CASA program, known as CASA of North Texas, recently kicked off their efforts to both recruit volunteers and win prizes for the children they serve. "We were thrilled to participate in this contest for several reasons. First, we always need volunteers to advocate for the children. Second, when you mention prizes to give the children, we're absolutely in," says CASA's director, Vicki Robertson.

"Since 1999, 100% of the Cooke County children who needed a CASA Advocate have had one," says Robertson. "We've provided advocates for all of the children, sometimes by the skin of our teeth. There have been many times that our staff have had to cover multiple cases, and volunteers (who had the time) have worked multiple cases. Our goal (locally) at this time is for each volunteer to work only one case. It doesn't hurt at all that we could win things like summer camp scholarships and other special things for the children."

CASA recently kicked off their Volunteer Roundup with a training session and entertainment in the beautiful western ballroom at Hidden Oaks Ranch, formerly known as C Quarter Circle Ranch. The training was geared toward teaching each person involved with CASA, including volunteers and board members, to be strategic in their thinking about those around them who are passionate about children, can make a commitment to serve CASA's children, and have the time to dedicate to truly making the difference in the children's lives. It is these people that CASA's children need. CASA will be seeking these people throughout the year both because advocates are needed and because the program wants to win the more than \$20,000 in prizes that will be available for the children.

The kickoff ended with a hilarious "Hee Haw" skit performed by a group of Lake Kiowa residents who added to the western theme of the evening and the kick off. The Hee Haw group ended the skit with a very sweet song adapted to show appreciation for CASA and its work for the abused and neglected children of Cooke County.

CASA of North Texas and its work for the children is supported by the Cooke County United Way, the City of Gainesville, Cooke County, the Priddy Foundation, and through the generosity of churches, businesses, and individuals.

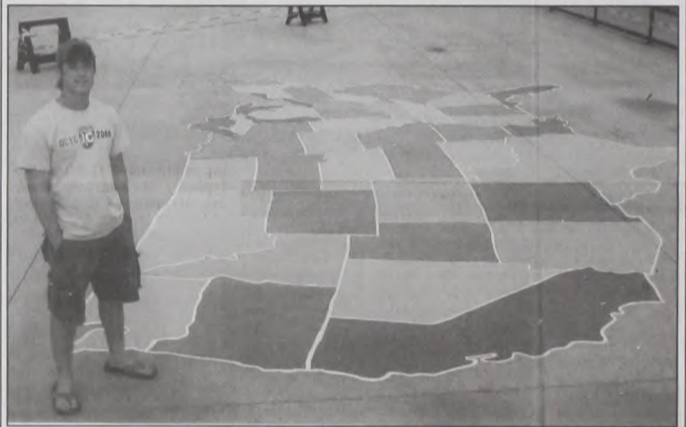

## Do your homework on college financing

In a tough economy, college applications typically increase. However, the current financial crisis might have consequences for how students—and their parents—pay for that education. A recent Sallie Mae/Gallup study shows that families typically use a complex funding mix: parents provide 48% of the funds, students kick in another 33%, and 15% comes from gift aid, like scholarships and grants. The average family covers nearly 40% of the costs by borrowing, so it pays to do your homework.

Early in the college planning process, parents and students should talk about what each can reasonably afford to pay. The good news is that earning a college degree positively affects lifetime earnings. It doesn't matter how it was earned. Students should explore all options for completing a college education, but keep financial factors in mind.

And while a college degree does generally lead to higher lifetime earnings, some careers do have limited earning potential. Pay shouldn't be the only factor when choosing

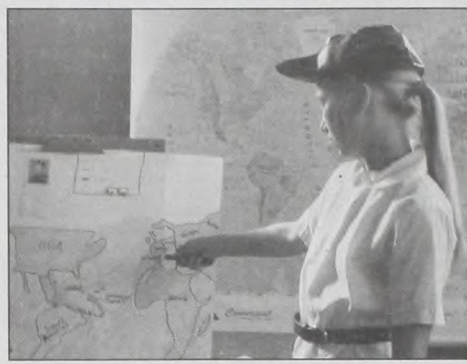

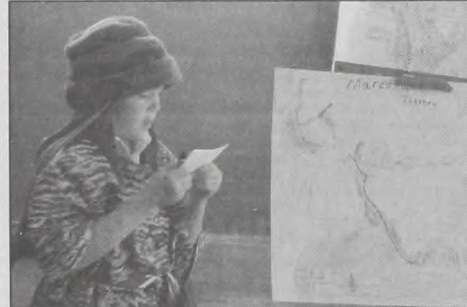

## Hornets advance in playoffs

The Hornets took the short drive to Whitesboro last Friday night for a rematch with Wolfe City. All-in-all, it added up to a 33-26 Muenster victory as the Hornets earned the title of Bi-District Champions and now advance to the Area round of the Texas 1A Championship playoffs.

"I'm excited for myself, the coaches, the kids, and the fans," said Hornet Coach Allen Cross. "We've achieved our goal - getting to the playoffs and winning. I talked to the kids about last year, their tough start, and how they stuck it out, now getting rewarded for their work, effort, and character. I'm mostly proud of their effort. They earned the win."

Wolfe City started the opening possession of the game from their 40 yard line. The third play ended the attempted drive when Eric Hellman intercepted a Wolf pass, setting the Hornets on the Wolves 42 yard line.

A 21 yard run by Levi Trubenbach with a short run each by Corey Reynolds and Trubenbach took Muenster to the 17. A Trubenbach completed pass to Garrett Walterscheid put 6 points on the board for the Hornets. Tanner Herr added the point after and Muenster was up 7-0.

Wolfe City bounced right back, scoring on the first snap of the drive with a 44 yard run. The PAT kick failed for a 7-6 score.

The Hornets got in six plays to the 17, but the threat to score ended with an interception. The Wolves could not get a 1st down in four plays and gave the ball back to the Hornets at the 38 yard line.

A 15 yard penalty and a short run by Paul Crabtree took the Hornets to the 20. A Trubenbach to Hellman pass set up a 1st and goal on the 6. A 6 yard plunge into the end zone by quarterback Trubenbach and the extra kick by Matt Flusche gave Muenster a 14-6 lead with 17 seconds remaining in the 1st quarter.

The next snap, Wolfe City scored on a 46 yard run. The PAT failed for a 14-12 score to end the 1st period.

A 60 yard kickoff placed the Hornets on the 20 yard

line. Nine plays later, Muenster was forced to punt on 4th and 22. The rugged Hornet defense held off the Wolves with an 11 yard sacked loss, forcing a punt that put Muenster on the 10 yard line. The Hornets lost a yard, punted, with the Wolves returning the ball to the Muenster 17. A penalty and the Hornet defense stopped Wolfe City at the 10. Muenster got in four plays to end the 1st half.

Muenster took the 3rd quarter kick, got a 1st down by penalty, then punted. Wolfe City fumbled the return, with Reynolds recovering the ball 9 yards from the end zone. The Hornets' chance for a touchdown halted the next play when the Wolves covered a loose ball at the 4.

After the defense forced Wolfe City to punt, runs by Crabtree, Trubenbach, and Reynolds, and a pass to Herr took the Hornets to the 1 yard line. A keeper by Trubenbach with 4:15 on the clock and a Flusche PAT gave Muenster a 21-12 lead.

Corey Reynolds caught the Wolves for a 39 yard loss, forcing a punt. The Hornets lost 7 and punted back. Wolfe City showed some spark on their next drive, taking the ball into the final period and scoring, closing the gap to 21-19.

It was three plays and punt for Muenster, who got the ball back when Reynolds covered a fumbled ball. Short runs by Crabtree and Trubenbach were followed by a 46 yard touchdown run by Trubenbach. The PAT failed and Muenster stretched their lead to 27-19 with 5:59 remaining in the game.

A short kick was recovered by Jason Luke on the Wolf 42. Crabtree and Trubenbach moved the ball as Muenster appeared to be on the verge of putting the game away as they drove to the 3 yard line. A quarterback keeper by Trubenbach and a PAT from Flusche put the Hornets ahead 33-19 with 2 minutes on the clock.

Wolfe City ran five plays, scoring with 37 seconds remaining in the game for a 33-26 score.

Muenster covered a short kick and took three knees to kill the clock.

## TPWD to consider sweeping deer hunting regulation changes

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) has transitioned away from political boundaries for the purpose of monitoring white-tailed deer populations and toward biologically-based communities or Resource Management Units (RMUs). The department has identified 33 unique RMUs across the state having similar soils, vegetation types, and land use practices they believe will more accurately capture deer population dynamics. The intent is to develop deer season bag limit frameworks based on these units, although implementation will still track county boundaries to avoid confusion among hunters.

In a briefing of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission's Regulations Committee, TPWD unveiled an extensive suite of potential regulation changes in deer harvest throughout much of the state.

The department will be gathering public input on the possible proposals during the next couple of months and present to the commission in January a comprehensive set of proposals.

Those proposals will then go back out for official comment during a series of public hearings around the state next spring. A final decision will be made by the commission at its March 25-26, 2009, public meeting.

### Expansion of antler restriction regulations

One key potential change involves further expansion of the department's successful antler restriction regulations into 52 additional counties where biologists have identified a need to provide greater protection of younger buck deer. In these counties, data indicates more than 55% of the harvested bucks are two-and-a-half years of age or younger, which creates an imbalance in the deer herd age structure.

According to Clayton Wolf, TPWD big game program director, based on data to date in the 61 counties where the rule is currently in effect, the

antler restrictions have improved age structure while maintaining ample hunting opportunity.

Potentially affected counties include: Archer, Clay, Cooke, Denton, Grayson, Harris, Jack, Kaufman, Montague, Tarrant, Wichita, and Wise.



### Bag limit changes

The department is also looking at increasing the bag limit in most Cross Timbers and Prairies and eastern Rolling Plains counties from three deer (no more than one buck, no more than two antlerless) or four deer (no more than two bucks and no more than two antlerless) to five deer (no more than 2 bucks).

Some counties affected include: Archer, Clay, Jack, Throckmorton, and Wichita. Another possible change would increase the bag limit from three deer to five deer (no more than one buck) in selected counties in the western Rolling Plains. Although white-tailed deer densities are highly variable in this part of the state, areas containing suitable habitat have become saturated with deer and whitetails are expanding into marginal to poor habitat.

Another issue where deer surveys indicate a need for change involves additional antlerless deer harvest opportunities. Therefore, the department is looking to increase antlerless deer hunting or "doe days."

This proposal offers more hunting opportunity as well as making "doe days" more consistent within each resource management unit (a suite of counties with similar

population and habitat characteristics). Data indicate that the deer populations can withstand the additional harvest pressure proposed.

The department is also looking at expansion of the late antlerless and spike season into additional counties.

Some counties affected include: Archer, Clay, Comanche, Cooke, Denton, Montague, Tarrant, Wichita, and Wise.

Biologists are also looking to implement a special muzzleloader season in additional counties, lengthen the existing muzzleloader season by five days to be equivalent in length with the special antlerless and spike buck seasons in other counties, and alter the current muzzleloader bag composition to allow the harvest of any buck (not just spike bucks) and antlerless deer without permits if the county has "doe days" during the general season.

In response to a commission directive to seek additional opportunities for youth participation, the department is looking at extending the early youth only season to include the entire month of October and the late youth-only season by 12 days during January in selected counties to run concurrently with late antlerless and spike seasons.

The intent of the proposal is to allow adults and children to hunt together during different special seasons.

The department is also considering a petition to implement a general open season (with antlerless harvest by permit only) in Grayson County. TPWD staff has determined that there is no biological necessity for retaining the current rule, which restricts lawful methods to archery equipment and crossbows, but will be seeking input from county residents prior to making any official proposal to the commission in January.

The date and locations of scoping meetings in Grayson have not been finalized.

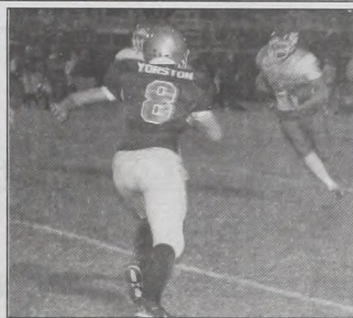
