

Commissioners approve Proposed Budget and Proposed Tax Rate

By Janet Felderhoff County Judge Bill Free-man opened the Monday, July 28 Commissioners Court meeting with a moment of si-lence in remembrance of Pre-cinct #4 Commissioner Virgil Hess. Hess died the day be-fore.

After much debate, Com-missioners Court approved a proposed budget for 2008-09. It includes a 5% cost of living salary increase and a 2% raise for County employees. Country of Origin label-ing - considerations for cattle owners The 2007 Farm Bill (passed in May 2008) included provi-sions to implement mada-tory Country of Origin Label-ing (COOL). COOL was ac-tually directed in the 2002 Farm Bill but was not imple-mented because of funding issues. Unless there is change during rule-making. COOL will be enforced at re-tail beginning Oct. 1, 2008. The following was ex-cerpted from a release in late May: The Farm Bill amends the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946 to provide new COOL requirements for beef, lamb, pork, and goat meat. It also amends the list of cov-ered commodities to include chicken, macadamia nuts, ginseng, and pecans. (Note that peanuts were covered by the existing COOL law.) The provision specifies labeling requirements for products that are of U.S. country of origin, imported for immedi-ate slaughter, and from a for-eign country of origin. For meat products to be eligible for U.S. country of origin, the product must be derived from an animal that was born, raised, and slaughtered ex-clusively in the United States, with a narrow exception for animals from Alaska or Ha-waii and transported through Canada), or present in the United States on or before July 15, 2008 and, once present in the U.S. on or be-ore July 15, 2008, and that remain un the U.S. after that date, are grandfathered (eli-gible for U.S. country of ori-gin label. The USDA is currently writing the rules for COOL. They are supposed to be out any time. The dMcCollum, Exten-tion beef cattle specialist in Amarillo, suggests it might be worthwhile for livestock. We do not know the rules yet, but a July 15, 2008 inventory might prove useful in the fu-
