Board members and Su-perintendent John Kaufman met for a total of three and one half hours in budget plan-ning workshops for the 2008-09 school year. The Board met again on June 30, opening with a pub-

lic hearing on the 2008-09 Proposed Tax Rate and Pro-posed Adopted Budget. No audience was in attendance. In the adoption of the budget, the Board approved the bud-get as presented. They also approved the Maintenance and Operation Tax Rate at 1.04 cents per hundred dollar evaluation, and the Interest and Sinking Tax Rate at .12681 cents per hundred dol-lar evaluation for 2008-09.

Joe was born June 26, 1909, in Tours, Texas, the sec-ond of the 11 children of Charles and Annie Seith Wimmer. The family moved to Calera, Oklahoma when he was five years old and then to Muenster in 1919 where he had lived the remainder of his life. He was a member of Sa-cred Heart Parish since mov-ing to Muenster. He married La Verna Schmitz on May 23, 1933 in Sacred Heart Church. She preceded him in death on March 1, 1968. He later mar-ried Clytie Sampler in 1972. She died in 1980. Joe was a member of the Knights of Golumbus and was a long time member of the Muenster School Board. He Weinzapfel in the farm and ranch business for 42 years. He raised sheep and cattle and farmed the land to har-vest hay and feed for the ani-mals. He was known as the best coyote trapper in the area. He trapped primarily to eliminate the predators that were after his sheep. Sportsmen are reminded all current annual hunting and fishing licenses (except for the year-to-date fishing icense) expire Aug. 31. Texas ssues 2.1 million hunting and fishing licenses annually through 28 TPWD field of-fices, more than 65 state barks, and at over 1,500 re-ailers across Texas. Because dove season in the North and Central Dove Xones opens on a Monday, here will be a weekend rush to buy licenses. The Depart-nent averaged less than 20,000 license transactions a day during the two weeks prior to the dove season opener as opposed to five or six times that number on the days around opening week-and. A last-minute license pur-

six times that number on the days around opening week-end. A last-minute license pur-chase rush is probably inevi-table in some areas of the state, TPWD officials say, particularly along the I-35 corridor where many dove hunters descend. Fortu-nately, there are other license ouying avenues available. Hunters can also purchase icenses online through the TPWD web site (http:// www.tpwd.state.tx.us/) or by calling (800) 895-4248. There s a \$5 convenience fee for ei-ther option and a major credit card is required. License sales call center nours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday—Friday. The online ransaction system is avail-ible 247. A license is mailed sepa-rately Confirmation numbers will verify that a license has been purchased, which is suf-icent for dove hunting, but will not allow hunters to take Tata.

Ill not allow hunters to take ab, or wildlife that requires tag. In addition to a hunting li-ense, all wing shooters will eed to purchase a game bird tamp. To hunt doves or teal a September, a Migratory iame Bird Stamp (\$7) is re-uired. Duck hunters also eed to purchase a Federal uck Stamp and receive HIP Harvest Information Pro-ram) certification. HIP cer-fication will be printed on ne license at the time of sale nly after the purchaser an-wers a few brief migratory ird questions. Lifetime li-ense holders must also be IIP-certified and purchase he Federal Duck Stamp to unt migratory birds. All ther state stamp endorse-nents are included with a fetime license.

Bark chips accumulate at the base of the tree. A heavily-in-fested tree will be completely girdled by white larvae feed-ing beneath the bark. The adult beetle is about one-half inch-long, shining black and distinctively marked with four small white spots on the wing covers. Larvae are flat-headed wood borers that may attain an inch or more in length as they mature. After feeding beneath the bark, the larvae bore into the wood to pupate. The adult leaves a D-shaped exit hole as it emerges.

# As summer heats up, so do water toxicity issues

Early summer rains provided for an excess of water inthe area this year, but as things start to heat up and dry up we may be facing new livestock problems. Bluegreen algae in dirty and drying ponds and flood overflow areas can cause fatal toxicity in all domestic animals that drink from these ponds. The culprit is not really an algae and may not even be bluegreen. The problem is caused by a group of organism known as cyanobacteria, or bacteria with photosynthesis capability. The colors range from blue to bright green but may also be red or purple. Other these organisms will
