Man perishes in house fire

Jonathan Parker, age
26, of 414 North Sycamore
Street in Muenster died after a fire in his home. Using
his cell phone, Parker called
9-1-1 at about 4:24 a.m. on
Monday, Dec. 1. He reported
being trapped in a house on
fire.

Muenster Volunteer Fire
Department was called out
at 4:28. They were called to
411 N. Sycamore, an address
that does not exist. Muenster Fire Chief Herbie Knabe
noted that Parker had inhaled a lot of smoke and the
dispatcher could not clearly
understand him. Also, cell
phones do not have address
locators as do land lines.
The firemen searched the
west side of Sycamore looking for signs of smoke or fire.
The dispatcher stayed with
the fire department during
the search. The cell phone
call had not been disconnected and the dispatcher
reported hearing sirens on
the phone.

At 4:35 a.m., the Muenster
firemen spotted smoke com-

the phone.
At 4:35 a.m., the Muenster firemen spotted smoke coming out of the chimney of the

house at 414 N. Sycamore. Windows at the residence were hot to the touch, so the front door was forced open. Smoke filled the house and a fire burned in the front room at the north wall. Firemen doused the fire and searched for Parker. At the same time the back door was being forced open. Firemen found Parker on the floor about four feet from the back door. He had been unable to find his way out due to the heavy his way out due to the heavy

his way out due to the heavy smoke.

Parker was pulled from the house at 4:42 a.m., and Cooke County EMS gave him medical care. He was transported to Muenster Memorial Hospital, but could not be revived. Justice of the Peace John Roane was called to the Hospital to pronounce his death. He was pronounced at 6:20 a.m. Cause of death was found to be smoke inhalation, according to Judge Roane.

According to Chief Knabe, the cause of the fire was investigated by Cooke County Fire Marshal Ray Fletcher and three TASK Force fire

investigators. It was caused by a mouse that chewed a wire creating a short circuit in a plug in box. The mouse was found in the box.

Knabe speculated that the fire had smouldered for some time, filling the house with smoke. There were two smoke detectors in the home, but neither worked. One had no battery and the other had a battery that was two years old.

Muenster had 22 firemen

Muenster had 22 firemen at the scene. They were assisted by the Myra Volunteer Fire Department with 11 firefighters, and by the Lindsay Volunteer Fire Department and Saint Jo Volunteer Fire Department.

Chief Knabe urges everyone take time to check the batteries in their smoke and fire detectors. Early warning of a fire can save lives, possibly yours or your family's. Take the time to put in new batteries when needed, and never "borrow" the batteries from your smoke detectors for use in other items. That may be the time they are really needed.

Muenster's recycling bin has been in place for more than a week and many are actively recycling already.

Others have expressed concern over what can be recycled and how to do it.

The recycling bin is located on the first block of West Second Street near the City yard and shop. It is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week at this time.

The majority of what had previously been placed in trash bags and set out on the curb for trash pick-up can now be taken to the recycling bin. What cannot be recycled is anything coated with food that can't be rinsed out such as pizza boxes and paper towels, number 6 plastics, items contaminated by oil, anti-freeze, or similar chemicals; and large items such as household appliances and furniture.

What can be recycled includes newspapers, junk paper, etc.

According to City Administrator Stan Endres, the City must pay a fee each time that the container is hauled away to be emptied and the City receives money back according to the amount on the truck and the price of recycled items at the time. He said the heavier the load, the more the City gets back. Endres also said that with the low windows on the recycling bin, it will be difficult to fill it to capacity. He was told that it will need to have the windows adjusted so that it can be filled to a higher level.

Dan Fette featured for building green

In the Saturday, Nov. 8 issue of *The Dallas Morning News*, Dan Fette, Muensterborn and raised, was featured on the front page of the Home Center section of the paper, in an article titled "Dan Fette - pioneer for green building."

A four column color picture with Danny standing in front of a home had a cutline which read Denton Affordable Housing Authority and Mr. Fette joined forces to build affordable houses in the \$130,000 to \$150,000 price range - that would have an air conditioning and heating bill of \$45 per month or less."

The article noted that Fette called himself a tree hugger, building a solar house years ago to "practice what I preached." After attending a green-building conference, Fette started to experiment in making stone with environmentally friendly fly ash, creating a stone product for Lodestone, a stone company

he owns. He has installed his product on six buildings in the Denton area.

In 2004, Fette was hired as the superintendent on a Zero Energy home in Frisco. After he built the near \$1 million home, he was asked about building affordable "green" homes.

The Denton Affordable Housing Authority with the help of Dan Fette has built nine of 14 houses in a Denton subdivision that are all but one sold or rented. The houses have been recognized with several awards, including a commendation from the U.S. Congress.

"We proved you don't have

"We proved you don't have to spend an arm and a leg to build a green house." Fette is quoted in the article.
Fette is chairman of Green Built North Texas, and last month received the Builder Advocate of the Year Award for his visionary work in bringing green building to North Texas.

Storm spotters gear up for Skywarn Recognition Day

From the evening of Dec. 5 through Dec. 6, amateur radio frequencies across north Texas will be filled with transmissions between severe storm spotters. However, the reports won't include information on hail, floods, or winds. Instead, the activity will be part of the 10th annual "Skywarn Recognition Day," co-sponsored by the American Radio Relay League and the National Weather Service (NWS).

Skywarn Recognition Day celebrates the contributions made by amateur radio storm spotters to the severe weather detection and warning system. During the day, amateur radio teams will gather at NWS offices across the country, and will attempt to contact as many other weather offices and spotters in the field as possible. It is estimated that over 100 NWS offices will participate in this year's event.

Gary Woodall, warning coordination meteorologist at the NWS Fort Worth Forecast Office, described the importance of the spotters. "We have some powerful electronic tools for observing thunderstorms. However, those tools only tell part of the story of what's happening in or near a storm. By combining the electronic data with the near-storm observations we get from spotters, we have a much more complete picture of the storm."

"We're happy to participate in Skywarn Recognition Day as a small 'thank-you' to our dedicated storm spotters."

"We're happy to participate in Skywarn Recognition Day as a small 'thank-you' to our dedicated storm spotters," Woodall added. "We have a tremendous network of storm spotter groups across north and north-central Texas. The amateur radio operators serve as the backbone for many of the groups, with law and fire officials, city and county employees, and members of the public also making valuable contributions."





Gainesville Kiwanis hear MHMR Services plan

Mental Health Mental Retardation of Texoma's Crisis Services was the topic for the Gainesville Kiwanis Club program on Nov. 25. Members learned that MHMR Services of Texoma has developed a plan to respond to individuals experiencing a mental health crisis in Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson counties. The crisis line is for anyone having a mental health crisis, and that is not restricted to only MHMRST clients. It is the purpose of MHMRST to provide staff who are vested with the responsibility of providing: Crisis screening, Assessments, Intervention, Relapse Prevention Services.

A toll free crisis hotline is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. Crisis calls are answered by trained staff with Certification by the American Academy of Sucidology. The number is: 877-277-2226.

Crisis services are provided by credential staff that have academic credentials and training that qualifies them to meet the state's requirements to perform as a Qualified Mental Health Professional—Community Services. The team has special training in crisis response procedures, techniques for managing crisis, and suicide

prevention. The team is also trained to provide services to children in crisis.

Most requests for a crisis response are received through the Crisis Hotline. The Mobile Crisis Outreach Team (MCOT) will make face-to-face contact if the crisis cannot be handled by telephone. Persons having been in crisis will be provided follow-up support for a period determined necessary by treating staff, up to 30 days.

All crisis assessments are performed using the crisis elements of the Texas Recommended Assessment Guidelines for both adults and children or by use of another Department of State Human Services approved screening tool. Assessments include:










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
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Knights fall to AC Wildcats

County Agent report

Reduced tillage
No-till farming is a phrase
that has been used for several years. No-till farming
uses herbicides to control
weeds and prepare seed
beds for the pending crop.
The term refers to the farming industry's innovation to
minimize tillage and maximize returns.

minimize tillage and maximize returns.

Rather than no-till farming, most farmers utilize what we refer to as "conservation tillage." This article hopes to address "conservation tillage" and "rotational tillage " versus conventional tillage."

tillage "versus conventional tillage. In experiments by Texas A&M faculty, yields from conservation tillage compared to conventional tillage have not been documented. However, the economic advantages derived from conservation tillage include: smaller equipment, less fuel, fewer repairs and maintenance, less labor, and better field accessibility, all resulting in less capital investment.

Conventional tillage is thought to help prevent soil compaction. In truth, "The primary cause of compaction comes from heavy equipment crushing air space out of moist soil." (Publication B-6189, Texas AgriLife Ex-

tension Service). Therefore, conservation tillage lessens field traffic thereby reducing soil compaction.

In "rotational tillage," soils are tilled every second or third season. Rotational tillage, strip tillage, or zone tillage eliminates field soil compaction problems within the soil's top four inches. Soils prone to soil compaction are generally comprised of 50% clay (or greater) or are located in regions with more than 30 inches of rainfall per year. In areas with less clay and rainfall, compaction does not seem to be a problem, and the topsoil actually becomes workable over time.

Fertilizer placement and application are more difficult in conservation tillage, thereby justifying rotational tillage. Surface applications of fertilizer can result in nitrogen loss from volatilization and cause phosphorus and other immobile nutrients to accumulate near the soil surface. Nutrient deficiencies are likely to occur in no-till seed beds where crops are planted the same each year. Rotational tillage with a chisel plow will break up soil firmness in the top six inches and may replace herbicide application.

Weeds compete for moisture, fertilizer, and light, and can be greatly inhibited if the soil is not tilled because tillage continually brings weeds to the surface, where they readily germinate with rain. Faculty at Texas A&M find it easier to control weeds under no-till and reduced tillage systems.

Covering the soil with residue rather than tilling improves water infiltration. The impact of rain on base soil destroys small aggregates, or clods, causing the soil to seal over. Residue breaks the impact of rain drops, "wicks" or moves moisture into the soil, and reduces runoff.

In Cooke County, conservation tillage may work on various crops, including corn, sorghum, and small grains.

In summary, the best reasons to utilize reduced-till-

age practices are associated with gaining water infiltra-tion while reducing water related erosion.
